The man who receives must settle that for hunself. There have been great men who were streng-thened - Pitt probably was - by never giving five minutes' thought either to expenditure or income-and there have been great men in whom economy was so rooted that if they left their keys at home they could not discuss public affairs with half their usual power. Of such, as legend tells, was the great Sir Robert Peel. We want both kinds of men, not one kind only in

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


