THE BUDGET ANALISED.-V.

We resume this topic from Friday last.

We are afraid it would prove tedious to our readers if we were to indulge in a prolix analysis of all the five Ministries. There are, however, some further points to which we cannot resist calling attention.

In the Department of Foment, the "National Department of Engineers" costs \$98,736 the year. This provides for an Inspection and Council and some eight or nine offices and sub-offices, with a total staff of about 192 persons; engineers, surveyors, inspectors, clerks, draughtsmen, porters, and so forth - quite a small army. If the State were largely embarked in public works, this large staff might possibly be justifiable, but it is not. Neither the amount of public works executed by the State, nor the supervision of those executed by private enterprise demands anything like so large a staff, and the expenditure is mere extravagance. This is more evident when we examine the items. \$9300 is charged to "Inspection and Council," which has little or nothing to do, or the members of which could be equally well employed in the departmental work. Over \$20,000 is charged to the section of "Railways and Hydraulic Works." The State has no Railways, and the guaranteed Railways which it is occasionally called upon to inspect have their own engineering staff, and we are sure, at a much less cost. No less than \$36,000 is charged to the "Section of Bridges, Public Roads and Topography," with a staff of 32 persons. What do they all do? Every day we hear the complaint that the Government does nothing or next door to it for the improvement of means of transit in the interior, yet here we find the Budget charged with an engineering staff large enough and costly enough to plan and build roads and bridges enough for a territory three times the size of Uruguay. Again we ask, what do they do? Where are the evidences that the money is spent with any profit whatever to the Republic? There is a "Section of Architecture and Drawing," with a staff of 16 persons and a cost of \$9300. What do these do? We are not aware that the State has erected a single public building on its own account for very many years. At the most it occasionally builds a school house, and that certainly does not require the maintenance of a permanent architectural staff of this magnitude. Then, there is an "Industrial Section of Mines" with a staff of six persons and a cost of \$7670. Of what earthly use is this section, when the mining industry hardly exists in the Republic, and in any case the State neither possesses nor works mines of any kind? We do not say that this "National Department of Engineers" is entirely useless; on the contrary, we know that it has done some useful and necessary work, and there is good reason for its existence; but it is conceived on an absurdly extravagant and pretentious scale, more befitting a State of five times the wealth and territory and where important public works were continually in progress, than to this Republic in its present modest and somewhat "condition. Fifteen or twenty years hence, the Department may be required in its present form, but for the present it might and should be reduced to much more modest dimensions.

The National University, which is dependent on the Department of Foment, costs the Republic \$117,518 the year. So far as we can perceive, the full cost is debited to the public charge, and there is nothing set off against it in the way of fees received. The young men who go to this institution nearly all belong to families of a more or less affluent class, who could well afford to pay for the completion of their education. But the University, it would seem, takes these young men, and educates them at the expense of the taxpayer, turning them into doctors of law and of medicine, of which the Republic has far more than she needs and which make but little for progress, and not into the agricultural, mercantile, and pioneers of development of which she is in far greater want, is not such an institution, maintained at the public expense, rather an absurd superfluity for a pastoral country of some 850,000 inhabitants? In any case, if an University must exist, might it not attempt to give a technical rather than a professional education, such as is better adapted to the present needs of the Republic; and might it not call upon the richer class of parents to bear at least part of the expense of the education of their sons, instead of having them educated at the cost of the unfortunate taxpayer? We find this considerable sum devoted to turning out lawyers and medics, while there is no provision in the Republic for a higher class technical education. The same money spent in technical schools would be of far greater public benefit.

The National Museum costs \$12,437 the year, but of this sum only a paltry \$1000 is devoted to the acquisition and preservation of objects and all the rest goes to staff and rent. The money seems very badly proportioned.

The Civil Pension and Orphans List, which comes under the head of National Obligations, costs \$165,163 the year. This provides for no fewer than 106 orphans or minors and 332 pensioners, 438 in all. There is one orphan (whose, we should like to know,) receives \$2880 (say £600) the year, another at \$2340, and some twelve others of \$1000 or over, the rest receiving sums down to as low as \$60 the year. Of the pensioners, there are two at \$4800 (over £1000) the year, two at \$3600, two at \$2900, nine at \$2400, about thirty receiving over \$1000, and the rest receiving sums down to as low as \$60. We do not hesitate to say that this is a very monstrous and extravagant list for a Republic of this description, and one of the peculiarities of it is that the pensioners never seem to die nor the minors to come of age; at all events we scarcely ever hear of names coming off the list, though only too frequently of names being added to it. However, the abuses of this pension list have long been notorious, and have so often been decried against that there is hardly anything left to say. Not less monstrous is the Superannuation List, which amounts to \$108,579, for 250 persons. In this list we find one at \$7200 the year (say £1,530) one at \$6750, three at \$5520, four at \$4450, two at \$3,000, and fully twenty between \$2500 and \$1000 whilst the lowest receives \$100. We do not know who are the happy recipients of the higher figures, but they are being better paid than the Ministers themselves or any of the present servants of the State, however important their posts. In these two lists as in many other things, the Republic has been aping the ways of richer and more populous states, with disastrous results to herself, and has been making grants which, both in quantity and number, are absolutely beyond her capacity. Fortunately the present Government shows signs of reacting against these two notorious abuses - and long may it continue to do so with all the energy in its power.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Council of State no quorumed very diligently on Friday. A special sitting was convened yesterday for discussion of the Annual Law of Licenses (Patentes.)

The Foment Committee of the Council of State has reported favorably on the application of Salvo Hermanos for concession to establish a factory for woven goods, with dye and wash houses attached. The capital to be employed is to be not less than \$50,000 and the concession would be for 10 years, during which period the establishment would be exempt from internal taxes and from import duties on machinery, etc. Strange to say, though this country produces excellent wool in considerable quantities

(about 10 1/4 million dollars worth yearly) no serious attempt has yet been made to manufacture the raw material for home consumption, and all the woolen materials and goods used here are imported from Europe. There should be an opening in this direction for an important and profitable industry.

Except for the disputes over candidates, which will probably continue until the very day of the elections, the political world keeps dull enough. Some of our contemporaries are endeavoring to revive the alarms of a "collectivist" revolution, but the people seem wearied of the topic and pay little attention.

The Executive has issued the Decree "regulating" the Law authorizing the issue of the 2nd Series of the Extraordinary 1897 Loan. There is nothing in it necessary to quote. We understand that the Certificates or Bonds will be issued to the claimants on the Loan in the course of the present month, as soon as they are printed.

We learn that the amount collected for Property Tax (Contribucion Inmobiliaria) up to the 3rd instant, was \$558,881 against \$490,924 on the same date last year. This is an improvement of nearly \$76,000.

THE YEOMEN OF THE GUARD.

We condense from the B. A. Standard the following account of the production of Gilbert and Sullivan's operetta "The Yeomen of the Guard," at the Opera House, Buenos Aires, on Thursday night, by the amateurs of the Buenos Aires Choral Union.

The Opera House last night presented a most brilliant spectacle, most of the best known families in English-speaking society, as well as many native families also being present. This was undoubtedly due to the curiosity that had been raised with regard to the production for the first time in Buenos Aires, of Gilbert and Sullivan's pretty opera "The Yeomen of the Guard."

The plot of the work is of the flimsiest kind, but in a piece of this nature, the music is the principal thing, and here Sir Arthur has risen far above his first productions, most of which are well known amongst us. The melodies may not be so catchy as many of those in "Pinafore," "The Pirates of Penzance," "The Mikado," "Iolanthe" and others, but the dignity of the score is most impressive. Sullivan has thrown into the score his ripe experience, his faultless taste and his splendid knowledge of the styles of bygone days. There is not one bar that is not interesting, and the composer has done himself ample justice, whilst Mr. Gilbert has written some of his best lyrics. It is the plot that is weak and hardly worthy of the writer. With regard to the opera as a spectacle, there can be but one opinion, and that must be that it is gorgeous. The grim old Tower of London in the back ground, with the brilliant costumes of the Yeomen in the front, the rich dresses of the galleys of Henry the Eighth's days, the quaint attire of the girls and apprentices, all lend a charm to a scene that is quite novel.

Speaking of the performance last night, in very many respects it was considerably above amateur performances, even amateur performances here, which are so good. Mrs. E. R. Showler has hitherto only been heard in small parts, and her performance last night came almost as a surprise. Her acting as the wedding coquette Phoebe, was splendid, and the manner in which she alternately cooed and scolded Wilfred was charming. Her solo "When maiden loves" was charmingly given, as was also the difficult air "Were I thy Bride" Miss Oulso as Elsie Maynard in the pretty ballad "This done, I am a Bride," in the touching solo "O, Mercy," as also in the duet with Point "I have a song to Sing O!" once more showed to great advantage and only followed up the success she had achieved in the "Gondoliers" and "Mikado." Mr. E. Leslie Wilson as Col. Fairfax was at his best. The music might have been written for his voice, so admirably was he suited.

Not only in the two beautiful airs already mentioned was he excellent, but the concerted music seemed to suit him better than usual. In his acting also he has improved, and it is only just to say that Mr. Wilson last night surpassed himself. Mr. J. S. Lee, as Wilfred Shadbol, gave another example of character acting, in which line he has really become famous. His representation of the vindictive, loutish jailer was admirable, and he was very great in the duet, "Like a ghost his vigil keeping," with Jack Point. As the melancholy, jilted Jester, Mr. F. C. Lee was very good, and was quite in keeping with the author's ideas. He was heard to great advantage in the duet with Elsie and in the duet with Wilfred, and also in his patter song "Oh! a private buffoon." Mr. T. V. M. Knox, as Sergeant Maryll, was hardly so well suited. His acting was good, but his voice is hardly

sufficiently powerful for the music allotted to the bluff old soldier. The minor parts of the piece, Dame Carruthers, Kate, her niece, the Lieutenant of the Tower, and Leonard Meryll were well undertaken by Mrs. A. M. Barton, Mrs. C. Taylor, Mr. R. Huntington, and Mr. J. S. Hooper.

In a work of this kind a great deal depends on an efficient chorus, and here special praise must be given to Mr. W. Nicholson, who has carried out this very important part of the production most admirably. Mr. Nicholson has worked most assiduously for many months past, and it is in a great measure due to his untiring efforts that last night's performance was so successful. In this he has been greatly assisted by Mr. R. H. Morgan as Stage Manager.

SUNDRIES.

The great event of the day - or rather, of Friday - in London has been the honoring of Sirdar Lord Kitchener of Khartoum. In the Guildhall he was received by the Lord Mayor and Corporation, who presented him with the Freedom of the City and a magnificent sword of honor, richly jewelled. The concourse of persons in the City to get a glimpse of the hero was so great that traffic had to be suspended nearly all day. In the evening followed the grand banquet in the Guildhall, attended

by Lord Salisbury, Lord Rosebery and many other notabilities, about 2000 guests in all.

Lord Salisbury made a notable speech, in which he paid very high tribute to the manner in which the Sirdar had conducted the Sudan campaign, eulogising in turn his personal valor, his strategic genius, his diplomatic tact, and finally the exceptional circumstance that he had brought the campaign to a brilliant conclusion without exceeding the estimates. He had conquered a terrible enemy, avenged the death of the hero Gordon, and, continuing the work of Generals Wood and Grenfell, had raised the Egyptian soldier from being the scorn of the world to the pinnacle of glory. Lord Salisbury then referred to the situation with France and made the important statement that, that very afternoon, he had received formal intimation that the French Government had decided to evacuate Fashoda, a step which, he said, though it did not end the controversy, settled the most dangerous point. Lord Rosebery also spoke in honor of the Sirdar. The latter in returning thanks, eulogised the bravery and discipline of his troops, especially the Egyptians, and spoke of the valuable part played in the campaign by Lord Cromer, who had directed (7) and assisted it throughout.

Nothing decisive seems to have been settled at the meeting of the peace commissioners in Paris on Friday; at all events, the telegrams still leave us in doubt, and all that can be said is that neither rupture nor settlement has yet been reached.

The French Company at the Cibils Theatre give their last performance this evening, the programme consisting of the Comedy "Le Maison Tamponin," one of the latest Parisian successes.

The Spanish Company at the Solis Theatre will this evening perform the blood-curdling melodrama "Maria Menotti or the Maniac of the Alps," with special scenes, one of which, according to the programme, represents "A Gothic Castle with some precious columns." Next week the Company migrates to the Cibils Theatre. We are very sorry to say that the visit of the Ballet Company seems to be indefinitely postponed.

Advices from Buenos Aires confirm the tragedy briefly mentioned in our last. Mr. Robison, the Mayordomo of the Pastoral Belga Estancia at Vedia Province of B. Aires, has been killed, and Mr. W. Livingstone Learmouth, Manager of the same estancia has been dangerously wounded. It appears that they caught a gaucho of bad character, notorious as a cattle raider, cutting the wires of the estancia, and he replied to their remonstrances by firing his revolver at them, with the result mentioned. It is some consolation to know that the rufian himself was killed by a shot from Mr. Robison before the latter received his death wound. Mr. Robison was a young man under thirty who came to the country about three years ago and had been employed in the offices of Messrs. Williams & Co. Mr. Learmouth had previously been in Paraguay, and was only married some 18 months ago. The affair has created a painful sensation in Buenos Aires where both the victims were well-known and respected. The Estancia is the property of an English Company.

We see by a telegram from B. Aires that Mr. Ronald Bridgett, for so many years British Consul there, has been superannuated by the British Government and will shortly retire to England.

Weather permitting (which is doubtful as usual) the social event of today will be the Battle of Flowers at the Prado, at which all the native "high life" will be present. A small charge will be made for admission to the course. Three military bands will be in attendance.

A Cricket match, M. V. C. C. versus C. U. R. C. C. is on the card for to-day, but up to the time of writing we had not received the teams.

An engagement is announced between Mr. Denny Stokes of Buenos Aires, the popular and veteran cricketer so well known on both sides of the Plate, and Miss Lillian

Crane, sister of Mr. G. T. Crane, also of that city, Mr. Stokes has hitherto been looked upon as such a confirmed bachelor, that the news has been no little surprise to his many friends.

The American press is unanimous in approving the selection of Mr. Buchanan, United States Minister in Buenos Aires, as arbitrator in the Punta de Atacama question, and says that it is a matter of congratulation that these evidences of a friendly feeling exist between the peoples of the Northern and Southern Continent.

In London, on Wednesday the celebrated law-suit against Mr. Martin Rusker, which was suspended on August 17th, was recommenced. The court condemned Mr. Rusker to pay £200 damages. This case is a result of the notorious failure of Ernest T. Hooley, the speculator and company promoter Rusker was accused of trying to induce Hooley to make false declarations, by offering him a sum of £1000. It was then that Hooley caused a scandal by declaring that he had paid £1000 to Sir William Marriott to introduce him to the Carlton Club, and that he had given £10,000 to the Marquess of Abergenny for the funds of the Conservative party, but that he did not know if this sum had actually been received by the party.

We quote from the B. A. Herald.—A correspondent signing himself "Wesleyan" went to a Methodist "Love Feast," thinking he was in for a feed; but he found it a strictly religious ceremony, where only bread and water were passed round. Evidently Wesleyan is a very recent convert or he might have known that a Love Feast is as much a religious ceremony with the Methodists as Mass is in the Catholic Church. Doubtless the Methodists will be sorry to lose the future presence of our esteemed correspondent; but if he is after a good square meal we recommend him to try the "Brunswick" or the "Criterion."

In a "Tragedy of the Sea" the other day, we made a mistake in saying the "Balmoral" had come to Montevideo. That vessel made her way to San Francisco, whence Captain Davies, who is at Montevideo, got the sad news that his wife perished.

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 8.

The detachments summoned to Peking by the Ministers of Great Britain, Germany, and Russia have arrived there, the Tsungli-Yamen having finally agreed to allow them to enter the city.

A deputation arranged by the East London Water Consumers' Defence Association yesterday waited upon the Water Committee of the London County Council, to bring before them the serious state of affairs in the East-end. The Chairman of the Committee expressed sympathy with the objects of the deputation, but pointed out that they were hampered in anything they might wish to do by the existence of a Royal Commission.

At their concluding sitting yesterday, at Leeds, the delegates of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants decided to amalgamate with, and take over, the membership of the General Railway Workers Union. The auditors' report was of a very satisfactory character. Mr. George Thaxton, of Leeds, was appointed president of the year. Liverpool was chosen as the next place of meeting.

Dr. Clifford on his return from America gave a lecture to a very large audience in Westbourne Park Chapel last night. Though dealing principally with questions affecting the churches, he touched also on the war, declaring that above all other things the Americans had been most deeply gratified with the sympathy and appreciation of England.

With the exception of Herr Humperdinck's new Moorish Rhapsody, both concerts at Leeds yesterday were devoted to familiar works.

St. Pancras has again rejected Free Libraries. The result of the poll, declared yesterday, was a majority of 3,429 against the adoption of the act. In 1894 the adverse majority was 1,674.

An action brought Mr. by Mr. C. Wreford Brown, a well known athlete, against the London and South Western Railway Company came on for hearing at the South-western County Court yesterday. Plaintiff claimed the amount of a cab hire incurred in consequence of one of defendants station masters closing the door of the Worcester Park station on two or three minutes before the time a train was advertised to start. The defence relied on a condition published in the company's time table giving the company power to close a station door five minutes before the departure of each train. His honour found for the defendants, with costs.

As the injured man is in a critical condition his depositions were taken during the day at Guy's Hospital, in the presence of a metropolitan magistrate. From this statement it appeared that the prisoner entered a shooting gallery at Newington Butts, kept by the injured man, from whom he demanded a character in respect of previous employment on the premises. The request being refused it was alleged that Simpson drew a revolver from his pocket and fired three shots at Paterson. The prisoner was remanded.

Thomas Drum was charged before the Recorder of Dublin, yesterday, with attempting to blackmail Dean Lefroy, of Norwich, by means of a letter threatening to publish a life of the Dean. The prisoner pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to six calendar month's imprisonment.

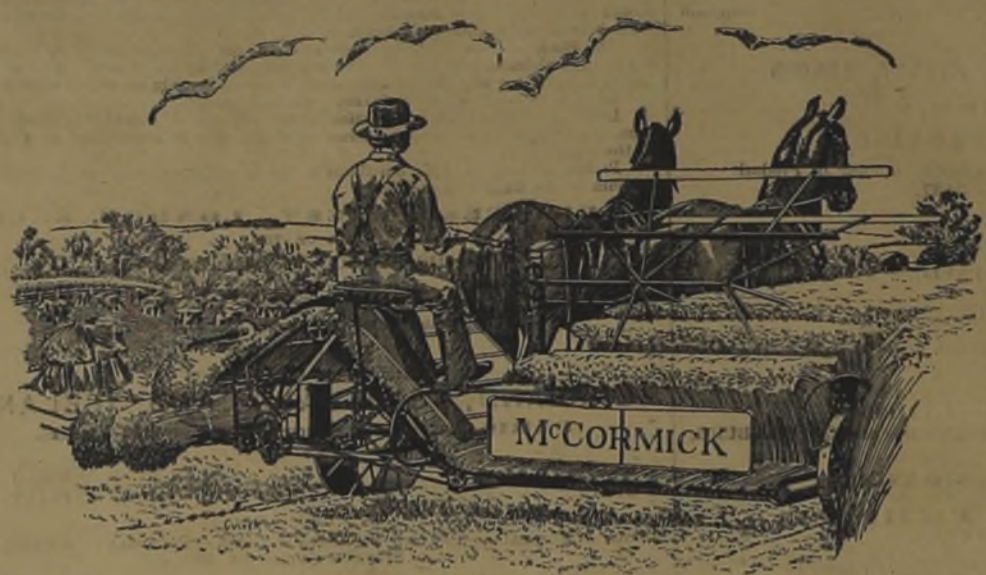
