Parliament.

Chamber of Senators.
On Saturday the discussion in detail of the Banking Bills was commenced, and without debate of interest, Articles 1 to 28 inclusive were approved with the modifications previously agreed up and mentioned by the Minister of Finance on Friday. It was then resolved to continue the discussion on Monday.

As the substance of these modifications is already known to our readers, we refrain from repeating them until the Bill is concluded, when we will reproduce it in its final form.

Chamber of Representatives.
On Saturday, after some minor business had been attended to, the discussion in general of the Bill granting a credit of \$24,000 to represent the Republic in the Chicago Exhibition was resumed, the Minister of Foment being again present.

The Minister, in reply to Deputy G. Rodriguez, said it was impossible to estimate the effect on our foreign commerce of the previous Exhibitions, in Paris and Barcelona, in which the Republic had been represented. There were so many factors to be considered, that it was impossible to say whether they had directly contributed to an increase of our commerce or not. But such a representation was not for the sole object of directly increasing commerce, it was also to give a proof of our civilisation and progress that if a serious body like the Rural Association, which proposed to undertake the representation, was content with the sum of \$24,000, it was not for the Chamber to object. There was no necessity for an expensive pavilion for the exhibition of works of art or delicate manufactures. The exhibit would be on a modest scale as befitted rural products.

Sr. Bachi thought the credit might conveniently be extended to \$30,000.
The Bill was then put to the vote in general, and was declared approved.
The Bill conceding free importation to the Lloyd Hand-Mill was then put in discussion in detail, and after a short debate was put to the vote and was rejected.
The sitting then closed.

Run on the London and River Plate Bank.
Some mischief-makers having circulated, on Saturday night and Sunday, unfavourable rumours respecting the London and River Plate Bank, rumours which were repeated by the exchange-dealers or cambistas for interested reasons, the result was a run on the Bank yesterday, confined, however, chiefly to small depositors and note-holders.
The Bank met the run with the calm indifference it always displays under such circumstances. Extra doors were thrown open for the admission of customers, extra clerks put on duty as paying cashiers, and every demand met with the greatest promptitude imaginable. The Bank was kept open after the usual hours until the small crowd were all satisfied. To-day we expect and hope the run will have practically ceased.

The alleged cause for the run was that the head office in London of the Bank had been hard hit by the failure of Murieta and Co. The tale seems to us highly improbable, as this failure, in one form or another, has been almost a foregone conclusion since the collapse of Baring Brothers, and therefore, whatever the relations of the Bank with Murieta's, it has had plenty of time to prepare, and

the technical declaration of failure can have little effect on its situation or great resources.

At the same time, we greatly regret the occurrence of the run, which shows that unprincipled "wreckers" are again at work, depreciating values, and putting the market into a nervous state of apprehension which renders all banking, and indeed financial business of any kind, next door to impossible.

If the authors of the present report could be traced, we think a coat of tar and feathers would be a suitable reward for their efforts.

So far we are aware, the run did not extend to Buenos Aires.

Death.

It is our painful duty to announce, with sincere regret, the sudden death, in her 34th year, of Mrs. James Hunter Jr. (Elizabeth Agnes Sheldon). The deceased lady had been safely delivered of a child on Saturday and was doing fairly well, but died most unexpectedly and suddenly yesterday morning, the immediate cause of death being failure of the heart's action.

Mrs. Hunter, who had only been married about a year, was well-known and much esteemed and respected both in Montevideo and in Buenos Aires where she had resided before her marriage. She had practised in England and the River Plate as a Hospital and private nurse of great ability, and since her residence in Montevideo had distinguished herself by her untiring kindness and thoughtfulness to the sick and distressed, and hardly less by her cheerful, friendly and intelligent disposition. She was a lady of unaffected piety and unlimited goodness of heart, and her loss will be deeply regretted by a large circle. General sympathy is felt with her husband in this exceptionally severe blow.

Mrs. Hunter's funeral will take place at 10.30 this morning, from the house Calle Asamble 366.

SUNDRIES.

The discussion in detail in the Senate of the Banking Bills was, we believe, completed yesterday, and, as remarked previously, the rest should be plain sailing, everything now depending on the power of the syndicate to deposit the guarantee and to furnish the promised capital within the appointed period. This period, however, as we understand, has not been shortened, but remains at the six months last fixed by the Representatives. In that case we must not look for the bank before October, instead of July.

The Special General Meeting of the Winter Evening Entertainment Society to consider the new rules proposed for the reorganisation of the Society is called for Monday, April 4. All persons interested, whether members of the Society or not, are invited to attend. The proposed new rules, which have received the unanimous approval of the Committee are being printed, and copies may be had, on and after Saturday next, on application to the Hon. Secretary at the English Club, or at the office of this paper. We will give some extracts from them in a few days.

No correspondence from Buenos Aires on Saturday morning, none yesterday. This "no steamer" nuisance is getting really terrible. The two capitals might be a whole continent apart, or might have drifted back to the early part of the century, for the limited means of communication between them. The chief absurdity of the case is that whilst on two or even three days of the week there are no steamers running, on other days there are two or even three at a time. As the Platense Company is now only making four trips a week, one would think it only common sense on the part of the other Companies to run their steamers on the off days, instead of running them in competition on the same days. But, unfortunately, common sense is rather uncommon in the River Plate.

Says the *B. A. Herald*—The British Consul paid the Irish residents in Buenos Aires the compliment on St. Patrick's Day of hoisting the British flag. The compliment was not reciprocated, for the only flags exhibited in the room at Mercier's restaurant, where a party of Irish gentlemen dined, were those of Ireland, the United States, Switzerland and the Argentine Republic—three Republics in *esse* and one in *poteste*!

Our B. A. Contemporaries understand that when Admiral Walker of the U. S. fleet goes home with his fleet, one of the number—probably the Bennington or Atlanta—will be detached to remain on this station with the Essex and the Yantic.

The vaunted elephant and bull fight attracted a large crowd to the bull-ring on Sunday afternoon, but resulted in an absurd fiasco, and the spectators who had hoped for something bloody and thrilling, went away disgusted at having been choused out of their money by a catch-penny advertisement. (N. B. "Chouse" is not slang. It is derived from the Turkish. *Vide Dictionary*.)
A genius writes to the *B. A. Herald* as follows.—"That apparitions have been common enough in various parts of the world during the last 40 years is well known. I have myself witnessed several in England, under conditions which no Theory of Hallucination will explain.—The sooner this exceptionally favoured individual gets into communication with Mr. Stead and the Society for Psychological Research, the better for the information of the world at large. He really should not hide his light under a bushel in remote Buenos Aires.

—We are prepared to back our weekly contemporary the *Uruguay News* against any paper ever published for knowing other people's business before they know it themselves and for making indiscreet and premature announcements with the object of doing mischief and creating difficulties.

The controversy of cricket versus lawn-tennis, raised by the Buenos Aires C. C., is still raging in the papers there. The dog-in-the-manger party who gained their end by such a very narrow majority finding themselves condemned by public opinion and all the press, have rushed into print to defend themselves. We repeat that they, considering that a majority of 2 in their favour can only be regarded as accidental and not decisive, would show good taste and good sense in giving way and allowing the Tournament to proceed. Let them take an example from the M. V. C. C. here, where the Cricket Captain is also lawn tennis champion, and where the cricketers have the good sense to recognise the importance of the kindred game and the additional attraction it lends to the Club.

The following are the results of the games of the Lawn Tennis Tournament played on Sunday, first draw, *Handy Single*: Dunbar beat Francis; Guyatt beat Jones. Mixed Doubles, Stanham and Miss Dart beat Harvey and Mrs. MacMaster.

The well-known historian Mr. Edward Freeman has just died at Nice, from small-pox, aged 69. His best known work is "History of the Norman Conquest," published in 1876-78. "Growth of the English Constitution" (accepted as a standard work on the subject) 1872, and "Historical Essays" 3 vols, 1872-9. He was also a well-known and distinguished lecturer in England and the United States.

Our almost-amusing contemporary the *News* stigmatises as a "conspiracy" the opposition in the Senate to the Banking Bills, and thanks it "very extraordinarily" that Senators should attend the Chamber temporarily, then, entertain the idea that the Senate only exists for the purpose of calmly acquiescing in every proposal laid before it by Government? If so, the *News* had better go to school again, and cease inflicting its nonsense on its readers.

Mr. J. J. Réthoré, whose translation of Sr. Zorrilla de San Martín's poem *Tabaré* into French has met with great acceptance here, is now engaged on a translation of the same work into English. Mr. Réthoré, a Frenchman by birth, was partly educated in England and is thoroughly acquainted with the English language, and therefore is well qualified for the task, audacious as it may seem. His idea is to publish the poem for circulation in the Chicago Exhibition. We have already seen some pages of Mr. Réthoré's work, and can testify to the ability with which he is pursuing it. "Tabaré," we may mention, is a poem of South American Indian life, resembling in form and conception Longfellow's exquisite "Hiawatha." It is a work of high poetic order, the fame of which is not confined to the River Plate, and it has, if we are not mistaken, been "crowned" by the Literary Academy of Madrid.

Commissary Ellauri, of whose arrest we spoke on Sunday, has already been released. The cause of the arrest was that Sr. Ellauri objected to his removal from the 3rd Section to the Plaza de Frutos, and addressed the Chief of Police in language which the latter construed as disrespectful.

Dr. Fructos Pitaluga has applied to the Criminal Judge Dr. Ballester, for a case of calumny against the Civil Prosecutor (Fiscal) Dr. Fein. We are unaware of the origin of the case.

It is telegraphed from London that H. M. the Queen has left for Hyeres (France) where she will remain some weeks.

The Postmaster General was breakfasted at the Hotel Pyramides on Saturday, by the superior employees of the department, to celebrate the union of the Post Office and Telegraph, recently ordained. Apropos of this, Sr. Lanza, ex-director of the National Telegraphs, intends to publish a statement in explanation of various phrases used in the preamble of the decree, and which he regards as reflections on his conduct in his post. He was away in Buenos Aires when

the decree appeared, and its announcement took him by surprise.

Sr. Ayarragaray, ex-manager of the National Bank, against whom charges of such serious irregularities have recently been made, has written to Dr. J. P. Ramirez (solicitor to the Bank) expressing his willingness to submit to an investigation by a Tribunal of any 5 persons appointed by Dr. Ramirez and the President of the Bank, these two forming part.

In the small hours of Sunday morning, a violent quarrel took place between two men who had been playing cards and drinking all night in the *almacen* Lavalleja 101. Challenges passed between them and they went out together. Shortly after one of them presented himself in the house of a neighbour, bleeding from a fearful wound in the throat, from which he died a few hours afterwards. He accused the other man of having caused the wound by a treacherous stab.

The victim is a labourer known as Genaró. His surname is unknown, nor is he thought to have relatives in the country. His assassin is another labourer named Manuel Chirillo, and the police have not yet succeeded in capturing him.

The passengers by the "Desterro," released from quarantine, have published a strong protest against their treatment on Flores Island, where, they say, they were charged at the rate of a first-class hotel, and treated worse than "2" in the meanest hostelry. The old story.

We return with pleasure the courteous salute of the *Tradicion* and *Deutsche Zeitung*, both of which made their first appearance on Sunday. The former is daily, the latter a modest little weekly and is edited by Mr. Paul Phillipson.

According to the *Heraldo* of Tacuarembó, the tobacco harvest on the grounds of the "Vegas Uruguayas" is valued at \$40,000.

BUENOS AIRES
—Dr. Lopez presented his resignation as Minister of Finance on Thursday and it was accepted; the under-secretary, D. Emilio Hansen, has been appointed acting Minister of Finance, *ad interim*.

A decree has been issued giving the Conversion Office the exclusive management of the issue of notes of less than a dollar, and the Bank of the Nation is to deliver to the office all the notes of that class in its possession and the contracts for printing notes. The Bank has to pay to the Treasury 6 o/o on its circulation, but the Government pays the Bank 3 o/o and out of this the Bank is to pay for printing the notes, &c.

—48 Krupp guns and 5000 projectiles for them have arrived from Europe.

The steamer "Wordsworth" brought out the boat which has been built for the Argentine Yacht Club by Burgoyne of London. It measures 18 feet in length and has been specially constructed for the rough waters of the River Plate. It is built of cedar and is fitted to carry three sails or for three pairs of oars. There are two air-tight compartments to prevent it from sinking even if full of water. According to the builder, this boat will be able to compete with Mr. Kinch's "Undine," which is considered the fastest boat of its kind on the river.

The French Government has asked the Argentine Government to prevent the sending to France of sheep affected with scab. It has been resolved that the veterinary surgeon who examines imported animals shall also examine those embarked for export so as to prevent infected animals from being shipped.

On Wednesday night more than 600 grocers assembled in the saloon of the Society "Lago di Como" to consider the best mode of resisting or protesting against the recent municipal ordinances affecting their business. A committee was appointed to protect the interests of the trade.

The Superior Council of War is very indignant that the *Diario* should have obtained and published a copy of its report on the plan of manoeuvres. The Military Fiscal was sent yesterday to ask for the name of the *Diario's* informant or for the manuscript which he had given for publication; both requests were politely refused. Afterwards the Auditor of War summoned the editor before him to be examined touching the matter, but the editor declined the invitation.

The representatives of the Belgrano Gas Company have sent a note to the Municipal Intendant, in compliance with instructions from London, in which they say that they will be under the painful necessity of suspending the lighting in Belgrano, Flores, Palermo Park and the North Western part of the city, within 15 days, if the Intendant does not pay, or make a satisfactory arrangement to pay the sum of \$266,209 m/n which is due to the company from the Municipality to the 31st December last. The Company has not as yet received a cent for this year's supply of gas.

At the meeting of the shareholders of the Catalinas Wharf Company it was resolved to issue over one million Obligaciones to build a

produce market on the lands of the Company in the Boca. The cost of erecting the market is estimated by engineer Stavillas at \$1,661,787 m/n, but the materials of the old wharf which is being demolished are expected to give a value of 243,630 dollars, which can be applied to the building of the produce market. Don Belisario Rollán was elected president of the Catalinas Wharf Company and Messrs. S. Alcorata, A. de Arredondo, Jorge Dickinson and E. Lermada as directors.

The representatives of Baron Hirsch have purchased from Mr. Spangenberg 2 leagues of camp in the department of Villaguay (Entre Rios) for \$50,000 m/n per league.

Dr. Luis Saenz Peña has resigned his post of Judge of the Supreme Court.

The president of the Conversion Office, Dr. Martinez, has resigned on account of ill-health. Drs. Arco and Chas. have also resigned because their efforts for the improvement of the financial situation have always been baffled by the other two directors and by the president, who invariably gave his casting vote to the latter.—*B. A. Herald*.

The Honorable Mr. and Mrs. Pakenham embark to-morrow in the mail-steamers Wordsworth for England, on leave of absence, but we much fear that we are not likely again to see them in this country, as His Excellency is spoken of in the London papers as about to be sent as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the court of Stockholm. Mr. Pakenham's connection with Buenos Aires goes back a long way. He was Secretary of Legation here in 1854, under Sir Edward Thornton, and subsequently acted as Chargé d'Affaires until his promotion to a similar post at Rio Janeiro in 1867.

He was afterwards Chargé d'Affaires successively at Stockholm, Brussels, Washington and Copenhagen, and was appointed Minister to Chile in 1877, where he remained until the higher grade of Plenipotentiary was conferred on him in 1885. His career has been so far, singularly fortunate in as much as he has never been embroiled with any Government to which he has been accredited. We do not doubt that he is in-labored for much of his good luck to the admirable tact of his accomplished wife for Mrs. Pakenham was evidently born to shine in diplomatic circles. The British Legation in Buenos Aires under her social regime has been a miniature court, open to all, and famous for hospitality. Moreover Mr. and Mrs. Pakenham have always displayed the warmest interest in everything pertaining to the British community, and especially to our charitable institutions. A committee of ladies meets to-day at noon to present Mrs. Pakenham with some Chinese silk as a parting souvenir. We wish Mr. and Mrs. Pakenham a pleasant voyage home and the same good fortune that has always accompanied them both here and elsewhere.—*B. A. Standard*.

LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 16.
In the House of Lords yesterday, the Indian Councils Bill and the East India Officers Bill were each read a second time. Some conversation took place with regard to Government grants and technical instruction.

In the Commons, Mr. Jackson stated, in reply to Mr. Sexton, that up to the 31st January the total applications under the Irish Land Purchase Act of last year represented 180,000. No cases had been sanctioned and no stock had been issued. Resuming the debate on the Address, Mr. Sexton moved an amendment expressing a conviction of the "inability of the Imperial Parliament to legislate for Ireland as her distinctive interests require," and setting forth that "this conviction has been intensified by the manifest failure of the Land Purchase Act of 1891 to afford an acceptable basis for the extension of the class of occupying proprietors in Ireland." Mr. Jackson contended that the Irish Land Act was not a failure, while Sir George Trevelyan pointed to the statistics, "perfectly phenomenal in character," that had been produced, suggesting failure. The debate was continued chiefly by Irish members, including Colonel Sanderson and Mr. T. Healy. On a division after the closure had been moved by Mr. McLaren, the amendment was negatived by a majority of only 21—179 votes against 158. The Address was then agreed to.

Two more meetings in the series of Liberal attacks on London took place last night. At one of them, held in the Chelsea Town Hall, Sir Lyon Playfair dwelt at considerable length on the question of Home Rule for Ireland. Comparing conditions existing in England, Scotland, and Ireland, he showed that Scot-

land had practically been granted Home Rule, much to her advantage, while Ireland had received very poor treatment.

Addressing a great meeting in the Forsters' Hall, Clerkenwell, Mr. Herbert Gladstone announced that when he left Nice a few days ago his father was in excellent health.

Mr. J. A. Wilcox, Conservative, was yesterday returned to Parliament unopposed for the Everton Division of Liverpool.

Mr. F. A. Hankey, Conservative member for the Chertsey Division of Surrey, died suddenly yesterday morning.

About five thousand persons were present at a dinner given in the Agricultural Hall last evening to celebrate General Booth's return to England.

Except in the East of London the coal porters resumed work yesterday, and considerable activity prevailed at most of the wharves and yards.

The terrified passengers, not being able to hold their seats, were momentarily expecting to be hurled into eternity, until the conductor and brakeman succeeded in felling with a blow the demented engine driver and sent off the steam.

One of the passengers states that after the train left Tacoma nothing unusual occurred until that part of the line which leads along the base of the mountain was reached, when suddenly it was noticed that the train was increasing in speed until fairly flew along the rails.

From side to side at a fearful rate, and the frightened passengers were thrown about the cars. Several stations were passed at lightning speed.

The passengers had now become panic-stricken, and women and children were screaming. The conductor and brakeman had been appealed to, and they said that either the engine-driver had gone mad or had lost control of the engine.

They crawled carefully along the tender and saw that the fireman had disappeared, and from the strange appearance of the engineer, who was bare-headed, decided that he had become insane.

He stealthily got behind him and struck him a heavy blow on the head, which felled him to the floor. The conductor shut off the steam and gradually brought the train to a standstill. The driver was secured and a despatch sent over the road asking for information regarding the missing fireman, who was subsequently discovered seriously injured on the side of the rails.

For a distance of forty-five miles the demented driver had driven the train at a rate of a hundred miles an hour.




