POLITICAL NOTES.

THE AGITATIONS OF FRIDAY NIGHT.

What was it all about? Since our last issue went to press, the city has passed through a period of vivid political agitation and anxiety Precisely what it was all about no one seems to know even now, though the popular mind seems setting towards the belief that there was a conspiracy on foot—happily frustra ed—by the «collectivist» majority of the Chambers to depose Sr. Cuestas and the present government, supplanting him by a representative of their own party—perhaps Dr. Julio Herrera. They imagined they had command of sufficient force to carry out their decision and keep the people subdued, whilst Sr. Cuesias was to be kidnapped and sent as prisoner on board one of the national gunboats. We merely give this as the popular version, which is in part supported by certain facts, but still the whole frain from expressing the indignation which such an outrage, if real, would merit. We give below the best account we can of the princi pal events, and if our readers find it somewhat incoherent they must blame the mystery of the events themselves, which even our best informed native contemporaries are unable to explain clearly.

Interpellation in the Permanent

Commission. The Permanent Commission sat on Frida, afternoon, there being present Sr. Duncan Stewart, who presided, Sres. Julio Herrera, Espatter, Acosta y Lara, Montero, Vila and Perea. Only routine business was on the programme, but Sr Acosta y Lara made a lengthy speech calling attention to some of the phrases in the manifesto published by Sr. Cuestas accepting his candidature to the Presidency. In his opinion the references made in the manifesto to the sovereign will of the people, the duty of the public powers to conform to public opinion, and the fearlier of the people of the people of the people opinion. faculty of the people to pronounce sentence of treason on their governors were entirely heretical and subversive and a threat to and subversive and a threat to the stability of the constituted powers. Possibly these were merely political theories, but he regarded them as highly danger-ous, and, as he had reason to be lieve that they had been published with the sanction of the Cabinet, he moved that the Evenutive he called moved that the Executive be called upon to give an explanation.

Dr. Espalter declared himself a

warm partisan of the candidature of Sr. Cuestas, whose honest and reformatory administration had al-ready caused that candidature to the influence which, in a republic, public opinion should have in political decisions, and he himself had heard, that very morning, from the lips of Sr. Cuestas, a declaration that he contemplated nothing against the stability of the Chambers. He thought it time to assert the supreme authority of the Assembly and put a stop to the threats that were being issued against it.

Sr. Espelter explained that Sr. most closely concerned them. Dr. Julio Herrera supported Sr Acosta, and thought it convenient that Sr. Cuestas should make his explana-tions publicly and solemnly before the Commission. Sr. Perea proposed that three members of the Commission should visit the Pre-sident personally to hear his explanations. This was rejected.

After some further debate the motion of Sr. Acosta was put to the vote and was approved by the casting vote of Sr. Stewart It was at once communicated by special messenger to the Executive, who sent a brief reply to the effect that as the Ministers were not as sembled at that moment the mat-ter must be deferred until tomorrew (Saturday.) After some further discussion the Commission resolved to meet on Saturday to await the Ministers We are not yet in a position to state the result of this.

Rumored Attempt against

Dr. Julio Herrera. Soon after 6 p. m on Saturday rumors rapidly spread over the city that there had been an at-tempt on the life of the expresident Dr. Julio Herrera, it being said at first that he was killed, and afterwards that he was only wounded. These rumors drew a large crowd out side his house in Calle Canelones, which also readly filled with his which also rapidly filled with his friends and supporters. Dr. Herre-ra was not to be found there, nor did he appear until 7.30 p m when he drove up in his carriage safe a d well. How the rumor that he had been attacked came into circulation, no one knows, for nothing had occurred to give it the least foundation. All the evening there was a large crowd outside his doors, which were guarded by the police, and there was mare than one hostile demonstration, though we matter is so uncertain that we repeat it with reserve and re understand there is no truth in the where they made a hostile de understand there is no truth in the statement that the windows were broken. In the passage he had several men armed with revolvers to prevent an entrance.

In the Plaza Constitucion.

Meanwhile, public attention was also excited by the unusual police movement in the Plaza Constitucion Soonafter 6 p. m this was occupied by armed and m unted police of the Urban Battalion commanded personally by Col Galarza, and of the Squadron of Security. One body formed in front of the Ca-bildo, and the other on the opposite side in front of the Cathedral, but beyond stopping carriages they made no attempt to interfere with public transit. It also became known that there was a strong torce inside the Cabildo under the orders of the Prefect Sr. Dominguez, and that a force of some 600 men was concentrated in the Pavilion, consisting of the city police, who had all been drawn from their usual posts. These forces were kept on foot until midnight. Later in the night extra police forces arrived from outside, and mounted police patrolled the city throughout the patrolled the city throughout the night. The only explanation that can be given of this display of force, and that an uncertain one, is that it was to prevent the Chambers -or the *herreristas* - trom carrying out a coup against Sr Cuestas.

Administrative Measures, Arrests, etc.

A Cabinet Council was held during, Friday afternoon, After it was over, the Minister of War imparted orders for all the garrison troops to be kept in barracks, which ready caused that candidature to be accepted by the majority of the country (*No, no, *no from Dr. Julio Herrera.) Rumors have been current, but are not yet confirmed, that General Perez will resign the Portfolio of War and will be succeeded by Sr. Dominguez, Sr. J. Battle y Ordonez (editor of the Dia) replac ing the latter as Prefect.

Col. Bertrand, Chief of the 1st Cavalry, now stationed at Salto, was to have left the Capital on Friday evening, but received orders to suspend his journey until further notice.

Public Manifestations. The events related above at-

tracted an excited and anxious crowd to the Plazas Constitucion and Independencia. About 9 p m. the word was passed round to form an impromplu manifesta tion in favor of Sr Cuestas. This was soon done, Dr J. C. Blanco and Sr. Balle taking the ini-tiative the former haranguing the people from one of the benches. In less than quarter of an hour a column nearly 2000 strong was formed and marched in good order to ed and marched in good order to Sr. Cuestas' house, giving cheers for Sr Cuestas, peace and unity, Dr. Blanco, and the independent press, at times diversified by groans and smuerass for the Chambers, Dr. Julio Berrera and the collectivity a Sr. Cuestas and the collectivity. Sr. Cuestas appeared on his balcony, with some of his Ministers, and received a tremendous ovation. He addressed a few words to the people, thanking them for their sympathy and assuring threw of his intention to support their cause and give them an honest their cause and give them an honest and popular government When the croad were tired of cheering they broke up. Part of them accom-panied Dr Blanco to his house, in sisting on another speech, and part went down Calle Canelones Dr. Herrera. This spontaneous manifestation was one of the culminating notes of the evening, and another proof of the powerful sympathy Sr. Cuestas has

In the Plaza Constitution the Prefect Sr. Dominguez and the Minister of Finance Dr. Campistegui were also the objects of sympathetic manifestations and more than once the people even exchanged cheers with the Urban Battalion and other forces on guard. A large number of prominent citizens and officials were in the Jefatura in the course of the evening, expressing their readiness to support the Gov-ernment. Many also visited the President with the same object. It was nearly midnight before the Plaza recovered its usual calm.

Important Declaration. The Dia of yesterday contains the following declaration which may be regarded as more or less official: - The President of the Senate in exercise of the Executive Power conceives that the Assembly would commit a subversive act, contrary to the laws, should it proceed to the election of a new President. Consequently we can guarantee that such election would not be obeyed.»

Yesterday.

As our space is nearly exhausted, we must briefly condense the political events of yesterday The Permanent Commission met

in the atternoon, the Plaza still being under police guard Dr Julio Herrera, whose house still has to be protected by the police, drove up with a body guard of supporters. To prevent disorder the public were not admitted to the sitting. A brief Message from the Executive was read stating that the manifesto of Sr. Cuestas was not an of-ficial document but the priv-ate act of the citizen and candidate, and consequently the Ministers could not be called upon to give an explanation In any case it contained nothing contrary to the Constitution or the laws. It concludes by assuring the Commission that the Executive, in all cases, will know how to comply with its duty. On the motion of Dr Espalter it was referred to a special Committee, himself and Dr. Acosta being named for the purpose. The proceedings then terminated.

Various arrests were made yes terday, amongst others Col. Toledo, Col. Bernabé Herrera, the ex commissaries of police Marquez and Massioti, and others whose names have not transpired. The troops were kept in quarters and the extra police forces were still in evidence. There were animated groups in the Plazas, but otherwise matters seemed quieting

-The world's largest telescope is now in position at the Yerkes Ob-servatory in the University of Chicago Its object lens is 40 inches in diameter, this being the diameter of the clear aperture after allowing constituted of the usual two discs of different optical glass required to correct chromatic aberration. The mechanism of the driving clock, which, regulated to the same speed as the earth's rotation, but driving in the opposite direction, keeps the star in the field, is supplied with change gears for mean solar and lunarrates. It has a double conical pendulum, mounted isochronously after Protessor Young's suggestion, and tessor Young's suggestion, and makes sixty revolutions per min-ute. It is under electric control and an electric motor automatically winds the clock when a driving weight approaches a point near its limit of descent.


