CARNIVAL.

Although the Carnival of this year is likely to prove a hollow mockery and delusive sham, like a pastry-puff in which the jam has been forgotten, it may not be amiss to give our English readers some account of a festival which is celebrated in nearly avery country of

account of a festival which is celebrated in nearly every country of Europe except England itself.

The festivities and pageants of carnival, only seen here of late in most degenerate style, and which this year will hardly be seen at all, find their origin long previous to the rise of Christianity, in the pagan festivals of ancient Rome, these having been most probably in turn adopted from the idolatrous observances of yet older nations. The vances of yet older nations. The Bacchanalian festivals of antiquity, to which the modern carnival is more nearly connected, were celebrated by the Romans twice a year, indicating the return of the seasons summer and winter.

The Lupercalian festivals, in honor of Pan and Ceres, observed in February, correspond still more closely with the date and nature of carnival, as did also, at an earlier period of the year, the Feast of Fools, equally a survival of pagan revels. The use of masks and torches may especially. be traced to the continuation of these ancient practices.

The primitive Roman church, already greatly amenable to political influences, finding itself too weak to suppress these popular revels, even if it wished to do so, adapted them to its own system, assigning to the various rites and mysteries meanings more conformable to its own practices and theories. In doing this it followed the same temporising policy which led it to adopt the worship of the goddess Isis and the formulæ of the Egyptian Trinity. This was probab-ly in the time of Telesphorus, bishop of Rome, in the early part of the second century,

Contemporary writers have left many striking records of the splen-dour with which carnival was celebrated in Italy, especially in Rome, Venice and Florence, during the 15th and 16th centuries, when the festival was under the protection and regulation of the Roman church, then in the zenith of its power and overflowing with wealth drawn from all tributary Christendom. The Carnival gala Christendom. The Carnival gala-doings were recognised as an im-portant element in the prosperity of the cities over which the Pope was then temporal as well as spiritual ruler, being found good for trade and attractive to large numbers of visi-tors. Whilst church, writers repre-sent the excesses of carnival as abhorsent the excesses of carnival as abhorrent to the church, it is certain that
many of the Papes were great
patrons and promoters of carnivalkeeping, at the some time ordaining,
with a characteristic spirit of compromise, special exercises of piety,
penitence and atonement for the
extravagances and immoralities to
which carnival inevitably led.

In France, carnival was also
maintained with the spirit and taste
belonging to the nation. Prohibited
in 1795 during the inception of the
Rayolu-lon, it was restored by the
first Napoleon when he was proclam-

ed First Consulin 1799, and was for a time celebrated with great taste and magnificence, even rivalling that recorded of medieval Italy. Now, however, it is there, as here, a moribund institution, the better classes having ceased to take an interest in it. interest in it.

As must be known to persons of any reading whatever, the typical carnival of Rome, Venice or Paris, was very different from the poor, tasteless, disorganised and vulgar imitation inthe River Plate. Lasting for Ha six to tan days preceding for the six to ten days preceding Ash Wednesday, everything was done according to strict rule properly arranged beforehand, and superintended by Muricipal authority. Hostile missiles were confined to flowers, confetti (weekingths) and covanidatis (lightle chalk pellets) and even these were only permitted to be used

these were only permitted to be used on certain days and within stated hours, the authorities foreseeing well enough that the the use of offen-sive and objectionable farticles sive and objectionable articles (such as the eggs, water and pomos in which the lower classes here find such fieldish delight,) would prove, as it has done here, altogether suicidal. Days and hours were appointed for the 'gala corso' or driving in procession, for the 'barbor' or races of riderless horses, for the aggents of which oversees the procession. pageants, of which our comparsus are a teeble imitation, for masked balls, and for the diversion of the 'mocolette' (little wax tapers or torches.) It was customary for every one to shriek at the top of their voices, and for maskers to address everyone in a counterfeit, falsetto voice. From this is doubtless derived the "Adios, ché mascaritu» which assails one from the mouth of every child and

ragged street urchin here. Sprink-ling with water — not in the brutal, wholesale fashion follow-ed here until recently—was permitted at a certain hour, as a sign of cleansing from sin. On Ash Wednesday flour or ashes were thrown as

a sign of penitence and humility.

How tar Camival, as celebrated here, has deteriorated from its ideal, and how little of fun grace or picturesqueness is left to it, our readers will scarcely want informing. This year, as already said, it will most probably be poorer than ever. We cannot help thinking that the world has at last outgrown this folly, and although readers. and although we by no means object to a holiday at a proper moment, we really think it is time that Carnival, as such, should be given the coup de

BUENOS AIRES.

-The action against the Province for the recovery of the interest on Cèdulas was commenced yesterday. The directors of the Hypothecary Bank sent to the Minister of Finance the documents relating to two loans (7259 and 7793 serie F.) granted by the Bank on mortgage of properties belonging to Sra. Elvira Villamayor and D. José E. Iglesias respectively, without any previous valuation; the lands were unoccupied and unculti-vated. From Vienna we learn that at the request of the Hydrographic Office of the Austrian naval authorities at Pola the Director of the Naval board of Hamburg, Privy Councillor Neumayer, compiled a collection of extracts from the journals of ships which returned to Hamburg from Cape Horn between the middle of July and the end of August last. This was done in order to obtain an exact account of the weather which reigned east and west of Cape Horn during the six weeks in which the ex-Archthe six weeks in which the ex-Archduke Johann Orth's ship Santa Marguerita may have been in those waters. The report shows that terrible storms raged at that time, which would expose a sailing vessel to the greatest danger. The director is of opinion that the Santa Marguerita was wrecked while rounding Cape Desire, 48 deg. S. lat. and 66 deg. W. long, where, seven days after the Santa Marguerita had left La Plata, a terrible storm from the east and south-east raged. He thinks it pos-sible that traces of the ship or its equipage might be found along the shores of Patagonia, and that an expedition sent to those parts might meet with certain tidings of the tate of John Orth. The report was laid before the Emperor yesterday.
