POLITICAL NOTES.

There is still a great absence of definite news respecting any of

the pending political problems.

The Chambers do not sit.

It is almost a month since the Representatives met, and they now have to fill up two vacancies caused by death Our contemporaries point out how the substitutes for these and other vacancies occurring in the two vacancies occurring in the two Chambers are without exception all pronounced «collectivistas,» showing how carefully their plans had been laid to fill up gaps in their parliamentary ranks. The «collectivity» is like a hydra headed monster; cut oil one head and two more ster; cut oil one head and two more stering torth in its place. This alone spring forth in its place This alone shows what an utter mockery has been made of the sulfrage. Speaking of the suffrage reminds us that the question of electoral reform has once more fallen out of sight-not even the oft promised Committee Report has appeared We are not in the least surprised, for we knew that every excuse would be made to shirk it. The collective majority in the Chambers have already broken their faith as regards a presidential candidate, and now they seem likely to do the same as regards electoral reform, which, it will be remembered was the cardinal clause of the peace compact. They have had peacely compact. They have had nearly three months, time enough at least to have begun, if not to have concluded, the discussion for the topic was no novelty. Perhaps they are waiting for the blancos to proclaim another revolution to entorce compliance with the compact

Reports continue to be absolutely contradictory respecting the con-flict between the Executive and the Permanent Commission over the banishment Decree. The only thing certain seems to be that the matter will not be hurried. Sr. Cuestas, we understand has until next Sat urday, to reply to the Resolution of the Commission. Accordingly to busily circulated reports of a *herrerista» origin, he will then haul down the flag by revoking the De cree and allowing the exiles to return. The Nacional publishes account of an interview with a «collectivist» number of the Com mission, whose name it reserves, according to which Sr. Cuestas will yield all along the line, restoring the exiles to their places, bowing to the illegitimate authority of the Chambers defend ing them from further assault, and finally, in March next, meekly finally, in March next, meekly handing over the command to a president of «collectivist» choice. The people, of course, will not have a word to say in the matter—they never enter into the calculations of the «collectivity.»—All this may be taken very much cum grano salis; the object of it is obvious. On the other hand, the Nactonal and the Dia, both well-informed in political questions, assert positively on their own account that Sr. Cuestas will not only maintain his attitude as regards the banishments, but will doubt. The present week, they say, will be as sensational, politically, as last week. For our part, we can only say that if Sr Cuestas does now allow the exiles to return, he will show a fatal weakness which will cause the withdrawal of all the hopes and

confidence reposed in him, and will plunge the country into a worse state of agitation and inquiet ude than ever.

It is equally impossible to learn anything definite concerning the presidential problem. Every day we hear of conferences meetings and plans, but they all seem to leave the matter just where it was. The majority of the «collectivity» remains immovable, and the more ikely are they to do so, the more decisions will be respected, which, in fact, is all they want to play as they like with national inter ests. Public opinion is none too well pleased with the report that attempts are being made at «transactons» with the factions of the «collectivity», for it

is well known that they can only be brought over, if it all, by compromises or concessions equally injurious to public interests and political morality. There should be no tran saction with men of that class. The report however, is denied in some quarters. The idea of a transaction with the contraction of the contra quarters The idea of a «transaction» candidate does not seem to gain ground - we hardly expicted it Yesterday's Tribuna takes a

doleful view of the situation and proclaims that it has already been delivered into the hands of the acol lectivity, and that the country is again under the yoke. This is rather premature, neither is it just to say that the country has

thrown up the sponge.
It is said that the cillustrious exiles. are preparing a manifesto of a fulminating description setting forth the purity of their acts and intentions and exposing the great and numerous infamies committed by the Government which has dared to send them which has dared to send them out of the country where they were so highly honored and on which they had conferred such incalculable benefits. No doubt it will be a very interesting piece of fiction Meanwhile some of our neighbours in Busines Aires are account. bours in Buenos Aires are snowing their keen appreciation of Dr. Her rera's high moral and political qualities by banquetting him. As regards the Ministry of Fin

ance, we are unable to say any thing, except that the portfolio still

remains vacant. Rumors continue to circulate of further and radical changes in the Cabinet, but we doubt if they have serious foundation. We doubt if Sr. Cuestas will find it easy to construct another Cabinet of pow er, seeing that this administra-tion has now only three months of certainty before it.

artistic point of view?

3. What would you suggest should form an artistic costume for men for use in daily life?

4. Should Lord Rosebery's suggestion, made at the Royal Academy banquet of 1894, That a more artistic attire should be worn by prominent men who sit for their portraits, be adopted?
Mr. G. F. Watts, R.A., who

certainly is one of the first authorities on such questions, replied:

*Lord Rosebery's suggestion carried out would be an inestim-able boon to portrait painters. Notwithstanding the very undenia ble talent and verve displayed by our portrait painters, our portrait gallery will make a sadly poor tigure, pictorially, on account of the most ignoble character, alike in form, colour, and material, of modern costume; but I do not think any suggestions likely to have the least effect. Pleasure in what is beautiful, or even agree-able to the eye, is, I believe, abso-lutely extruct as a general senti-ment. Pullman were walled up in Graceland Cemetery, Chicago If the bodies of millionaires are sometimes stolen with a view to the exaction of ransom, the operations in Graceland will certainly discourage body snatcuers in this case. The labour of the gold getting there would certainly not pay for the digging; besides the time required would make the secrecy so essential to tomb desecration impossible. The casket, as the people of the United States call the cofin, was lowered to a depth of eight feet and there lay on a concrete flooring. It was encased in an asphalte covering an inch thick. Then the concrete flooring was heated, and a fresh mass of concrete laid upon it all round until the colfin in its asphalt covering was walled in to a height half an inch higher than itself. Then eight heavy steels rails were laid across and bolted together, and over them a layer of tar paper to serve as a bottom for the first layer of fresh concrete. More was added, until the steel bars with their rod con-nections were hidden from view, and the body of the palace car magnate had interposed between it and an attack from above a wall of

stone and steel. The projected tunnel of the London and North-Western Railway Company through Shap Fells will not only be by far the longest in England but the longest—though only by about half a mile—in Enrope. At present the St Gothard heads the list; it is about nine and a half miles long. The Mont-Uenis runnel between France and Italy measures 12,220 metres (1,609 1/2 metres are an English mile) the metres are an English mile), the tunnel of the Arlberg in Austria, is but 10,257 metres. Not one of the others, whether railway or canal tunnels, is half the length of the last mentioned. The canal tunnel from the river Marne to the Rhine (France) is just a trifle under three miles, and the next in length is the Neythe tunnel on the Paris I was Nerthe tunnel, on the Paris, Lyons, and Mediterranean Railway. From inquiries made in influential quarters, it is understood that the Engineering Employers, at their meeting on Friday, agreed, subject to conditions, to the in-clusion of the hours question in the terms of reference to the proposed conference. A part from this they are believed to have broadly accept ed the Board of Trade's proposal for a conference Speaking yester day at an East End meeting Mr. Barnes stated that important move-ments had been initiated between the Engineers and kindred societies, which would be backed and financed by the whole Trade Union movement of the country, and would have a far-reaching effect on the present dispute.


