As a matter of fact, Presidents of Republics have Presidents of Republics have more frequently in recent times fallen by the knife or the bullet of the assassin, than have royal personages. To mur-der the chief of a State is an effect-ive way of obtaining world-wide notoriety, and the assassin is a person with an exceptional de-velopment of vanity. Pride, we are told, will bear much pain. The desire of notoriety, which is a form of pride would prompt men to most desperate deeds. Such men, of course, are the most contemptof course, are the most contemptble and most loathsome order of humanity. The wretch Lucchini probably flatters himself that he has secured world-wide notoriety by taking a new departure in the cowardly assassination business. He has plunged his dagger into the heart of a woman who, though an Empress, had proved that she had no love of Imperial

pomp and circumstance, but pre-ferred the life of an ordinary gentle-woman. The cry for vengeance against her murderer is natural enough, but let us remember that will not exterminate the race of assassing. They are a class of men who are the despair of social reform ers. We can only hope that they will die out in the process of the evolution of society. Even Lucchini evolution of society. Even Lucchini seems to be a somewhat degraded specimen of his class when we compare him with some of his pre-decessors in the profession of ty-rannicide. The most remarkable specimen of this order of scoun-drefs was, perhaps, Balthazar Gérard, the murdarer of William the Silent, Lucchini seems to rethe Silent. Lucchini seems to re-present the process of degenera-tion from Gérard, who, as Mot-ley says, was neither wholly a fanatic nor entirely a ruffian, but combined the most dangerous dementary of both characters. The Executive has sent a short Message to the Council of State urging approval of the Extradition Treaty with Spain, which was presented in May last year. A lengthy report has been issued by the Finance Committee of the Council of State on the application of the Executive for authority to of the Executive for authority to emit a new series of the Ex-traordinary Loan of 1897 in or-der to satisfy the claims for requisitions, etc., during the civil war of last year. These claims as approved by the Class ifying Commission appointed for the purpose may be summarised as follows:--118,329 oxen, 91,162 sheap. 79151 horses 42,422 oxas follows:--118,329 oxen, 91,162 sheen, 78,151 horses, 42,422 ox-hides, 26,455 sheepskins, value \$1,726,249; fencing, ferries, etc., destroyed, \$312,300; various claims not included in the above, \$23,100, total, \$2,061,649. There are other items connected with the war which it is thought convenient to include in the Debt, and that bring the general total up to \$2,473,-665. 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
