
LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 16. Polling took place in Deptford yesterday, to fill the vacancy in the Parliamentary representation caus-ed by the elevation of Mr. C. J. Darling to the Judicial Bench. The Conservative majority was reduced by more than 900, 5,317 votes being cast for the Conservative, Mr. A. H. Morton, and 4,993 for Mr. J. Williams Benn, the Liberal.

Addressing a meeting at Aber-deen last night, Mr. Bryce, M.P., reviewed the record of the Government, complaining that they had been weak in foreign policy, whilst their domestic legislation had been their domestic legislation had been innovating and provocative.
