For this reason alone, if for no other, it behoves the community to make every effort and self-sacrifice to sustain and strength en the Society, and it equally behoves those who have the direc-tion of it to redouble their efforts to

tion of it to redouble their efforts to make the Society a success.

In the second place the Society appears as one of the very few organisations which serve as a social link to bring and bind the community together. The programme of the Society has hitherto been rather limited, but there is no reason that it should not be widened in the future, and we hope to see it so this very year. The community, not remarkable for unity or cooperation, cannot afford to lose one such link, and therefore the Society has a social claim for support, scarcely less and therefore the Society has a social claim for support, scarcely less strong than the cause of charity first named. Even if there were no benevolence in the back ground, the Society ought to be sustained.

The July Revolution in Buenos Aires.

General Manuel J. Campos has cupies nearly a whole page of the Nacion and of the Prensa. The concentration in the Parque was necessary in order to know the forces available, to prevent the Government from seizing upon that centre of resources, and to compromise the troops in the revolutionary movement. This plan was accepted at a meeting in Dr. Sunblad's house at a meeting in Dr. Sunblad's house and the military officers present received definite instructions for carrying it out on July 21st, but, two days previously General Camposwas arrested. Up to the 24th he was unable to discuss the plan with any of those who visited him, because he was closely watched. On that day, however, his brother

Julio told him that the Committee was doing nothing, being afraid that any movement would cause the General's death, but he authorized his brother to tell the Committee that he cheerfully took the risk of this On the 25th, all that he heard was

THE TIME OF DAY FOR OPERATIONS.

There is considerable difference of opinion amongst surgeons as to whether it is best to operate early in the morning or in the afternoon. Many prefer the morning. They say that the patient is saved the suspense of being kept waiting till the afternoon, and the surgeon has the better chance of a good supply of sunlight or of its equivalent in this country. Both these reasons have considerable force. Other surgeons maintainthat early operating implies a sleepless previous night. The shades of evening, a greater promoter of sleep than blinds and screens, come on sooner when the operation is performed in the afternoon. This physical fact also implies greater There is considerable difference of physical fact also implies greater chances of rest in another respect, for there is less fear of subsequent disturbance from noises inside or ontside the house when the surgeon operates late. Long operations may seriously tax the surgeon's strength and nerve, and in this respect again the afternoon is better for operating than the morning. In private practice and wherever freedom from noise and olenty of warmth can be ensurplenty of warmth can be ensur-ed, the morning is probably the best, time, especially in summer. As far as light—a most important factor is concerned, the time of day makes little difference at this time of the year in London, though the danger of a sudden darkening of the atmosphere is, perhaps, greatest in the atternoon.—British Medical Journal.

THE UNITED STATES ARMY.

The president stands in the same relation to the United States army as the Crown does to our army, except that the power of the President seems greater. For command and discipline the army is, like our own, under a military chief. The regular forces of the United States are limited by Act of Congress to a peace force not exceeding 30,000 enlisted men. The terms of enlistment are simple. The recruits must be able-bodied, effective men between the ages of sixteen and thirty five, not less than 5 feet 3 inches in height, and the term of service is five years, with power to re-engage. According to the last returns available (1887) the number of officers was 2,173, and the number of enlisted men

BRITISH MILLIONAIRES.


