The Bank was, in fact, an embodiment of many of the evils, speculation, inflation, mal-administration and the rest, alluded to in general terms in our previous article. If the Government had not, for very interested motives, lent it a fictitious im-portance by its ill-advised and nutile attempts to force its notes into circulation, it would have been liquidated and have sunk quietly out of sight with little more general loss than has been caused by the collapse and virtual or actual bankruptcy of similar speculative institutions by which the market was hag-ridden, and with some of which it had intimate relations. These institutions—which it would be no exaggeration to call institutions of discredit, — together with the speculators who fostered and

managed them, have all been factors in the crisis equally with the National Bank, and all were included in the general terms of the previous article. Hence we were no more called upon to mention the Bank than we were to give a list of those institutions or of the names of the speculators, gamblers and rogues who have contributed to our downfall. Such a list would be very interesting, no doubt, but hardly becoming to the columns of our paper. Our readers can make it up for themselves, and

if they only put down names enough, cannot go far wrong.

The National Barkalone could not have produced the crisis, and even if the Bank had not existed, or had been quite other than what it is, the crisis would have come just the same. And even supposing the Bank to be re-suscitated, towards which end the predit of the Nation is now being pledged, and on which such wild opes are being fostered, the crisis will by no means have been conquered. The return to conversion will, it is true, relieve the market to a certain extent, some four million dollars we believe, but it will do little more. To onsider the crisis stemmed we want to see a general return of confidence, a re-opening of credit by the leading banks, and a revival in all departments of business, today almost

take some steps to recover its lost prestige,—no easy task—must ap-point Ministers whom the pub-lic can respect, must lighten the over-burdensome taxation, must develop the country's resources the over-burdensome taxation, must develop the country's resources and assist immigration and colonisation, and must undertake the question of administrative economy far more seriously than it has yet done. If it would only do this, the situation would soon right itself and there would be little necessity to go the round of the nations, cap in hand, begging for a loan. All the loans in the world will have no permanent the world will have no permanent effect unless the Government changes its courses and assists the country to develop instead of retarding it.

As to the National Bank, as we do not consider it was responsible for the crisis, neither do we consider its reorganisation will conquer the crisis, not only forthereasons already crisis, not only forthereasons already stated, but also, because, under present conditions, it can never hope for a sufficient return of public confidence in it again to become a leading factor in commerce and industry. It will have the Government business, and such speculative custom as cannot find a market elsewhere, but for general purposes it will be comparatively powerless for either good or evil.

Parliament.

In the Chamber of Representatives, In the Chamber of Representatives, on Monday, the Bill imposing specific duties on imported cereals, etc., sanctioned by the other Chamber, was put in general discussion. The report of the Finance Committee adopted the opinions of that of the other Chamber, and advised acceptance of the Bill.

Sr Vasquez, pointed out that the

Sr. Vasquez pointed out that the Bill involved other questions not considered in the report, and that the other Chamber, so far from sanctioning a sliding scale of duties, as advised in the report, had sanctioned specific duties as petitioned by certain millers and agriculturists. He was a decided opponent to protectionism, which he thought brought about more harm than good. If the national agriculture required protection against the imported article, it must be in a hopeless case, article, it must be in a hopeless case, and need never hope to appear in a foreign market. He thought that the imposition of a heavy duty on imported cereals would prejudice the various important industries of starch, fideos, etc., established in the country and which did a considerable export trade. It would also tend to raise, the raise of an article of

the Bill at every stage.

Sr. Silva avowed himself a protectionist, and considered that the Bill had been sufficiently considered by the other Chamber and in Committee and there was little necessity for further discussion.

The Bill was then put to the vote and was approved in general and in detail without modification, the second reading being suppressed.


