Old London Newspaper Ceases Publication

United States High Gold Record

The Round Table All India Conference

OLD LONDON NEWSPAPER CEASES PUBLICATION

London, August 17th
The "Sunday News", one of the oldest Sunday newspapers in Great Britain, dramatically ceased publication on Saturday at six o'clock in the evening, just as the first edition was about to go to press.

The sub-editors, reporters and compositors were working normally when suddenly Mr. Valentine Heywood, the acting editor, entered the news room and announced: "Gentlemen the Sunday News is dead".

This paper, first published in 1842, had a circulation which reached every quarter of the globe. Until March of last year it was known as Lloyds Sunday News. The well known author Elgar Wallace was recently appointed editor in an effort to keep the journal alive.

UNITED STATES HIGH GOLD RECORD

New York, August 17th
It is announced that as a result of recent shipments from South America and Japan, the United States monetary gold stocks now amount to \$ 4,976,500,000 which is a new high record.

It is expected to reach five billion shortly inasmuch as adverse trade balances oblige foreign countries to pay the differences of imports over exports in gold.

THE ROUND TABLE ALL INDIA CONFERENCE

Bombay, August 17th
The majority of the prominent Indian delegates to the Round Table Conference have now left for London; though Gandhi has not yet gone, it is hoped he may do so soon.

Speaking at Ahmedabad, Gandhi urged his hearers to prepare for any eventuality, and said, "if there should be peace, do not disturb it; if there should be war, the people must not be slow to respond. Do not expect anything from London".

PERUVIAN PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE WELCOMED

Lima, August 17th
The Presidential candidate, Sr. Victor Haya de la Torre, was welcomed on his arrival by more than fifty thousand persons, who paraded the streets in the centre of the city amid thunderous ovations. So popular a reception can only be compared with that of Sanchez Cerro, after overthrowing the Leguía regime.

ITALIAN AIR MANOEUVRES

Rome, August 17th
The Italian air manoeuvres have been fixed to begin on August 25th. Six hundred planes are taking part commanded by General Balbo, assisted by the Chief of Staff, General Valle.

The operations will take place chiefly in the Apennines and later there will be sham attacks on Florence, Turin, Bologna, Pisa and Ferrara.

GERMANY'S SHORT-TERM CREDITS

Basle, August 17th
It is understood that foreign bankers have agreed on principle to prolong the short-term credits to Germany for six months, on the condition that the Central banks and the B. I. S. prolong the \$100,000,000 credit similarly, but the Germans have rejected the banker's reservations regarding the utilization of the credits.

Negotiations with Berlin continue.

SHIPPING

WORLD TONNAGE

During the last twelve months there has been a decrease in the steam tonnage owned in the world of 636,099 tons, an increase of 1,335,096 tons in the motor tonnage, and a decrease in the tonnage of sailing vessels and barges of 175,601 tons, making a net increase of 523,369 tons in the total tonnage for the world. The net increase from June, 1929, to June, 1930, was 1,533,332 tons. The countries showing the largest increase for the last twelve months are: Norway (397,217 tons), British Dominions (133,924 tons),

alternatives one is that the United States Government should temporarily reacquire several of the company's largest steamers, and the other that the combined International Mercantile Marine and Roosevelt Steamship Companies should purchase control of the United States Lines. It is believed that the latter will be accepted. The Shipping Board is vitally interested in the affairs of the United States Lines, because it holds some £ 2,000,000 in mortgages on the fleet of eleven vessels, which it sold for £ 3,200,000.

Sweden (80,731 tons), Soviet Russia (71,740 tons), Yugoslavia (59,125 tons), and Denmark (57,251 tons). Among the principal maritime countries three show decreases: the United States (403,625 tons), Great Britain and Ireland (135,539), and Japan (40,463 tons).

A considerable increase has taken place in recent years in the number of sea-going steamers and motor-ships of 4,000 tons each and above. In 1914 there were 3,608 such vessels, and now the number reaches 6,630, of which 473 are of 10,000 tons and above including 68 of 20,000 tons each and upwards. Of the 473 vessels 239 are under the British flag. It may be noted that just under one-half of the total number of steamers and motor-ships in existence are of less than 1,000 tons each.

U. S. A. SHIPPING PROPOSAL FAILS

It is stated in New York that the appeal has virtually failed of the United States Shipping Board to steamship interests to form a pool of £ 700,000 to aid the United States Lines, which is reported to be in financial difficulties as a result of the depression.

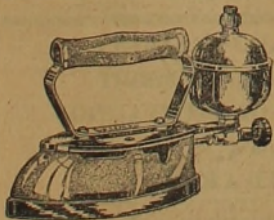

Shipping Company has again declared a dividend of 10 per cent. This efficient concern, which has not so far been "rationalised", has profited by the retention of independence, and the shareholders have good reason to be satisfied with the results of the fleet's management.

SHIP CANAL'S HALF YEAR

June is usually one of the Manchester Ship Canal Company's best months, as a number of half-yearly receipts come in then. This year, however, it was not a great deal better than May, and the revenue from the main waterway was not equal to that of last January. There is nothing surprising in this for, as everybody knows, imports and exports have fallen to a low level and all the ports of the country appear to have suffered loss of traffic. The Mersey Docks and Harbour, for example, in its report for the year to the 1st of this month, shows a decrease in the number of vessels using the port of Liverpool of 1,040 (to 19,731) and a decline of 1,471,592 (to 21,314,820) in the aggregate tonnage. The effect of this state of things upon the board's revenue was a decline of £ 330,212 for the

THE ENGLISH DINNER

By T. Earle Welby

(Continued)

When, as already noted, there occurred the benevolent revolution in the feeding of cattle whereby it was possible for everyone to have freshly killed beef and mutton during the winter months, the old English spice box disappeared. Not so the taste acquired over many centuries for sharply flavoured good. To satisfy this persisting demand for a no longer strictly necessary corrective of mustiness in preserved meat, our forefathers might well have handed down to all of us some of the excellent freshly made sauces, and in particular that Cumberland sauce the formula of which is very seldom to be found in any but the most enlightened books of cookery (by French chefs). They did nothing of the sort. What happened was that there sprang into existence those specialities of England, the bottled sauces, so that whereas on the Continent sauce usually means something newly made with particular regard to the needs of the dish in question, in England it is a liquid out of a bottle to be spattered indiscriminately into soup, on to fish and butcher's meat and poultry, and even in some wicked households in and on a salad.

To be sure, at least two of the English bottled sauces, each aristocratic in origin, are among the more considerable achievements of our race. In the latter part of the eighteenth century, Captain Charles Combers, a follower of the Quorn Hunt, had the habit of staying at the George Inn, Bedford always accompanied by a bottle of his special sauce. On an occasion, he left the precious bottle there against his imminent return; the host, Peter Harvey, brother of the eventually not less celebrated Elishbeth Lazanby, rashly served some of it to a company of strangers, who insisted on finishing the lot. On Captain Combers's return, there followed apologies, and the Captain's good-natured offer to

give the landlord the recipe, and eventually a sale by Harvey of the recipe for an annuity of £ 400. Many years later, round about 1830, "a Nobleman of the County" accidentally left his recipe for Worcester sauce on the counter of a chemist with a mere and vile medical prescription. But the bottle sauces achieved, no thought was given to the fresh — the specific sauces.

In short English cookery lost its battle without very really fighting it. The survival of a few chop houses, some of them meritorious enough but others now playing the worst of all cards in "Ye Olde Englishe Fare" and spurious old oak, really does not affect, this contention for there is no English establishment known to us which has evolved either a number of desirable dishes out of the national legacy or devised something that could reasonably be called both a dinner and truly English.

We are back to the already made complaint that what even some of the wisest of our conservative epicures have called a dinner is not sufficiently contoured. Mercifully we have long ago escaped from the dreadful and unending dinners so bitterly described by Thackeray, when he said, "Everybody has the same dinner in London, the same soup, saddle of mutton, boiled fowls, tongues, entrées, and so forth" That supposedly picturesque system which caused the board to groan at dinner, and the company to groan next morning, has gone; but, significantly, what has succeeded it was long known as "service a la Russe". Brevity, simplicity, delicacy, service from kitchen or side-table instead of from the dinner table with a host interminably

carving; these improvements cannot be described as English in origin.

To-day there is a welcome if limited revival of interest in English regional cooking in what little survives of it; and within the last few months we have seen both the publication, by "Country Life", of an excellent volume of traditional English recipes, and the formation, independently, of a society which is collecting recipes with the zeal that some have given to the collection of English folksongs. But all this though eminently deserving of support, will not take us far unless we understand and act upon the truth that evolution is the principle of life and cookery.

The mere revival of things individually good and English much as it is to be applauded, will not give us the English Dinner. For a dinner is not simply an assemblage of separately tempting dishes but a composition; and it is to this art of composition, of considered crescendo and diminuendo, that we must apply our national energy, if to Geneva and at other gatherings of the nations we are to hold up our heads and say proudly that we too have a cookery, and are not still in the condition of Mr. George Saintsbury's friend who invited an Italian artist to dinner and offered him macaroni, to be properly rebuked with, "When you dine with me in Naples I will not offer you beef-steak."

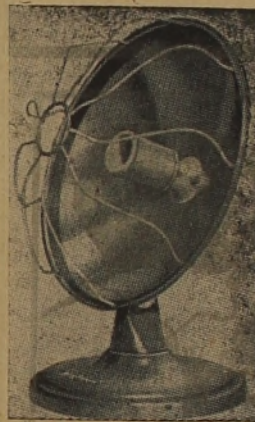

THE CENSORED HYMNALS

A severe censorship is now being applied to the Methodist hymnals. The union of the great Methodist connexions, Wesleyan, Primitive and United, has been sanctioned by statute, and is now practically certain. The hymn-books of the three component bodies are to be replaced by one. It was announced recently that of more than two thousand hymns in these books nearly twelve hundred have been rejected.

John Wesley learnt the value of a hymn from the Moravians, and made more use of it than any religious leader since Luther. But he had met Isaac Watts, and half his first hymn-book was of Watt's writing. That first book of John Wesley's had no secretarian exclusions. Besides the verses of Watts, the Congregationalist, and those of the Pietist Moravians he had Roman Catholic hymns, hymns of George Herbert's hymns of Addison's. For the new Methodist hymnal fifty-six books of other Churches have been drawn upon. Who now remembers that "Rock of Ages" was written in the fever of controversy to maintain a particular dogma? The spirit of a great hymn has in it something universal.

Year Since April 1 last the Canal Company has reduced its working expenditure materially. The recent railway award was applied to the workers on its railways 1,200 of them having their wages reduced by 1 1/2 per cent and a further 1/2 per cent in respect of earnings over £ 2 a week. It was also found necessary to put short time in operation in departments, such as that of the dockers, which were not affected by the railway award. The supervisory staffs, too, had their salaries reduced on the same scale as the railway companies applied as their staffs, and the directors, including the chairman, made a voluntary reduction in their fees equal to 18 per cent. The net revenue of the whole undertaking, after providing for interest and fixed charges, is now given as £ 75,335 less than the amount in the corresponding half of 1930. That means, no doubt, that the net revenue was £ 47,147 as against £ 122,482 in 1930 and £ 158,980 in 1929. The savings which have been effected that the fall in the half-year's traffic receipts from the Ship Canal was £ 90,923.

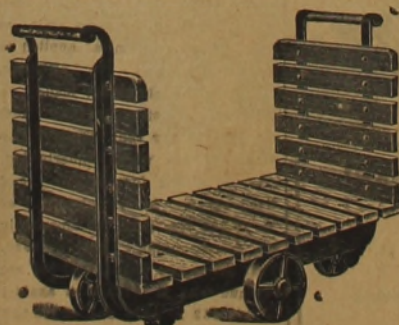

him urged strongly that he turn about and go again to the girl he loved — the living semblance of the one he had dreamed would come to him and be a mother for Petrie.

The poet's assertion that "love is loveliest when embalmed in tears" — and before he left her Allan had seen the glistening in Hilga's eyes — seemed a self-contradictory proposition. It was unbelievable that one should weep when a true lover's caress was offered — yes, even turn away from the desired embrace. Did she doubt his sincerity? Did she consider him unworthy? Or worse still,

was Hilga bound to another? Why — oh, why if she really did want him, had Hilga sent Allan away?

Again and again he propounded such questions to himself, turning over in his mind all possible answers without finding any that satisfied him, but Allan Campbell's time to contemplate his own problem was very short. The Ghost and three companions had entered the sleeping village a few moments before Allan reached it himself and were awaiting him at the entrance to his wilderness home.

The older man promptly introduced to Allan the men he had brought with him, and the younger man

instantly recognized them as persons whose encouragement and support meant much to the success of any such campaign in Michigan as William Brent had planned. Many times had he heard of them as the most loyal among all the friends whom the Ghost had induced to accept and advocate his doctrines.

In a few moments all of them were engrossed in a discussion of the proposed drive to arouse interest in a worth-while conservation policy that should be followed without regard for the temporary political advantages one candidate or another might think he saw in promising variations from its terms, that should be written into "the law of the land" as firmly as had been the state's educational policy so many years ago, and be as regularly and consistently put into effect.

Everyone agreed, declared William Brent, that it had taken more

than one generation to show the people of Michigan the benefits arising from her long-established policy with respect to schools and the means for obtaining an education, but time had proved that it was feasible to adopt and steadfastly adhere to such a policy. Then why not agree on the fundamental principles of a policy with respect to conservation? Such a course might, he admitted, provide little for the present generation, but it would most assuredly cause their children's children, even unto the fourth and more remote generations, to rise up and call them blessed. Why not, he continued, adhere to such a policy when adopted and steadfastly enforce it? Conditions might change from time to time, of course, and require changes in detail but the present trouble was that Michigan had never had any policy with respect to the cut-over lands for

more than four successive years. Conservation had become the plaything of politicians and men were often appointed to the Conservation Commission who knew nothing of the forests and their wild life from personal contact — men who, if not actually hostile to a wise policy of conservation, could be swayed as reeds in the wind by this or that selfish interest. Thus far Michigan's applicable statutes had been enacted by piecemeal methods, without any proper conception of the ultimate purpose to be eventually accomplished by conservation laws as a whole.
