## ANOTHER MESSAGE.

If Messages may be regarded as a proof of activity on the part of the Executive, we certainly have no cause for grumbling of late. And we think we may add with justice, that there is equally little cause of complaint with regard to the tone and substance of these Messages, that is to say, those that have appeared since the Message of the President at the opening of the new Chambers. The latest addition to this class of

literature is the Message which we translated in yesterday's issue, and which bears the date March 15. This document sets torth frankly, but with moderation, the reasons that the Executive offers for not being punctual in the presentation of the accounts for the past year and the Estimates for the coming year, and it cannot be denied that these reasons

The financial year of the Republic commences, not on January 1 like the civil year, but on July 1, and conti-nues until June 30 of the following civil year. According to law the acought to be presented 15 days after the opening of the sessions of the Legislative Body, that is to say, about the end of February or beginning of March, thus allowing some eight months for the preparation. As a matter of fact, and as acknowledged in the Message, this law has never been complied with. The difficulty in the present instance is stated to be the collection of the License Taxes or Patentes, which run with the civil and not with the economic year, and the delay necessary for closing the accounts of these renders backward all the other accounts.

Although not mentioned in the Message, we should think that such Message, we should think that such a difficulty as this, which occurs annually, ought to be legislated upon without delay. It is manifestly absurd as well as inconvenient that certain of the Treasury accounts, such as the taxes named, should be current with the civil year, whilst others are current with an arbitrary economic year anding June 30. It economic year ording June 30. It would certainly be better and simpler, if possible, to make all the accounts correspond with the civil year, thus also corresponding with the statistics, and with the accounts of most other countries and cooperations throughout the civilised world. In many senses it is just as inconvenient for a nation like this to have an arbitrary economic

this to have an arbitrary economic year as it would be to have an arbitrary measure of time, or an arbitrary calendar. Failing this, the periods for the taxes, and for all accounts that concern the State treasury, should be made to correspond to the economic year. With all our expensive administrative machinery here we are at the close machinery, here we are at the closs of March, and about to make our calculations for another economic year, yet the accounts for the past year, concluded Jane 30, 1890, are not complete. Nine months have not sufficed for their compilation,

It is evident that the administrative ed protocol additional to the treaty, machinery, costly as it is, is certainly which I have the honor to submit to machinery, costly as it is, is certainly inefficient in this instance.

After conveying the welcome assurance that these accounts will now be presented very shortly, the Message refers to the Budget. According to law the Budget Estimates for the forthcoming economic year should always be presented on April 1. But this law, too, has never been fulfilled. Although the Budget is supposed to come into force on July 1, it has generally been August or September before the discussion is concluded. Last year, as candidly acknowledged in the Message, it was never discussed at all, but the Chambers, yielding to the indications of the Executive, contented themselves with prolonging the Budget for the previous year, already found very insufficient. It was not until last January that a measure was introduced making certain reductions in the extravagant estimates with which the country was burdened. We have before commented with some severity on the action of Dr. Herrera's Government of last year, in thus neglecting the Budget et the very moment when they should have done the reverse. It is pleasant, therefore, to be able now to acknowledge that the Executive frankly admits the error of its pastways, and gives us every hope of an immediate reform. The Message promises us that the Estimates will be presented before the end of April, and that there will be presented before the end of April, and that there will be every probability of the Budget being discussed, reformed, passed, and ready to be put in force by the commencement of the Economic year, on July 1 next. This Message then, like its im-

This Message then, like its immediate predecessors, shows a decided change for the better in the policy of the Executive, and leaves little room for uniriendly criticism. Let but the Executive prove as good as its written word, and all will yet go well. We think there is little doubt that the excuses set forth in the Message as well as set forth in the Message as well as the promises conveyed, are perfectly satisfactory, and will help to strengthen that revival of confidence which is the certain forerunner of an improved situation.

There are matters which rest solely with the committee, and which the director of the entertainment cannot possibly attend to. Recalling the benevolent aims of this Society, we would once more urge upon all our readers the heartiest cooperation in the efforts of the Committee to accomplish an end in which amusement and charity are so happily combined.

### National Bank.

The Dia says that on April 2 the National Bank will receive, as first instalment of the Brazilian loan, the sum of a million and a half dollars.

The inquest on the body of Frances Coles, the victim of the Whitechapel murder, was continued yesterday, when evidence of considerable importance was given. Duncan Campbell, a sailor, deposed that the prisoner Sadler sold him a knite for a shilling on the morning after the shilling on the morning after the murder, and that, having his suspicions aroused, he put the knife in water, which then became salmon-coloured. A marine-store dealer to whom Campbell had in turn sold the knife stated that he sharpened the big blade and ate his supper with it. On the other hand Sadler, whose the temperature was not in the there had Satte, whose statement to the police was put in, stoutly protested that he did not sell the knife and that he never had one to sell. Dr. George Phillips and Dr. Oxley concurred in thinking that death was caused by three distinct passings of a knife across the woman's throat, and that her assailant cut her throat, with his right hand, while he

throat, with his right hand, while he held her chin with his left. It was not a sharp knife that was used, and one such as that produced would have inflicted the injuries. The inquiry was adjourned till Friday.

Giving judgment yesterday in the dispute arising out of the will of the late Sir James Tyler, Mr. Justice Stirling ruled that the Merchant Taylors' Company and the British and Foreign Bible Society had failed to establish their claims to bequests to establish their claims to bequests of 42,000l. each, while the London Missionary Society had succeeded in

its claim to 42,000%. For nearly eighty years the House of Commons has been accustomed to vote a pension of 10l. a year to a person who appears in the Estimates as the "Daughter of a Toulonese emigrant." The total amount of life insurance in Great Britain appears, from the particulars furnished in Mr. Bourne's "Handy Assurance Manual," to be nearly identical with the total of our national debt. Taking the reports of eighty-one offices, the insurances in force last year reached the enormous sum of nearly six hundred and eighty-five millions, besides which the total of life and annuity funds was returned by the same offices at upwards of two hundred and thirty-five millions. Death, fire, and ship-wreck are of course the great objects of insurance; but the principal of equalising risks by the payment of small premiums is now applied to many other things. Our steamboilers are insured against explosions. our greenhouses against hailstorms, our plate-glass windows against drunken roysterers, our live stock against epidemics, our bodies against accidents which only maim or disable, our mortgages against depre-ciation, and our men of business against loss from the dishonesty of

M. C. Reinwald, the senior member of the publishing trade in Paris, died yesterday morning suddenly at Nice.
A Paris Correspondent writes;—M.
Reinwald brought out the French
translation of Darwin's works and
was the Paris agent of the Tauchnitz house. His office was one of the nitz house. His office was one of the most interesting resorts of literary and scientific men in Paris. He was a man of remarkable character and fine quality of intellect. When he died he was looking forward to a reaction favourable to idealism in the book-buying public. He said to me last winter: «The author who has now the best chance is the idealist, provided he do not take leave of common-sense. Were writers like Bernardin de St.-Pierre and Goldsmith to come back to life they would make their own and their publisher's fortunes.» M. Reinwald did not see why scientific knowledge did not see why scientific knowledge should stand in the way of idealism. Of all mental pabulum it was in his estimation the one that best fed the fancy, when there was a fancy.

## RESEMBLANCES OF MARRIED PEOPLE.

PEOPLE.

Science is about to destroy, if it has not already done so, another of our old world ideas. The popular notion that married people gradually assimilate each other's external characteristics and thus end by resembling one another, has now been jeopardised, if not exploded, by the eminent embriologist, Hermann Fol. While staying at Mice—described as «the Mecca of honeymooning»—M. Fol's trained powers of ob--M. Fol's trained powers of ob-servation detected among crowds of young married couples characterisyoung married couples characteris-tics which led him to suppose a con-trary proposition to be nearer the truth, namely that they begin by resembling each other. The instinct of the scientist of course prompted him to put the matter to the orthodox statistical test. From observation of statistical test. From observation of the photographs of young and old married couples M. Fol has con-cluded that among young married couples the percentage of resemb-lances is a bout 66.66, and of non-resemblances 33.33 per cent, while the proportions among old married couples are about 71.70 per cent. of resemblances and about 28.30 non-resemblances. As heightening the effects of these figures he calcuthe effects of these figures he calculates that in marriages made by chance the number of resemblances would not amount to more than two in a hundred. These figures form the basis of the two following tentative con-clusions, which, however, M. Fol admits require further verification:-That in the immense majority of marriages of einclinations the contracting parties are attracted by similarities and not by dissimilarities and that the resemblances between aged married couples is not a fact acquired by conjugal life.—Liverpool
