

The international Commission of boundaries with Chile has had to suspend its operations in the Cordillera in consequence of the intense snow. The Chilean Commissioner, Sr. Bertrand, a notability is coming here on a visit by invitation of the Government.

Government will propose to Congress to issue nickel coins of 20, 10 and 5 cents, also more copper coins of less weight. Coins to the nominal amount of \$1,000,000 would cost only \$100,000.

LONDON NOTES

Yesterday's sitting of the House of Commons was occupied with discussion on the Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1891, Amendment Bill, which provided for the reinstatement of evicted tenants. The Bill, which was supported by all sections of the Irish Home Rule party, was thrown out on the motion for second reading by 220 votes to 144, a majority of 76.

Mr. John Morley, addressing a public meeting last night at Sale, organised by the Cheshire Liberal Federation Council, said he did not believe that the Government knew when the dissolution would take place, but it might dissolve Parliament before September rather than face the difficulty of passing the Irish Local Government Bill if the Government made up its mind to proceed with the Bill, it would encounter the most resolute resistance so worthless a measure deserved, and the forms of Parliament allowed. With respect to English questions, Mr. Morley said that the fabric of popular local government still remained to be constructed, but Parliament would never be able to tackle the tasks awaiting it until Irishmen had been left free to do their own business in their own country; that was the first great political necessity.

Mr. Stanfield, M.P., presided last night over the annual meeting of the Home Rule Union, held at the National Liberal Club. In the course of his speech he referred to the introduction of the Irish Local Government Bill, and expressed his conviction that, by hook or by crook, the Government would find an excuse for going to the country before the end of the session. The meeting was afterwards addressed by Mr. P. W. Claydon, Mr. T. Lough, Mr. H. Holiday, Mr. Costelloe, and others.

Speaking at Wigan last night, on behalf of the candidature of Mr. Aspinwall, Sir George Trevelyan expressed himself as being in favour of the direct representation of labour in Parliament, with the payment of members. In cross-examination before the Theatres and Music Halls Committee of the House of Commons, Mr. Fardell caused some surprise by practically throwing over the County Council and stating his opinion that it was not the most desirable body to be entrusted with large licensing powers. He preferred a State officer or department responsible to Parliament. Mr. Fladgate followed with evidence as to the wishes of the theatrical interest.

The case of some of the opponents of the proposed new railway from Sheffield to London, so far as it affects property at the St. John's Wood terminus, was opened before the Committee of the House of Commons yesterday. A deputation waited yesterday upon the President of the Board of Trade to ask for support for the Merchant Shipping Bill now before Parliament. The Bill deals with such matters as the lead line and seamen's food. Sir M. Hicks-Beach expressed sympathy with its principles, but indicated points on which in his opinion it required amendment. The Lord Mayor last night entertained the Welsh members of Parliament at a dinner at the Mansion House, and in proposing the toast of "The Welsh M. P.s." expressed his intention to hold during his term of office a national Welsh banquet at the Mansion House, to which representative men of all classes in the Principality would be invited. We learn from Melbourne that some suspicious circumstances have come to light which the police think may point to the commission of another murder by Deeming. It has been discovered that a man passing under the name of Lawson, one of Deeming's well-known aliases, went to the Cape from Australia with a man named Keays in 1888, and subsequently wrote to friends at Sydney announcing the death of Keays at the Transvaal goldfields. The belief is that Keays was murdered. The steamer with the prisoner on board arrived at Adelaide yesterday, when Press representatives were deemed known of the discoverer at Rainhill. Ravachol, the man already sentenced by default to death for murder, and supposed to be the perpetrator of the dynamite outrage in Paris on Sunday, was arrested yesterday in

that city. He violently resisted the police-officers, and could not be pinioned with the assistance of fewer than fifteen men. Yesterday orders were issued for the expulsion from France of forty foreigners suspected of Anarchist tendencies. Colonel North won the Northamptonshire Stakes yesterday with Colorado, Burnaby being second, and White Feather third. Of the other events at the same meeting, the Rothschild Plate went to Lord Penrhyn's Noble Chieftain, the National Hunt Flat race to Mr. Barclay's Bohemian, the Kelmarsch Plate to Mr. Marshall's Crackberry, the Wellington Plate to Mr. Popham's Succulent, the Auction Plate to Mr. T. Jennings, jun's Neiphile, and the Buccleuch Heavy-Weight Handicap to Mr. Hammond's Savage. At Lingfield Mr. G. Wilson won the Grand National Steeple-chase with Rosalind.

The six prisoners who are indicted for being concerned in the alleged Anarchist plot at Walsall were placed upon their trial at the Stafford Assizes yesterday, the Attorney-General leading the prosecution. The proceedings will be resumed to-day. In the Queen Bench Division yesterday, Mr. Strat, sanitary inspector of the Board of Works for the Strand district, obtained judgment for 75l. in addition to 5l. paid into court, against Mr. Kellaway, a builder in the neighbourhood of Theobald's-road, for false imprisonment and malicious prosecution.

A breach of promise case was heard in the Queen's Bench Division in which the plaintiff was Miss Mercer, a cook in the service of an ironmonger at Camberwell, while the defendant was Mr. F. J. Thomas, who had been a shopman in the same service. The parties had walked out together for five years, and then the defendant married another. The jury awarded the plaintiff 100l.

Dealing at the Thames Police-court with charges against Jeremiah Cronin, otherwise John Gladding, of failing to report himself to the chief officer at New Scotland-yard on his liberation from Wormwood Scrubs Prison, and of failing to notify his change of address. Mr. Mead ruled that the Commissioner of Police is called upon to consider every case of this kind upon its merits, and is not entitled to make one general rule. The first charge would therefore be dismissed, but for failing to notify his change of address the prisoner would be committed for a month's hard labour.

According to the Registrar-General's report, the deaths registered in London last week (1,744) were 93 below the average for the week, and the death rate per thousand per annum only 21.3. The principal decline was in the deaths from diseases of the respiratory organs, the total being only 466, as against 523 in the previous week. The deaths primarily attributed to influenza—80 and 35 in the preceding two weeks—were 70 last week.

A Little Bit of Scandal.

(A SHORT STORY.) The small provincial town which, for want of a better name, I will call Bridgeton was possibly no worse than others of its size and character in the matter of meddling with every one's business, still, it was bad enough. The fact was that few of its inhabitants had sufficient occupation; they were chiefly of the class which never finds anything to do.

The residents were retired officers, with families in excess of means; maiden ladies, elderly married couples, a very few bachelors long past their first youth. These, with the clergyman, the lawyer, and the doctor, made up the society of Bridgeton. The shopkeepers were social among themselves, but a hard and fast line excluded them from all save business communication with those whose names were unaltered by connection with trade.

Bridgeton might not compete with other towns in regard to its prosperous commerce, the gaiety of its streets, or the brilliancy of its festivities; in one particular, however, it was second to none. Search England (or any other country) from end to end, traverse its length and its breadth if you will, but you will find no town in a more thriving condition than Bridgeton in respect of gossip. The quietest whisper in the ear of a friend would become there as public as any newspaper advertisement within the space of twenty-four hours. It would besides have gained so much in volume and significance as to come like a surprise to its originator, whereas a newspaper paragraph does remain pretty much what the writer intended—excepting for certain printing errors which may obscure the sense!

The ladies of any community always get credited with the greatest gift in gossip, but personal study of the question causes me to yield the palm to the men. Produce an unoccupied man in a country town, and a woman with nothing more than her household duties and her toilet on her mind—the nobler creature is bound to win in the matter of gossip. How could it be otherwise? She—the woman—chats with an intimate friend over afternoon tea; he—the man—has his club, where he meets two or three dozen acquaintances, all more or less bored by Arcadian life, all short of a job, all snatching eagerly at some news about somebody else.

It is fatiguing to trace a scandal to its first beginning; still, when it has been done now and then with success, it will be more often found to have started on its career from a country-town club than from any old maid's tea-table. So now to the particular bit of scandal of which I propose to furnish the biography. The Rosery, Bridgeton, had been to let some six months without any sign of getting a new tenant, when, upon a certain fine day, a carriage standing at its gate seemed to indicate that some one had at length accepted the house-agent's invitation to view the premises.

Major Burton was passing at the time with Colonel Coltham, and this being passed on from one to another, the entre town was talking that evening of the incoming tenant. The only little difficulty lay in the diversity of opinions. Some said that the house was let to a gentleman with a large family. Some declared that a widow and her son had taken it on a seven years' lease. Some were certain that its inmate was to be a person of vast fortune, but deranged in mind, and safely guarded by two male servants, who were really "keepers," though innocuous.

Every body was right in one particular. The Rosery was let that same July day. Every one was wrong as to the new tenant, for, in due course, it proved to be one solitary lady, neither old nor very young, and not even insane. The secret of her name was not long a secret. She was Mrs. Dunbar. The men at their club began raking up every sleeping memory of any Dunbar they had known or met, or heard of.
