### POLITICAL NOTES.

The present week already promises to be more exciting than the last, and has opened with an unusually lively stock of rumors, some of which have been in circulation since Saturday night. Of these three may be regarded as fairly reliable, if not semi-official. These are, that the vacant portfolio of Finance will be given to Dr. J. R. Mendoza—a sound man and Vice president of the Independent Colorado Committee; General Ricardo Estevan will be appointed to the long-vacant post of Chief of the Staff—an announcement that has not been well received for General Estevan is more feared than respected; and that General Perez will resign the Ministry of War at the end of the month no great loss for he may be regarded as the weak point in the Cabinet and one of the obstacles to a more decisive policy. Rumor, but of a less reliable character, is also busy with the name of a successor to General Perez, and for this General Casimiro Garcia, at present Commandant of the Northern Frontier, has been mentioned probably on the strength of his having been summoned to the Capital by the Government. This would have an even worse effect than the appointment of General Estevan. The *Dia*, however, says that the successor of General Perez will be a person deservedly esteemed in the army and outside it, whose appointment will have a very favorable effect throughout the country. This cannot mean General Garcia. Rumors have been current of the return of Dr. Campisteguy to the Cabinet, also of a general reconstruction of the Cabinet by a redistribution of portfolios, but we do not think they have very serious basis.

Yesterday, attention was concentrated on the Permanent Commission which was to sit to receive the Message of Sr. Cuestas in reply to its admission respecting the deportation of Herrera and Co. The latest version concerning the Message was that Sr. Cuestas undertook, in case the Commission insisted on the unconstitutionality of his action, to allow the exiles to return, but would charge the Commission with the responsibility of the consequences that might ensue. The text of the Message should be published to-day. At the moment of writing we are not yet aware of what passed, but it was not expected that anything would be done beyond referring the Message to a special Committee which would occupy some days in reporting, consistent with the idea of not precipitating a solution. President Cuestas visited the Cabinet shortly before the sitting of the Commission, and the Plaza was once more occupied by mounted police (Squadron of Security). This gave rise to some wild rumors, even of the long-wished for dissolution of the Chambers. These rumors were heightened by the statement that orders had been given to prepare the Pavilion for occupation of the Extramural Battalion which was once again to be called upon for police service in the city.

Another matter with which rumormongers have been busy is the departure for Florida, on Saturday night, of a company of 80 men of the 4th Chasseurs under command of Mayor Victor Canton, and for reasons which are reserved.

On Sunday anonymous placards were posted on the walls in various parts of the city, calling on the people to meet in the Plaza Constitution yesterday afternoon to prohibit the meeting of the Permanent Commission and to overthrow the Chamber. The placards concluded, "Long live the Triumvirate of Juan L. Cuestas, Juan José de Herrera and Rufino T. Dominguez. They are attributed to the notorious agitator Abdon Aráozeguy. The police promptly defaced them, which was hardly necessary, as nobody paid any serious attention to them.

Reviewing the events of last week, the *Siglo* says, referring to the rumors of an evolution on the part of the "collectivist" majority of the Chambers; "We do not believe in the sincerity of any 'collectivist' evolution. The 'collectivist' can only turn towards their own policy, towards the regimen which gave them their legislative seats and which would keep them there.... The public mistrust already felt in them would only increase in case of such an evolution as that now rumored, for they would have less prestige than ever after abandoning the candidature which they proclaimed as the only one to unite their votes. If they turned round now, they might turn round again on the eve of the election, provided they could dominate the situation." The *Siglo*, like ourselves, sees that no confidence can be placed in the "collectivity," whatever they may promise.

Turning to the economical situation the *Siglo* proceeds: "Meanwhile the financial equilibrium is getting worse; we are again in a state of crisis. The Customs receipts for September, October and November, or the first quarter of the Cuestas administration, show a shrinkage of some \$40,000 compared with the same months last year, and some \$230,000 compared with 1895 which was not particularly prosperous. (This comparison is not entirely fair, as the three months cited are better than the preceding three months of the Borda administration, both relatively and in comparison with preceding years.) Commerce, industry, in general all the inhabitants of the country and especially those of Montevideo, stand with their arms crossed awaiting the solution of political problems, which will declare if they can renew their tasks or if they must limit themselves to merely vegetative daily necessities. As a consequence of this general paralysis in which even the sworn enemies of politics are obliged to occupy themselves with politics, the revenues diminish, and the great arrears in budgetary payments increase in spite of the moralising measures which constitute the healthiest and most honorable capital of Sr. Cuestas' administration. Things cannot go on thus, people keep repeating. The political problems that paralyze everything must be solved with a firm hand, in order that the economical forces of the Republic may awaken and rescue it from the present stagnation."

Yesterday's *Tribuna* censures Government and people alike for the apparent lethargy into which they have fallen since the deportation of Dr. Herrera. A more vigorous attitude must be shown by both, it says, or else the country will be delivered over to the clutches of the "collectivity," and "in this oligarchical position are enshrined all the threats that can fall on an unfortunate country, inevitable civil war, ruin, depopulation, shame and hatred. And it is merely a handful of men who would condemn the country to this fate. This would be one of those humiliations which deny a nation the right to a future, and our young country has not yet incurred such an avatema."

A Decree has been issued from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs recognizing Don Tomás Eastman as Chargé of the Argentine Consulate-General during the absence, through ill-health, of Sr. Paunero. The Classifying Committee, appointed to examine the claims for live-stock requisitioned during the war, pursues its task, which is somewhat delayed owing to the slowness of some of the military commanders in sending in their reports. Up to the present some 400 claims have been presented, which include flesh of 80,000 oxen and 20,000 sheep, 9000 ox-hides 8000 sheepskins and 960 horses. In some cases the claimants state that their losses of live stock through the destruction of wire fencing have been greater than on account of animals seized by the troops.

A general and, it is added, thoroughly detailed statement is being prepared of the revenue

and expenditure of Sr. Cuestas' administration from August 25 to December 31st, and will in due time be given to the press for publicity. Sr. Cuestas has no intention of making a secret of the public finances, as was done by his predecessors.

Rumors of a "collectivist" origin say that it is intended to elect Dr. J. L. Terra President of the Senate on February 14 next.

Yesterday's *Dia* again occupies itself with the question of calling out the National Guard, saying that it would have a decisive influence for good in the presidential election. It asserts that the idea is favorably entertained by the Government, which is considering the best means of putting it into practice.

Writing later we can confirm the statement made above respecting the Message of the Executive. It has been referred to a Special Committee consisting of Drs. Terra and Acosta y Lara.

According to latest rumor General Perez will quit the Ministry of War shortly and his most probable successor is General Gregorio Castro.

### The Great Fire in the City.

One of the most serious fires which the London Fire Brigade have been called upon to deal with broke out on Friday afternoon, November 29, in Aldersgate and Cripplegate. The streets involved were Hamsell-street, Jewin-street, Nicholas square, and Well-street. A huge block, extending from Jewin street to Nicholas square, was in a very short time blazing fiercely, and several of the houses collapsed. The fire broke out in Hamsell-street, and worked its way, through the houses to Well-street. The latter is a narrow thoroughfare, and the flames leaping across it, the houses on the opposite side quickly became involved, the fire extending right and left up and down the street. Wellstreet was involved from end to end. At half past four o'clock the flames had worked their way from Jewin street into Redcross-street, and several houses in the latter thoroughfare were burning fiercely, and tears were entertained that the entire block of houses on the west side would be involved. Over 40 engines were at work. Messrs. Norman's paper factory at the extreme end of Well street was attacked just before half past three. The huge building was rapidly enveloped in flames, and was soon destroyed. At eleven o'clock Friday night the fire was still raging. Both sides of Jewin-street were burnt out, and both sides of Hamsell street were burning, while from Jewin-street to Jewin-crescent several warehouses were still enveloped in flames. Cripplegate Church, which is damaged, escaped the fires in 1547 and the great fire of London in 1666. Messrs. Klentch, of Cornhill, fire assessors, state that they estimate the loss by fire through destruction of buildings and contents at least £2,000,000. A later report says that about 290 firms have been burnt out, and that an expert's estimate puts the damage at nearly £5,000,000. The effect of the fire, which has practically destroyed many of the more influential houses in the feather trade colony, will cause an enormous upward tendency in the price of ostrich and other feathers. Up to Friday evening the prices had risen from 20 to 30 per cent., and both Paris and American markets, where business has lately been at a standstill, are likely to be unusually active. The loss to two of the principal feather firms in Jewin-street alone is estimated at upwards of £15,000.

### SUNDRIES

Our English compatriots in Buenos Aires have made a great outcry about the proposal to restore bull-fighting, which, as every one knows, is a very brutal and cruel sport that cannot be too strongly condemned. And by way of marking disapproval and giving a lesson in humanity to the Argentinians, there is to be a big pigeon shooting match, ten birds apiece, at Hurlingham. You see, bulls and horses have feelings, but pigeons have none, which just makes all the difference. Besides the bull does occasionally get his chance of retaliating on the man, and can even make things uncomfortable for him, whereas there is no danger in winging a pigeon. So, by all means, down with the brutal and dangerous sport of bull fighting and long live the noble, manly and courageous sport of pigeon shooting.

We learn that Alacran and Pitanga will represent the Buenos Aires turf in the Grand International to be run at Rosario in January next. It is possible other horses may also come but their names are not yet known.

Mr. U. Rogberg has been confirmed in the post of Consul for Sweden and Norway, which he has occupied in temporary character.

Berlin telegrams give it as almost a certainty that the Govern-

ment will obtain a large majority in the Reichstag in favour of the bill proposing an addition to the Imperial navy.

All is not gold with the Electric Tramway installation in Buenos Aires. The *B. A. Standard* says:—Numerous accidents have been caused already by the Electric Tramway overhead wires, although no serious damage has been done as yet. Now, all these accidents are of the same class as occurred in American cities North of the Equator during the early days of electric tramway installation, and undoubtedly ought not to have been possible. Low sagging and swinging telegraph wires are not allowable in proximity to trolley wires, and trolley wires should be protected by a guard wire, where necessary, running exactly overhead of the trolley wire some distance from it and strong enough to keep any sagging wires from coming in contact with it. If the telegraph wires came in contact with the trolley wire on a curve, being swung against it from the side by wind, then manifestly the telegraph or telephone wires must be re-located. The danger of death resulting from contact with the trolley wires or other wires which have made a contact with them, is, we believe, very small; but severe burns can be received, and it goes without saying that everything within reason should be done to prevent telegraph and telephone wires from in any way coming in contact with them.

Mr. Cyril Smith, son of the Rev. Dr. Smith, long chaplain of the Episcopal Church of Buenos Aires, has been appointed manager of the Paraguay Central Railway, vice Mr. E. J. White resigned.

The publication of "Captains Courageous" has served to call attention to a peculiar degree, to Mr. Rudyard Kipling's knowledge of the tenacity and cool daring of the fishermen of the Grand Banks. Critics seem to have forgotten that story of Kipling's boyhood which is eminently characteristic of the man who created Harvey Cheyne. When he was twelve he went, it seems, on a sea voyage with Mr. Lockwood Kipling, his father. Unfortunately, the elder Kipling became very sea sick, and went below, leaving the youngster to himself. Presently there was a great commotion overhead, and one of the ship's officers rushed down and banged at Mr. Kipling's door. "Mr. Kipling," he cried, "your boy has crawled out on the yard arm, and if he lets go, he'll drown." "Yes," said Mr. Kipling, glad to know that nothing serious was the matter, "but he won't let go."

The first class passengers arrived by the P. S. N. Co's. "Liguria" on Saturday evening were Mrs. Nugent and two children, Mr. M. L. Crespo, and Mr. T. W. D'Oliveira. 34 third class. For Buenos Aires, 33 first class, 13 second, 83 third.

We call attention to two advertisements from London, one for a factory manager experienced in the manufacture of beef extract, the other for agents for the Morse Manufacturing Company.

The musical event of this evening will be the Orchestral Concert of the Beethoven Society at the Solis Theatre, which will also be the farewell to Montevideo of the talented violinists Sr. and Sra. Gaos. This Concert has already been postponed several times, but on this occasion we believe it is really coming off.

The redecorated and reformed San Felipe Theatre will reopen on Thursday evening with the Italian Variety Company of Sr. Gaetano Cavalli. Performances will be in sections and at popular prices.

The weather continues to be as unsettled as the political situation.

The deaths have occurred of Sr. Luis Lerena Joanicó son of the well-known citizen Don Luis Lerena Lengua, and of Sr. Julio Lanza, son of the merchant of the same name. Both were young men of promise, and their early death has caused much sympathy. The death also occurred on Sunday of the Sra. Maria D. de Hardey, mother of the well-known merchants Sres. Beltran and Pedro Hardey.

When General Campos returned to Madrid from Cuba, unsuccessful in subduing the revolution, but nevertheless having met it with humane and civilized methods, he was received with silence and disfavor. Now that General Weyler returns equally unsuccessful, and his name stained with inhuman cruelties that are condemned by civilized nations, he is, the telegrams inform us given a tremendous popular ovation and is carried triumphantly through the streets. Spain appears to be proud of her butcher,

but such pride will not increase the regard in which she is held by other nations. Spain must learn to rely upon something better and more honorable than mere cruelty if she desires to hold her own in the march of civilization. The unenviable reputation for cruelty which Spaniards earned three centuries ago still clings, and apparently not without reason.

According to a Constantinople telegram, at a meeting of the Ambassadors the British Representative proposed the immediate evacuation of Crete by the Turkish troops, but the proposal was opposed by Germany and Austria, and consequently rejected.

In July next the steamer "Pol-lux" will leave Christiania on an Antarctic expedition. The crew will be exclusively Norwegian, and the Commander is Captain Borch Grewinch.

A Washington telegram announces the death of Mrs. McKinley mother of the U. S. President, from her recent attack of paralysis. It occurred on Sunday.

Prince Bismarck is confined to his bed with a severe attack of rheumatism which incapacitates one side of his body.

Sir M. Hicks Beach has made a speech—the telegram omits to state where—announcing that the time has arrived to march against Khartoum. Parliament will be asked to vote the necessary funds, to which the Egyptian Government will also contribute.

### BUENOS AIRES.

An apprentice at the Tigra Navy yard, named Currell, from Chacomos, was drowned in the River Lujan in front of the Navy Yard on Thursday evening. Half a dozen apprentices were bathing, all good swimmers, when young Currell was drawn under a pontoon by the strong current which had set in. A companion ran to the other end of the pontoon and dived for him but could not find him, and so far all searching has failed to recover the body. The currents in that river are so strong, variable and treacherous, that swimming should not be allowed without boats and life-buoys within easy reach.

The latest information regarding the death of Sr. Ramon Lista, the explorer, is contained in a telegram from Salta to the President of the Geographical Institute, and is as follows:—On the 20th of November Señor Lista left Oran, accompanied by an Italian named Alberto Marcoz, as secretary, and a peon after arriving at Miraflores they lost their way, and suffered from thirst to such an extent that Lista shot himself. His companions after wandering about for a few days found their way back to Oran, where they reported themselves to the police authorities and gave their version of the casualty. They were of course detained the general impression being that they murdered Lista.—*B. A. Herald.*

### LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 13.

In stormy weather the Queen and Court left Balmoral yesterday afternoon for Windsor. Her Majesty was apparently in excellent health and spirits.

Sir Charles Dilke, M.P., delivered a lecture last night to the Fabian Society on "The Empire." He indicated that his expectation of union between Great Britain and the Colonies was limited to the idea of arrangements for defence. Several interesting points were raised by questions to which the lecturer replied.

In the match at Sydney yesterday the Colonials won the toss, and Donnan and Trumper began the batting for New South Wales. A bad start was made, but when Fredale joined Donnan the bowling was mastered. Donnan was run out when he had scored 104. Fredale put together 93, and Mackenzie, one of the not-outs, has 81 to his credit. The total at the close of play was 804 for five wickets.

Attended by the Chancellor of the Exchequer and other members of the Ministry, the ceremony of nominating gentlemen to serve as Scriffs in the various counties of England and Wales took place yesterday at the Law Courts. There was a fairly large assembly of spectators. The proceedings were not as interesting or amusing as usual, the most noticeable feature this year being the large number of "confidential" excuses forwarded by persons who desired to escape service.

An appeal was yesterday brought by the proprietor of a paper called "Society" against a decision by which he had been liable in damages for libelling Miss Lottie Collins. Mr. Jelf, in stating the grounds of the appeal, said the jury had decided that an article which appeared in "Society" had gone beyond the bounds of fair criticism, but he should contend that this was not the case, and should urge, moreover, that the judge was wrong in allowing the issue to go to the jury.

The Lords Justices dismissed the appeal, deciding that it was a case to go to the jury.

After seven days hearing the case Bailey v Bailey was concluded in the Divorce Division yesterday.

Col. Frederick Robert Howell, of Prince of Wales-terrace, Kensington, and Mr. Thomas Cory, of Grayley-court, Reading, were charged at Bow-street Police court yesterday, with having, as directors of the National Bank of Wales unlawfully and fraudulently applied to their own use and benefit, 30,000, belonging to that company, the transactions in respect of which the charge was made took place as far back as 1890, when the National Bank of Wales look over the North Wales Bank.

Fines and costs amounting to over 62l. were yesterday imposed at Bow-street Police-court on Joseph Wallace, homoeopathic practitioner, of Albany-terrace, Regent's-park, for selling a poisonous drug (a preparation of acemine) without inquiry, without properly labelling the article, and without entering the fact of such sale in a book.

A woman named Florence Stansfield was charged at Westminster Police Court yesterday with having demanded money from Earl Carrington, with menaces. Letters received were forwarded by his lordship to his solicitors, and the woman was warned, but as she persisted in sending letters to him she was arrested. Mr. Dutton, who appeared for the prisoner, said he would admit that she had made a very serious mistake, and he apologised to Lord Carrington on her behalf. The prisoner was committed for trial at the Old Bailey.

Colston's birthday was celebrated in Bristol on Saturday in the evening the usual banquets were held. Mr. Weston Stevens presided at the Anchor dinner, the principal speaker being Lord Reay, formerly Governor of Bombay. He devoted his speech mainly to a review of foreign politics. At the dinner of the Dolphin (Unionist) Society, the Chancellor of the Exchequer addressed himself to a consideration largely of home affairs—referring to the "temporary reverses" of the party in recent bye-elections, Sir William Harcourt's letter respecting Middleton, and the dispute in the engineering trade; in the course of which he condemned the action of the leaders, who were seeking to introduce new Socialism, and who, if they had their wish, would proceed to the nationalisation of all industries, with the result that the employers in industrial occupations would be ruined as well.

A crowded audience assembled at Toynbee Hall, on Saturday, when Mr. Henry Arthur Jones delivered a lecture on the relation of the drama to real life. In the drama as in other arts, art, he said, was art because it was not nature, but because it was something quite distinct from nature. So called realism had made great advances in the novel, but it had, to a great extent, been repulsed on the stage.

The session of the Sunday Lecture Society was opened yesterday at St. George's Hall, Langham-place. Lord Hobhouse, the president, pointed out that the National Sunday League had had to come to the rescue of the society. He also referred to the fanaticism of the Lord's Day Observance Society, and to the novel and oppressive way in which an old statute had recently been put in operation. Afterwards Mr. A. M. Brice lectured on "André and the North Pole: a Problem of to-day."

At St. James's Hall, yesterday afternoon, the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes devoted his address to the subject of Sunday amusements. He read letters from Mr. Judge, of the Sunday Society, in favour of the removal of restrictions on Sunday entertainments, and contended that great danger would result from the approach to anything like the establishment of a "Continental Sunday."

Shortly before midnight on Saturday, while an omnibus was passing down Præd street, one of the wheels collapsed, with the result that the outside passengers were hurled into the roadway, and those inside were left struggling amidst broken glass. Of the 25 fares, about a half were more or less seriously injured, and were taken to St. Mary's Hospital, where their wounds were dressed.

The English cricketers at Sydney put together 324 runs on Saturday for the loss of seven wickets, to which McLaren contributed 142 and Storer 81. New South Wales in their first innings made 311.

In the Football League Championship on Saturday, Sheffield United, the present leaders in the competition, could only draw their match with Derby County, and this result afforded Aston Villa a chance of reducing the difference between the first two positions. The game was not lost to the Villa,

Under Rugby rules county championship matches were won by Yorkshire, Lancashire, and Cumberland. The chief thing in football in the South was the match in which Blackheath, after having a man injured, were beaten, for the first time this season, by Oxford University.

Judgment was given in the Chancery Division on Saturday, in an action brought against the First Lord of the Admiralty and others, for an injunction restraining them from trespassing on land forming part of the Mount Boone estate, near Dartmouth, which land, it was alleged, the Admiralty was desirous of acquiring as a site for a college for naval cadets. Plaintiffs complained that two mariners had, under the directions of the defendants, entered upon and staked out the land. The Court held that the defendants could not be sued as an official body, and dismissed the action with costs.

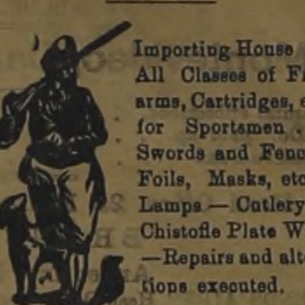
