

issue of 1,200,000. Metropolitan Consolidated Stock, carrying interest at 2 1/2 per cent. per annum. A long debate took place on a recommendation of the Public Health Committee in favour of giving substantial compensation in the case of seven public-houses and four beer-houses within the Boundary-street area.

The Duke of Fife presided yesterday evening over a public meeting held at the Polytechnic, Regent-street, on behalf of the adoption of the Public Libraries Act in Marylebone. The speakers included Mr. Goschen, who expressed the opinion that, though the rates were a burden free libraries would benefit the social life of the people; and Sir John Lubbock, who declared that free libraries and education were not an expensive but a profitable investment.

Mr. George Fox's new grand opera 'Nydia' was produced at the Crystal Palace yesterday. A Rome Correspondent telegraphs that Signor Giolitti has been entrusted by the King with the formation of a Ministry. The present crisis, our Correspondent says, has been useful in impressing upon public opinion and upon politicians the absolute necessity of reducing the military burdens of the country.

Sentence of death has been pronounced upon the two men tried in Constantinople for the murder of Dr. Vukovitch, the Bulgarian Diplomatic Agent in that city. Two accomplices, who are known to be in Odessa, were sentenced by default to fifteen years' hard labour; a request that the Court should take steps to obtain their extradition being, however, rejected. An appeal will be made against the capital sentence passed in the two former cases.

Deeming, according to a Malbourne telegram, has confessed to the chaplain of the gaol the murder of his wife at Windsor. He says the crime was committed at the bidding of his mother's spirit, and that he had made several previous attempts to take the woman's life. He professes to know nothing of the manner in which his victim was buried.

M. C. C. and Ground won their match at Lord yesterday with Lancashire by ten wickets. In the Cambridge Freshmen match, Mr. Hill's side secured an eleven wicket victory over Mr. Jackson's Progress also made with the match Oxford University Eleven v. Sixteen Freshmen, the Freshmen being now 191 runs to the good with six wickets to fall. The Nottingham and Yorkshire Colts match had to be left drawn.

On taking his seat in the Divorce Division yesterday to try undefended divorce suits, Lord Justice Lopez remarked upon the feeling that there was a vast amount of collusion in these cases, and said that he should require the strictest proof before making a decree. Subsequently he granted a decree nisi to Mr. Joseph Parker Wheelton, whose wife had lived for some years with a Spanish nobleman.

During the hearing of a case at the Bowstreet Police-court, in which a young lady, Mary Agnes Illingworth, was charged with forging a post office order, a remarkable statement was made by the prosecuting counsel as to the proceedings of the accused. Letters from her were read, admitting the forgery of post-office date stamps and other matters. Eventually Miss Illingworth was remanded on her father's surety.

The deaths registered in London last week, 1,549, were 97 below the average for the week. The death-rate per thousand per annum was the lowest for some weeks past, being only 18.9. Deaths from measles and diphtheria were largely in excess of the average. Only 297 deaths were referred to diseases of the respiratory organs, or 51 fewer than the average. Eleven deaths were primarily attributed to influenza.

Between the 1st April and the 7th inst., the total receipts into the Exchequer amounted to 8,995,624, as compared with 10,197,210, in the corresponding period of the last financial year; and the expenditure to 11,366,732, as against 11,056,362. On Saturday last the Treasury balances stood at 2,946,934, and on the same date in the previous year at 5,275,803.

'Incalculable Room for Emigrants' is the title of an article contributed to 'The Forum' by Mr. Edward Atkinson, the well-known American writer on financial and economical topics. Mr. Atkinson's views on this subject are very concisely put by him in a little anecdote of how he once answered an English friend who suggested that, according to official reports, all the land in America is now about disposed of.

'My dear sir,' was the reply, 'I have not bragged yet, have I?' 'No,' answered, 'you are as modest a Yankee as I ever met.' 'Then,' said this authority, 'if you will send from England and Scotland intelligent and industrious men to occupy that portion of a single State of the United States by which it exceeds the Empire of Germany in area, comprising a little patch which will itself be larger than Great Britain, we will presently return to you from that now unoccupied territory the present cotton crop of the United States (then four million bales) and the present wheat

crop of the United States (then two hundred and fifty million bushels). We will support all the people who make these crops on what we do not export. Of course (continues Mr. Atkinson) I referred to the State of Texas, and to the counties mainly in the North-West, which are at present sparsely populated. I then remarked that on the north side of the Red River came the Indian Territory, of about fifty thousand square miles, together with No Man's Land, now called Oklahoma, which added together would make another productive body of territory of about the same area as Great Britain, which would ultimately be brought to the use of mankind.

THURSDAY, MAY 12. The House of Commons was occupied yesterday in discussing the Municipal Corporations Act (1882) Amendment Bill, which was backed by Tory members for Liverpool. Liberal speakers declared that the Bill was introduced with the object of enabling the Tories of Liverpool to jerry-mander the wards, with a view to preserve their supremacy in the City Council. Mr. Stuart Wortley, saying that the Government would leave the Bill to the free judgment of the House, announced that he should support it. The Bill was read a second time, after the Closure had been applied.

Mr. Bousfield, Q. C., Conservative, has been returned for North Hackney by a majority of 969. At the last election, in 1886, the Tory majority was 1,608. The poll was the heaviest ever known in the division, the Liberal vote being 580 larger than in 1886, when the party was united, and the Tory vote more by 1,133 than in 1885.

Speaking at Brigg, in Lincolnshire, last night, Mr. Labouchere, M. P., pointed to the reforms which the Liberal party would pass if they obtained a majority at the general election. He strongly condemned Lord Salisbury's recent incitement to civil war in Ulster.

Political meetings were addressed last night by Earl Spencer, at Banbury; Sir George Trevelyan, at Leamington; Mr. Stansfeld, at St. Pancras; Mr. Matthews, at Worcester; and Mr. Jackson, at Leeds.

A complimentary dinner was given last night at the City Liberal Club to Sir J. Lubbock, M. P. Mr. W. C. C. presided. The Earl of Rosebery and Sir T. Sutherland, M. P., responded to the toast of 'The Houses of Parliament.'

The Duke of Devonshire, addressing the annual meeting of the Women's Liberal Unionist Association yesterday, said he did not attach so much importance as Sir William Harcourt to a majority at the polls. Making further reference to Sir William Harcourt, he insisted that Liberals were rank deserters. After urging that it would be impossible for Mr. Gladstone to present a Home Rule Bill differing essentially from the last, he illustrated his opinion of Liberal promises by reference to cheap jacks, puffing prospectuses, and sham financial enterprises.

Lord Salisbury and Mr. Balfour yesterday afternoon received at the Foreign Office a representative deputation from the workmen's associations who are agitating for a legislative restriction of the working day to eight hours. Mr. George Shipton introduced the speakers, who expressed an intention of making the legal eight hours day a test question at the general election. Lord Salisbury, in reply, said that although they were unanimous in their desire for an eight hours day, they did not appear agreed as to the means by which their object should be attained. The object was estimable, but the matter required further discussion. No object obtained by violent methods could have permanent good results, and in warning them of the disastrous result which might follow the legislative restriction of the hours of labour, he urged them to be careful of the fearful interests they controlled. Mr. Balfour expressed his concurrence in the views of the Premier, and designated as rash any endeavour to carry out the object aimed at by means of the great parliamentary machine.

Replying yesterday to a deputation organized by the Bi-Metallic League, who waited upon Lord Salisbury, Mr. Balfour and himself, Mr. Goschen announced that the Government had received an invitation from the United States to consider the question of the unrestricted coinage of gold and silver, and as it did not bind the English or any other Government to details, they had decided to accept it.

Mr. Lionel Brough, Mr. Michael Gunnleson of the Gaiety Theatre and the Leinster Hall, in Dublin, Mr. Shelmerdine (surveyor to the Corporation of Liverpool), Mr. John Hollingshead, and Mr. Newsom Smith an accountant officially connected with several important music halls, were the witnesses called yesterday before the Theatres Committee of the House of Commons.

The Duke of Cambridge presided last evening at the annual festival of the German Hospital at the Hotel Métropole, when subscriptions in aid of the charity were announced to the amount of 2,862l.

In the absence of Lord Kelvin, on account of the death of his brother, Mr. W. E. H. Lecky presided last evening at the anniversary dinner of the Royal Literary Fund, held at the Criterion Restaurant. Donations and subscriptions to the amount of about 1,200l. were announced, including 100 guineas from the Queen.

A report was presented to the annual meeting of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to children held at the Mansion House yesterday afternoon, showing that during the year an enormous number of cases had been investigated, and that of the prosecutions 93.45 per cent. had been successful. The Lord

Mayor, the City Chamberlain, the Duke of Fife, Mr. H. H. Fowler, M. P., the Bishop of Rochester, Lady O'Hagan, Mr. Ben Tillet, and others commended the Society to public support.

A colliery explosion occurred yesterday at Rosslyn, in the State of Washington, by which between forty and fifty miners lost their lives. The cause of the disaster is unknown.

At Oxford yesterday the University Eleven made but a poor display of batting, with the result that the Sixteen Freshmen won the match by 157 runs.

Mr. Justice Stirling heard the case yesterday in which Mr. Gilbert seeks an injunction to restrain Mr. Sedger, lessee of the Lyric Theatre, from giving performances of 'The Mountebanks' at the Grand Theatre, Islington, there was an agreement between the parties as to performing rights in the opera in London, the provinces, and America, and the point to be determined was practically whether the 'Grand' is a London or a provincial theatre. Mr. Gilbert contending that it is a London theatre, and Mr. Sedger taking the contrary view. Judgment will be given this morning.

An action came on for hearing in the Queen's Bench Division, in which Mr. and Mrs. Tilkins, known in the musical and dramatic profession respectively as Ivan Caryll and Geraldine Ulmar, sued Mr. G. T. Greaves, as London Correspondent of the 'New York World,' for damages in respect of alleged libel. Evidence was heard, but was not concluded at the rising of the Court.

Some curious disclosures as to the practice of Customs officers were made at the Thames Police-court during the hearing of a summons against John Amos, a Customs House officer, charging him with detaining twelve ounces of tobacco and a bottle of Florida water belonging to a seaman. Mr. Mead took time to consider his decision.
