POLITICAL NOTES.

With the approach of the elections the political world daily be-comes more agitated, both as re-gards candidates and revolutionary alarms. With respect to the first the situation is still sufficiently chaotic, especially in the «colo rado» party, the disorganisation of which is daily more evident. There s little doubt that the resolution of the «National Colorado Committee» to exact a preliminary confession of political faith has caused the mask to fall from many candidates who, whilst pretending to be friends of the present situation and supporters of Sr. Cuestas, were really entertaining very different views and even perhaps awaiting their opportunity to assist in a «collectivist» restoration. The whole business wears a decidedly ugly aspect, and shows once more how little confidence can be placed in the divers political factions that wear the common name of that wear the common name of «colorado.» No such duplicity of intention can be attributed to the other parties, but even among them things are not going so smooth ly as they might, and we dai-ly hear of transpositions, changes and resignations among their candidates It is much to be doubted if the complete list of candidates will be definitely known until the very day of the elections. The fact is, we suppose, that this being practically the first time the parties have had any freed m in the selection of their candidates they hardly yet know how to employ their lib erty, and the muddle is simply the result of their inexperience, if not their ignorance, in the working of democratic methods. This is no thing surprising. Orderly and systematic habits of self-government are not acquired in a day or two; for the matter of that, some peoples never learn them at all. Whatever the faults of the present electoral situation it must be conceded that it presents an enormous advance

on its immediate predecessors.

The «National Colorado Committees has not yet taken any resolution with regard to Dr. 8lanco's famous note of secession, there having been no quorum again on Thursday evening. We rather suspect that several members of the Committee are practically in the same box as Dr Blanco, that is to say that if out to the test that says say, that if put to the test, they also would be found not to accept the party programme and the electoral accord, and to be awaiting an op-portunity to repudiate the one and the other. For example, Dr. Manuel Otero, a prominent member of the party, has not hesitated to publish articles defending they entirely anti-democratic theory that candidates should not be called upon for a declaration of their opinions, and are not under any obligation to represent the opinions of their electors! If the ·colorado · voters were wise, they

only common sentiment among the «colorados» is an unreasoning hatred of the «blancos»-who in nearly every political respect are their superiors—but that does not constitute a programme nor does it enter into the domain of legitimate politics; it is nearly an unhealthy and absurd tradition which works to obstruct the development and felicity of the Republic. How men professing so many and con trary political creeds can all call themselves by the name of «colorados is something beyond our mod-est comprehension—but then we have not had the advantage of being educated in the South American

An example of the moral and political perseverity of certain of the «colorados» comes from Salto, where a group of «collectivists» have had the shamelessness and effrontery to name their club after he hated and dishonored name of the ex president Ur. Julio Herrera, at the same time putting forward a pretended programme full of high-flown patriotic sentiments which have no more rela-tian to Dr Herrera and his works than holiness and virtue have to Satan. Such an incident baffles criticism. The authorities are very properly keeping an eye on this club, the revolutionary aims of which are no secret


