### LET US REJOICE.

The unmitigated fervour, generally, heartiness and good will of the memorable festivities of last Monday, coming in the midst of crisis, gloom and uncertainty, seem to us to prove a great deal more than that the occasion was intrinsically an important one. They show that the people are light-hearted at bottom, that they are far more ready to rejoice than to mourn, that they will welcome, even with effusion, the smallest administrative mercies, and that the pessimism and want of confidence so frequently attributed to them are not natural to them, but are imposed upon them by the force of circumstances and their irresistible dictates of reason. They thus convey a lesson which we would like to see keenly brought home to the President, Ministers and other dignitaries who witnessed the rejoicings of Monday.

The people of Montevideo, natives and foreigners, are pacific, friendly, and extraordinarily long-suffering and patient under perennial misgovernment. They tolerate abuses which less pacific people would immediately revolt against. Even when the clouds gather blackest round them, as at present, they are still hopeful and still eager to find opportunity for rejoicing. It is a liberal and an insult to pretend that they are pessimistic by nature, or that their present want of confidence in the government arises from any but the natural effects of that government's misdeeds and incapacity. Equally false is it to pretend that the proposterous standing army which helps to devour our substance and maintain an excessive rate of taxation is necessary to keep them in order. So far from this latter being the case, it is the army itself, not the people, that has been at the bottom of nearly every revolutionary movement and rumour since the independence. The people themselves only move when the oppression of the Government and the army become too entirely intolerable, as they did on various occasions during the abominable military dictatorship of Santos, when the army performed the honorable task of repressing their just revolt. So far as the people are concerned, a just and constitutional government could be maintained without any army at all. It is only the bad governments that have anything to fear from them or that need the support of force. Under a good and popular government, the army could be disbanded to-morrow with the greatest benefit to all concerned, and especially to the finances of the country.

This is not romance, it is sober reality. Monday's festivities are a proof. The Government merely does its duty by relieving the port from iniquitous burdens which should never have been imposed. It may be said that it has only undone its own former misdeeds. Yet for this the people break forth into a tremendous demonstration of gratitude. It is the first attempt of Dr. Herrera's administration towards doing anything really beneficial, and it is at once hailed with a unanimous shout of joy. By this we may measure the popularity which the Government might attain, the gratitude which they might receive, if they would always legislate beneficially, in the interests of the Republic and the people, instead of against them and in private interests. Unpopular and mistrusted as the Government is, it has it in its power to change the whole aspect of the situation by a simple

change in that policy which has proved so fatal to all the best interests of the country. The piece of legislation which called forth the rejoicings of Monday, was in no way remarkable, it contained nothing either brilliant or difficult, in fact it might easily have been much better than it was, yet it was welcomed because it had the unusual quality of being obviously beneficial. Let the Government make such legislation the rule instead of the exception, and the people will then have an excuse for rejoicing every few months, and will soon show their readiness to accept it.

With people so ready to welcome the least benefit from government, there should be no question of pessimism, or want of confidence, of revolutionary rumours, of subversive movements. These are the artificial products, or more accurately the diseases, resulting from bad government and from nothing else whatever. As was shown on Monday, nothing is further from the people. All the people want is to be allowed to live in peace, to work untrammelled by iniquitous taxes devised for administrative sins, to take advantage of the benefits nature has showered upon this Republic but which Government has done its best to spoil. This is very little they ask, and requires neither special genius nor ability on the part of the governing powers. But it does require a modicum of common honesty and disinterestedness. In the prosperity and peace that would ensue, Government would be the first to share. The Government that cannot grant as much as this is not merely an ignominious failure, but is a self-condemned criminal worthy of condign punishment and execration.

We repeat then that the festivities of last Monday convey a deep lesson which should be taken to heart by the powers that rule us.

Rejoicing is pleasanter than mourning, optimism more cheerful than pessimism. We are all, of us, ready to rejoice, only let Government give us the chance. When will it do so?

**The Port Festivities.**  
It is so long since the people here have had any excuse for rejoicing, that they threw themselves into Monday's fête, in celebration of the reduction of the port dues, with double zest, and for half a day the crisis was almost forgotten. The whole city practically made holiday in the afternoon, and from 3 o'clock the moles and the vicinity were thronged with such crowds as they have rarely seen before. The bay, however, was the favoured spot, and though every possible description and size of craft were called into service, they proved all too few for the numbers that crowded to them. Fortunately the sun was comparatively mild and there was a pleasant breeze blowing which made the temperature deliciously fresh. The water was a trifle rough for rowing but first class for sailing. Notwithstanding the enormous crowds on the water, and a great deal of unavoidable confusion, no mishaps occurred, and we did not even hear of anyone getting a ducking. Both morning and evening the crowd behaved admirably, as is indeed generally the case here, and although the police were present in large numbers, they had little to do, and for once omitted to make themselves objectionable by unnecessary interference.

Early in the afternoon, a select Committee representing the various Chambers of Commerce and the local shipping agencies, approached the President of the Republic and the Ministers, in order to invite them to take part in the festivities. This they did, and latter on the President and Ministers, accompanied by a numerous suite of officers and dignitaries, visited the press barge "India," where they were received with due courtesy by Sr. Christophersen and committee, afterwards going on board the national gunboat "General Artigas" whence they witnessed the boat-races, etc.

In the evening the President and some intimate friends witnessed the illuminations in the bay from on board the tug "Lavalleja."

In the course of the afternoon the representatives of the press were also gallantly entertained on board the "India," and over a friendly glass of champagne Sr. Christophersen spoke a few words in eulogy of the unanimous manner in which the local papers had supported the propaganda in favour of freeing the port.

After the boat-races there was a general procession of tugs, launches and minor craft of all descriptions, both native and foreign, most of them gallily decorated with flags and bunting. Special attention was attracted by the neat appearance of eight boats from the American men of war in port, and by two boats from the French gun-boat "Sañmanned" by negroes in brilliant white uniform.

In the evening the port was again crowded with visitors to witness the illuminations. The greater number of craft in the bay were lit up with Chinese lanterns and colored lights, which, being reflected in the glaucous waters of the bay, presented a charming picture, such as has rarely been seen here. The Custom House, and offices of the Capitania, as well as many houses and places of business in the neighbourhood were similarly illuminated, affording a very pretty and unusual sight. In calles Colon and 25 de Agosto tar-barrels were lighted, there were rockets and fireworks, and a gay and judas was burnt to the immense delight of the street urchins. Rockets and bombs were let off from all quarters. The throng of visitors was again enormous, the perfect temperature tempting them to remain in the streets till a late hour. The Hotel Balmoria was specially favoured, a charming view of the bay and illuminations being obtainable from its many windows. Military and other bands played at suitable spots.

Altogether the festivities were most successful and brilliant, not a single incident occurring to mar the rejoicing and general good-humour.

**New Zealand and River Plate Land Mortgage Company.**

In their eighth annual report the directors announce that the net profit for the year ended 31st October, 1891, including £1,644 8s. 4d. brought forward from the preceding year, amounts to £13,543 7s. 6d. A careful valuation was made in October of the mortgages and properties held by the company in New Zealand, resulting in a somewhat larger appropriation being suggested than has hitherto been considered sufficient. The position of the colony continues to improve, and there is every prospect of returning prosperity. Notwithstanding the continuance of the financial crisis at the River Plate, the directors are satisfied that the business of the company in those districts is thoroughly sound, but, as a precautionary measure against all possible contingencies, it has been thought advisable to make a separate appropriation in relation to the business of the company in Eew Zealand and the River Plate districts, together with the shrinkage of Stock Exchange prices quoted on 31st October from the cost prices of the company's investments in London amount to £90,000. The directors are advised and believe that the above appropriations are more than sufficient, and they further consider that the depreciation of Argentine securities will disappear to a great extent before realisation, and they do not, therefore, think that any considerable proportion of the above-mentioned sum of £90,000 can be regarded as lost. They do not, however, recommend that any of the profits of the year ended 31st October, 1891, should be distributed at the present moment, but that a sum equal to the amount of a dividend at the rate of 5 per cent be carried to a separate reserve fund (to be termed the "detained dividend fund") and invested in Consols, £10,000, and that the balance of the profit for the year be carried forward to the accounts now current, £23,543 7s. 6d.—total, £13,543 7s. 6d.

**Financial.**

Nothing new whatever transpired yesterday about the banking question. The "Nacion" confessed that the "official confirmations"—is still wanting, thereby showing how entirely untrustworthy were its former very positive assurances that all was settled.

Although Government still maintains a silence which can only be condemned as reprehensible in the present anxious situation, faith seems to have revived somewhat in

the probabilities of the bank being established. It is said that if local capitalists will not subscribe the two million dollars which seem to be expected from them, the London syndicate will commence operations with six millions instead of the four originally proposed. But, it is added, the question of naming the President still blocks the way, as Government still insists on usurping that unnecessary and dangerous privilege. If this be so, we have no terms severe enough to condemn the attitude of Government in the matter and it is only one more proof of how little it has the genuine interest of the country at heart. However, we cannot give this as more than rumour, official circles being absolutely silent.

The Representatives met yesterday, but not to treat of the banking question. The general impression is that several days may yet elapse before a settlement is reached, and perhaps the debate may not be resumed until the opening of the ordinary sessions on February 15.

**SUNDRIES.**  
—It is telegraphed from St. Petersburg that the Grand Duke Constantine, uncle of the Czar of Russia, died on Monday, aged 64.

—The affair of the unfortunate Ciavasco still drags on. Sr. Bartolo F. Sanguinetti, who has been appointed to make out the summary, has passed an official note to Dr. Alberto Palomques informing him that "the deserter Ciavasco" (the italics are own ours) had appointed him as defender. Dr. Palomques very properly replied that he had great pleasure in undertaking the defence of "the alleged deserter Ciavasco," a merited snub which we trust the judge will appreciate.

When we thus see the very judge appointed to try the case commencing by assuming the point to be tried and on which the whole case depends, we can imagine what kind of justice the unfortunate prisoner may expect. Never was there a more barbarous travesty of all law and justice. In our eyes it would be a meritorious act of Christian charity to help the poor fellow to escape and convey him to some other country where he would be safe from the clutches of the military demons. We wish we had the opportunity of doing so.

—According to the *S. A. Journal* Baron Hirsch, has turned his attention to Paraguay as a home for his co-religionists. There are, doubtless, some parts of that lovely country where his persecuted countrymen might well spend happy and prosperous lives.

—Yesterday's mail, so anxiously awaited, proved of a very limited nature, only bringing dates to Dec. 24, so that we are still a month behind time in London news. As this is only a few days ahead of what we already had in hand, there was not much of interest in it, and nothing at all concerning the important topic of the Confiscation Scheme. The "Trent," expected to-day, should be more liberal, as she brings dates up to December 30.

—The question of the Captaincy of the Port is still unsettled and no indication has been allowed to escape from official quarters as to who is likely to be the favoured person. The latest candidate is Col. Zenon Tezanos, at present Jefe Politico of Canelones. More than one contemporary, however, has pointed out the unfitness of appointing a military man to a purely maritime post, of the duties of which he can have no knowledge. They consider, and with justice, that the appointment should fall on a naval man or else on a civilian connected with maritime interests. For the latter the name of Don Antonio Lussich has been mentioned and has been received with favour in shipping circles.

—The judicial vacation came to an end yesterday and the Tribunals and Judges' Courts have resumed their usual duties.

—Dr. José Mnaso, a physician well-known in this capital, has died suddenly in Italy; whether he recently went on a visit to his family.

—Sr. Andres Crovetto, captain in the Oriental navy, died on Monday, at the advanced age of 84. He lent important services in the war of the triple alliance, when he served under the Brazilian flag. He had long retired from public life.

—The wedding took place on Monday evening, of Don Luis Cardoso, ex-Consul General of Chile, to Miss Clara Gowland, belonging to a family well-known on both sides of the Plate for some three generations. The civil and religious ceremonies took place in the house of the Soria family, calle Treinta y Tres, the Argentine Minister, Sr. Morano, gave the bride away.

—The inscription of pupils in the public or State schools at the end of 1891 was 14,370 against 13,091 in 1890, being an increase of 1279. Of these pupils 13,256 were Orientals and 1104 foreigners. (It must be remembered that all children born here of foreign parents rank as Orientals). To educate these pupils there were 63 schools, directed by 298 teachers and assistants. These statistics do not include private schools.

—The North Eastern Railway, attending to the request of residents in the section Miguas, department of Canelones, will open a station at the Cuchilla de Cabo de Hornos, between Tapia and Montas stations. The Central Railway issues notice that the great reduction in the fares to Paysandu and Salto will be continued until February 28.—We have not heard definitely when the extension to Rivera will be opened, but it will be very soon. It is not intended to hold any expensive official ceremony.

—L. Vignolo and Co. have proposed to Government to erect a lighthouse on Lobos Island, off the coast of Maldonado, a point of danger to navigation at present undistinguished by light. The tower would be 3340 metres high, and the light would be intermittent and visible at 18 miles distant. The dues would be within the limits of the recently reformed law. At present there is no light on the coast between Cape Santa Maria and Flores Island.

—The revolutionary alarms in Buenos Aires seem to have calmed down, for the present. Neither do we hear any more of defensive movements on this side of the brook.

—We hear that the regatta of the Club Nacional will probably be postponed until the first or second Sunday in February, at it is thought injudicious to hold it so soon after the festival of Monday.

—Yesterday's *Razon* relates a strange tale of Nemea, Col. Clark, Chief of the Arsenal, had left his carriage standing outside the door of his residence, on Monday, in calle Masoneria. A passer-by of thievish propensities, thinking it a good opportunity to possess himself of a carriage, mounted the box and drove off rapidly. Nervousness, a quickened conscience, or want of practice in driving, however, brought him to grief at a wooden bridge crossing a small brook. The carriage was overturned and smashed, the horse killed and the thief of a driver had his head broke.

## LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, DECEMBER 21.

Great excitement prevails in Quebec in consequence of the dismissal of the Provincial Cabinet. Mr. Mercier declares that the recent inquiry failed to connect him or the Ministry in any way with the charges made against Mr. Pasquid. Mr. Mercier has published his reply to the letter from the Governor ordering him not to make correspondence on the subject public, in which he says that the action taken by the Governor is such as in England would provoke a revolution, and threatens that if he ever returned to his former position he will chase the Governor from office. The Lieutenant Governor's residence is watched by police.

A Cairo correspondent telegraphs that the three refugees from the Sudan appear in good health, in spite of their prolonged sojourn there and the sufferings they have been through. They escaped from Ondurman with the assistance of a native, who obtained camels for them. The journey to Korosko occupied only twenty days.

A Paris correspondent telegraphs on the authority of a prominent Orleanist, that the Comte de Paris is about to bring to an end the political organization in favour of his succession to the throne.

There were no disturbances at Eastbourne yesterday in connection with the parade of the Salvation Army. Members of that body were, however, closely followed by the police, and large crowds of spectators assembled. Acknowledging a circular from the Corporation, asking members of Parliament to suspend their judgment respecting the local Act under which proceedings have been taken, Mr. B. Coleridge, M.P., and Sir E. Mappin, M.P., have written adverse replies.

By a fire which occurred on premises occupied by a draper at Lavender-hill, Battersea, on Saturday afternoon, two young girls were burned to death and two others persons were severely injured. Ration-place, near Eastbourne, and the North Wales Church of England College at Carnarvon were yesterday destroyed by fire.

Skating commenced yesterday in the Fen Country, the ice being reported to be in splendid condition.

Saturday's football embraced various features of more than ordinary interest, although in the South the frost interfered with the Rugby Union. A fine match was seen at Newcastle, when the North beat the South by four goals and a try to two goals and a try. Oxford lost again in Dublin. Under Association Rules the Canadians were easily beaten by

England at the Oval, and the Old Westminsters beat the London Catholics for the English Cup.

On Saturday evening the coroner's inquiry into the circumstances attending the death of the child Edith Jeal at Brighton was concluded.

A verdict of wilful murder was returned against George Henry Wood, the railway porter, who has been in custody for some days.

Upon the resumption of the Hargreaves slander action on Saturday a communication was made by the Judge to the leading counsel.

An adjournment over to-day was ultimately asked for and granted, it being stated by Sir E. Clarke that possibly by that time a solution of the case might be arrived at.

The Court sat until late in the day taking the evidence of Major and Mrs. Hargreaves. In cross-examination the former admitted that Captain Barber, chief constable at Torquay, had asked him by letter whether he himself might not have taken away the missing jewels, and that he replied that the young lady who was staying with his wife lately might know something.

Mr. G. W. Hastings, who represents the East Brompton Division of Worcester in Parliament, was brought to Bow-street from Folkestone on Saturday under a warrant signed by Mr. Vaughan. He is charged with fraud as a trustee.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 22. We deeply regret to announce the death of the Duke of Devonshire, which occurred, after a lingering illness, at Holker Hall, last evening.

All the members of the family were present. The deceased nobleman, who was in his eighty-fourth year, had succeeded in the title by the Marquis of Hartington, M. P. for the Rosendale Division of Lancashire.

Mr. Bryce, M. P., was the principal speaker at a meeting held at Old Trafford last night on behalf of the candidature of Mr. S. Hall, for the Stretford Division of Lancashire. No one could be surprised, he said, that members of the present Government should occupy their time in attacking their opponents rather than dwelling on the work they themselves had done; for the measures passed had, with scarcely an exception, been advocated by the Liberal party.

Two hundred and nineteen Bills were yesterday deposited at the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons, an increase of 23 as compared with last session.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Stuart Cumberland gave a series of thought-provoking performances on the stage of the Haymarket Theatre, for the benefit of the House of Shelter in Burdett-road.

Heavy fog prevailed throughout the metropolis and the greater part of the Midlands yesterday. Reports from the parks show that, should the frost continue, excellent skating may soon be expected on the ornamental waters. Already the sport is being freely indulged in on the Lincolnshire and Cambridgeshire fens.

In accordance with ancient custom, yesterday being St. Thomas's Day, wardmotes were held in the twenty-six wards of the City for the election of members to the Court of Common Council for the ensuing year. In two wards only were polls demanded—Candlewick and Farringdon Without, and they will be taken to-day.

Eggleston and Rayner, the men who are suspected of having murdered two gamekeepers at Pitstone, were arrested yesterday at Slough. Later in the day they were sent to Aylesbury. They appear to have been previously arrested by the Oxfordshire police, but were allowed to go as their height did not tally with the first description issued.

Thursday, it being understood that no further evidence should be taken till the 1st of January. An application for bail was refused.

A smart-looking lad of fifteen, wearing the uniform of the Royal Navy, was charged at Bow-street Police-court yesterday with burglary at the Duke of Grafton's house in Carlton House-terrace. Evidence was given that prisoner was seen upon the premises; an alarm was raised, and he ran up the area steps, with his boots off, into the arms of a policeman. Property that had been stolen was found upon him. Mr. Vaughan committed the prisoner for trial.

Thirty-five men who were arrested by the police when they made a raid upon the New Germania Club, Gerrard-street, Soho, on Sunday morning, were brought up at the Marlborough-street Police-court yesterday, two being charged with keeping the place as a gaming house, and the others with frequenting it. When the premises were searched a number of cards and dice were found, and the police started that on the occasion of their visit favo was being played. Prisoners were remanded, but were admitted to bail.

THE SECRECY OF THE CONFESIONAL IN FRANCE.

The question whether a priest is bound to give evidence in court on the strength of information derived under the seal of the confessional, which was answered lately in the affirmative by the judicial authorities of a Norman town, has just been negated by the Paris Court of Cassation. The curé of a village in the Department of the Calvados, during the trial of a husband who had seriously wounded a man whom he believed to be on too friendly terms with his wife, was questioned with a view to ascertain whether the woman had really furnished the prisoner with a reasonable pretext for the assault. The abbé refused point-blank to throw any light on the matter, and when urged to do so, declared that he could not betray secrets which he had learned in his ecclesiastical capacity. He was immediately condemned to the payment of a fine of 24, and appealed against this sentence. In reversing the judgment the Court of Cassation, quoting from one of the clauses of the Penal Code, expressed the opinion that ministers of all religious denominations recognised by the State were in duty bound to maintain strict silence on the subject of all the revelations which might be made to them in the exercise of their profession.

It is said in England that the cargo ship of the future will be a five-masted vessel with auxiliary steam, and will be large enough to carry 6000 tons of cargo. The demand is certainly for big cargo carriers, but the success with auxiliary steam vessels in the past has not been so great as to make that class of vessel attractive.

The model of the new steamer building at Glasgow will, it is claimed, insure the quickest possible transit of the Atlantic Ocean attainable by steam craft. With a length of 630 feet, and 70 feet beam, very fine lines are obtained, and the twin screws are of some twenty-three feet diameter, well supported. There are four funnels, and about two hundred feet of the length of the ship is devoted to the boilers and bunkers. The engines, triple compound, with four cylinders working four cranks, are figured at 38000 horse power. Accommodation is provided for some 700 first and 300 second class passengers and about 400 immigrants, and all the arrangements worked out in the plans for carrying out this important feature are far ahead, it is claimed, of anything yet produced in nautical construction. The plating of the ship is carried up to the promenade deck, which runs from end to end, and about twenty feet on each side is left for walking.—New York M. Register.





THE FALSETTO VOICE. Mr. E. Davidson Palmer, Mus. Bac Oxon., calls the attention of scientific men to an apparently unknown fact in connection with voice production. This fact has to do with the so-called 'falssetto' voice. The general opinion about this kind of voice is that it is something altogether unnatural, and that it ought never to be used. According to modern scientific theories, however, it is one of two or more registers, and is supposed to be intended by nature to be used only at the upper extremity of the vocal compass. But it is quite possible to produce this kind of voice at a much lower pitch (at least an octave lower) than that at which singers are ever taught to use it. Produced in this way, it may be so weak and feeble as to be practically useless. Still it is possible to produce it, as men and singers well know. What they do not know, and what scientific men appear to be totally unaware of is that it may be developed at this low pitch, and not only developed but completely transformed. When thus transformed, it loses entirely its unnatural and effeminate character, and becomes a strong, manly voice, which is easily mistaken for what is commonly called 'chest voice,' but which, unlike that kind of voice, is capable of bearing throughout its whole compass any strain that may be put upon it.—English Mechanic.
