### NATURALISATION OF FOREIGNERS.—II

Before proceeding any further with this question, we think it advisable, and indeed have been asked to do so by some interested readers, to give a translation of those Articles of the Constitution touching on the subject, referred to by us in our article of Wednesday.

**Article 6.**—Citizens of the Oriental State of Uruguay are natural or legal.

**Article 7.**—Natural citizens are all free men born in any point of the territory of the State.

**Article 8.**—Legal citizens are:—foreigners, parents of natural citizens, settled in the country before the establishment of the present constitution; those children of father or mother natives of the country, born outside the State, from the moment of settling in it; those foreigners who, in the capacity of officers, have fought and may fight in the land or sea forces of the Nation; foreigners, although childless or with foreign children, but married with native females, who, professing any science, art or industry or possessing any floating capital or real estate, are resident in the country at the time of swearing this Constitution; foreign males, married to foreign females, who have any of the qualifications just mentioned and three years residence in the State; unmarried male foreigners, who also have any of the said qualifications and four years of residence; those who may obtain special grace from the Assembly for notable services or special merits.

It is on the above article that the *Dia* has founded its pretensions of obligatory citizenship. But this article, as will be seen by the above careful translation, is very clumsily drawn up, and jumbles together transitory and permanent dispositions in a way that must give rise to diverse interpretations. But, we maintain, whatever the interpretation given this article, there is no power which can force a man to lose or change his nationality against his will. It can only be by voluntary act.

That the above article may be interpreted as giving to resident foreigners fulfilling certain easy conditions, the rights of citizenship, we fully admit, but then the question at once arises—by accepting these rights how far do they sacrifice their own nationality? how far do they relinquish their claim to the protection of their respective Minister or Consul? The whole question resolves itself into this. If it were possible to exercise the rights of Oriental citizenship without sacrificing the rights of one's previous nationality, the matter would be easily resolved, but this is obviously absurd. We come back then to the old question of "obligatory citizenship," which also means obligatory loss of previous citizenship, an obvious impossibility. Any attempt, then, to put a forced construction on this article must fail in the act.

Nor could any such attempt ever be made. Suppose a foreign resident resisted the attempt to force Oriental citizenship on him, how far could it be carried. If his life or personal liberty were attacked on this pretence, an appeal to the Minister of his country would ensue, and, in case of obstinacy on the part of the local authorities, a few foreign gunboats would quickly and justly reduce them to reason. A shell or two dropped into the Cabildo or the Government house would soon solve the point. And if the attempt were made by imposing disabilities or disadvantages, an appeal to the Constitution would equally soon settle the matter. Listen to the following articles.

**Article 130.**—The inhabitants of the State have the right to be protected in the enjoyment of their life, honor, liberty, security and property.

No one can be deprived of these rights except according to the Laws.

**Article 132.**—All men are equal before the Law, whether preceptive, penal or defensive; there being recognised no other distinctions between them, save those of talent or virtue.

**Article 135.**—Those private actions of men which in no way attack public order nor are injurious to third parties, are reserved for God and are exempt from the authority of the magistrates. No inhabitant of the State shall be obliged to do that which is not commanded by the Law or prevented from doing that which is not prohibited by the Law.

**Article 146.**—Every inhabitant of the State may devote himself to the work, cultivation, industry or commerce which suits him, in so far as it is not opposed to public good or to that of the citizens.

**Article 147.**—It is free to every one to enter the territory of the Republic, to remain in it, and to leave it with all their property, observing the police laws and without prejudice to third parties.

These articles seem to us to be sufficient to secure to foreigners resident in the Republic the free exercise of all functions except those peculiar to citizenship, and these articles are also sufficient to prevent any penalty of disability being imposed on foreigners who did not choose to accept citizenship. So long as they exist, therefore, obligatory citizenship is out of the question.

Yesterday's *Dia*, pursuing the subject, attempts to establish a distinction between nationality and citizenship, which we confess we do not altogether understand. If we read it aright, it attempts to make out that a foreigner may, under expressed conditions, exercise the rights of Oriental citizenship, without sacrificing his own nationality. We have already dealt with this, and we fail to see how it can be brought about, though we confess it would be, to the majority of eligible foreigners, a very easy and acceptable solution.

### Parliament.

In the Chamber of Senators, on Wednesday, after some minor matters had been attended to, the discussion in general was resumed of the Bill for interpretation of the Laws concerning commercial mortgages.

Sr. Costa argued at some length in favour of the substitutory bill presented by Sr. Muñoz. Finally the original Bill was put to the vote, and was declared accepted in general. The sitting then closed.

### Note issue of the English Bank of the River Plate in Montevideo.

The following communication with regard to the responsibility of the shareholders for the note issue of this bank in Uruguay have been addressed by Dr. Alberto Nin, Minister of Uruguay, to the City Editor of the *Times*:

Sr.—The liquidator of the English Bank of the River Plate, in his report, published to-day in the financial papers, on the proposed reconstruction of that institution, says:—  
"The official receiver has been advised by counsel that in addition to this liability the shareholders are also liable in respect of the note issue of the Montevideo branch, amounting to \$160,000. This liability is not limited, but is, as counsel advises, unlimited."

I am a member of the Uruguayan Bar, and, as far as I know the Laws of my country, I would like you to allow me to say that the advice of the official receiver's counsel is not accurate.

The shareholders of a limited liability company are in no case liable for more than the subscribed capital.

Here is almost the literal transcription of the Law:—  
"The social mass [all its assets] composed of the social capital and its accumulated benefits, is only responsible [liable] in the limited liability company for the obligations contracted by its administration and management by legitimate persons, and under the form prescribed in its rules."

Neither are the shareholders of a limited liability company liable for the obligations of the company except to the value of the shares or

the interest that they may have in it.

By the Commercial Law of Uruguay it is impossible that a limited liability company can have any unlimited liability whatsoever, besides which the terms are contrary to one another logically.

A limited liability company that wishes to deal in banking matters in Uruguay is also subject to the Banking Laws, but these laws do not state any modification to the General Commercial Law with regard to the liability of the shareholders, or to any other common rule referring to this kind of company.

I consider the scheme prepared by the liquidator to be sound, and it is practicable; but I am compelled to make this correction on a technical point of law, because the error may lead the shareholders to accept it in the belief that their actual liability is greater than the uncalculated capital of the late English Bank of the River Plate—that is to say, more than \$750,000.—I am, Sir, your obedient servant,

The above letter was not published by the *Times*, but was referred to in the following terms in the City article of 1st March:—

Dr. Alberto Nin, the Minister of the Republic of Uruguay, writes to us taking exception to the statement of the official Receiver of the English Bank of the River Plate with reference to the unlimited liability of the shareholders in respect of the note issue, amounting to \$160,000. Dr. Nin is mistaken, in the first place, in assuming that the holder of a note of the English Bank of the River Plate could not recover the amount because the law of the Uruguay Republic would protect the shareholder in the event of bankruptcy. The branch of the English Bank of the River Plate at Montevideo is under the English law as regards the liability of the shareholders, the bank being registered in England. In the second place, Dr. Nin is probably not aware that the amended Joint-Stock Companies Acts hold banks unlimitedly liable in respect of note issues.

To these remarks Dr. Nin replied as follows:—

**To the Editor of the "Times"**  
Sir.—I am sorry that, instead of publishing my remarks, made in my letter of yesterday, you have only answered them, because, if by so doing you appear and will always appear to be right, the shareholders of the late English Bank of the River Plate will never be able to form an opinion of their own as to their obligations.

In order to evade the complicated question of private international law, in which we might compromise ourselves, to find out the reach and effect of English laws on the branch of the River Plate Bank in Montevideo, by the fact of that company being registered in this kingdom, I wish to concede to you the issue of the question.

But you must recognise that acts are ruled by the law of the country in which they take place, and, naturally, as the issue of notes (which, it is said, unlimitedly obliges the shareholders) has been made in Montevideo, and not in England, you will see that the case must be examined and resolved upon by the Uruguayan laws, which, as I told you, do not state that shareholders must bear any unlimited liability in any limited liability company.

The Joint-Stock Companies' Act of this kingdom will apply to companies that issue paper money in this country, but you will grant that they have no power over other countries.

Passing to the facts, I believe that the official receiver might have been more explicit about this business, and to have mentioned, besides the opinion of the counsel, a few details of no little importance, about the English Bank of the River Plate in Montevideo, and which lead to the belief that, even applying the Joint-Stock Companies' Acts, the shareholders would not be prejudiced.

The Montevideo branch is perfectly solvent, and if they have liquidated, it was only because of the failure of the head office in London. Now, if the Montevideo branch pays, as it appears it will, all its Montevideo creditors, including the note issue holders, I fail to see what further obligation the shareholders have other than for the uncalculated capital.—I am, Sir, your obedient servant,

The above letter did not appear in our contemporary, and Dr. Alberto Nin sends it to us for publication, with a further letter addressed to ourselves, which we insert as under:—

**To the Editor of the "SOUTH AMERICAN JOURNAL"**  
Sir.—A few of the shareholders of the late English Bank of the River Plate, Limited, who are supposed to be unlimitedly liable for the \$160,000 worth of notes issued by the Montevideo branch, urge me to further elucidate that legal question and, as I am not peculiarly interested in the before-named bank

I have considered it a duty to accede to their request.

Therefore, I beg you, Mr. Editor as you are kindly inserting my contra-reply to the *Times* of the 1st inst., and which that paper did not think worthy of publication, to have the goodness to publish also these lines as an amplification of that contra-reply, and because I think that this letter, as well as my last, shows the inconsistency of the *Times*' remarks.

To begin with, I might as well say that the origin of the question is the wish of the liquidator to call a general concourse or meeting in London, which meeting shall include all the branches of the English Bank of the River Plate in other countries. Now, this idea of the liquidator, although very laudable, is practically impossible, as you will see.

The Uruguayan law says:—  
"The declaration of failure pronounced in a foreign country cannot be invoked against the creditors that the bankrupt may have in the State, neither to dispute the right that they may pretend to have upon the existing assets within the territory, nor to annul the acts that may have been made with the bankrupt."

When the bankruptcy is declared by the Tribunals of the Republic the claims of the creditors that belong to the meeting formed in the exterior will not be taken into consideration, except in the case of the creditors of the Republic being paid integrally, and that there should be a surplus.

For that purpose the official receiver of the meeting formed in the Republic will put himself in communication with the official receiver of the foreign meeting.

The Argentines have an identical law, and I suppose that amongst the English laws there must be an analogous one, as nations always try to favour their own subjects in all conflicts with strangers, apart from the dominant principles between them of jurisdiction and authority.

Well, now, can the creditors of the London branch, or those of Argentina, pretend to make the situation of the shareholders worse because the Montevideoan creditors receive twenty shillings in the pound, and they less, or vice versa?

Surely not, and simply, Mr. Editor, because it is inevitable that, let the law of this kingdom say what it will, in Uruguay or in Argentina it is possible, as a fact, that the creditors there may be paid integrally, or that they may receive more than the English creditors receive here, or that the Montevideoan note issue holders are only paid, provided that it is done with the money of the Montevideoan branch.

Now it appears that the note issue holders will be paid in Montevideo, where the issue was made, and where, although it were not so, there would be no right to compel the shareholders to pay more than the full amount of the subscribed capital, not only because there is no such thing as unlimited responsibility in a limited company, but because a special meeting would have been called excluding creditors of houses in foreign countries. If it were not so, the enormity would result, that the Montevideoan creditors would be played with by a game of "Heads I win, tails you lose."

But, Mr. Editor, as we have now brought the question down to absurdity, which is used in logic to test the truth, we should see that, if the Montevideoan note issue were not paid, it would be their holders, and not other common creditors, that would come to England to ask for the application of the Joint-Stock Companies' Acts which the *Times* informed me contained a rule by which creditors are favoured (for the fact of their being note issue holders), and giving them the right to pursue unlimitedly the shareholders of a limited company.

This is the last word of the question, and should dispel all doubts, if I had not already clearly shown the error in which the counsel of the official receiver had fallen and which the *Times* accepts.—I am, Sir, your obedient servant,

### SUNDRIES.

We reproduce to-day the correspondence published in the *S. A. Journal* by Dr. Alberto Nin, respecting the note issue of the English Bank in Montevideo, Dr. Nin, it will be observed, takes exactly the same view as we did in our article of March 5, namely that the note issue cannot be converted into an extra or unlimited liability for the shareholders and his reasons are the same as ours. No doubt this will encourage the shareholders to resist the extra call. It seems evident to us that the official Receiver—who in all

his proceedings seems to have ignored in an extraordinary manner the foreign status of the Bank and the foreign shareholders—has acted rather too hastily in making such a call solely on the strength of an English counsel's opinion. Certainly, it may assist the liquidation for the extra call to be made, but in that case it should be voluntary and not obligatory. So far as we understand the reconstruction scheme, that is the intention. We may add that, as we understand, the terms offered to the creditors in the reconstruction scheme we published yesterday, refer to English creditors, and are not applicable to creditors here, where the liquidation is being carried on under quite different conditions.

Yesterday's *Nacion* utters a tremendous cock-a-doodle-doo because the service of the first quarter of the forcibly reduced foreign debt is assured. It would have been a disgraceful thing indeed if it were not, and we can not see anything for the *Nacion* to crow about. Wait till the debt is fully redeemed, or until the original service is restored, as in common honesty it ought to be some day, and then the *Nacion* may crow.

A telegram from Rio Janeiro published yesterday states that a new political party, called the "National Republican Centre" has been formed there for the suppression of the military power. We hope the party will extend here, and will attain success, for the military have always been and still are the curse of the country, morally, financially and politically.

It is telegraphed from London that Mr. Herbert Vaughan, Catholic Bishop of Salford, has been appointed Archbishop of Westminster in place of the universally lamented Cardinal Manning. He may fill the post, but he can never replace the man.

There has been a temporary suspension in the publication of our amusing B. A. contemporary the *Crutch*, but it will reappear next Saturday, from the offices of Messrs. Ravenscroft and Mills, in a new and improved form. It was good before, but they promise to make it still better.

At the general meeting of the Buenos Aires C. C., held on Monday evening to elect a new Committee, the following was the result: President, R. Bridgett; Vice-president, J. C. Zimmerman; committee, R. Anderson, A. B. P. Boyd, G. Harker, J. Gifford, V. Ker-Seymer, A. Luce, D. J. Stokes.

The Third Tribunal of appeal has passed the sentence of 25 years imprisonment on Segundo Nougoy or Rosas, for an abominable cold-blooded murder committed in August 26, 1888. Nougoy, who was only 18 years old at the time of his crime, was originally condemned to death, but the Tribunal mitigated the sentence as above; though why they should have done so, we fail to see, for there was not a single extenuating circumstance. When he is 43 years old, Nougoy will be free to commit more murders.

The Minister of Government has issued a circular to the departmental Jefes Políticos, instructing them not to permit the entry into the country of demanated persons likely to become a burden on the Committee of Charity. It appears that many of these persons have been purposely sent across the border in order that they might thus be taken care of or although they are not natives of this country.

It should arouse the Government to the condition and defects of our Port, which has already cost so many millions, when vessels like the *Wordsworth* remains for days stuck in the mud in the channel and a squadron like that of the United States cannot come here but must remain at La Plata. These facts are discreditable to our port and to the Government and some one should look into the matter and see what can be done in the premises, because, vessels will not continue to come here with a good chance that they will have to wait for weather and water in order to sail. Montevideo has not yet settled upon her port plan and she should take warning from us and adopt the best plan independent of the personal interests. Commerce should not be taxed and oppressed in order to make any ring rich.—*B. A. Herald.*

The Chamber of Senators has accepted the offer of the *Siglo* for the free publication of the official reports of their debates.

Yesterday's telegram from Buenos Aires was again full of revolutionary alarms, and it was stated that the authorities were taking energetic measures.

It is stated that Government has at last resolved to suppress that absurd and useless publication the *Diario Oficial*, which costs the State some \$10,000 the year without rendering a single service in return, and the institution of which was due to a scandalous bit of favoritism.

Yesterday being the anniversary of the revolution of Quabracu, when a number of lives were sacrificed in a fruitless attempt to overthrow the power of the despot Santos (supported as he was by the majority of the noble Uruguayan army)

memorial services were held in San Francisco Church, and were largely attended.

It is stated that Directorate of the National Bank have instructed Dr. J. P. Ramirez (solicitor to the Bank) to prepare for publication a report of the proceedings connected with the "Special Account."

According to the Reason the Bill concerning the naturalisation of foreigners, prepared by Dr. M. Rodriguez, was read before a group of deputies on Wednesday evening, receiving their approval, and will shortly be presented to the Chambers. The terms of it are not yet made public.

Dr. Eduardo Basavilbaso had been appointed Minister of Finance. The Government engineers have, by soundings, discovered a natural channel near the Uruguay coast opposite Martin Garcia which terminates near the Argentine coast, and in a distance of eight kilometres maintains a depth of from 17 to 19 feet.

The following gentlemen have been named Directors of the Conservancy office: Sres. Marcelino Ugarte, Alberto Casares, Luis P. Molina and Ventura Cárdenas.

We are informed that the "Quilmes Sunday School" have undertaken to maintain at their sole expense a children's cot in the British Hospital, to be called the "Quilmes Sunday School Cot." This is a very gracious and thoughtful undertaking on the part of the little people of Quilmes.

The Manager of one of the principal railway received a few days ago an anonymous letter announcing that a Society has been formed for destroying the railway telegraphs unless the passenger fares are reduced within 15 days, and it appears that on Saturday the wires on the railway were cut in two places, in the district in which it was stated that the Society's operations would be carried on.

The Attorney General of the Nation advises the Government that the Manager of the Ensenada Railway should be informed that he must obey the directions of the National Railway Board, notwithstanding any opposing claim of jurisdiction by the Provincial Government, the law creating the Board and defining its powers being a law of Congress, which is paramount all over the Republic.

The President of the Local Board of the Buenos Aires and Rosario Railway has sent a note to the General Railway Board inviting its consideration of the decree of the Provincial Government imposing a tax on railway tickets, and pointing out that the decree is opposed to the principles of the National Constitution, to clauses 1 and 2 of the General Railway Law (inasmuch as it claims that national railways are subject to Provincial jurisdiction) and to the rights and privileges conferred on the Buenos Aires and Rosario Railway Company by the laws relating to its concession, which exempt it from all imposts, national as well as provincial.

It is stated that the Provincial Government has resolved not to enforce the railway-ticket tax, which was to have come into operation on April 1st and that a decree to that effect will be issued.

On the 14th instant, the Nation published a portion of a letter from Baron Hirsch to his agent in this Republic stating that through the negligence of his agents some hundreds of Jews, useless for work, had been sent to Buenos Aires, and that they must be sent back again to serve as an example to those who, without labour has been found for them in the Argentine Republic. This has drawn forth a telegram from the Moseville Colony, at Palacios station, declaring that Baron Hirsch must have been misinformed concerning the condition of that colony and of Moseville colony; that the latter has been formed for ten months but the land has not yet been allotted to the colonists, and they have not received any implements for working it. They are lodged in miserable tents and nothing has been done to enable them to begin work. The colonists worked as peons during the harvest, and many of them have been employed by Messrs. Carlsen and Schultz, of Belgrano, on their buildings at Moseville. About two months ago Mr. Cullen visited the colony and gave orders for the colonists to be put in a position to work, but, unfortunately, he met with a serious accident from which he has not yet recovered, and none of his orders have been carried out.—B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES

On Saturday, February 27. In the Commons yesterday the Belfast Corporation (Lunatic Asylums, &c.) Bill, which came on for second reading, was strongly opposed by the Irish Nationalist members.

Mr. Courtney admitted the awkwardness of the position—Belfast proposing a private Bill and the Government a public one. A motion for adjourning the debate was negatived by a majority of 12 only—143 to 137. Ultimately the Bill was read a second time and referred to a Hybrid Committee as a compromise. The motion to expel Mr. De Cobain was brought forward by Mr. Balfour, and agreed to. Mr. Herbert Gardner submitted an amendment declaring that school-rooms in receipt of Parliamentary grants should be at the disposal of both political parties, on reasonable terms, when not required for educational purposes. On behalf of the Government, Sir W. Hart-Dyke accepted the principle of the amendment, and made concessions. Some discussion afterwards arose as to whether a Bill had been promised, and in the result the amendment was carried without alteration. Mr. Balfour moved for leave to introduce a Bill to amend the Procedure with respect to Private Bills in Scotland and Ireland. Mr. Healy was speaking against the Bill when at midnight the debate stood adjourned.

Under the direction of Lieutenant Colonel William Smith, Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General for the Home District, some fifty volunteer officers yesterday commenced a course of practical instruction in technical military operations near Horsham. The proceedings were practically an illustration of the war game in the open, and will be continued to-day.

A Berlin Correspondent telegraphs that the disturbances were renewed there yesterday. Repeated charges were made by the police to disperse the crowds, and in the scuffles that took place the police freely used the flats of their swords. In the afternoon the Emperor rode down the Avenue of Unter den Linden, accompanied by two aides-de-camp and two grooms. He was received with cheers by the crowd, which pressed so closely upon him that only just enough room was left for his horse to pass.

On returning from his ride in the Thiergarten he was hooted by a band of ruffians, who were, however, quickly dispersed by the police. All responsibility for the riots is disclaimed by the Socialists, and they are without particular political significance.

Dr. Valkovitch, the Bulgarian Diplomatic Agent in Constantinople, has succumbed to the stab dealt him by the hand of an assassin.

A remarkable divorce suit came before Sir Charles Butcher yesterday. The petitioner was a medical practitioner named Erskine, living in Chelsea, and he sought relief by reason of his wife's alleged misconduct with a jobmaster, of Earl's court-road, against whom damages were claimed. The hearing of the case was adjourned.

Mr. Horatio Bottomley applied to Mr. Vaughan, at the Bow-street Police-court yesterday, for advice as to the best means of compelling the attendance of certain witnesses on Monday next, when the hearing of the charge against himself and Sir Henry Isaacs, in connection with the Hansard Union, is to be commenced. One of the witnesses, he said, was Evans Broad, who was engaged in a Parliamentary contest in South Derbyshire. Mr. Vaughan told the applicant he could apply for an adjournment of the hearing when it had been opened, if the presence of the gentlemen mentioned was necessary to his case.

Allard, the Belgian "strong man," who was recently charged under the Criminal Law Amendment Act with procuring his own wife for an immoral purpose, was yesterday committed for trial from the Westminster Police-court for procuration, assault, and conspiracy. The evidence went to show that the prisoner used letters written by men to his wife, in her character as an immoral woman, for blackmailing purposes.

A GREAT FORTUNE. The £1,764,000 of Mr. W. H. Smith is the greatest fortune made in recent years out of the newspaper business. It far exceeds the £563,000 of the late Mr. Edward Lloyd, of the Daily Chronicle, and the £375,000 of Mr. Joseph M. Levy, of the Daily Telegraph. It also far exceeds the fortune of any publisher, the nearest approach being the £520,000 of Mr. G. W. Petter, of Cassell & Co. Great as it is, Mr. Smith's estate ranks only sixth among the personalities of the last six years. Baron de Stern and Mr. Hugh McCalmont both left more than three millions; Mr. John Rylands and Mr. Junius Morgan both more than two; while Lord Wolverton's estate slightly exceeded that of the late member for the Strand, who had snuk large sums in the purchase of landed property before his death.—Star.

NEWEST MODE OF BURGLARY. The other day a gentleman in a workman's suburb found a stranger ascending his staircase, who, without betraying any emotion, said he had come about the repairs. "Oh, yes," replied the owner, "but I am in a hurry to keep an engagement just now. Come out with me, and I'll tell you what I want done." The two walked out together, the householder talking about water-pipes and tanks, and the stranger answering with a glossiness that showed considerable experience, until they came to a policeman when the former at once gave the pretended plumber into custody for being in his house with ulterior intent. Upon him were found the usual instruments of the burglar's business, and when taken to the police station he was soon identified as an expert crib cracker, who was already wanted on several charges

of housebreaking and burglary. People will do well to view with suspicion men who come to their dwellings to do repairs which have never been ordered.—Daily Telegraph.
