TWELVE MONTHS OF CRISIS.

A year ago to-day the National Bank of Uruguay suspended the conversion of its notes, thereby bringing upon us in all its force the crisis the premonitory symptoms of which had already been felt, and which had been prepared by the excessive speculation and financial immorality of the two or three preceeding years.

Twelve months have elapsed since that sinister event, twelve sad months of general depression, hardship and trial, and the crisis still continues. How much longer it will last, how much longer we must wait to see the business of the Republic return to its normal activity and prosperity, we confess ourselves entirely unable

Owing to the want of land belonging to the state, official immigration would seem to be superfluous in the republic of Uruguay; nevertheless a new law, promulgated in June, 1890, devoted forty-five articles to the details of this question. Amongst the chief articles of the law are the following: The consular agents of the republic shall give information in their various posts both to intending immigrants and to the home government, and make out annual reports on all matters connected with the subject of emigration and im- Misiones 130, Montevilleo migration. The General Assembly of the republic shall fix annually a sum for paying third-class passages for immigrants from Europe, which passages shall be repaid by the immigrant by means of quarterly instalments, with an annual interest of six per cent., within two years and a half after his arrival. Colonization enterprises and private individuals may obtain from the Direction de Inmigracion y Agricultura the advance of passage money for persons whom they may designate, against a vale drawn up in the conditions of repayment above mentioned. The law prohibits the importation of beggars, cripples, aged men, except when they form part of a family, Asiatics, Africans, gypsies, Hungarians, and Bohemians, With these exceptions all kinds of agricultural and day laborers and artisans are demanded.
