Customs Receipts. The following were the Customs Receipts for February, 1892.

Same month, 1891 \$ 653,831.77 Whilst these receipts are an improvement on those of the same month last year, they show a falling off of some \$2,500 from those of January this year and are considerably below those of February, 1890 and 1891.

THE CONVERSION SCHEME.

The wonderful circular from the Bank of England, out of which so much capital was attempted to be made here by the official organs some five weeks ago, on the strength of entirely misleading telegrams, resolves itself, as our readers now know, into a formal letter to its clients—not to the body of the bondholders—asking them if they intend to convert, and concluding with the sentence,—"So far as can be judged, no better arrangement seems likely to be obtained." This was very improperly and unjustly magnified here into a circular to the bondholders recommending the scheme.

Constructing the above "recommendations" by the light of notorious contemporary events, it may be interpreted thus,—The arrangement is not good, nor what it ought to be, but it is evident that the Uruguayan Government is not acting in good faith towards its creditors and will not listen to any terms not proposed by itself, and since nothing is to be expected from it, and since if the bondholders do not accept this arrangement they will probably get nothing at all, therefore, bad as it is, they had better accept it. We do not see that any other interpretation is possible, and after this we think the less the official organs say about the "recommendation" of the Bank of England, the better, for it is by no means flattering.

However, left-handed as this "recommendation" was, it met with no sympathy in London, and was severely criticised by the financial papers, as might have been expected, for remembering the history of the Conversion Scheme, it was a decided impropriety for the Bank of England or any other Bank to have issued such a circular. The obvious duty of the Banks to their clients would have been either to remain entirely neutral or better still to have thrown their influence against the scheme so as to force the Uruguayan Government to listen to reason. As it happens, their interest in the Baring liquidation has outweighed their duty to their clients, and they have thus assisted in making the affair one of the financial scandals of the century.

In the City article of the London Standard, and there is none of greater weight, we read,—It is with regret that we find the Bank mixing itself up so intimately with a piece of business which cannot, on any reasonable pretence, be looked upon as other than very questionable both in its origin and purpose. On the following day the same paper also published the following letter. To the Editor of the Standard. Sir,—The remarks made in The Standard of to-day on the support given by the Bank of England to the Uruguayan Conversion Scheme will be endorsed by all who wish to see the City regain the path of sound finance.

The proposal to rob the five per cent. Bondholders, who were in the position of First Mortgagees, in order to make Messrs. Baring's subsequent loan of two million pounds marketable, is so high handed that no consideration of expediency can justify the support given to it in high quarters. You have, moreover, shown conclusively by figures that forty-five per cent. of the Customs, even if set aside for the conversion scheme, will leave a heavy deficit.

The Bank of England is, therefore, giving its weight to a scheme which must bring loss on the unskilled investors, who alone are willing at present to absorb this worthless security. If the liquidation of Messrs. Baring's affairs can only be accomplished by such expedients, the gain to the guarantors will be more than counterbalanced by the sanction given to precedents which will make the soundest banking unsafe.

The interests of Messrs. Baring's late partners—one at least of whom does not appear to have realised his situation—will, no doubt, be best served by keeping together the whole mass of Securities, and waiting for brighter times.

The public desires that those which are marketable should be realised, and those which are worthless exposed. This alone can remove the pall which has so long hung over the City, and restore that confidence to preserve which the guarantors risked so much.

The continued "lock-up" of some millions of the Bank assets in Messrs. Baring's affairs is a serious weakness, and early steps should be taken to reduce the liability. I write as one having no interest, beyond my share in the guarantee, in South American Securities.

Important journals such as the Financial News, Economist, Statist, Sunday Sun, Echo, Daily Oracle, and doubtless many others, which we have not seen unite in strongly condemning the attitude assumed by the Bank of England as derogatory to its dignity and reputation. The opposition in railway as well as financial circles was undiminished, as may be judged from the following note in the Railway Times of Feb. 6.—

Messrs. Glyn, Mills, Currie, and Company announce that a majority of the bonds of the Uruguayan Unified and 1888 Loans has been deposited with them for conversion under Señor Ellauri's scheme. There can be no doubt that this result has been mainly influenced by a circular addressed by the cashier of the Bank of England to the Uruguayan bondholders on the books of that institution. A strong feeling exists in the City that, however much the Bank of England may be concerned in the success of the Ellauri confiscation it would have been in better taste to have refrained from giving the clients of the Bank and bondholders in general such dubious advice. The intimation that no better terms were likely to be procured was utterly uncalled for, and unfortunately, owing to the prestige of the Bank of England, it received more general credence than it deserved.

Looking back upon the affair as revealed in the London papers we should say that in all probability on January 31, the decisive date fixed for conversion, the scheme was a failure and only a minority of bonds had been offered. If Messrs. Glyn or Co. or Dr. Ellauri had responded to the enquiries made as to the amount offered, as they ought to have done in common honesty to say nothing of courtesy, this would have become known and the whole nefarious business have collapsed. However they made no declaration and went on using every possible means to obtain bonds for conversion until perhaps they really had a majority. The rest were then bound to follow, however strong and justifiable their objections, as further resistance would be useless. And thus the conversion would be secured, not by honest or legitimate means, but by a mean trick discreditable to all concerned.

Dr. Ellauri, although selected as Commissioner to England, is ignorant of the English language, and therefore we cannot help thinking that he has fallen into the hands of some entirely unscrupulous scoundrels who willfully deceive him as to the events passing around him and even as to the nature of the correspondence and documents in English laid before him. This theory would give an explanation of the gross misstatements he has telegraphed to the Government here and of his unparalleled discourtesy in neglecting even to acknowledge the communications of the Bondholders' Committee. The only possible alternative to this theory is that he has deliberately sacrificed the reputation he previously bore as an honourable and straight-forward man.

The Uruguayan Confiscation. (Financial News, Feb. 2.) The period for the deposit of Uruguayan bonds by the holders

who consent to the confiscation scheme expired on December 31. An extension of time was, at the urgent request of Dr. Ellauri and his associates, granted until January 31; but yesterday, February 1, Messrs. Glyn, Mills, Currie and Co. were still receiving bonds. How many that firm has received it is impossible to learn; estimates vary. According to the advocates of the confiscation scheme, the number is sufficient to ensure Dr. Ellauri's success; according to the opponents of that scheme, the result is still in doubt. If the so-called conversion be carried through, it will certainly not be because it is satisfactory to the creditors of Uruguayan, or because it is fair to them or creditable to the Uruguayan Government. If it be adopted, its adoption will be due to the immense influence which has been exercised in its favour by English banking institutions, from the Bank of England downwards. Never has a scheme of financial repudiation by a foreign State received the backing that this scheme has had. The Council of Foreign Bondholders, backed up by the whole force of the Baring guarantors, has spared no effort to force it upon the bondholders and the railway companies. The eminent financiers who have touted for it have not even stopped to ask who is to get the \$396,000 for "commissions, expenses and press propaganda." All that is known is that the Council of Foreign Bondholders has declared that it is only to have \$2,100. Where the \$533,900 is to go no one knows, and apparently no one cares. The destination of 5 per cent. of the entire amount of the proposed new issue is thus enshrouded in mystery. This is a large sum to be devoted to "secret services," more especially when it is remembered that it comes out of the pockets of the creditors of Uruguayan, who are, for the second time in nine years, made the victims of Uruguayan repudiation.

Needless to remind our readers that the banks which have lent their influence to the foisting of this scheme upon the Uruguayan bondholders are not wholly disinterested. As members of the Baring Guarantee Fund, they know well that, by persuading the bondholders to submit to the scheme of spoliation brought forward by Dr. Ellauri, they are rendering substantial aid to the Baring estate, and so helping themselves. Of course, the bankers have been clever enough to keep this point in the background; but the facts are incontestable. Not only is the private Baring loan of 1890, of which \$1,950,000 is outstanding, brought in to rank equally with the bona-fide External Debt, but a liability of \$1,280,000 which the Baring estate has in connection with the Western Railway contract is got rid of. In a word, the eminent bankers are to score off the unfortunate investor, and the high reputation of the eminent bankers is used for the purpose of persuading the investor that he is pursuing the course of prudence in allowing himself to be despoiled. That, in the long run, this scheme will prove as injurious to the reputation of the banks concerned as it will be to the financial credit of Uruguay we cannot doubt. The whole business has been from beginning to end most irregular and most discreditable to all concerned.

For the sake of Uruguay, for the sake of her bondholders, and for the sake of the good name of English finance houses, it is to be hoped that, even at the eleventh hour, Dr. Ellauri's confiscation trick may meet with the defeat it deserves.

Cricket. (Contributed.) The match between The English School and an Eleven of the M. V. C. C. captained by Mr. Harvey, was played on Tuesday and proved a most enjoyable one to all engaged in it. The day was splendid, the lunch excellent and (what is important where boys are concerned) plentiful, and the bowling and fielding much above the average. The batting may be said to have been erratic, especially on the side of the Eleven, accounted for no doubt by the dangerous bowling of Harley and W. Ashe, who knocked about the wicket like nine pins during the first half hour. Dunbar however made a stand, and played a fine strong innings, going in first man and carrying his bat for 58. Were it not for this exceptional piece of play, which tired the school bowling, the result of the match would have been different. Still even without the victory the boys feel that their performance was highly creditable, and it is certain to be encouraging towards future effort. Mention should not be omitted of the bowling of F. H. Smith, R. N., which proved very effective, and was of a style not often seen in these parts, neat, even and straight.

The Queen's Message to her Subjects. A supplement to the London Gazette published the following letter from the Queen, which had been received by the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Home Department.—

Osborne, January 26th, 1892. I must once again give expression to my deep sense of the loyalty and affectionate sympathy evinced by my subjects in every part of my empire, on an occasion more sad and fragrant than any but one which has befallen me and mine, as well as the nation. The overwhelming misfortune of my dearly-loved grandson having been thus suddenly cut off in the flower of his age, full of promise for the future, amiable and gentle, and endearing himself to all, renders it hard for his sorely-stricken parents, his dear young bride, and his fond grandmother to bow in submission to the inscrutable decrees of Providence.

The sympathy of millions, which has been so touchingly and visibly expressed, is deeply gratifying at such a time, and I wish, both in my own name and that of my children, to express from my heart my warmest testimonies of sympathy with us, and appreciation of my dear grandson, whom I loved as a son, and whose devotion to me was as great as that of a son, will be a help and consolation to me and mine in our affliction.

My bereavements during the last thirty years of my reign have indeed been heavy. Through the labours, anxieties, and responsibilities inseparable from my position have been great, yet it is my earnest prayer that God may continue to give me health and strength to work for the good and happiness of my dear country and empire while life lasts.

VICTORIAN I. SUNDRIES. The Chamber of Senators is convoked to a sitting to-day, when, we believe, the report of the Finance Committee on the Banking Bills will be presented. We are informed that they propose some modifications of an entirely secondary nature. The discussion will commence next week. We learn that the President continues his system of endeavouring to overcome opposition by means of personal interviews with the supposed opponents, a practice which may be convenient but is certainly open to criticism.

The Executive has forwarded to the H. General Assembly a short Message conveying the scheme prepared by Dr. Angel Floro Costa for the creation of the High Court of Justice. The object of this is to supply an obvious defect in the present imperfect judicial system, and great importance is attached to the Bill in legal circles. Dr. Costa's scheme has already been approved in the main by the special committee of juriconsults to whom it was submitted and whose report accompanies the Message.

The Superior Tribunal of Justice has ratified the decision of the Civil Judge in favour of the Municipality in the claim brought against it by Don Adolfo del Campo for possession of the Prado, and has definitely decided that the Municipality has full title to the lands. We hope this long vexed question will now be allowed to rest.

Under authority of the Minister of Government and order of the Chief of Police, the police, have, during the week, been closing several of the "casas amuebladas" situated in different parts of city, several of which were more or less clandestine houses of ill-fame. The police have undoubtedly done right, but at the same time it must acknowledge that the outcry raised by some of the papers against these houses has been greatly exaggerated, and that there are other far more striking defects to which they might turn attention first.

In a London paper we read of a special case brought before the magistrates to decide the point whether a bear is a domestic animal or not, certain defendants being charged with cruelty to a bear. We know of several "domestic animals" who are decidedly bears.

The commercial treaty between France and the United States has been definitely arranged and will be submitted to the French Chambers for ratification next week. It is telegraphed from London

that Government has suffered a defeat in the first reading of Mr. Goschen's Bill for the issue of £1 notes and the increase of the metallic reserve of the Bank of England. This defeat will probably hasten the dissolution of Parliament and bring in a Liberal Government even sooner than was expected.

The conflict concerning the Council of Hygiene has been solved by a decree from the Ministry of Government reorganising the Council as follows.—Drs. J. L. Heguy, J. M. Carafé, L. P. Lengua, P. Regules, J. Salterain, A. Berro and E. Pouey. Four of these were resigning members of the previous Council, and Dr. M. M. Espinosa, who gave rise to conflict, is now eliminated.

Since Col. Muró has been appointed to the Commandancy General of Marine, no fewer than 180 respectable and well-recommended persons have applied to him for posts. This is cited as an example of the number of persons out of work, thanks to the crisis.

From a recent London paper we cut the following exceptionally romantic story.—An old man named McKenna, living in a poor house at Deptford, has just had a remarkable experience of the vicissitudes of fortune. He and his daughter, aged eighteen, caught the influenza, and the girl dying, McKenna was left to shift for himself with only a few shilling between him and starvation. One day last week a fashionably-dressed lady drove up to the house and asked for McKenna. She was shown into his room, and catching sight of him she dropped on her knee, and exclaimed "Oh, Jack, forgive me." It was his wife. Twenty years ago she eloped with his best friend to California, where her paramour made a huge fortune in the goldfields. He died recently, and the woman returned to England to find McKenna. The pathetic part of the romance is that in nursing the old fellow back to health she herself caught the influenza, and has just died of pneumonia, leaving him £62,000.

A decree from the Ministry of Government appoints Drs. Damian Vivas y Cerante and Felix Illa as Fiscal Agents for the departments of Salto and Rio Negro respectively. In reply to an application of the Chief of Police, calling attention to the deficient material of the Fire Brigade, the Minister of Government has authorised the expenditure of \$3000 to purchase 1000 metres of hose, which will enable the Brigade to bring into use a new steam engine in their possession.

There are to be no illuminations for the "burial" of Carnival on Sunday, all the gas globes and fixings having been removed yesterday. Let us also hope there will be no water-throwing. We hear efforts will be made to arrange a "corso" for the afternoon.

The Nation, in one of the most ridiculous articles it has yet published, says that the Bolsa saluted the election of Dr. Herrera to the Presidency with a fall in values which was a formal declaration of war against the financial schemes of the new government, and that the chief object of this war was the ruin of the National Bank. Until we read this we thought about by State interference, the dishonesty of its Directors and such shady transactions as the infamous "special accounts."

The trouble in the Lazaret at Flores Island last Sunday was caused by some Brazilian soldiers, passengers by the "Pelotas," who refused to submit to the regulations of the island, and attacked the sentinels with stones. In repelling the attack one of them was severely wounded.

Not to Eat Poker nor Bellows.—A lady consulting Dr. Abernethy on a nervous disorder, entered into a long, frivolous, and fantastic account of her symptoms. Unsatisfied with being referred to his book for instructions respecting the treatment of her complaints, she persisted in endeavouring to extract further information from Dr. Abernethy. After suffering her volubility with considerable patience for a while, he exclaimed, in answer to her repeated question, "May I eat oysters, doctor? May I eat supper?" "I'll tell you what, ma'am: you may eat anything but the poker and the bellows; for the one is hard of digestion, and the other is full of wind."

The fire which we mentioned as having broken out in the coal store, Rio Negro 71, continued to smoulder yesterday, keeping a squad of firemen hard at work. The fire is in the centre of a pile of some 1000 tons of coal, and is consequently difficult to get at. No danger is apprehended to the adjacent buildings. Men are at work removing the coal as much as possible, a dangerous task, as any access of air increases the combustion.

The Argentine Health authorities have declared the Brazilian port of Paranaguá to be infested, yellow fever having broken out violently there.
