POLITICAL NOTES.

Plots and conspiracies are once more the plat du jour. The arrest, referred to in our last, of the conspirator Chiarla, insignificant as he was personally, seems to have furnished a clue to more serious things behind, or at all events things serious enough to impart unusual activity to Government circles and to induce the taking of extra precautions. So far as the reserve imparted to the matter officially can be penetrated, discovery seems to have been made of a plot to commence revolutionary offers in the bay. revolutionary offers in the bay, seizing the national gunboats, which would then be employed to cover the landing of the acollectivists invading hosts. Measure have been taken to defeat this plan by placing extra guards at the Capitania and on board the vessels themselves, whilst patrols are ordered to keep a sharp look out in and around the bay of night. The Finance Committee of the Council of State has issued a report entirely unfavorable to the Bill presented by Dr. Arturo Terra in substitution of the Official Bill for the creation of the Treasury Certifi cates Debt. As Dr. Terra's proposal has met with little or no support from public opinion, it may be re-garded as certain that the original Bill will be confirmed.

The Foment Committee of the Council of State will report in favor of the proposal of Rowley Solsona and Co. to establish a wharf for the embarkation of live stock at the Buceo, also in favor of Sr. Semblat's Bill authorising the free introduction of live stock by the Brazilian frontier, and also in favor of the petition of Salvo Her-manos for privileges for the estabishment of a weaving factory.

The Executive has forwarded a Message to the Council of State recommending sanction of the Bill drafted by the Rural Asso-ciation for the formation and collection of agricultural statistics in the Republic. The main object of the Bill is to entrust the compilation of the statistics to the ocal authorities in each district, and to make the supplying of the statistics compulsory on all agricul-turists under certain penalties. The Bill is one of obvious public utility.

It is probable that some other administrative employees, whose loyalty is open to suspicion, will be discharged. In the public of-fices there are still many employees, dating from the previous ad-ministration, who are known to be affiliated to the «collectivists.» Hitherto the Government has tolerated them, so that it should not be open to any accusation of political per secution in their dismissal It would however, be very weak and foolish if it retained them in their posts once it had any proof that they were any way concerned in or even cognisant of a conspir-acy for its overthrow by criminal violence. That would be carrying toleration to a suicidal extreme.

The Falkland Islands. «The inhabitants of the Falkland The inhabitants of the Falkland Islands, a model colony, may well be proud of the material results shown in the fifty-fifth year of colonisation. The great success which has followed the industry and enterprise of a handful of permanent English settlers, who numbered only 52 in 1843, may be gauged by the fact that 1,000 men now support only 52 in 1843, may be gauged by the fact that 1,000 men now support an equal number of women and children, they occupy some 5,000 square miles of pastoral country, possess 132,000 sheep, producing 4,301,000 lb. of wool, and conduct an external commerce of £186,600. The savings bank shows a balance in hand of bank shows a balance in hand of £38,270 with 327 depositors, or an average of about £117 to the credit of each account, or over £19 per head of population. £13.636, or £666 in excess of the revenue received and £1,646 in ex cess of the estimate. Public works were £1,296 above the estimate. The colony's assets reach a total of £60,947, against liabilities £44,204 an excess of £16,743, and from tables given in the report it is shown that satisfactory progress is maintained in the growth of assets over liabilities from year to year. Education has hitherto been a difficulty; but by the appointment of two itinerant schoolmasters ele-mentary education has been finally brought within reach of the most remote shepherd's but, so that no further excuse exists for the lam-entable condition of illiteracy in which whole families had unavoidably been raised. The colony's exports are nearly double the value of its imports, being in 1897 £125,123 of the former to £63,286 of the latter. Both totals show a falling off from the figures of the previous year, but no important stress is to be laid on the decrease of £60,000 in the imports, as this difference represents merely the unforeseen delay of one or other of the sailing vessels which bring cargo once or twice in the year from England. The normal population of the colony is law-abiding in the fullest degree, of lences requiring what the Colonia Treasurer somewhat curiously calls «penal punishment» being confined mainly to the floating population of passing ships. For months together the common gaol, which can only accomed ate 11 prisoners at most, is untenauted, and the local gaoler, who is also Government printer. finds occupation in the duties of the latter office. After all these interesting particulars many people will read with something like a feeling of regret that the colony, despite its solvent and prosperous condition, alfords no inducement to capitalists desirous of opening up new industries, nor to intending immigrants.-Financial News.

THE NEW ARGENTINE PRESIDENT.

We copy from the Buenos Aires Herald the following condensed translation of the address made by General Roca on assuming, for the second time, the presidency of the Argentine Republic,-

I have had the honour of being elevated for the second time to the Presidency of the Nation, and have renewed the oath which the Constitution demands on beginning to hold this high office, which at all times involves such serious res. ponsibilities. I return to the Government twelve years after having terminated my first Administration, a fact which permits me the better to appreciate the political and economic progress we have made. The fact that the transmission of power has taken place without in power has taken place without interruption for such a long time is, of itself, a guarantee of the stability and development of our institu

In new countries subject to constant change, each epoch has usually its characteristic physiognomy. Peculiar necessities and demands new and diverse problems, demand special conditions and apittudes in the statesmen who cannot remain behind the general movement with-out defrauding legitimate hopes and retarding the national progress. We have to day before us manifold questions which it will be necess ary to resolve with the help of a profound knowledge of our true pre-sentcircumstances. Happily, thanks-to the inspirations of patriotism and to the hard lessons of experience, we have reached an era of peace and quiet which will enable the public powers to concentrate all their attention on the demand of the moral and material progress of the

One of them relates to the electral system. One cannot expect of the reform of the laws those benefits which only arise from a complete political education. Without the civic capacities and virtues which a democratic government requires, the best institutions are inellicient. It is therefore indispensable that the customs improve. It demands of the former a strict impartiality, and of the latter attendance at the polls and honesty and purity of voting. ities, fraud on the part of the par-ties, absence from or desertion of the urns, corrupt at its source the representative system The moment seems appropriate to make an appeal to public conscience in this respect Notwithstanding there is a firm conviction that it is necessary to revise our electoral legislation. We must try to make the register a true census of the en-franchised citizens and arrange that no vote deposited in the urns may be lost. All shades of opinion have a right to be listened to. The presence of minorities in the Congress supplies a safety-valve for the passions of the moment, which are only dangerous when suppressed or shut out. So let us make the sulfrage a truth, and act so that the parties may not throw that scandal of electoral frauds in each other's faces. Understanding that these abuses are too strongly grafted upon our political system to be swept away in a day, we will, however, use all the means which the Constitution puts in the hands of the president to correct them when it lies in his power.

Every year we have been making great efforts to push forward our educational system. As far as relates to normal, secondary, and higher education, the necessity is now felt of moderating these efforts, partly because it is a heavy burden on the Country and partly because we must inquire as to whether the present system is not a mistake. University and second ary education, the normal schools and special schools are free like the elementary schools. This is too much. The State takes the child at a tender age, pays for his uni-versity education, after which a large number look to the administration for employment, only find-ing then that their life is barren. It is necessary to lighten the Nation by dividing the burden between the State and those who receive an

We must also change the sub jects taught, as we have ignored the technical and even political subjects necessary to enable men to take their part in the struggle for life. The people of Europe, whose example we have followed, are now alternated at the increase. alarmed at the increase of Universities and academies, and at the in creasing number of persons who de-dicate themselves to the liberal pro-tessions and take degrees, and whose abilities remain unused. Attention is being called to the British system of education, which is a reflection of life and society, and which tends to form men who are sufficient in themselves, emancipating them first from the guardiau-ship of their fathers and then from that of the State. It seems that this is also the model which would most suit the requirements of a Re public where each man is the depositary of, or participates in, the sovereignty. The soil being the fundamental source of our wealth, the scientific knowledge of its cultivation should figure in the curri cula of our universities, schools and colleges The new Government will devote much attention to this

important question.

Justice must be reformed so as to become a true guarantee for the manifold interests which depend upon its administration. It does not suffice to have learned and impar tal judges if the fundamental laws of the Constitution retard or make expensive their action. Laws which are defective in their form, provoke or lengthen the suits, and cause despair to those who have to have recourse to the law courts to make good their rights. The credit of the Country is interested even in priv-Ocuntry is interested even in private law proceedings, as nothing has more influence abroad than the vices of judicial administration, and capital is placed where it enjoys the greatest security.

In a lew years we have quadrupled our expenditure as it we believed that our resources were

believed that our resources were inexhaustible, so that we find ourselves with a deficit which evinces want of foresight or disorder. The equilibrium must be re-established by the decrease of the expenditure as our sources of taxation are exhausted. We hope that the op-portunity will arrive to unify the debt. Upon this depends the arrangement of the provincial debt, which equally interests the Nation as the honorable congress has recognised. It would be prudent therefore to take necessary precautions to as sure the regular action of the local administrations without weighing too heavily on the federal treasury. On their part the provinces should aspire to establish their economic, independence in order the better to enjoy political and constitutional autonomy. The budgets of the majority of the provinces now are double or triple what they were ten years ago with-out their expenses in many cases being proportionate to their re-

the revenue is spent in a very cost-ly administrative personnel, which is more costly than that of richest and most popular state of North America.






