POLITICAL NOTES.

The Council of State no quorumed on Monday.

The political world is very calm; resting after the excitements and tension of last week. Congratul-ations on the pacific and favorable issue of the elections are flying round. Among them is a polite note from the U. S. Minister, Mr. Finch, who congratulates Sr Cuestas and the country on the *beautiful and peaceful day of the elections. The Minister of War has
issued an order of the day paying
a merited compliment to the Army for its correct attitude. All the papers without exception testify to papers without exception testify to the excellent behaviour of the police throughout the Republic. In fact, there is a general expres-sion of satisfaction all round, and the few who had hoped for a differ-ent result have the good sense to shut their mouths for once.

As to the elections themselves, there is little to add to our report of yesterday. As voting has yet to take place in a few districts, the absolute results will not be known for atleast another week, but there is no doubt as to the strong majority in favor of the «electoral accord. and Sr. Cuesta's govern-ment. Soriano and Maldonado are the only departments known to have elected candidates contrary to the accord. In one or two others candidates have been elected who were not approved by the party directorates, but this is merely an instance of want of party disci-pline. In Salto the result is still rather doubtful. At present the cofficials candidates have a very small majority, but it is thought this may disappear on second scruting. A few grumbles are appearing about official pressure, but they are not very serious or important. There is no doubt that on the whole the country is well satisfied both with the manner in which the elections have been conducted and their result. The Razon, which last week was inclined to censure the Government, says: -«Now that motives of reserve have disappeared, it must be acknowledged that the country has been consulted in conditions of truth and regularity of form such as it has rarely known, according to the concensus of opinions of im-partial men... Truly no one would have imagined that, after this having been the last country on earth in the matter of political rights, we may now place ourselves on a level with the two or three nations of the world where the purity of the suffrage is a cult.

Neither the Government nor the dominant party has had recourse to illicit practices to assert itself against the popular will... Undoubtedly the greatest progress of these elections is in the autonomic representation of the minority parties. No one has thought it

omic representation of the minority purties. No one has thought it necessary to obtain the official vise for a nationalist or constitutionalist senator or deputy. The directive Committees of the parties have discussed and chosen their candidates without a single fear that objections would be raised to their choice. This is warm testimony, and we find similar acknowledgements in the Siglo and the Bien.

through its own inherent weakness and the foresight and preparation of the Government. The movements of certain military officers, some of whom are still under arrest, the petty risings in San José and one or two other places, the pretended invasion of Rivera, the groups dispersed last week by the Argentine Government, and other incidents, were all part of this plan To-day, however, averyone laughs at what ever, everyone laughs at what last week was a terrible bogey, and after the miserable collapse of the whole business it will be difficult to revive the alarmethat were then current. They still falk big in Buenos Aires, we learn, and their organ the Diario publishes lying telegrams and articles to prove that the Republic is convulsed and the whole country in arms against the «Dictator,» and that the elections were a farce against which the country is protesting; but such falsehoods are only material for derision and contempt. The revolutionary scare has com-pletely passed, and people are now turning their attention to the revival of business after a long period of

depression and anxiety.

There is some talk of anticipating the dates of the meeting of the new Chambers and the formal election of Sr. Cuestas to the con stitutional presidency of the Repub-lic, but nothing yet certain. It is a question in which there is much to be said on both sides, having both its benefits and its drawbacks.

Apropos of the «collectivists» and their terrible revolutionary plans, the Nacional tells a characteristic and amusing tale. It will be remembered that a few weeks ago Dr. Julio Herrera sold two houses in this city, having first made a pretended transfer of them to his friend and co-conspirator ex-general Estevan. Though a broker Estevan sold them to a German firm, who paid him ball in cash and half in arms and munition of which they were importers! When, however, the Germans came take possession of the properties. they found to their surprise, that they were heavily mortgaged to the Mortgage Bank, a trifling incident which, doubtless owing to preoccupation or shortness of memory, had not been mentioned in the transfer deeds! The Germans are accordingly taking action in the Argentine Courts for awarding It would seem by this swindling It would seem by this that Dr. Herrera has not forgotten his old habit, of which he gave us no many examples when Minister and President, of selling what was not his own. Sweet creature — what a pity he is not to be allowed to regenerate the Republic!

The President is once more attending at the Government House. A certain amount of precaution is still observed, but the formidable apparatus of last week is gradually disappearing, and no doubt before long everything will have returned to its normal condition.

NEW RAILWAY.

Yesterday there took place, withservice of the first section of the Western Railway, namely from the port of Sauce to San José, passing through Rosario Oriental and the Swiss Colony. A special train, carrying a representation of the Government, the local authorities, and various passengers, ran the re-turn journey. The regular service will soon be initiated.

This act significs an important progress for the department of Colonia, which comprises one of the richest productive zones of the Rerichest productive zones of the Republic and raises the finest quality of wheat to be found on the continent. The port of Sauce is, we may mention, already open for public use, ocean steamers calling there, as well as a weekly service of coasting steamers from Montavideo. Montevideo-

After the recent period of depres sion and political turmoil, it is pleasant to be able to record this instance of material pregress, the effects of which will soon make themselves lelt.

THE SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR,

PEACE ARRANGED AT LAST. Yesterday's telegrams brought the important news that, at the meeting of the peace commissioners in Paris on Monday, the Spanish Commissioners definitely accepted the terms proposed by those of the United States, for the abandonment by Spain of the Phillipine Islands. The indemnity to be paid is 20 million dollars, which is equi-valent to the debt of the archipelago, less the part ap-plied by Spain to war expenses. The superficies of the islands thus acquired is about 470,0.0 square kilometres and they have a population of over6,000 000 One of the telegrams adds that the terms of peace were signed forthwith, but this probably refers to some preliminary documents. Washington and New York telegrams say that the news has made an excellent impression in the U. S. Government and the Union gen-erally. Notwithstanding, the anti-imperialists are continuing an active propaganda, in which Mr. Andrew Carnegie is playing a pro minent part. The U.S. Govern-

ment has already issued orders for the complete and immediate milit-ary occupation of the archipelago. The news of the cession is said to have produced a dismal effect in Spain, and is lamented by all the papers, many of which do not he sitate to abuse the Spanish Govern-ment for yielding. However, there has not been any disorder. An alternoon Paris telegram says that public opinion in Europe, and especially France, is generally contrary to the occupation of the Philli-pines by the United States, and that it is feared it will prove a factor of disorder as the Americans are wanting in diplomatic forms and will be continually provoking con-flicts with the European Powers. We do not think much attention need be paid to this. It is stated that Germany has al-

ready made an offer to the United States for the purchase of an island as a coaling station.

General Blanco, ex-governor of Cubs, sailed for Spain on Sunday night. He is replaced by General Ximenez Castellanos.

THE ANNEXATION OF THE PHILLIPINES,

(Daily News.) The news sent by our Washing ton Correspondent to the effect that the American Government means to annex the Philippines, is con-firmed from Paris. At the beginning of the war, none contemplated any territorial extension beyond a possible protectorate over Cuba; and strong sections of both parties were averse from even permitting the suppliant Ha-waiians to join the Union. Secretary Sherman's declaration, «We have enough to do at home, * expressed a very general sentiment. The victory of Admiral Dewey at Manila suddenly broadened the national outlook, and the naval lessons of the war convinced the Pre sident of the desirability of having coaling stations at a distance from the national base. But even quite recently few responsible politicians would admit the possibility of more than the relention of the island of Luzon and perhaps the town of Manila. When the Peace Protocol was drawn up between the United States and Spain, it was agreed that the Amer-icans should occupy Manila pend-ing the conclusion of the treaty of peace, which should determine the control, the disposition, and government of the islands, Prob-ably two things have largely influenced the American Cabinet in deciding on the annexation of the whole group. First is the strong note which has been sounded during the present electoral (campaign in favour of foreign expansion. In dozens of State Conventions, and from thousands of platforms, the cry has been taken up: « What American arms have won, American statemanship must hold - «It would be a mockery and a hideous cruel-ty to the islanders, says one New York orator, «to turn them over to the blood wringing oppressions of a decayed monarchy.» Yet, and here comes in the second great cause of annexation, it is manifest y undesirable to grant them selfgovernment The most ardent ad

administration over to Aguinaldo and his followers would be to create another of the semi-milit ary, semi despotic *Republics * that are the contempt of the world. The most striking feature of the whole thing is the apathetic indifference of the Spanish people to the loss of the last remnants of their once immense dependencies. It seems true that the loss of the Philipines is of less moment to the people of Madrid than the result of a builfight. The common people of Spain have paid so heavily dur-ing the past quarter century for Colonial glory—in the death of the pick of their young men, in in-creased taxation, and in a thouscreased taxation, and in a thousand other ways—that the loss
of empire is to them a relief rather
than a sorrow. It is still possible
that Don Carlos may, for his own
purposes, create an agitation
against the reigning house on
account of the surrender, but this
reason will be an excuse rather
than a cause. For England, the
American retention of the Philip-American retention of the Philip-pines should be nothing but gain. It brings America actively into Asiatic politics, and in Asia the interests of the two English-speaking and commercial nations

-Two men, one of them named Williams, have been arrested at Fulham, London, with some of the jewels recently stolen from the Ducness of Sutherland in their possession, and it is said they have confesed to being concerned in the robbery.

-According to a London telo-gram, Prince Louis of Battenberg, Commander (17) of H.M.S. «Ma-jestic.» flagship of the Gibraltar squadron, has been seriously hurt by falling down a companion lad-der. No turther details are given. - The Japanese Government has

given orders to an English firm to build an ironclad of 15,000 tons, to be the most powerful war vessel yet constructed.

-The emad Mullah» is giving serious trouble at simla, and is trying to raise another insurrection

among the friendly tribes on the north-west frontier of India. -The greatest traveller of the feline species has just died. «Tom.» a large cat, owned by Mr. Little, Chief Engineer of the Royal Mail steamer Aladema, has been for the past thirteen years a favourite on board this ship in all her voyages between Sydney and San Francis-co. When Tom had travelled 7,000 miles he was presented with a silver collar. He died in the harbour of San Francisco and was buried at sea. Had he lived to reach Sydney he would have completed a million miles of travel, and would have exchanged his silver collar for a collar of pure gold. Tom was a great favourite, and his master has no fewer than fifty different photographs of his pet.

-The telegrams of four weeks ago told us, with many alarming additions, that the Kaiser cut short his tour in Palestine on account of the proximity of war between England and France. The London pap ers of the same date just arrived, say that the Kaiser cut short his tour on account of the excessive heat. We prefer to believe the latter, but less sensational, story. This is only one instance out of many in which the English papers are discrediting the sensational war telegrams of a month ago, Once more we were right in warning our readers to place a minimum of credence in them.

Sir Herbert Kitchener arrived at King's Cross Station about twenty minutes before the departure of his train, and began to stroll up and down the platform, although Mr. Melison, the station master, offered him the use of his private office.
