LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 22. The losses sustained in the storming of the Chagru Kotah heights are stated to have been 150 killed and wounded. Three British officers were killed.

Trafalgar Day was yesterday celebrated in London and several provincial centres. As last year, the Nelson Monument in Trafalgar square was made gay with evergreens and floral tributes, and the decorations were inspected by large crowds throughout the day.

It is now considered improbable that the shipowners of the Exchange Division, Liverpool, will run an independent candidate at the pending by-election The Unionists of the Division yesterday received a communication from the Conservative headquarters in London stating that the Government had promised to introduce a Bill next Session to revise the light dues on shipping from Barmsey news comes that during the prevalence of a thick fog on Wednesday evening Mr Pale Curran the Independent Labour candidate, met with a carriage accident. He was shaken but was able to resume canvassing yesterday.

Under the presidency of the Rev. Charles H. Kelly the annual meeting of the Metropolitan Free Church Federation was held yesterday at the Memorial Hall. A satisfactory report of the year's working was presented by the secretary, the Rev. J. Matthews. Resolutions were passed advising the electors to support Progressive candidates at the coming School Board election, and urging the Government to exercise their powers under the Conciliation Act to bring the Engineering dispute to a close.

A number of papers dealing with libraries and their management were read at yesterday's meeting of the Library Association. In the evening a conversation was held at the Institute of Painters in Water Colours.

The abuse of hospital relief in the out-patient and casualty departments was the subject of discussion at a conference held at St. Martin's Town Hall yesterday afternoon. The conference was called by the Hospital Reform Association, and was presided over by the Earl of Stamford.

In consequence of the outbreak of typhoid at Maidstone the West Kent Quarter Sessions were opened at Westminster Guildhall yesterday. There was a further diminution in the number of notifications received in the town in the course of the day.

A letter has been addressed under the Conciliation Act by Sir Courtenay Boyle to the parties in the Engineering dispute. It contains a proposed basis for a conference and settlement of the conflict. The main terms are that the men shall abandon their claim for the 48 hours week; that the employers shall agree not to interfere with Trade Unionism on the one side, and the men with the internal

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 23.

It is officially announced that the Queen has been pleased to confer the dignity of Viscount upon Lord Esher on his resignation of the office of Master of the Rolls; to approve of the appointment of the Lord Mayor of London as a Knight Grand Commander of the Most Eminent Order of the Indian Empire; and to approve of the re-appointment to the Council of India of Sir James Braithwaite Peile and Sir Alfred Comyns Lyall.

Speaking as the guest of the Manchester Ninety Five Club last night, Mr. Herbert Paul reviewed the political situation. As members of the Liberal party they wanted, he said, fewer leaders and more followers. Some Radicals followed Sir William Harcourt, and others pinned their faith on Lord Rosebery. Personally he was a Gladstonian. Mr. Gladstone's last Liverpool speech showed wonderful prescience and wisdom.

Sir Albert Rollit, M. P., presided yesterday at the autumn general meeting of the Association of Municipal Corporations held at the Westminster Palace Hotel. A resolution was adopted congratulating Mr. Bigham, Q. C., one of the Vice-Presidents of the Association, upon his elevation to the Bench. Subsequently various municipal subjects were discussed, including the Land Transfer Act, Borough funds, the housing of the working classes, and offensive trades in relation to the public health.

Under the presidency of Mr. H. E. Tedder, the closing meetings of the Library Association were held yesterday at the rooms of the Society of Arts, Adelphi. The progress of library work in the villages was the subject of a paper by Sir Edmund Verney, and, in the course of discussion, Mr. J. R. Boose, chairman of the Colonial Institute, pointed out that the Agents General for the Colonies would, if applied to, gladly supply village libraries with literature relating to the history, geography, and resources of Britain beyond the seas. In the evening the librarians and their friends dined at the Hotel Cecil.

Opinions expressed yesterday by leading employers and engineers point to the confident hope that the invitation to a Conference issued by the Board of Trade will be accepted by both sides—subject to certain modifications. As to the relations between the Engineering employers and the Federated Trades, Mr. Ritchie has agreed to receive a deputation of the Trades on Wednesday next.

An interesting account of the «Compulsory Labour Arbitration Act» and how it works in New Zealand was given last evening at the Essex Hall, Essex street by the Hon. W. P. Reeves, Agent-General for the Colony. Mr. Reeves, urged the necessity of making arbitration in all industrial disputes compulsory, and contended that there should be an enforcement of the awards by the State.
