#### REFORM THE BANKS.

(The following short article from the B. A. Stand rd of Wednesday is not without application here. We do not often have the opcortanity of agreeing with the Standard, but in this case we are entirely of accord with it, and especially in the seniences we have printed in italics, which may also be applied here.)

The banks of issue have plunged the country in the present tre-mendous crisis, and it is idle to expect any improvement until the Republic retraces the erroneous path which it has followed since January

In the first place it is necessary to close up all the Free Banks created by Dr. Pacheco. In the second to take from the National Bank and the Provincial Bank the right of issue, and out them on the same footing as private banks. In the third to call in the present currency and issue 300 millions

of Treasury Greenbacks.

This will be found the only solution of the present crisis. Otherwise we shall be called on every six months to undergo a new issue of shinplasters, to save the State Banks. Nobody seems to grasp the fact that every fresh issue is merely postpon-ing the «day of reckoning,» and that the more shinplaster we create the more tremendous the «denouement.»

If John Law could arise from his grave he would give emphasis to our words, and tell the Government that paper money may create a crisis but cannot cure it. The experience of all nations is uniform on this point. We may, every six months, put off the terrible outburst by increasing the currency, but there must be in the end, perhaps two years hence, a stupendous deadlock. The present crisis is much worse than when Celman was overturned, and now it is proposed to emit, not 60 millions, but 200 millions. Will anyone tell us what the amount of the next issue is

Agricultural Colony in Colonia, The Finance Committee of the Representatives has reported on the scheme for establishing an agricultural colony in Colonia, presented to the previous legislation by Dr. Herman Imhof and Don Daniel Ugon, in representation of a syndicate of residents. The colony was to be established some seven leagues from the port of Conchillas, and the proponents asked for the opening of that port, the creation of a Justiceship of the Peace, the exemption from direct taxes for ten years, and a subvention of \$30,000 to be applied to the colonization of 6000 squares of land, and the construction of roads, a church, school of agriculture,

The Committee approves the scheme in general, but objects to the subvention of \$30,000, which it considers impossible to allow in the pre-

sent situation. It points out, how-ever, that the Departmental Board of Instruction holds funds for the establishment of schools. It recom-mends the sauction of a bill drawn up in conformity with these ideas, and declaring spublic utilitys for the expropriation of land necessary for the roads.

The Reception of General Mitre.

This distinguished Argentine being expected to arrive in this port on Monday next, the Reception Committee are forwarding their preparations for an imposing demonstration. As Bishop Soler arrives on the same day, and acoust preparations are their control of the same day. and equal preparations are being made on his behalf, with the powerful addition of official recognition and assistance, it is to be feared the two will somewhat clash, unless the de-monstrators acquire the Irish secret of being in two places at once

For the reception of General Mitre the principal launch owners in the port have placed steam tugs at the disposal of the Committee. The people, natives, Argentines and toreigners, are invited to assemble on the Capitania mole at 9 a.m., when the procession will be formed. An album will be offered the illustrious general, and is now open for signa-ture by all interested at the «Sastre-ria del Profeta,» calle 25 de Mayo, from 9 to 11 a.m. and 4 to 9 p.m.

Nothing further has been publish-Nothing further has been published recently respecting the reception of Bishop Soler, nor do we know what steps will be taken, if any, to prevent the two demonstrations getting mixed. That to General Mitre being of a political character, Government can take no notice of it beyond the necessary police regula-tions to preserve order.

#### «King Lear.»

1.040

This sublime tragedy, the most intensely pathetic in all dramatic literature, like its compeers "Hamlet», «Macbeth» and «Othello», stands alone upon a pinnacle of unapproachable greatness. Yet, although Shakespeare has lavished upon it the same unequalled wealth of genius as dramatist, poet and moralist, as upon the other pieces named, it has not held the stage like them, and of late years have been but rarely performed in England. Apart from the great difficulties of its adaptation to the exigencies of the modern stage, a reason may be found for this in the unsuitableness of its abaratars, to the present school of characters to the present school of acting. Fortunately present actors are aware of their deficiencies in this respect, and although the characters of the play offer great chances of distinction, the actors of the new school have hitherto shrunk from attempting them. One has to hark attempting them. One has to hark back to the actors of a past generation and a different school to find any impersonators of the grand old king who have made any mark whatever. The Italian school of acting, based upon broader lines and healthier traditions than the English, fortunatally still, produces actors not fortunately still produces actors not afraid of undertaking the task, and

stage date back fully fourteen years ago, when I was a raw youth, not out of my teens. It formed one of an admirable series of Shakesperian productions, given in the good old estock company» days, by the late Charles Rice, at Bradford. In those days the average of provincial act-ing, especially as regards Shakes-peare, was higher than at present, for actors studied elecution, were taught all branches of their art, and had not degenerated into the mere copyists of London artists that they are at present. The cast was a not-able one. Miss Maud Brennan, who afterwards won distinction at the Lyceum, was a sweetly pathetic Cordelia. Mr. E. S. Willard, now a principal London «star» was the Edgar. The late Walter Speakman, for many years a favourite at the Princesses under Wilson Barrett, was the *Edmund*. The other leading parts were all filled by artists of experience, several of whom have since made their mark in London, and some of whom, alas, have joined the great majority. The King Lear was the late Charles Dillon, once a Shakes-perian actor of the highest distinction. Although then an old man, much broken by an irregular life, he still maintained the fire of genius, and to this day I still preserve a vivid recollection of the intense and rugged pathos of his per-formance. In such parts as this I have never seen an actor to surpass him, at least, on the English stage. But he belonged to an expiring school, and when he last appeared in London, some eight years ago, the people would hardly listen to him. I was playing one of the lords in waiting, a part so insignificant that I even forget its name. I well remember how, in the fourth act, when Lear recognises his daughter Cordelia, I was so absorbed by the intensity of his acting, that I quite forgot the cue to leave the stage, and was only recalled by hearing some one shout to me from the wings «Come off, you-something - idiot.» I could hardly find my way off for the tears that were in my eyes. Certainly in the whole range of dramatic literature, I know no situation so moving as this, and even now a bare perusal of the lines suffices to bring a dimness to the eyes and a choking in the throat.

A few years later I saw Creswick play the part at the Surrey, but age had already diminished his powers. Edwin Booth played it for a few nights at the Princesses, but I was not fortunate enough to see him. I know of no recent English actor of eminence who has attempted the

eminence who has attempted the part, though it has often been said Henry Irving is studying it.

#### Murders by a Soldier.

A horrible affair, illustrative of the A horrible affair, illustrative of the animosity still existing between the soldiers and the police, and reminding one of the bloodthirsty scenes of «Juan Moreira,» took place yesterday morning, about 1 a.m. Two soldiers of the 1st Infantry, named Sebastian Altos and Sandalio Ortizara deinking in a diagonatable Sebastian Altos and Sandalio Ortiz
Were drinking in a disreputable
almacen at the corner of calle Patagones and Buenos Aires. They
quarelled and commenced to fight, so
the proprietor of the almacen called
for the police. Juan Saenz, official
inspector of the 1st section, cane up,
and ordered the combatants under
arrest. They refused to recognise arrest. They refused to recognise his authority, and a third soldiez, named Agustin Peñarosa attacked Saenz, inflicting a fearful stab in his chest with a large dagger. Saenz drew a revolver and fired, but missed him, and then fell helpless to the ground. A young policeman named Esteban Lando then arrived and tried to arrest the assassin, but was attacked by all three and received a fearful wound in the head. The soldiers then turned on the proprietor and his assistant, but these managed to escape and gave the alarm. Despite his wound Lando continued to struggle with Peñarosa, wounding hin with his cutlass, and himself receiving further wounds. Peñarosa was only prevented from killing him by passer-by who drew a revolver. By this time, further assistance had arrived, including an officer from the barracks with a squad of men. These succeeded in disarming and arresting the combatants. Saenz was taken at once to the Hospital, were he died two hours after. He had only been in the force a few months, and leaves a widow and three small children. The policeman Lando, who behaved yery bravely, is also severely wounded and hardly expected to recover. The assassin Penarosa is not much hurt. He is a man of notorious violent character and only three months ago finished serving a sentence for murder. How he came into the army requires to be explained. The other two soldiers are under arrest, but their share in the affray was comparatively small.

The book opens, as is natural, with a statement of how the rumour first got about that on a desolate volcanic rock in the Southern Atlantic, 800 miles south of Bahia, there were deposited large sums of gold and silver, as well as cathedral plate, gold candle-sticks, and jewels; and how this information came to be gathered, it is best to let Mr. Knight narrate in his own words, premising that the man of whom he is speaking was a sailor serving under a Captain P—and who had the reputation of having been a pirate in the early days of the sacking of Lima.

THE PIRATE'S STORY.

«When he found that he was dying, heasked Captain P—, who frequently visited him at the hospital, to go to his chest and take out from it a parcel. The parcel contained a piece of old tarpaulin with a plan of the island of Trinidad onit. The mangave him this plan, and told him that at the place indicated on it—that is, under the mountain known as the Sugarloaf -there was an immense treasure —there was an immense treasure buried, consisting principally of gold and silver plate and ornaments, the plunder of Peruvian churches which certain pirates had concealed there in the year 1821. Much of this plate, he said, came from the cathedral of Lima; and he further stated that he was the only arranger of the pirates as all the survivor of the pirates, as all the others had been executed in Cuba some year before. He then gave Captain P—instructions as to the exact position of the treasure in the bay under the Sugarloaf, and enjoin-ed him to go there and search for it, as it was almost certain that it had not been removed. The sailor died shortly afterwards.»

VERIFICATION AND SEARCH.

This statement, by reference to Cuban archives, proved true, as it was found that the other men had been executed at Havannad at the time mentioned; and erelong various expeditions in search of the treasure were undertaken. Previous to that of the Alerte, four had been made; and, simply remarking that they had all been unsuccessful, we may Used largely upon the proceed to notice the manner in which that of Mr. Knight, which set out in August of 1889, was inaugurated. Having let it be known that he was planning a treasure hunt and had procured a vessel in which to undertake it, it, he soon received about 160 applications from various gentlemen anxious to take part in the excitement, and to pay £100, of each man's share. «All manner as men made appointments to meet me, he says, «the sanguine young spirits eager for adventure, the cautious and picious who would not risk their £100 unless they were guaranteed a return of £50,000 or so. There were also those who wasted my time out of mere curiosity.»

ON THE WAY

A careful selection having been made, and the vessel being well found in everything necessary as well as some weapons of attack and defence, a start was duly made, and the voyage to the Island of Trinidad was accomplished without any incident of note, except that a stay was made at the Salvages to hunt for another treasure over which with true piratical proptiety—had been buried the body of a murdered man. This search, however, formed out a fitting prelude to that which was to follow, and nothing was found. Down the Trades the little ship ran pleasantly-she was only a thirtythree tonner-and so they arrived at Santa Cruz; and, again continu-ing their voyage through the region known as the Doldrums, they reached the beautiful city of Bahia, Here water, fresh fruit, and vegetables were taken in, and more delay was caused than necessary by the state of the wind; but finally the last start was made for what the author describes as «an accursed island,» and on November 20th, it appeared right ahead, a faint blue peak on the horizon, and was reached eight hours afterwards.

«THE ACCURSED ISLAND.»

«As we neared it, the features of this extraordinary place could gra-dually be distinguished. The north side, that which faced us, is the most barren and desolate portion of the island, and appears to be utterly inaccessible. Here the mountains rise sheer from the boiling surffantastically shaped of volcanic rock;

cloven by frightful ravines; lowering in perpendicular precipices; in places overhanging threatningly; and where the mountains have been snakwhere the mountains have been shall en to pieces by the fires and earth-quakes of volcanic action, huge land-slips slope steeply into the yawning ravines—landslips of black and red

ravines—landships of black and red volcanic débris, and loose rocks large as houses ready on the slightest disturbance to roll down, crashing into the abysses below.»

On this desolate spot, where the heat was intense, and on which the only inhabitants seemed to be turtle and land crabs, who pulled their hair and nipped their necks whenever the adventurers attempted to doze, and who devoured their dead brethren, making «a crackling noise all around them as they pulled the joints asunder and opened the shells,» the voand opened the shells," the voyagers were doomed to stay for many weeks. After exploring the shores and the ravines, and without ever being able to get ashore without running imminent risk of being drowned in the surf, a spot was fixed on which was supposed to be that where the treausure might be found—viz, under Sugarloaf—only to the ordinary difficulty of digging for it had now to be added the task of removing a portion of thousands and thousands of tons of rock which had been rolled down by a landship in been rolled down by a landslip in recent years. However, they were stout hearts in the Alerte, and, with plenty of muscle and sinews to back them up; and as the discontented ones had been allowed to return home. had been allowed to return home from the places at which they stop-ped the work well on well. Mean-while, it was remarked by all that while, it was remarked by all that the island was a frequent place of visit from the outer world. Indepen-dently of it having been once a Por-tuguese penal settlement—the walls built by them being still standing— some copies of London newspapers were found, dated October, 1875, and containing an account of the trial of Wainw.ight, the murderer; and also some Blue Dragon china—a strange find in such a place—while a bottle found on the island contained the information that H. M. S. Ruby had recently called at it, and H, M. S. Bramble did so while they were there.

DIGGING FOR THE TREASURE. The party was divided into, naturally, two portions, one with Mr. Knight remaining on the ship, while the other proceeded, after landing tents, stores, etc., to at once dig for the pirate's horde in the spot selected. The manner in which this was done can best be told in the chief's own words:—«The men had constructed several little paths leading from the trench, down the ravine, to the edges of the chasms and precipitous steps which are frequent in this gully, and the earth and The party was divided into, natuin this gully, and the earth and stones that were dug out of the trench were carried down these paths in the wheelbarrows and tilted over the precipices. As we gradually filled up these chasms the roads had to be extended further down the ravine, and at last we had formed a great dyke which stretched right across it. I was satisfied that all the operations had been conducted with judgment, and, if the treasure was in the ravine at all, there was but little doubt that we should

Find it, however, they never did, and at last the fiat went forth—for the bad weather was now at hand—that the search was to be abandoned, that the treasure, it treasure there was, was so buried under the landslip that mortal men could never reach it, and that they were to return at once to

The volume, which contains two is tull of interest, and although there is not space to quote the many other striking descripcions it contains, such as that of the ejourney to market»—a voyage of 800 miles, each way, to Bahia, to replenish the stock fruit and vegetables-or that of the dead forest, where whole woods of leafless trees lay killed by the volcanic nature of the island, enough has been said to show what treasure is here for the reader of adventures.
