TWELVE MONTHS OF CRISIS.
A year ago to-day the National Bank of Uruguay suspended the conversion of its notes, thereby bringing upon us in all its force the crisis the premonitory symptoms of which had already been felt, and which had been prepared by the excessive speculation and financial immorality of the two or three preceding years.

Twelve months have elapsed since that sinister event, twelve sad months of general depression, hardship and trial, and the crisis still continues. How much longer it will last, how much longer we must wait to see the business of the Republic return to its normal activity and prosperity, we confess ourselves entirely unable to foresee.

That the situation is not so desperate as it was, we cheerfully admit, but we are hardly prepared to say that matters have yet taken that decisive upward turn which signifies the conquest of the crisis. At great sacrifices Government has enabled the Bank to return to conversion since the 1st instant, but as we said recently, that is only one factor out of many necessary, and perhaps not the most important. Apart from that there is certainly a more hopeful feeling about, money is not quite so scarce and there is perhaps a little less absolute want of confidence. But retail trade, which is a great touchstone of the situation, is almost as dull as ever and enterprise remains at a standstill. The terrible Argentine muddle continues to tell against us, and although our situation is simplicity itself compared to theirs, we are bound to suffer for the sins and discredit of our big neighbours.

Although the crisis took a short enough time in developing, we think it best not to expect any sudden or violent cure. When it does come, the improvement will probably be quiet and slow, and perhaps for that very reason, all the surer. In fact, we would prefer it so. We have had enough of "booms" and inflation, and our experience of them has been anything but agreeable. We would now prefer something more solid and lasting, even if less glittering and showy.

Twelve months of crisis have passed, and let us hope we may never see their like again, but that the improvement and hopeful feeling to which we have referred, slight as they may be, are the forerunners of the return to prosperity which must come sooner or later.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Senators, on Friday, Sr. Magariños was named to join the Committee of Legislation for the consideration of Sr. Carve's

Bill for the reform of the Civil Marriage Law.

After some discussion, the Bill for liquidating a claim made by the widow of Col. Fernandez Echenique for arrears of pay due to her husband, was approved in general and in detail, as also a Bill granting a pension of \$30 a month to the widow and children of Juan Maria Saenz, ex-inspector of police of the capital. The second discussion of both Bills was suppressed.

The sitting then terminated.

The W. E. E. Entertainment.

After an interval of two months, the second entertainment of the Winter Evening Entertainment Society was given at the San Felipe Theatre on Friday evening, before an audience which, if not so crowded as we would have liked to have seen, at all events included many representative English and American families, a number of officers and men from the warships in port, and many native friends. The first part consisted of an exhibition of Animated Wax Figures by Professor Cera (Mr. G. Lloyd Davies) and his comical assistant (Mr. Macadam). This exhibition was divided into three groups of figures representing well-known subjects, the figures being represented by various lady and gentlemen amateurs. The figures, appropriately dressed and painted, were remarkably well got up, and looked exceedingly life—we mean war-like, and when wound up went through the various motions in a jerky mechanical manner that proved very amusing. Amongst the most successful we may mention the Bachelor and future Bride, the Ruffian disarmed by a smile (the ruffian very appropriately represented by Juan Moreira) and the Man Monkey, the latter bearing a strong resemblance to some of the "smashers" who haunt calle Sarandí. The concluding group representing Britannia and Uruguay triumphing over Father Time was also very good. Each group was introduced by the showman with an appropriate address, in which were introduced several amusing local hits. The figures were so well made up as to baffle any attempt at identification and were represented by Mrs. W. Jones, Mrs. Reid, Miss Fisher, Miss Jones, Miss A. L. Jones, Miss Lawrie, Miss Scott, and Messrs. Fox, Francis, C. Jones, W. Jones, T. D. Lawrie, E. Lawrie and Reid. Great credit is due to all of these for the pains they must have been at in rehearsing their attitudes and for their endurance in maintaining their trying positions whilst on show. This part of the entertainment was rather damped by the long, but we presume unavoidable, waits between the exhibition of the groups, when a little music would have been very acceptable.

The second part consisted of a short but amusing farce, "The Obstinate Family," which was smartly played by all concerned. Mrs. Lloyd Davies, as was expected, proved a most captivating and saucy housemaid, Lucy, although the part was hardly long enough for the display of much talent. Miss A. L. Jones was very graceful and winning as Jessie Harford, and is a decided acquisition to amateur ranks, whom we hope to see again during the season. Another acquisition was Mrs. Mahnats, who made a great hit as Mrs. Harwood. Although past her first youth, this lady has an imposing presence, at once genial and portly, and she knew how to combine tender maternal love for her daughter with appropriate sternness to her son-in-law. Her engaging curls and her "Cinderella" feet were equally admired, whilst her management of her bonnet and her mode of sitting down will doubtless set the fashion for some time to come. She was certainly one of the hits of the farce. Much comment was aroused by the remarkable likeness of this lady to one of our most popular amateur actors, to whom, we believe, she is a near relation, participating in the dramatic talent of the family. Mr. W. Jones proved a comical butler, Mr. Davies an admirable bridegroom and Mr. J. Reid a genial father-in-law. Altogether the farce was very well played.

The two parts were opened by pianoforte solos by Miss Hawkins, but, owing to the position of the instrument or some other cause, it seemed to us that this lady did not do justice to her well-known abilities as a pianist. During the intervals of the first part Mr. G. Still played on the violin Beriot's "Scènes de Ballet," his rendering of which is sufficiently well known to require no criticism, and Mr. Denstone gave a rather amusing recitation "Ferdinando and Elvira."

The credit of the entertainment is due to the efforts of Mr. and Mrs. G. Lloyd Davies, who worked hard against great difficulties to make every arrangement complete, and it must be acknowledged, with great success. The thanks of the W. E. E. Society are also due to Mr. Adams of the Botica Inglesa for his gratuitous pains in the sale of tickets.

SUNDRIES.

—Senator Carve is in a great hurry to push his Bill for the reform of civil marriage, which is decidedly not wanted here, and which we trust the Chambers will show their good sense by rejecting. Apropos of this we quote the following, with hearty approval, from the B. A. Herald:—

"The Standard, quoting the figures that have been published respecting the number of marriages celebrated during the first five months of this year, viz. 2109, necessarily celebrated at the Civil Registries, but of which only 1248 were afterwards celebrated in churches, says: 'These figures show that the Civil Marriage Law is undermining the moral tone of the people, as we predicted it would, when it was enacted.' Here is a pretty specimen of bigotry! People are immoral because knowing that they are legally married, they think it unnecessary to go through the form of a religious ceremony. Would the Standard contend that every cohabitation sanctioned by a marriage celebrated in a church is moral? Because Miss May's marriage to Mr. December is celebrated by an Archbishop is the union necessarily a moral one? Are not young girls absolutely sold to worn-out rouses and hoary old sensualists for title, social position or wealth? Are such unions made moral by the benediction of a priest? Is there no morality except among Christians? Are all Christian marriages moral? Was not marriage instituted before Churches? Was the City of Buenos Aires a moral city prior to the passing of the Civil Marriage law? Is there a more immoral City in free-thinking Europe or America than in this well-church and well-priested City of Buenos Aires?"

—A telegram from London informs us that the House of Lords has approved Balfour's Irish Land Purchase Bill, already passed by the Commons. The Emperor and Empress of Germany have arrived in Amsterdam on a visit to the Queen Regent Emma. They were due at Windsor yesterday afternoon on a visit to Queen Victoria.

—Owing to insufficient attendance the meeting of "Cinderella" subscribers was not held on Friday afternoon, but stands transferred to to-morrow (Monday) afternoon, at 5.30 p.m. at Calle Sarandí 126, when it is hoped that all who can will attend in order that a representative Committee may be elected.

—The programme at the Politeama this evening consists of the first two acts of the "Beggar Student" and "Niña Pancha," the latter amusing piece being given in Spanish. The visit of the Lomba Comany will be prolonged for another week.

—Yesterday's *Siglo* has an article on the dignification of the military career. The only way to dignify the military career here is to reform the present brutalities of the military Code and teach the officers to treat their men like human beings.

—It is still reported that negotiations for the extension of the Brazilian loan are proceeding very favourably, though the affair does not seem to have been settled so quickly as was at first expected. Official circles are silent regarding details.

—Many of our readers will regret to hear of the death of Mr. Henry Cadmas, for so many years connected with the wool market in Buenos Aires, and also well known in business circles in this city. His death occurred in London on the 30th June. About two years ago he left the Plate to enjoy a well-earned fortune and rest at home, but he had still valuable properties here, and many expected to see him back again this year.

—The next Presidential "tea" takes place to-morrow. These receptions arouse considerable interest and pave the way to the formation of many political combinations and the smoothing over of many political enmities.

—The direction of Public Works is entrusted with drawing up the statement of repairs necessary to the Government House, and they will then be subjected to public tender.

—At request of the Oriental authorities there has just been arrested in Buenos Aires a man named René Rigor, who, in company with another named Grawert or Graver, is accused of having swindled Juan C. Arrien out of \$18,000 a year ago.

—The post office authorities are occupied in burning some 3500 dead letters which have been accumulating since 1883. They are all opened first to see if there is anything of value in them.

—There will be a race meeting with an important and interesting programme, at the Montevideo Hippodrome, this afternoon. Judging from betting at the auctions, the favourites are Apolo, Coronel or Hellena, Kleber, Troya, Donna and Tangarupá.

—A small fire broke out just before daybreak yesterday in the *almacen* at the corner of Salsipuedes and Palermo. The fire brigade, who have had an easy time of late, soon extinguished it. Damages about \$1000. The place was insured in the "Mercantile" for \$4000.

—There were registered yesterday six new cases and two deaths from small pox, also two cases of diphtheria.

—We remind our readers of the important Rugby Football Match which will be played this afternoon. The M. V. team is as follows:—Back, H. S. Bowles. Three quarters, G. M. Barrett, P. H. Vignoles, C. Jeffrey, H. O. Vignoles. Half backs, Gamon, Poole, Forwards, Slater, M. Adam, A. Lawrie, A. Davis, Vanrell, A. Macadam, Hogge and Dunbar. We regret we have not been able to learn the names of the Navy team. Kick off at 3 p.m.

—A patent for nine years has been granted to Mr. W. A. Harley for a condensation freezing apparatus of his invention.

—A decree has been issued ordering the remains of General Rondeau to be deposited in the National Pantheon.

BUENOS AIRES

—The adjourned meeting of shareholders of the National Bank was held on Wednesday, when 38 shareholders, representing 17,600 shares, were present. The report of the Audit Committee was approved, excepting as regards the part relating to the great operations executed by the Bank under the pressure of the Minister of Finance, which was referred to a Committee of four directors: Sres. Salaverría, Lucio Lopez, Devoto and Pearson.

—A committee of revision named by the Minister of Finance has reduced the estimates for the expenditure of 1891 to \$59,000,000 and estimates the Revenue at \$35,000,000 gold and \$16,500,000 m/n.

—The Committee of Cédulas holders held a meeting on Friday afternoon in order to adopt energetic measures to repress the abuses that are being committed by the public powers of the Province by sanctioning absurd and unconstitutional laws relating to the Cédulas, the effect of which is to produce a great fall in the price of cedulas, to the prejudice of the holders, although the security for the same is perfectly good.

—At a meeting of tradesmen in Chivilcoy, which was attended by the manager and a director of the Bank of Rome and by Sr. Perazzo, it was resolved that a branch of the bank should be established in that town, and the persons present agreed to subscribe for 2000 shares of \$50 each.

—On Wednesday evening, Major Barritt, of the Salvation Army, delivered a lecture in the large room of the English Literary Society upon the social work which is being accomplished by the Army in various parts of the world and especially in this Republic.

We intended to give a *resumé* of the lecture, but the want of time prevents our transcribing our notes for to-day's issue.

The lecturer was listened to with close attention and attracted the sympathy of his audience by his rude eloquence, his earnestness and evident sincerity.

Several members made remarks upon various points of the lecture, all, with one exception, expressing approval of the movement and of the manner in which it is conducted in City by Major Barritt. The exception was the speech of Mr. Atherton, who upon the faith of the assertions of the highly moral and truthful editor of *Truth* denounced the Army and all its works, declaring the organisation to be unchristian and bellicose, and General Booth and his family to be self-seekers who rendered no proper account of the money received from their credulous supporters. He also blamed the Committee of the E. L. S. for allowing religious question to be discussed. This last accusation makes us think that Mr. Atherton attended the lecture prepared to make a speech for the truth is that Major Barritt carefully abstained from saying a word about religion. The Major made a triumphant reply to General Booth's accuser by stating that the Army accounts are audited by a first-class firm of London ac-

countants, and that a balance sheet has been sent annually to the *Times* ever since the Army was created.

There was large attendance including several ladies, some of whom belong to the Army.—B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES

THURSDAY, JUNE 4.

In the House of Commons yesterday the Scotch Police Burghs Bill and the Scotch Local Authorities Loans Bill passed through Committee.

Sir Reginald Hanson was yesterday returned to Parliament for the City of London without opposition, in succession to the late Sir R. Fowler.

Mr. A. J. Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland, was present at a meeting of the ladies Liberal Unionist Association in St. George's Hall yesterday, and in the course of a speech denounced the attitude of the Nonconformists of England in regard to the Irish question. He characterised that attitude as the darkest in their history, for Nonconformists had sacrificed, to the mere expediency of party, principles with which they had for generations been identified.

The Prince and Princess of Wales, with the Duke of Clarence and the Princesses Victoria and Maud, visited the Royal Military Tournament in the Agricultural Hall yesterday.

There is a strong indication that unless a favourable answer is returned to the formulated demands of the men, through their Union, a general omnibus strike will take place in London on Saturday at midnight. A crowded and demonstrative meeting of the Western District bus and tram employes was held early this morning, and resolutions pledging support to the projected movement were enthusiastically adopted.

The East-end tailors held a meeting last night at Spitalfields, and showed a strong determination to adhere firmly to their programme for obtaining better facilities for carrying on their work and getting a higher rate of wage. In the West-end with but one exception, the various sub-committees made satisfactory progress in arranging a uniform log.

After a protracted hearing at the Marlborough-street Police Court Mr. L. W. Cloett, late Consul-General for Persia, was yesterday committed for trial on the charge of having obtained 16,705*l.* by false pretences and with intent to defraud Mrs. Agnes Annie Page. Bail was allowed.

A Paris Correspondent telegraphs that the text of a letter from M. Millevoys, Deputy, to Mr. Labouchere, M.P., on the subject of an alleged undertaking by Great Britain to defend Italian interests has been published. M. Millevoys says that Prince Napoleon summoned him to San Remo at the end of January, 1890, and informed him that he had just had a conversation with King Humbert, who said that he had nothing to fear for the security of the Italian coasts, for he had received from the Cabinet of St. James a formal assurance that the British fleet would unite with his to shield Italy against any naval attack.

As expected after the previous play, Kent gained a victory over Warwickshire yesterday by nine wickets.

At the Brighton Races yesterday the Bevenden Plate went to Miss Hagioscope, the Shoreham Plate to The Mummer, the Corinthian Welter Handicap to Delaval, the Juvenile Plate to Barcombe, and the Balcombe Plate to Rokeby. The running for the Southdown Welter Handicap resulted in a dead heat, and an objection was raised that the horses were started eleven minutes before the time. Another race was therefore decided upon, Ashgrove colt winning easily.

An inquest was held yesterday on the victims of the tragedy in Kentish Town. The jury found that the cabman Elmer murdered his wife and child and committed suicide while temporarily insane.

In the *baccarat* case yesterday Sir Charles Russell made his opening speech for the defence. The court was again greatly crowded, and among those on the bench was Prince of Wales, who resumed his seat on the left hand side of the Lord Chief Justice. The only witness called during the day was Mr. Arthur Stanley Wilson, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Wilson, of Cranby Croft, who deposed in his examination-in-chief to specific acts, alleged to amount to cheating, on the part of the plaintiff, Sir William Gordon-Cumming. Mr. Wilson's cross-examination by the Solicitor-General was not concluded at the rising of the Court.

Evidence in opposition to Miss M. J. Smith's claim for 20,000*l.* on the estate of the late Mr. C. J. Park was heard in the Chancery Division yesterday, the Court then adjourning till to-day.

THE UNPOPULARITY OF THE ARMY.

The parents, particularly the mothers, of many youths dread their becoming soldiers. Some look upon

the army as the very last resource of the peninsula, the vicious and the drunken. They decline to believe the statements blazoned forth in red and blue print on the posters at railway stations and elsewhere. If a youth does so far harden his heart as to talk to the recruiting sergeant, he has to meet that functionary at some out-of-the-way place where his female relations will not be likely to see him. The sergeant himself has to keep out of their sight also. And even when the youth has enlisted he may have to remain for weeks or months at the depot near his native town, subject to the reproaches of his relatives and friends. This is greatly objected to by the majority of young soldiers. A slight increase in the soldier's pay, or rather decrease in his stoppages, would, we believe, go a great way to run up the number and raise the standard of recruits. Other remedies may be quite unnecessary if that were conceded; but until the soldier can be got to look upon dismissal from the service as the greatest punishment that can be inflicted on him for the usual military offences, there will be no real progress towards the perfection all must long to see in our army.—Army and Navy Gazette.

A HUMOROUS CANON. There was a quaint old canon in Newcastle some years ago who never minded what he said or how he said it. One very wet day he noticed some strangers in his church (people who he knew attended another on finer days) so, after the service, he toddled down the aisle and said to them audibly, "I am very glad you make a convenience of my church on a wet day." This same oddity went to visit a sick man during the absence of one of his curates and began to read part of the Church prayers to him, at which the old man expostulated, saying, "Mr.—always made his prayers up as he went along; he couldn't understand them printed prayers." The canon at this flared up and withered the old man with these words: "If you think I am going to wrestle with the devil for your sins while you lie in bed doing nothing but being umpire, you are very much mistaken. Take these prayers I give you or none at all."

STRANGE DIRECTIONS. In what part of England are «Bry-rack», «Jerpinime», «Harley Potterings» and «Pambore near Peas and Stoke, Essex»? Puzzling though these addresses may be to the average topographer, they have all been satisfactorily deciphered by our Post-office letter-sorters. When correctly spelt they read «Billericay», «Jarraw-on-Tyne», «The Hasing Potteries», and «Pamber, near Hasling-stoke, Hants.» Perhaps even more enigmatical is the superscription «Waltrats Salorshom Tebielak, For-which was finally perceived to stand for «Wells-street Sailors' Home. To be called for.» A writer in «The Strand Magazine» who has been permitted to call these and like examples from the famous scrap-books at St. Martin's-le-Grand, gives a facsimile of an envelope addressed «Her Majesty the queen, Windsor Castle», with the note «Sir, Please excuse not putting stamp; as I am so poor.» Another bears the Paris postmark, and is addressed «Mrs. Lena Deroos, Salin Sunday night last night, see o'clock, Angletree.» Guided by these indications, we are told that the authorities discovered a vessel leaving the port of London at an hour named, and there were able to place the missive in M. Deroos's hands. The practice of sending a solitary penny stamp through the post with the name, address, and message written on the gummed sides, we are told, of frequent occurrence. It is not, however, recommended as a safe one. An example addressed «Clapman, Esq., 91, James-street», conveyed the message «Meet me to-night, 1.9.86, without fail. I am hard up.—R. S. B.»

A PURITAN ORDINANCE. A Dalziel despatch from Boston says much amusement, and not a little indignation, has been occasioned there by the arrest of a prominent citizen and his wife for being guilty of violating the ordinance against kissing in the street. The couple have not long been married, and, happening to meet in the street a few days' separation, they saluted each other with a kiss. By this act they brought themselves under one of the old Puritan Blue Laws, which has never been repealed, for the promotion of becoming behaviour. There is a similar law in the Statute Book of Massachusetts against smoking in the streets, but that law is never put in force.
