### PASSING NOTES.

When, towards the close of last year, the Law increasing the number of Deputies to 69 was passed, and again, in January last, when the Economies Bill was sanctioned, it was understood that one of the first matters to be considered by the new Chambers was to be a reduction in the salaries received by the said deputies, so that administrative expenses should not receive a fresh burden at a moment when retrenchment was so much needed. According to the Constitution the said Deputies have the unusual faculty of fixing their own salaries, and it is in no one else's power even to propose a reduction. The Law in question, which was at once recognised as signifying a serious increase in the estimates, was severely commented on at the time, the patronage of it by the Executive caused considerable unfavourable criticism, it met with much resistance in the Chambers, its passing created an unfavourable impression abroad, and it was only the understanding above referred to that made it any way acceptable. However, the new Chambers have been opened, and have settled down steadily to the work of the session, but so far we have heard not the least hint of the very necessary reduction. The days pass into weeks, and the weeks into months, and the State continues charged with this heavy increase. The time is one of economies, and we really think that both the new Ministers and the Chambers intend earnestly attacking the subject, they have already given very acceptable indications of their intentions in this respect. We think, therefore, by no means amiss to jog their memories with regard to this affair.

#### MONTEVIDEO

**Railway.**  
The legal representative of the Northern Railway of Uruguay having notified to the Government that the line to San Eugenio (on the Brazilian frontier) is ready for opening to public service, a decree has been issued authorising the transport by that line of goods for Brazil, subject to the prevailing regulations, and at the same time suppressing the transport of these goods by cart from Isla Cabello to San Eugenio. The Direction General of Customs is ordered to take the necessary steps for the establishment of a Custom House at San Eugenio.

In conformity with a petition made by the Midland Railway Company a decree has been issued facilitating the transport of goods intended for Concordia (Argentine Republic) from Paysandu to Salto, by that line, at such time as the river is impassible to steamers. The Custom

House officers are charged with the placing of seals on the wagons conveying such goods, and the Railway Company is made responsible for any violation of the seals.

The engineers appointed by the Direction of Public Works to inspect the extension of the Central Uruguay Railway from the station General Netto to San Fructuoso have started for their destination. As soon as their report is issued the line will be opened to public service.

**The Installation of Bishop Soler.**  
The official reception and installation of the recently appointed and consecrated Bishop Soler, impeded on Tuesday by the violent rain, took place yesterday at midday with unusual pomp and circumstance. Military honors were paid by all the resident garrison troops, in gala uniform, with their bands, who were drawn up in line from the Government House in Plaza Independencia, along calle Sarandi, to the Cathedral. The latter building was sumptuously decorated for the occasion, and the crowded congregation included the President of the Republic, his Ministers, most of the resident foreign Ministers and Consuls, members of the Chambers, and the legislative body, representatives of religious societies, and a crowd of ladies and private persons. About half past twelve the Bishop left his house in calle Sarandi and proceeded to the Cathedral on foot, accompanied by the clergy, seminarists and members of the Catholic Club. An impressive service, including a Te Deum, was held, and the Bishop and the rest of the concourers then passed to the Government House where he took the following oath in the presence of the President and other magnates:—

«I swear and promise by the Holy Gospels obedience and fidelity to the Government of the Republic, and likewise promise not to aid any proposition, person or advice which may be harmful to the tranquility or independence of the Republic.» The streets and balconies on the route of the procession were crowded with spectators, including a very large proportion of ladies. Both before and after the ceremony the Bishops house was besieged with visitors, requiring a detachment of policemen to guard the door.

### SUNDRIES.

—The «Eolo» with General Mitre, the Argentine Committee and a crowd of admirers on board, left for Buenos Aires about eight o'clock on Tuesday night. In the course of the afternoon the G. O. M. was inveigled into making a speech from the balcony of the Oriental Hotel. It was enthusiastically applauded by a large crowd in calle Solis, four-fifths of which could not have heard a word he said.

—It is quite certain there will be no «Cinderella» dance this month, and in all probability there will be none until towards the end of May. The idea of a Fancy Dress Ball is in abeyance for the present, but if it can be carried out without too great a tax upon the purses of our bachelors, we hope it will not be abandoned. What runs away with the money in these affairs is generally the supper and the champagne, but as the object of the gathering is dancing and not gormandising, we think these, as well as the decorations, might be reduced to a minimum, under present circumstances. Given a comfortable hall, a good floor and an efficient orchestra, and all the rest are dispensable luxuries, only leading to an expense which is not welcome at present. We understand that a general meeting to elect a committee will be held before long.

—The new Chamber of Senators has as yet held but few sittings, because, in fact, there is no master of importance to be considered by it until certain affairs have been passed by the other Chamber, or reported upon by Committee.

—Once more we remind lovers of the Shakespearean drama of the performance of «King Lear» at the Solis Theatre this evening. With Sr. Emmanuel in the central part, assisted by the very capable company he has brought with him, the performance of this rarely seen but magnificent tragedy, is sure to be interesting.

—Government has approved the appointment of Lieutenant Colonel Antonio Marquez as Chief of the Archives, Accounts and Statistics of the General Staff of the Army.

—It is said that Sr. Ciachio has succeeded in engaging in Spain, for the season in the River Plate, a really first class Zarzuela Company, including the sisters Pastor.

—Mr. G. P. Lengoust, founder and proprietor of our French contemporary, *Le Courrier Français*, has returned to his original post as director of that journal, Mr. A. Cazaux, who has had charge of it for over a year, having retired.

—According to a custom which would be more honoured in the breach than the observance, the new Chambers are being assailed with a host of petitions for pensions, some on the most ridiculous pretences. We are very glad to notice, however, that the reporting Committee generally advises the rejection of these, unless there are really good grounds for their acceptance. This is a necessary step in the right direction, for the present pension list is already excessive, and there are few countries where pensions have been more abused than in this.

—«Juan Cuello» will be given for the third time at the Politeama this evening.

—«Where's the proprietor?» asked a man as he entered a well-known restaurant. «He's gone home to dinner, sir» replied a waiter. The man now dines elsewhere.

—Our camp correspondents seem to have quite forgotten our existence. We are sure they could send us some interesting items, if they would only take the trouble.

—The postal service between Buenos Aires and this city has been unusually irregular of late, and we are constantly receiving complaints of the non-delivery of letters and papers. We would like to know on which side the fault lies.

—The promised decree completing the list of departmental Jefes Políticos is a long time in making its appearance.

—Pascual Solari, the foreman of the recently exploded powder factory at the Buco, has been set at liberty, no proof of guilt being found against him. This explosion remains a mystery and probably will so continue.

—The total cost of the very pleasant garden arranged in the Plaza Zabala was \$14,653. This garden should be a welcome resource to the neighbourhood, it is still deficient in lighting on the borders, and is greatly in want of gates opposite the principal street openings. The present gates seem to have been purposely placed in the stupidest positions so as to prevent any direct passage across the garden.

—Our religious contemporary *El Bien*, which arrogates to itself the care of the morals of the community is highly indignant because the company at the Solis Theatre includes in its programme some pieces of the French school of which the worst that can be said is that they are rather improper, but it is discreetly silent about the «criollo» dramas represented at another theatre, the tendency of which is ten times more actively immoral than any piece of the school alluded to. In other words, it strains at a gnat and swallows a camel.

—Our contemporaries, in speaking of the departure of General Mitre, give considerable space to the speeches made by certain local notabilities on the occasion, but not one of them transcribes a line of the only really important speech of the lot, that made by the General himself.

—Once more loud complaints are being heard about the scandalous manner in which the policemen are being fed, under contract, and which has given rise to indignant protests on the part of the men. It strikes us that a policeman's lot here is «not a happy one.» Whilst this kind of thing continues it is not surprising that there are complaints about the deficiency of the service.

#### BUENOS AIRES.

—The election on Sunday of the «electors» who are to choose two Senators for Buenos Aires was conducted in perfect order, without need of the services of the armed policemen who watched the proceedings at the various polling places. There was no opposition to the list of electors who will choose Drs. Alem and del Valle as Senators; the total number of votes recorded for them was 9975.

—General Frias, a venerable soldier of the Independence, died on Monday afternoon. His funeral took place on Tuesday with military honours, at the expense of the State. His last days were saddened by the thought that he had been unable to make a provision for his only daughter, but, doubtless, his pension will be continued to her. The General was 91 years of age.

—The Manager of the Custom House paid a visit to the old warehouse of specimens and baggage in the patio of the new Custom House, and, having had several cases of merchandise opened, he discovered that the contents of many of them had disappeared. Out of one case 200 boxes of gloves had been stolen! Then he had the iron safe opened in which packages of jewellery are deposited and it was found that thieves had been busy among them. The Alcalde has been ordered to

ascertain the names of the officials who have had charge of this warehouse.

—Messrs. John T. Stant and Co. have submitted to the Provincial Government a proposal for supplying the city of La Plata with water from the river Santiago, filtered by the Porter Clark process. The supply would be constant, and 200 litres daily to each of 100,000 inhabitants. The Company would purchase the present works. The charge for the service would be the same as at present. A concession for 20 years is asked for.

—The British Minister has called the attention of the Argentine Government to the sad condition of the Irish colonists at Naposta, through the failure of their harvest which, they allege, has been caused by the culpable administration of the persons in charge of the colony and he asks the Government to institute an enquiry so that the persons in fault may be compelled to assist the colonists.

#### THE HUMOUR OF THE ELEMNTARY SCHOOL.

In «Our Boys and Girls at School» Mr. Henry J. Barker has published another budget of the absurdities committed by boys and girls who are crammed with undigested knowledge at our elementary schools.

The mistress of a poor village school in Sussex was the recipient of a most remarkable piece of juvenile information. The lady had been giving the younger girls a lesson on the tenses of verbs, and, at the close of her discourse, she requested the children to write down in their exercise books a few examples of the manner in which the tenses may be changed. The mistress then walked round the desks and overlooked her pupils while they were studiously engaged with their exercises. Presently she drew near to a rustic little nymph who was intimating by her raised hand and jubilant countenance that she had completed her example of one of these tense changes. When the mistress arrived at the child's desk and looked down at what was written, her own hands immediately became elevated with astonishment as she read:—«The verb *To be*. Past tense—*I was* a baby. Future tense—*I shall have* a baby.»

The following extract from an essay on «The Moon» affords—in defiance of its title—some most interesting glimpses of sublimity home-life:—«To look at the white moon shining through your window at night, sitting on the edge of the bed, and listening to your father and mother's knives and forks rattling on their plates while they are getting their nice supper, is the prittiest site you ever seed. When it's liver and hunyens there a waving you can smell it all the way upstairs. It looks very brite and nearly all white. Once when they was a having Fried fish and potatoes I crept out of my bedroom to the top of the stairs all in the dark, just so as to have a better lissen and a nearer smell. I forget weather there was a moon that night. I dont think as there was, 'cose I got to the top of the states afore I new I was there, and I tumbled right down to the botom of the stairs, a bursting open the door at the bottom, and rolling into the room nearly as far as the supper table. My father thote of giving me the stick for it, but he let my mother give me a bit of fish on some bread, and told me to skittle off to bed again. I am sure there was not no moon, else I should have seed there wasnt a top stare when I put my foot out slow. I only skattered my left eye and ear a bit with that last bump at the bottom, witch was a hard one. Stares are steeper than girls think, speshilly where the corner is.»

In the course of an examination in grammar, a Surrey inspector was the privileged recipient of some most edifying (or startling) information. The parents of the children were mostly agricultural labourers. The examiner was dealing with grammatical «diminutives» and particularly with the force of the suffix *kin*—e.g., mannikin, a little man, &c. On his asking the lads to give him a few examples of such «diminutives», a number of eager hands was soon raised. The gentleman, much gratified at such a ready response to his question, pointed to one of the lads for an answer. «Lambkin, a little lamb» was the reply. «Very good indeed» said the inspector, and he pointed another lad «Tomkin, a little Tom» was the answer. The gentleman somewhat demurred at this, but finally accepted it. He then pointed to a further lad. «Buskin, a little bus!» was the response. The inspector's countenance fell. «Now, my lads,» he pleaded, «do take time to think before you speak. The last answer was altogether wrong.» And he pointed to a little yokel behind who, in his desperate eagerness to catch the inspector's eye, had ventured to half mount upon the form. «Well, you, my lad?» said the inspector, pointing at last to this young hopeful. «Pumkin, sir, a little pump!»

#### ORDEAL BY TOUCH.

A correspondent sends the following story to the *St. James's Gazette*.—Some years ago in one of the cavalry barracks, a man complained that several articles of his kit had been stolen. The corporal of the room, finding that the thief could not be discovered, got a large tin mess-dish, and turned it upside down on the floor with the barrack-room cat underneath it. Then he ordered the gas to be turned down, and requested each man to touch the dish in turn, saying that the cat would mew when the thief touched it. STANLEY'S GREATEST ACHIEVEMENT.

Livingstone did more, perhaps, than any other single man to fill up the blank which he found on the map of Africa at the beginning of his thirty years' wanderings; but he died and left unsolved the mystery of that mile-wide river that swept away northward past Nyangwe. The next white man that found himself standing on the banks of that mysterious river at Nyangwe, and wondering where it went to after it disappeared among the primeval forests, was Commander Cameron. Not long after Cameron, in October 1876, Henry Stanley and his mongrel band of dusky and faithful followers found themselves face to face with the great problem at this same Nyangwe. Stanley was not the man to turn aside from such a magnificent problem, the one great mystery that now remained for solution in the Dark Continent. Readers of his book will remember the dramatic scene in the hut with his white companion, poor Frank Pocock. Six times they tossed a rupee, heads for the north and tails for the south; and six times it turned up tails for the south; with short and long straws they were equally unfortunate. «It is of no use, Frank, we will face our destiny in spite of the coin and straws. With your help, my dear fellow, I will follow the river.» We all know the result. In eight months after leaving Nyangwe, Stanley had been able to trace down to the Atlantic the course of the Congo, one of the greatest rivers of the world, to place upon the map of Africa its most striking feature; a river which is certainly destined to play a great part in the development of whatever resources Central Africa is able to produce.—Scribner's Magazine.

A NEW VERB.

Yet another new verb has been added to the American language. Amongst the «personals» in a recent issue of the Bismarck (U.S.S.) Tribune it was recorded that «G. M. Hogue, of Steele, Sunday in the capital city.» And, of course, if the verb «to Sunday» gets into use it will be followed by «to Monday,» «to Tuesday,» and so on. Perhaps even, by-and-by, American journals will report that Mr. Rutus K. Brown last weeked in Boston, or that Mr. and Mrs. Phineas T. Jones «Augusted» at Saratoga.
