POLITICAL NOTES.

Practically the only topic of the moment continues to be the threatened «collectivist» invasion, and the rumors concerning this seem to be getting feebler daily. The Siglo devotes articles to the question both on Sunday and Monday, but without coming to any more important conclusion than its old panacea of a change in the Ministry. It is quite possible. in the Ministry. It is quite possible that this may take place before long the present Ministers resigning their portfolios in order to eligible for election to the Senate. Perhaps in the meantime the Siglo will graciously indicate who are the men that, in its opinion, are better qualified for a ministerial position.
Sunday's Razon has a very sen-

sible article on the situation. It says that at present there are two equally exaggerated opinions current—the idea that the *collectivists* are capable of promoting a revolution in the full sense of the word, and the idea are superfluous. There is little r ght to take every precaution in its power, in order to avoid a prolong-ation of the situation de facto that would be fatal to the general in-terests of the country. But this, thinks our contemporary, will be the beginning and should be the end of the whole matter. The Government is quite strong enough to subdue any attempt at disturb-ance that may be made, and as soon as the elections are over it should set about reducing the present exaggerated military for ces, which are not only a burden to the Treasury, but in themselves a source of danger and mistrust so long as their can remain any doubt as to the fidelity of the commanding officers. Where treachery is on the treather treacher are not the state of foot, twenty regiments are no greater protection than one. As an example it cites the Mobilised an example it cites the Mobilised Frontier Regiment, raised on purpose to prevent invasion from the frontier, and the recent commander of which, Com. Calleros, now appears implicated in the invasive conspiracy! With too or three such treacherous men at the head of regiments the invasion might be really formidable. It must always be borne in mind that it is amongst the military that «collectivism» finds its ry that *collectivism» finds its strongest sympathies and ties; they were the defenders of the *collectivist. governments in the past, they are indebted to them for many they are indebted to them for many favors and rewards, and they are amongst those most affected by Sr Cuestas' policy of economy and rectitude. It was only to be expected that the intrigues of the «collectivists» should be mainly directed to the bearsaks. As to the want of unity

The Arrangement of the Puna de Atacama.

The boundary conflict in con-nection with the Puna de Atacama was definitely solved yesterday in a manner satisfactory to the Arg-entine and Obilian Foreign Offices. The negotiations have been carried on between the two offices without the intervention of the respective Legations. The precise terms of the agreement are not known, but they will be published simulta-neously in Chile and Argentina. The Argentine Minister in Santiago feeling hurt at such a negotiation having been carried out without his intervention forthwith wired his resignation, which was immediately accepted on this side. The Chilian Minister in this City does not appear to have been so thin-skin ned, as there is no report of his having tendered his resignation. The whole of the boundary question thus appears to be finally settled and the respective Governments can now divert their attention from warlike matters to the real necessities of the respective countries, pending the final award of the arbitrator on the questions already submitted. We are pleased to be able to record the news of the arrangement concluded yesterday .- Times of Argentina, Oct. 22.

The Errors of the War.

NEW YORK, SEPT. 25. The President has finally succeeded in completing the Commis sion of nine members to investigate the conduct of the war. There are two regular army officers on it, and one retired officer. The other members, with the exception of Mr. Denby, the former Minister to China, do not

impress the country as men likely to push the inquiry fearlessly. This Commission has been ap-This Commission has been appointed by the President in response to bitter complaints from all parts of the country which have been gaining in volume steadily since the close of the war. The pitiable condition of the returning troops, not only from Cuba and Puerto Rico, but from the preparatory camps, aroused great indigna-tion. The deaths from disease and neglect have been so numerous that the whole country unites in demanding an inquiry as to responsibility. The Press and a large majority of army and navy officers place the blame upon the Secretary of War, saying that the disastrous results were due to his conduct in filling the commissary and medical bran-ches of the service with ignorant and incompetent civillans, chosen in response to political requests and influences. This is the general shown by the recent elections in Maine and Vermont, where the usual Republican majorities have been greatly reduced.

There is no doubt that the suf-ferings of the troops have caused a considerable reaction in popular sentiment, both in regard to the wisdom of the war and the de-sirableness of territorial expan-sion. It is conceded that the popular faith in Imperialism is much less strong than at the close barracks. As to the want of unity in the colorado party, the Razon acquits the Government of serious blame, and says that the fault lies with the members of the party itself for their want of breadth

of view and their preference of in-terests of person and circle to the general interests of the country. This is the old complaint against verbially rapid, and it would not be surprising to see the recent wave in favour of Imperialism give place to one equally strong against it.

In his remarks to the investigat-ing Commission yesterday, the Pre-sident admitted that he had received many letters from different parts of the country saying that no investig-ation was needed, but that the Secretary of War should be dismissed. He said he should not consent to dismissal, but wished the Commission to make the inquiry thorough without regard to consequences, including the Secretary in its scope, and giving him an opportunity to be heard in his own defence.

Anglo-German Treaty.

Particulars of the new Anglo-German Agreement are given in the October number of the Fort-nightly Review» by «Diploma-ticus,» who writes «on information received.»

«The agreement,» says «Diplo-maticus,» is, in fact, an arrange-ment resulting from certain negotiations with Portugal, by which the two great Powers divide be-tween them a right of pre-emption in regard to all the Portuguese

colonies in Africa. «It defines the territorial sphere of each of the two contracting Powers in those colonies, provides for the consideration to be paid as and when the colonies are alienated by Portugal, assesses the proportions of the purchase money or leasehold premiums for which each of the Powers will be liable, and settles a multitude of minor questions connected with the eventual trans-

«In short, Great Britain and Germany have become joint heirs to the estates of the Portuguese Crown in Africa, and, while undertaking the reversion in common; they have prudently provided against any clashing of interests when the time arrives for entering upon and divid

The first result of these agree-ments will be the leasing of Dela-

goa Bay by Great Britain. The colonies dealt with in the two treaties consist of the provinces of Mozambique and Lourenço Marques on the east coast, Angola, Ambriz, Benguela, Mossamedes, and Congo on the west, and the small but ancient settlement of Guines on the north-west. ment of Guinea on the north-west, the whole possessing an area of 914 000 square miles, or rather more than seven and a-hall times that of the United Kingdom.

«Diplomaticus» adds some re-marks which are worth citing:

«Apart from its territorial features, the Anglo German Agreement possesses advantages which are none the less solid because they are not specifically enumerated in it. Chief among these will be the pacificatory influence it will exert on Cape politics, and on the relations power. President Kruger has nourished not a few mischievous illu sions with regard to the attitude of Germany towards the South Africa Republic. These he will now have to abandon. It will make no differ-ence to his rights under the Lonence to his rights under the London Convention, for Great Britain has no idea of violating them in any way; but it is to be hoped that it will make a great difference so far as the good and equitable government of the Transvaal is concerned, and especially in regard to the Utilanders, who, whether English, German, or whether English, German, or French, are all equally dis-satisfied with the reactionary regime to which they [are subjected The Anglo German Agreement has given rise to some observations in the German Press on this subject which will afford salutary reading to President Kruger Juring his leisure. Dr. Leyds has probably ascertained by this time that these observations are not altogether irresponsible.

Life at Klondike.

DAWSON, AUGUST 20 All through this summer Dawson has resembled a country town on fair day. It has been fair day each and every day, but particularly each and every day, out particularly each and every night of continuous day light. When I reached Dawson early in summer there were about 20,000 people there, of whom per-haps 5,000 lived in log and lumber cabins and houses, while the rest were scattered along the river front, round the town, and on the hill sides in tents of all shapes and sizes. sides in tents of all shapes and sizes. The town itself consisted of little more than one muddy street about a mile in length, built upon the virgin marsh that extends back from the river for a distance of about half a mile. The business side of the street faced the river, and was one unbroken succession of saloons,

dance houses, and restaurants.

The leading industry of the place

energetic, for the places of business | chener reached Kartum, Lord Salnever closed for a minute night or day, excepting on Sundays, and then only by special order of Major Walsh, the Commissioner, who was credited with possessing very straightlaced ideas. Midnight was very early in the even-ing, figuratively speaking, for it was, of course, broad daylight, and no one began to think of going to bed until the sun was high in the heavens at four or five o'clock in the morning By comparison with mid-night, midday was as quiet almost as Sunday At all hours the street was crowded as Cheapside in Lon-don, or Broadway in New York, and at the busy time of the night in Dawson there was scarcely standing room on the street and in the saloons.

And what a heterogeneous crowd. Old Yukon pioneers fresh from the diggings with their sacks full of the precious dust, the trading for which has cost so many men their lives or their fortunes. Amer-icans, Englishmen, Canadians, Frenchmen, Swedes, Germans, Japanese – members of almost every civilized race, all tanned, roughly clad and hardy, the stur-diest crowd of men, probably, ever gathered together on one

spot.

Though many have now gone, there is still a large crowd here, and the leading industry still flourishes. Inside the saloons the fun rages gloriously day and night. Each saloon contains three distinct departments—drinking gambling, and dancing—in each of which a conspicuous feature is the big gold scales, where the coarse-grained yellow dust that is the ordinary currency of the camp is solemnly weighed out. The miner comes into his favourite place of amusement in the evening, ac-companied by a small crowd of thirsty admirers, and throws his sack, often containing hundreds of dollars worth of dust, over the bar. whence often-only too often-it returns some hours later to the owner drained to the last grain of its precious contents. Meanwhile, the dust goes in frequent and numerous driblets by way of the big scales to the coffers of the saloon keeper, each driblet representing edrinks for the crowd, including a number of highly decorated «dancing la-

The guileless simplicity of the miner is never more strikingly be-trayed than in one of these places that are run for his especial benefit. It is the most perfectly constructed machine for the effective extraction of gold dust that is in use anywhere in these diggings. From the loud voiced master of ceremonies who hustles up the couples for the various dances, which he cuts as short as possible, to the weigher who has reduced the art of manipulating the gold scales down to a science, every member connected with the institution knows his or her part to perfection, and acts it most efficaciously to the cost of the simple minded miner. Men who have worked hard in the diggings for a month at 15 dollars a day will come into Dawson and find that they have only earned enough for one night's entertainment. The miner reaps his barvest without having previously had the trouble of sowing, and for that reason per haps he failed to appreciate its value, but the saloon keeper has a big pair of scales, and he knows

Arthur MacMurrogh Kavanagh, who was for more than a decade the leader of the Irish Landlord Party in the House of Commons. Mr. Ka vanagh, who died in 1889 in his fitty ninth year, was born with only the rudiments of legs and arms. He had, however, a mechanical chair so contrived as to enable him to move about without assistance. His chest was broad, and he could make the stumps of his arms meet across it, and by long practice he made the stumps themselves so supple, strong, and nervous, that with the reins round them he could manage a horse as well as if he had them between his fingers, and could even make good use of a whip In riding he was strapped to a chair saddle. He rode to hounds, and took fences and walls as boldly as the most dar-ing cross country rider. He was, moreover, an expert angler, fishing from a boat or from horseback, and supplying the want of wrist play by dexterous jerks of the stumps of his arms. He contrived to shoot well both in cover and the open, carrying a gun without a trigger guard, resting the piece upon his left arm stump, and jerking the trigger with his right. He was also a good amateur draughtsman and painter, and he wrote legibly.




