NEWS OF THE DAY

Saint James of Acaia.—Charles Kemble died 1854—310 days past, 49 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.
The prominent topic of the day is the «petty Panama» affair briefly referred to in our last. At the special sitting of the Council of State held on Thursday evening, Sr. Berindegue, speaking on behalf of the Committee of Foment, said that reports had reached the Committee of trafficking in votes with regard to the concession for a live stock wharf at the Buseo. On account of this the Committee had summoned Sr. Rowley y Solsona the applicant for the concession, and he had made certain revelations, of so serious a character that it was necessary for the good name of the Council for the matter to be cleared up. It was therefore asked that an Investigating Committee be formed for the purpose. A motion to this effect was then put to the vote and was carried unanimously, without discussion. The Committee was accordingly constituted as follows: Sres. Herrero y Espinosa, Dufort y Alvarez, Alonso, Ferreira, Maza, Echeverría and Donaldo MacEachern. The sitting then concluded.

Our contemporaries publish the result of lengthy interviews with the two principal parties in the affair, namely Sr. Rowley y Solsona, and the Councillor Sr. A. O. Villalba, but they do not seem to us to give a very coherent idea of the affair, nor does the accusation of corruption seem to rest, so far, on a very formidable basis; though, of course, there may be more behind that has not yet been made public. Sr. Rowley's tale is that he had become convinced there was organized and interested obstruction to the approval of his concession, though it asked nothing from the public purse and was of great public utility. He had known this to be the case under the previous administration, when, in consequence of his refusal to give a group of blackmailers \$30,000 and 20% of the profits, his scheme had been shelved. He had lately come to the conclusion that the same thing was occurring again, and that there was an organized group of members of the Council opposing his scheme for interested purposes, that is to say in the hope of trafficking their votes, and as much had been hinted to him by various friends. There then appeared a certain Pedro Saez who insinuated that it was possible to overcome the opposition to his scheme for a consideration and offered to act as his intermediary in the matter. After some hesitation, Sr. Rowley consented to go further into the matter, and was then introduced to Sr. Villalba. The latter, according to Sr. Rowley, professed to be able to secure the approval of the concession Sr. Rowley refused—in fact was not in a position—to offer him a cash sum, but instead offered him a share in the enterprise. Sr. Villalba, after some days' interval, declined this on a card which forms the principal «piece of accusation.» Sr. Rowley then made another effort to get his scheme through, but, as he says, was again met by systematic opposition and by threats of rejection, one of the opponents being Sr. Villalba himself. He therefore resolved to expose the business in self-defence.

Sr. Villalba makes light of the accusation. His tale is that he was accidentally introduced to Sr. Rowley, who asked him to act as his parliamentary agent or attorney to get the scheme expedited. Sr. Villalba said that if he did this he would be unable to vote for the scheme in the Council and that his connection with it must be perfectly public and above board. On consideration, however, and not caring for the terms Sr. Rowley offered, he rejected the business, and since then they had not met, nor had he occupied himself with the matter. The rest of the story, says Sr. Villalba, is merely a malicious invention and an intrigue.

Thus the matter stands, and it remains for the Investigating Committee to get at the truth. There are two points worth noting. The first is that the opposition to the passing of the scheme, which Sr. Solsona describes as interested, probably proceeded from official quarters, for the Executive has only recently passed a Message to the Council asking for the discussion of the scheme to be deferred until next year, on the grounds that it would interfere with the plans for the general port of Montevideo, which also include wharves for embarkation of live stock. This is fully explained in yesterday's *Nacion*, and the explanation is most obviously *bona fide*. The other point is that, so far as has yet been made public, Sr. Rowley has been unable to formulate an accusation against any one except Sr. Villalba, and that it is quite possible the former has been victimised and deceived by some scamp who thought he saw his way to levying blackmail. The characters of the members of the Council of State are for the most part well and favorably known (with a very few exceptions) and it is difficult to believe, without convincing proof, that a group of some twenty or twenty-five of them either would, or could without immediate exposure, be guilty of trafficking in their votes in the brazen manner alleged by Sr. Rowley. Anyhow it is satisfactory to note that the matter has been taken up vigorously—in a very different spirit to the similar scandal that occurred a few years ago—and the composition of the Investigating Committee is a guarantee that the truth will not be shirked or concealed. The result is awaited with impatience.

The revolutionary alarms of a few days ago have quite died out, and there is no necessity to refer to them further for the present. Yesterday's *Siglo* comments on the recent arrest of two priests for infractions of the Law of Civil Register, and laments the artificial atmosphere that has been raised over the matter in ultra-Catholic circles, where they are represented as heroes and martyrs. It points out that the Ministers of a Church which is supported by the State, should be the first in inculcating respect for the laws, and that if they openly infringe these they have no right to be treated differently from other offenders.

It transpires that Dr. Julio Herrera has sold two valuable houses in Calles Canelones and San José, which he managed to snatch out of the liquidation of the National Bank, of funest memory. This has caused a tale to be started that he intends to devote the proceeds to the oft-threatened «collectivist» invasion. Those who know the ex-president, however, consider this very unlikely. He has no objection to any sacrifices he may impose upon others, but he is not fond of undergoing them himself.

SOLIS THEATRE.
Our anticipations regarding the spectacular ballet «Die Puppen Fee» presented at this Theatre on Thursday evening, were not defrauded, and we may say at once that no more charming and complete entertainment of the description has been seen in Montevideo for many years. The production has been placed on the stage with most elaborate care, the mechanical and electric light effects were very fine, and the costumes rich, varied and artistic, being also remarkable for their almost excessive modesty. The idea of the characters personating animated dolls is carried out very carefully throughout, and the imitation of the stiff and angular movements of mechanical figures is at once clever and amusing, whilst there is some very good dancing in the course of the representation. The effect when all the figures are in motion together on the stage under a blaze of electric lights is exceedingly fine. Amongst a long list of characters all admirably impersonated it is difficult to make selections, but we may make special mention of Sta. Morlac as a Doll Fairy who was a vision of beauty and grace, and Sta. Morino for her very clever impersonation of the speaking doll, and afterwards for some very clever and agile solo dancing. The four young women

dressed as *Bébé Jumeaux* and who led off the figure dances were also very clever in the manner in which they imitated doll movements. The music for the ballet is pretty and was well rendered by a good orchestra. Altogether the entertainment is most artistic, original, and pleasing, and is calculated to send all children under seventy years of age wild with delight. It was received with every mark of approval by a crowded audience and will no doubt bear many repetitions.

It is to be regretted that the management could find no better prelude to so delightful a production than the two feeble Spanish duologues which occupied the stage until about 10.15 p. m. and which were worthy neither of the theatre nor the occasion. This is hardly the kind of fare to set before visitors to the Solís Theatre, and this part of the programme certainly requires strengthening—or, better still, changing altogether. In any case it would be well to place the ballet, which is the only attraction, second on the programme, so that the many who do not feel interested in the rest of the programme may get home earlier.

OUR ENERGY AND OUR SUCCESS.

ASIATIC QUARTERLY.
Thirty years ago Germany had neither ocean trade, navy, nor manufactures worth mentioning; but ships were built in England; officers were welcomed as midshipmen and lieutenants in our navy, gawky Teutons were licked into shape by smart seamen; clerks found their account and their training in the London and Manchester business offices; machinery was supplied, mechanics were taught, and all information was given with an unstinted hand. Perhaps parliamentary institutions are not regarded as an entirely unmixed blessing by the rulers of those countries, who, according to Nicola Shishkoff, are now seriously contemplating our reduction to our «proper status» as a third class Power; but if there is the least modicum of virtue at all in free political assemblies whence did any nation, even the United States, derive the spirits of them, unless it be from England? Thus, England has adopted Free Trade, become a great sea power, sent forth colonies, and acquired a preponderating share of the world's commerce. But, apart from the perfect legitimacy of the enterprises, what other nation had the same provocative in the shape of restricted area and superabundant population? If Free Trade is good was it not open to others to adopt it? If bad, what grudge need there be against England for unconplacably acquiescing in the adoption by others of the wiser policy of Protection? If we have become a great sea power, did we ever step in to prevent Germany, France, and Russia from following our example? Are we not ready to furnish to each of them, or to any one else who pays the price, as many ships and as good as our own? By deliberately refraining from becoming a great land power, have we not given the best security for peace and non-aggressiveness? If we have in past times conquered colonies from France, was it not in fair battle? And was it in any case morally worse than the conquest of Europe by France under Napoleon? But, however we got our colonies, are they not all perfectly free and open to all the world? Look at the privileges of Frenchmen in Australia as compared with those of Australians in New Caledonia! Look at the privileges of Germans in Singapore and Caylon compared with those of Englishmen in German New Guinea! Look at the Russian tea merchants housed in the best parts of the British concession at Hankow compared with the jealous exclusiveness at Vladivostok! I was myself present when the very first Russian Captain (Soutcovoï) was, during four days, indoctrinated in the mysteries of the Yangtze by a British skipper. The French are at our mercy in India; but the rights of Chander-nagore, Pondicherry, and Mahé are as scrupulously guarded by us as the rights of British traders and missionaries are interfered with by the French in Madagascar. Germany and France never dream of consulting the interests of either ourselves or our colonies when they embarked upon their sugar bounty policy; we never complained, and as a matter of fact we do not like it; though it has in a way overshoot its mark and profited the home section of us at their home consumers' expense. Our forefathers made a bad bargain with the Newfoundland fishery treaties; but do we not protect the French rights loyally against the reasonable but politically impossible appeals of our own colonists? We have been the pioneers in railway lines, steamships, machinery

for manufactures, the cheap Press, sports, good tailoring, and in fact nearly all the accessories of modern progress. In short, is it not a fact that our energy and our success have communicated themselves in every sense to the rest of the world, given equal chances to all, opened up men's minds, and spread liberal doctrines throughout the universe?

SUNDRIES.

—Two interesting sentences have just been issued in trials for murder. The first was that of Augusto Barros. In July, last year, this individual tried to force his way into a house where there was a dance one of the dancers being a female friend of his. His entrance was opposed by Guillermo Zaz, an altercation ensued in which Zaz struck him and threatened him with a sword. Barros thereupon took out a dagger and stabbed Zaz, the wound proving fatal. The jury—once more encroaching on a question of right not within their province—found this to be legitimate self defence, and Judge Montañó has accordingly acquitted the prisoner. In the second case the Superior Tribunal has raised from three to five years' imprisonment the sentence on Eustaquio Caballero for the death of the youth Rosales Gonzalez, in February, 1897. There had been an altercation between the two, and Caballero struck Gonzalez with a harness strap, causing a wound that proved mortal, but it was admitted that he struck the blow without criminal or murderous intention, and that the youth was trying to frighten the horse he was riding. The inequality of the two sentences is remarkable, and it is impossible to avoid thinking that better justice would have been done if they had been reversed—but comment on this head is dangerous.

—The Municipality has at last consented to a junction between the Este and Pocitos Tramway lines being effected on the north side of the Plaza Independencia, charging the stiff rent of \$100 the month for the privilege and for the use of the 100 or 150 yards of road that will be covered. Seeing that the junction will be of great public convenience, the Municipality might have been satisfied with a smaller rent, but it is showing itself very exorbitant towards the Tramway Companies, so much so that it will discourage enterprise in this direction. Perhaps it is persecuting them because, for the most part they are foreign property, there being an evident tendency just now to persecute foreign enterprises, especially when they are already established and therefore at the mercy of the authorities.

—The latest account of the results of the legislative elections in the United States gives 183 republicans elected against 174 opposition, a narrow majority for the former of only nine. This refers to the House of Representatives, the figures for the Senate have not yet appeared.

—Yesterday morning's telegrams tried to make out that renewed activity was being imparted to the bellicose preparations in both England and France. An afternoon telegram from London states that the work in the naval ports and dockyards in England is being greatly reduced and that the papers regard this as an augury of peace. The morning and afternoon telegrams generally contrive to contradict each other just to keep the interest alive.

—The meeting of the peace commissioners in Paris on Thursday was again indecisive, and once more there are hints of a possible rupture. The latest crime committed by the U. S. Commissioners has been to present a document in English, a barbarous language which the Spanish commissioners do not pretend to understand. To culminate the offence, the document was type-written.

—Luccheni, the anarchist assassin of the unfortunate Empress of Austria, was brought before the Assize Court at Geneva and Thursday, and after a brief trial was condemned to imprisonment for life, the highest penalty under the Swiss law. He confessed his crime was premeditated and showed no signs of remorse.

—It seems certain that the Kaiser will touch at Cadix or other Spanish ports on his way home from Palestine (he is going all the way round to the Baltic). This has aroused

great hopes in the breasts of the Spaniards, who hope to persuade him to visit the Queen Regent at Madrid and already see in him the protector of Spain against the United States. It would be strange if, after having taken Turkey to his imperial bosom, the Kaiser should make a friend of Spain, the next most backward and anti-progressive nation in Europe. Germany, Spain and Turkey would constitute a fine triple alliance.

—The P. S. N. Co's «Iberia» bringing London dates to about October 22, is expected early on Monday morning, and will sail the same day for the West Coast.

—The extraordinary deficiencies of the Solís Theatre in its lighting arrangements received a remarkable illustration on Thursday evening. It being necessary, for the purposes of the ballet, to reduce the lights in the auditorium, this could only be done, as regards the lower tier of boxes, by the inexpressibly clumsy expedient of sending round a man to turn them off burner by burner, there being no connection to raise or lower them all together. Such a thing seems hardly credible in a theatre pretending to be modern and first class. It is certainly time that the proprietors brought it more up to date in these respects.

—The *B. A. Standard* is our authority for announcing the death of an old British resident in this Republic, Mr. George Porteous, who died last week at the Bellasco estate, Rio Negro, in his 85th year.

—A proof of the increasing love of tobacco in England is given in the Report of the Principal Chemist at Somerset House, who says that the tobacco cleared for consumption in the United Kingdom has now reached 11b. 12 ozs. per head of the population. In the first year of this decade the amount per head was 11b. 9 1/2 ozs., and since then it has steadily increased. The tobacco was never more free from adulteration than it is at the present time.

—«Le Soleil», a Government organ in Quebec, states that the final figures of the prohibition plebiscite in Canada show a Dominion majority of 20,094 against the measure. In Quebec there is a majority of 91,295 against, thus wiping out the majority of 71,201 in favour of the measure cast in the seven Provinces of the Dominion.

—An aged widow lady living near Dunmow (famous for the Fitch) is probably the oldest living cyclist. She was born 93 years ago, and recently bought a bicycle on which she journeys frequently to and from the village for her shopping and visiting. She informs inquirers that she feels better for the exercise, and regrets that Mr. Gladstone had not taken to cycling.

—The *B. A. Standard* congratulates Dr. John Halahan, late of the British Hospital, on his marriage. Dr. Halahan is the third son of the Rev. John Halahan of Castletown, Berehaven, County Cork, and married Miss Edith Fomly, the second daughter of Mr. Edward Bristowe of Deal Kent. The ceremony was celebrated on Wednesday. While at the Hospital the Doctor made many friends, and none will miss him more, or wish him joy with more sincerity, than the many poor «out patients» who have always received careful attention from him.

BUENOS AIRES.

—A meeting of the creditors of Messrs. W. Davis and Co., advertising agents, was held on Wednesday afternoon at Piedad 349, to enquire into the state of the firm's financial affairs. Mr. W. Davis, the principal of the firm, having disappeared. The representatives of nearly all the newspapers in the city were present, as well as those of several commercial firms, who submitted a statement of their claims. After an interchange of ideas as to the best course to be taken under the circumstances, a committee was formed, consisting of the following gentlemen, to continue an investigation: Messrs. Edeya of the *Review of the River Plate*, Bernheim, of the *Courrier de la Plata*, Beach, ex-book keeper of the firm, and Erhart, the ex-manager. Meanwhile the representatives of the various newspapers agreed not to accept any more business from the firm.

—We regret to announce the death of Mr. Thomas Griffin, who was for many years engineer at the water-works, Recoleta. He died at the estancia La Valdesia, Cachari, the residence of his brother-in-law, Mr. John Hill, and was

Continuing his visitation charge at Maidstone yesterday the Archbishop of Canterbury dealt with the subject of ceremonial in the Church of England.

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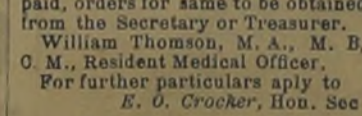
