POLITICAL NOTES,

The sitting of the Council of State on Monday was entirely occu-pied with the death of Dr. Caros Maria Ramirez, A Message was received from the Execut-ive stating that it had directed ministerial honors to be paid to the deceased and the national flag to be half musted on the day of the funeral (yesterday.) This was approved, and in addition it was resolved that the body should lie in state in the Senate Chamber that Dr. J. C. Blanco should speak at the tuneral in the name of the Council, that the funeral expenses should be borne by the National Treasury, and that the sitting should be suspended in honor to his memory. This having been voted, the sitting terminated. The death of Dr. Berniesz was

The death of Dr. Ramirez was practically the only topic yes-terday, all our native contemporaries placing their columns in deep mourning and devoting more or less lengthy obituary notices to his memory. They are unanimous in recognising him as one of the most brilllant political writers and journalists of the generation, and there is no doubt that his death has made a great impression. The luneral tock place yesterday afternoon and was most im-posing, but owing to the late hour at which it concluded we are unable to give any particulars today.

Some surprise has been caused by the issue of a Decree appointing Lieut. Col. José De Grossi as 1st Chief of the 3rd Chasseurs in place of Col. Martin Souberan (at present on special mission at the front ier.) The Decree contains an obvious contradiction, for it gives as the reason for the change that Col. Souberan has asked for temporary leave on ac-count of aggravated ill-health, and yet adds that it is the intention of yet adds that it is the intention of the Government to give him a preferential post. The matter has set tongues gossiping, on account of the way in which it was endeavoured to implicate Col. Souberan in the military mutiny of July, and his relations with the Government since. Serve with the Government since. Sergt. Major José Calleriza is named 2nd Chief of the same regiment.

The Decree has been issued accepting the resignation of Ool Zoilo Pereyra as Prelect of Tacuarembó, and placing the post temporarily in charge of Col Celedonio Islas, Inspector General of Police in the interior.

An order has been issued from the Army Staff Office, according to which all military officers coming to the capital from the interior must report themselves at the Staft Office, and no officers may leave

They have gone out of their way to invite purchasers, but first of all they have seen that the mainspring of their reputation was righttheir flocks well-bred and regis

tered.

One of the most practical meas-ures that could possibly be adopted to advertise a breed is to send representative specimens to foreign showyards so that the public of other countries may have a good idea of its merits. It is, therefore, with no little pleasure that we pub lish a full account, descriptive and illustrative, of an extensive ship ment of pure breed sheep which sailed on Saturday week for the Argentine. Messrs. Cooper and Nephews, to whose enterprise and initiative this step is due, have performed a service to English sheep-breeders, which, doubtless, they will make it their duty not to overlook. The various lots sent out are quite representative of the best leatures of English sbeepbreeding. They are numerous enough to satisfy all requirements and if experience of them should lead to further business, as it not improbably will, then the primary object will have been attained., It is clear that the time has come

when more vigorous efforts should be made by certain of our breed societies to bring the merits of their sheep under the eye of the foreigner. There is, indeed, a vast feld for enterine, but we are field for enterprise, but we are convinced that the investment is sound, if the credit long. It is not enough to leave to individuals what properly comes within the province of a society. If by no other means than disseminating information abroad concerning their respective protégés, the societies would be performing a grand service to every member who aspires to share in that growing branch of our export trade. Messrs. Cooper have, at very con siderable expense, been instrumen tal in at last securing one huge advertisement for the various breeds included in their shipment, but unless this is followed up by obviously be robbed of a consid able degree of its utility. It won be a great pity if breeders ov looked this opportunity which enterprise of a private firm t placed at their disposal. We had devoted a considerable section our space this week to this la export shipment, having obtain for our special use photographs the various lots before embarki The experiment promises to memorable one, if for no ot reason than that it may establis precedent. Who knows? The collection of sheep shipped on Saturday last, July 30th, 1898, por ss. Belleone by Messrs, Cooper and Nephews, of Berkhampstead, for the purpose of exhibition and sale at Palmero Show, Buenos Ai-res, in September, is not only of extraordinary, but of national, im-nortance. It is truly twoical of that portance. It is truly typical of that British pluck and enterprise that has brought the live stock of England to its position of pre-eminence in the world, for in all cases the in-dividual breeders are themselves undertaking the sole risk of their animals being sold at Buenos Aires at remunerative prices. Each and every sheep is being sent out without the slightest guarantee as to what they will be sold for. All that the consign-ors know at present is the prob-able amount of costs for which they will be liable. Accordingly, then, England's flock-masters may well be proud to include amongst their ranks so large a number of fellow-breeders who have enough public spirit, not only to send out valuable sheep on the chance of their being sold at remunerative prices, but at the same time to undertake the whole of the ex-penses. No time was then lost to bring the matter before the sheep breaders' execution of formed and breeders' societies of England, and the result was that the following societies feil in with the sugges-tions of Messrs. Cooper, and ap-pealed to their members to provide the needful sheep to form what may be termed the official representation of their breeds: -- Coiswold, Devon Long - wool, Hampshire Down, Kent or Romney Marsh, Oxford Down, Recommon, Suf-tolk, and Wensleydale. When it was found that the other breeds would not be officially represented, other steps were taken to secure by private means a typical representation of them, which were so far successful that the Lincola Shropshire and South down breeds (the last selected by Mr. W. W. Chapman) were able to be included in the collection. Of course, it is a great pity that all breeds were not officially represented; but when the ruling powers of these societies were either unable to agree as to how the selection should be

made, or so short-sighted as to be unable to discern the enormous importance it was for their breed to be represented at this important show, the only thing that remained was to go direct to the individual breeders, and thus give to a few that advertisement which might, and could, have been shar-ed by many. The Dorset Horns, Leicesters, and Cheviots are three leading breeds not represented.



China is waking up, after a slumber of many centuries. - The mystery of the man found murdered in Calle Uruguayana on Sunday evening has not yet been solved, but the police have alrea-dy anotser horror to occupy them-selves with. Early on Monday morning, in a door way in the Avenida Paz, there was found, wrapped up in some dirty rags, the dead body of a little boy, about 4 years of age, terribly emaciated and covered with sores and bruises. It was at first thought the child had been strangled, but examination showed that death had occurred from natural causes, probably accelerated by ill-treat-ment. After a great deal of trouble it was discovered that he was the son of a washerwoman of dissolute habits, named Martina Ayoroa, living at Ejido 26 When arrest-ed, the mother declared that the child had died a natural death, but as she was too poor to bear the cost as she was too poor to bear the cost of funeral she left the body in the street! Her neighbours lestify to her constant cruel treatment of the child, and the general opinon is that she murdered him.

- Very contradictory statements are appearing in the telegrams about affairs at Fashoda, in the Soudan, towards which Sir Herbert Kitchener is now marching. At first it was said that he town was occupied by the French expe-dition under Mr. Marchand, and a conflict between the French and Bruish troops was thought almost certain. Then it was said that the French Government had sent orders to Mr. Marchand to evacuate, allowing the British to occupy it and cooperating with them The latest tale is that there are no French troops there at all, and the telegrams have been creat-

ing excitement out of nothing ! -The McDougall mills, at Millwall London, have just been des-troyed by fire. 2000 tons of wheat were consumed Losses £75,000. -At Glasgow 5 persons have been killed and 9 injured in the collapse of a factory which was burnt on Sunday.

-Gold mines said to be richer than those of Klondyke have been discovered at Alun, British Columbia, and expeditions are alrea-dy on the way thither. —Archduke Heinrich of Austria,

But the Archduke, pointing to Miss Leopoldine Hoffmann, pronounced slowly and solemnly the words, «Most Reverend, this is my (wile.» Miss Holfmann immediately rose in ber turn, and said. «This is my husband.» According to the theory of «passive assistance» in Germany and Austria, these words, spoken before a priest rendered the marriage of the pair valid and sacramentally concluded. The Emperor was said to be extremely astonished, but could do nothing, for the Church says; «What God has joined, let no man put asunder.»

Of this increase, 155,378 was vegetative increase and 70,622 by immigration. The births for the year 1897 were as follows: -Males, legitimate, illegitimate, 10,585 3,118 total, 18,708 Females, legitimate, illegitimate, 10.293 2,976 total, 18,269 26 972 The rate of illegitimacy in 1897 was 22 59 % of the total births which compares with 25 % in 1896, 24 % in 1895, 23 % in 1894, 22 % in 1893, 21 % in 1892 and 20 % in 1891. It is worth noting, in com-parison with this that the highest rate of illegitimacy in Europe (ac-cording to Mulhall's Dictionary of Statistics) is 12.9 % in Austria Statistics) is 12.9 % in Austria while it descends to as low as 1.6 % in Greece and 2.3 % in Ireland. The in Greece and 2.3 % in Ireland. The high rate in Uruguay, however, mustin part be attributed to the difficulties of getting married in the less-populated districts of the interior, and also, for the poorer classes, to the heavy fees attached to the civil ceremony which is an indispensable prelim-ingry to any religious ceremony. inary to any religious ceremony. The law in part recognises this and makes liberal provision for the ul-terior recognition and legitimisation of illegitimate children, though it is to be leared that its very liberality in this respect also acts as an incentive to irregular unions. It is worth mentioning that the statistics for 1897 are avowedly detective and unreliable, as owing to the disturbed state of t e interior of the Republic during the greater part of the year, civil registration was greatly interfered with and at times and places completely im-
