Well, he will never dare to tell it, that's certain, for nobody would believe him if he for nobody would believe him if he did; and he may congratulate himself heartily that he's got well out of this difficulty. It will be the luckiest thing in the end that ever happened to him. And now I hope this little episode is finally over.'

The voting tables were opened in the church porches, according to custom, from 9 a.m. to sunset, and it is no exagerration to say that not five per cent of the voters registered thought it worth their while to attend. In some districts numbering over a thousand voters, we are assured scarcely 20 voters fulfilled their duty. Absolute order was maintained in all parts, the city was even quieter than parts, the city was even quieter than usual, the people going about with a marked air of hopeless dejection, but so farfron this being a moral triumph, it may be recorded as a disgrace. Rarely has it been our lot to witness a more humiliating spectacle, for it signified the death of all free suffrage, and the slavery of the people. The and the slavery of the people. The election was a farce, an utter and absolute farce, and about the most melancholy farce ever devised.

(December 4th) THE RETURN TO CONVERSION.

The Plague of Locusts.

Writing from north of the Rio Negro, an estanciero says.— « We have been faring very badly here, we have been devastated by the here, we have been devastated by the largest swarm of locusts I have ever seen, and in spite of all our efforts the way are not so great as they at st sight appear, and we hope in a v days to be able to prove this, and show the manner in which the eaten all our vegetables, grass, alfalfa, etc. They then commenced to lay, and they were so thick and in such numbers that I set a couple of men to work with sharp shovels to cut them in half, which is easily done when they are deposi-ing their eggs, for then the body is buried in the ground to the wings and by passing the shovel quickly over the surface of the ground, we cut thousands in halves, thus r only destroying the locusts but all their eggs as well, and the remainder took fright and cleared out, a thing generally they will not stir until they have finished laying their eggs. our shovels or not, I cannot say, b a large number that were cut took to flight and died a good distance from the house, and their companions seeing them start off followed suit and when once on the wing, did not stop until night over-took them. This is merely my surmise, at all events I was glad to get rid of them, as I have made a trial of a thousand European trees, such asoaks, elms, ash, maple, chestnut both sweet and horse, elder, sycamore, and beech. These I had sent out last month, packed in a hoy. They are month packed in a box. They are about 18 inches high and at present about 18 inches high and at present are doing well, and I think if I can keep the locusts off I shall save the greater portion in spite of the drought. I am expecting another 100 trees and 20 Shropshire ewes from England. I have already twenty, and thirtyrams, so I hope and trust we shall soon have rain as trust we shall soon have rain so make our alfalfa grow or we shall have difficulty in feeding during the winter our Herefords, Saropshires, Cleveland and Clydesdale stallions and our pure Rambouillets. Up to date from four squares of ground I have not been able to house a ton of hay, so I trust we shall have rain frequently during this summer, but

I have no desire for a we summer or our sheep will suffer more than from want of alfalfa. pears little doubt that the invasion of locusts threatens to be of great danger in many pares of the Republic. Arising in the Gran Chaco of the Argentine Republic, the locusts seem to have migrated in a south easterly direction and entered this Republic on the north west about between Paysandu and Constitucion. Their course was then for a time southerly, and now, obeying the direction of the prevailing winds, they are moving easterly. If we are not mistaken they have already been heard of in Treinta y Tres.

The danger of this invasion arises not so much from the imago or perfect insect, a large, powerfully winged locust from three to four inches long, locust from three to four inches long, which is not a very hungry beast, but from the larvw. Each female locusts deposits a bag or sac containing on an average about 50 eggs. In forty days these are hatched, the produce being the saltona, a little wingless insect not unlike the English grasshopper. These are of incredible rapacity and make short work of nearly every green substance. of nearly every green substance attainable. About the only things they will not devour are the eucalyp-tus and paraiso trees. Moreover as the food passes through their bodies almost as fast as it is swallowed, they leave the camp in such a condithey leave the camp in such a condi-tion that for some time after the cattle refuse to take the pasture. They are not difficult to kill in the egg, or forthe first twenty four hours of their existence, but after that they become very active and are conse-quently most troublesome. Knowing this, it is to be hoped that estancie-ros threatened with the plague will take energetic steps to nip it in the bud by destroying all the eggs possbud by destroying all the eggs poss-
