COUNCIL OF STATE.

THE ELECTIONS.—EXTRAORDINARY EXPENDITURE—BULL-FIGHTS.

There was an interesting sitting of the Council of State on Wednesday. The proceedings were opened by Dr. J. C. Blanco, who, tempor-arily abandoning the Chair for the purpose, called the attention of the Council to the fact that several denunciations had appeared in the press of late, of improper official intervention in the preparations for the elections. He did not think it opportune to go into details or to assign responsibilities, but he thought it incumbent on the Coun cil to take notice of a circumstance that was so contrary to the pro-mises that had been made to the country of liberty of suffrage. Therefore, in order to save the dignity and responsibility of the Council, he proposed a «min-ute of communication» to the Executive, to the following effect:-«The Council of State, in view of the denunciations of the press respecting the intervention of public functionaries in the proclama tion of candidates and other preparatory electoral acts, considers it its duty to address the Executive, giving warning that the said denunciations, should they grave responsibilities, which the Council could neither share nor pass over in silence, in view of its authority and of the solemn pro mises made before the country to promote the reestablishment of institutions on the base of liberty of

Sr. Baille y Ordonez opposed the motion, which he said was weak. If the charges were proved, it would be the duty of the Council to take a much more energetic course; its responsibility would not be saved by such a protest. So far, however, Dr. Blanco had presented no concrete proofs or facts, merely the newspaper assertions which might be based on political passion or intrigue Council required something clear-er than that before it could justly sanction a motion which was in effect a censure on the Executive

Discussion then commenced of the Bill for the restoration of bull fights Sr. Rodolfo Arteaga said that the moment was not opportune for discussion of such a topic, and proposed that it should be deferred to the next legislature. This was opposed by Sr. Espalter, who maintained that it was a question of principles and of individual rights (1) The motion was lost by a large

A lively discussion ensued. Sr. Salterain expressed his opposition to the Bill. Sr. Espalter defended it at some length, saying that the restoration was desired by a large class of the population, whose wishes in such a matter merited the respect of the legislators. He regarded bull fights as a manly and noble spectacle, as was proved by their popularity in Spain, a nation of high morality. Dr. Rodriguez Larreta thought it shameful that the Council should shameful that the Council should be called upon to discuss at a moment of national anxiety, the restoration of an immoral, scandalous and cruel spectacle. The Council would stultify and dis grace itself if it gave sanction to the restoration. This provoked an angry reply from Sr. Archaga, who defended the restoration on the grounds that it was desired by the grounds that it was desired by a large majority (?) of the inhabi-tants and that it would restore its former animation and attractions (stc) to Montevideo. Sr. Battle supported the views of Sr. R. Larreta, and denounced bull fights as being of immoral and de grading tendencies. He was still speaking when the hour sounded and the Chamber adjourned.

POLITICAL NOTES.

We give account elsewhere of the lively sitting in the Council of State on Wednesday. Dr. Blanco's motion, which came as a surprise, is regarded by many as another proof of his desertion to the opposition, and by others as a bid for favor with the dissident acolorados. It met with very little sympathy from the Council, its reference to Committee being almost equivalent to a negative, and it is rumored that on this account Dr. Blanco will resign both as President and member of the Council. There was quite a heated discussion over the bull-fights question, which remained unsettled. The promoters of the restoration were in strong force at the *bar,* and indulged in some noisy demonstrations for or against the speakers

on the two sides of the question. Convict Mutiny.

A somewhat serious affair took place on Wednesday afternoon, when a number of the penitentiary convicts who were employed in macadamising the road near the «Tablada,» mutinied against their warders and made an attempt to escape. It was nearly the hour for ceasing work, when, taking advantage of the laxi-ty of the guard, some of them at-tempted to overpower them and seize their rifles, while the rest tried to run away. The attempt was evidently preconcerted but the authorities had an idea that some-thing of the kind, was contemplat thing of the kind was contemplated, and showed their readiness by surrounding the scene, in less than quarter of an hour by 300 forces, namely 200 men of the Squadron of Security, and 100 of 5th Cavalry, Sr. Dominguez, the Prefect of Police, placing him-sell at their head. These soon reduced the mutineers to order, but one of them, a notorious criminal named Diaz Galarza was killed by a rifle shot, and two others, equally notorious, contrived make good their escape. It is be-lieved one of these is wounded.

The affair, the shots, and the presence of the troops, caused great excitement in the neighbourhood, and not a few thought the threatened revolution had broken out at last a rumor to that effect being also spread in the city. The authorities may be congratulated on the promptitude they displayed, which shows their readiness to cope with any alarm.

Some of our contemporaries ascribe the mutiny to the work of «collectivist» agents, who hoped to find in the escaped convicts a nucleus for their revolutionary plans ! It is difficult to believe that is the case, nor is it conceivable that prison discipline could remotey admit of such machinations. Anyhow, it is characteristic, in more ways than one, that the «collectivists» should resort to the lowest criminal classes for further ance of their plans against the welfare of the Republic.
