EXTRAORDINARY 1897 LOAN, New Emission.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law authorising a new emission of the Extraordinary 1897 Loan to the amount of \$2,600,000, for the purpose of settling all outstanding claims arising from the civil war last year, The following is a translation of the

is bereby authorised to emit a Debt up to \$2,600,000 in Bonds of the Extraordinary Loan of 1897, 2nd Series, in the same terms and conditious as established by the Law of May 18, 1897.

Art. 2. - The service of interests and amortisation corresponding to these Bonds shall commence to run

from Dec. 1st , 1898. Art. 3.—There shall be assigned to the service of interest and amortisation of this Debt, the remainder of the product of the internal tobacco tax, after the service of the 1st Series has been covered. If this assignment does not suffice to cover the said service, it shall be complemented from the general

Art 4 .- The Executive shall re

gulate the present Law.

Art. 5.—Let this be communicated, etc.

POLITICAL NOTES.

In the Council of State, on Mon-In the Council of State, on Monday, the Bill authorising emission of the 2nd Series of the Eutrordinary 1897 Loan was fully approved without debate of interest. The amount to be issued was raised from \$2,500,000 to \$2,600,000, to allow for an error in the calculation of the bonus. The Bill granting a concession to Rowley Solsona & Co. to build a wharf for the embarkation of live-stock at the Buceo was approved in general. The remaining business was not of gen-

The sanction of the Loan above mentioned adds another \$2,600,000 to the Public Debt of Uruguay, and this with the \$5,000,000 of Treasury Certificates Debt makes over 71/2 millions added, on account of the Borda administration, the three and a half years of which has thus cost the country no less than \$24,-700,000 added to the Public Debt, apart from the terrible indirect damages it inflicted on the Repub lic. period between Feb. 15 and March 1st., and both more or less agree that Sr. Cuestas should resign his provisional presidency into the hands of the President of the Senate for the intervening period. Dr. A. M. Rodriguez, writing in the Dia, has come forward with the formal proposition. which is believed to enjoy official favor that the new Chambers should be convoked as soon as the elections are over, and should immediately proceed to the presidential election. According to this plan, Sr. Cuestas' term as constitutional president would date for four years from the day of his election (some when in December) and then there would be an interim presidency of two months and presidency of two months and some weeks until the next presidential election on March 1st, 1902. It is agreed that this course would not be unconstitutional, but it aggravates, whilst postponing, the evil of an interim presidency, which is what it is de-sired to avoid Why our contemporaries and those who have sup-ported the dissolution of the Chambers and the situation de facto that ollowed, should be so opposed to dea of Sr. Cuestas retaining his position as provisional President for a fortnight longer; and why the existence of Constitutional Chambers should be considered incom-patible with the continuance in provisional power for fifteen days of the man they presently in-tend to elect to the constitution-al presidency, are two things we completely fail to understand. It seems to us that the quarrel is one over words and barren forms. We are sure that if the Republic were consulted, the common sense of ninety-nine persons out of every hundred would say that, since Sr. Unestas is to be elected definite President, let him remain in his post without solution of continuity, and thus save the Republic the manifest dangers and inconveniences of an interim presidency, either now or four years hence. If, as we said the other day, it is formally declared that the return o a constitutional regime, shall date from the presidential election on March 1st, the whole question is solved, and there is no occasion for further dispute. The mistake arises from imagining that the re-turn to constitutional government is complete with the meeting of the Chambers on Feb. 15.
We are surprised that so obvious and simple a solution should not have suggested itself to any of

not have suggested itself to any of our contemporaries.

The Legislative body is and always has been mainly composed of lawyers, and there are no posed of lawyers, and there are no body of men as a rule more systematically opposed to reform in legal procedure and more difficult to be persuaded to accept it than lawyers themselves. They may admit its necessity theoretically, but that is a very different thing from inducing them to put it into practice—possibly to the detriment of their own acquired customs and their own acquired customs and emoluments.)

The balloon relieved with the weight of Mr. Pini, which is 85 kilos, immediately bounded upwards causing the peo-ple below to release their hold on the room. The balloon weat soaring the rope. The balloon went soaring up with such rapidity that it was not long before it was enveloped in clouds and lost to sight. LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 4.

A telegram from Shanghai says will decide upon a joint occupation of Peking to ensure the salety of toreigners there. The German fleet has left Shanghai for Taku, and the American Government is sending the cruiser Baltimore and the gunboat Petrel.

Information received from China by mail shows that the provinces are in a disturbed state, and that the missionaries are in considerable danger. In several towns they have lately suffered violence, and it is feared that recent events in Peking may remove all fear of punishment from the minds of the local authorities, who are likely to allow foreigners to be attacked

with impunity.
In an interview in Paris, Mr. Strong, the Correspondent there of «The Observer,» states that Ester-hazy, besides confessing that he was the author of the bordereau, admitted that he had forged a number of documents, on the order of his military superiors.
