### STARTLING POLITICAL EVENTS.

**ARREST AND BANISHMENT OF DRS. JULIO HERRERA, MARTIN AGUIRRE AND BRIAN.**

Our last issue was barely ready for the press, when the news rapidly spread through the town of the arrest of the senator and ex-president Dr. Julio Herrera, Deputy Dr. Martin Aguirre, and the President of the Municipality Dr. Brian, ex-secretary and factotum to Presidents Herrera and Borda. The arrests took place between 6 and 7 p. m. Dr. Herrera was the first, being brought to the Cabildo in a carriage guarded by policemen. On his arrival the Prefect Sr. Dominguez informed him that he was a prisoner. Dr. Herrera protested and pleaded his parliamentary privileges, but Sr. Dominguez replied that he was not going to argue the matter but was obeying the orders of the Government. Dr. Brian was arrested in his house by the Inspector Commandant Charlone, and Dr. Aguirre by the Commissary Sr. Larroba. All three were lodged in the Prefects' own apartments, but were not allowed to communicate with each other. The officials treated them with entire courtesy. As soon as the news of the arrest was known, groups assembled outside the building, hooting the prisoners until dispersed by the police or by the rain which fell at intervals. Rumors were freely current during the evening of other arrests of prominent political personages, but as these have not yet been verified, it is useless to repeat them.

The arrest and banishment of Dr. Herrera, Brian and Aguirre was decided it appears at a lengthy Cabinet Council held during the afternoon, at which Sr. Cuestas informed his Ministers that the situation was becoming untenable and that radical measures were necessary to preserve order and satisfy public opinion. We understand that the police had obtained sufficient evidence of the connection of the three prisoners with a conspiracy against the Government, and also with the outrage on the manifestation of Sunday, to justify the measure, though the real motive is, of course, the fact of their being the ringleaders of the resistance in the Chambers.

The step was not decided upon without producing a partial Cabinet crisis. The Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Mariano Ferreira refused to concur in it and tendered his resignation. Within half an hour Sr. Cuestas had found a successor in Dr. Joaquin Salteran, but the change is not yet officially announced, efforts being made to induce Dr. Ferreira to remain. The Minister of War General Perez also refused to sign the Decree, but we cannot yet speak with certainty as to whether he has resigned.

Most simultaneously with the above the Directive Commissions of the Independent "Colorados," the "Blancos" and the "Constitutional" parties held a united meeting, at which, after much discussion, it

was resolved that they should offer to Sr. Cuestas their support in a provisional Government on condition of convoking the country to new elections before March next. Drs. Blanco and Salteran and Sres. P. Carva and J. Ballo were named as Delegates to present this to Sr. Cuestas. They reached him just as the cabinet meeting above mentioned was concluded. Sr. Cuestas thanked them for such a mark of extreme confidence but declined to give a categorical answer, leaving it to be understood that he was adverse to such an extremity until all other measures had failed.

### OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS

The following is a condensed translation of the official Documents published in Bulletin on Tuesday night.

Montevideo, Nov. 30, 1897.—Considering that the public excitement against the person of the citizen Don Julio Herrera y Obes threatens to take alarming proportions on account of the attitude of the said citizens who holds meetings of armed men in large numbers, defying the authorities from his own house, and promoting rebellion: That these facts are proved not only by their public notoriety but by published police reports and by the words of Sr. Herrera himself in the sitting of the Permanent Commission on the 27th inst., that he had armed himself and his friends to sell their lives dearly, invoking the right of defence as if it were true that they were threatened:—That the letter addressed by Sr. Herrera to the Minister of War on the 24th inst., and read in public session, was full of offensive accusations against members of the Government and other persons, with the evident object of provoking anarchy and the alteration of order:—That Art. 79 of the Constitution imposes on the Executive the maintenance of order and tranquillity in the interior, and Art. 81 also confers faculties to take prompt measures of security in grave and unforeseen cases of interior commotion, a situation evinced by the sanguinary acts of Sunday afternoon when a popular manifestation, marching tranquilly to its object was assaulted by hired ruffians who, with the cry of "Viva Herrera," fired their arms killing and wounding several persons:—The President of the Senate in exercise of the Executive Power, in order to avoid greater evils, such as subordination, an attempt at which failed through the loyalty of the authorities tempted, but which would inevitably have produced lamentable perturbations, accords and Decrees—

### ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY'S BANQUET.

This annual festivity, which took place in the Pyramides Hotel on Tuesday night, was all the success that could be wished although unfortunately there were some vacant chairs at the table, owing in part to the temporary disposition of some representative Scotch residents and in part to absences caused by the political excitement raging outside. The chef of the Pyramides did justice to a capital bill of fare, though the central dish, the classic haggis, was a disappointment—it had become somewhat deteriorated in crossing the line, and not the most devoted admirer felt tempted to ask for a second helping. On the other hand, the plum pudding was remarkably good. And what was lacking in the haggis, was fully compensated for in the presence of the piper, who strutted and piped in brave style, his wild, weird strains imparting a special flavor to the dishes. What the other inmates of the hotel thought of his music, we cannot say. The table, we may say, was decorated with sprigs of heather, all the way from Scotland, and heads of purple thistles, all the way from Punta Carretas.

Dinner over, and the whiskey bottle having circulated, the "business of the evening" began. The Chairman, Mr. J. M. Murray—and a very genial and excellent chairman he made—proposed the usual loyal toasts in happy style and waxed eloquent over "The St. Andrew's Society of Uruguay." These were all well received, and there was a hearty cheer for the name of President Cuestas. Much applause also greeted the reading of friendly telegrams from kindred Societies in Buenos Aires, Rosario, Rio Janeiro, and over the Andes from Valparaiso showing how the hearts of Scotchmen scattered over the great continent were beating in unison that night. Mr. J. S. Reid had a neat speech where with to propose "Kindred Societies" and brought in a happy reference

to the recent exploit of the Gordon Highlanders on the Indian frontier; in fact more than one speaker found a theme in this. Mr. J. Ritchie gave "Our Ain Native Land" in a really beautiful speech, full of apt quotation and tender sentiment. This was the gem of the evening and we hope to see it published in the *St. Andrew's Gazette*, for it deserves to be placed on record. Mr. P. H. Scott found a congenial theme in "Sweethearts and Wives," Dr. Thomson replying. The croupier Mr. Jas. Fraser was happy over "A' the Folk at Home." "The Land we Live in" gave Mr. J. P. Henderson a chance which he did not neglect to put in a good word for Uruguay, Mr. P. C. Towers aptly replying Mr. W. Kerr Connell gave "The Press" with happy allusion to the part the newspapers had played in the evolution now going on, and with complimentary reference to the *Montevideo Times*. Mr. Denstone made due acknowledgement, Mr. Lane spoke for "The Poem and Trade of Montevideo" "Our Guests" by Mr. Owen called forth a very next reply from Mr. Wingate, and finally "Chairman and Croupier" from Mr. Adam was celebrated with Highland honours after which "Auld Lang Syne" broke up the meeting, not until after the midnight hour had sounded, and all separated remarkably well pleased with the evening's diversion and congratulating the Committee on the success of their efforts.

We must not forget the songs Mr. D. W. Fraser, Mr. W. H. Owen and Dr. MacLellan gave various Scotch songs with happy effect and even the Chairman was made to contribute. The piper showed the strength of his lungs in "Rule Britannia" Messrs. Leonard and Buckland Cooper also rendered some excellent selections, the former making a hit with a new patriotic song, called, we believe, "Our Empire" Mr. Denstone gave a comic recitation and Mr. Sniart's sentimental songs were much liked.

### DEATH OF DR. ZAPATA.

Dr. José Vicente Zapata died on Sunday at the age of 46 in his house Calle 310. He was a Mendocino and commenced public life early as Minister of Government in his native province, which post he held under two Administrations. Then he was made a member of the Legislature, and afterwards in 1878, National Deputy and became a faithfully adherent of General Roca. In 1882, he was made Senator for nine years. In 1890, he became Minister of the Interior under Dr. Pellegrini, and was for a short time Minister of Justice under President Saenz Peña. As Interventor in Santa Fe, he gave satisfaction to his own party but by no means to the general public.

Very early on Monday morning, a fire occurred in the room on the third storey of the deceased's house in which his body was lying in a coffin surrounded by a great number of burning candles, the walls being covered with crape hangings. It appears that one of the candles fell and set fire to these hangings, and when the friends assembled in the adjoining room became aware of the fact it was too late to extinguish the fire which spread rapidly. With difficulty the coffin was got out of the room, down the staircase and into the street. The family, consisting of the widow and five little girls the eldest eight years of age and the youngest only eight months, were taken by Dr. Lobos to the roof of the house, and were followed by other ladies who were in the house and by the servants, and thence they passed to the adjoining house and afterwards to Calle Ferni 1047, the house of Sr. E. Ferrari, who is related to the family. The coffin was also taken but it had to be changed for another, as it had been much damaged by the fire. When the firemen arrived, the flames had spread to the ante-sala, library and bedroom and it was with difficulty that the fire was extinguished. All the furniture of the four rooms was completely destroyed, together with important papers, valuable books, the clothes and jewellery of Sr. Zapata and \$2000 in money, all that she had for the expenses of the funeral. The losses are estimated at \$70,000. Mr. Miras, who was making the arrangements for the funeral, lost property worth \$9000. The

family on the second floor sustained damage to the amount of \$2000. The building, belonging to the Mendez family, was also damaged, to the extent of \$5000.—*Times of Argentina*.

### CRICKET.

*C. U. R. C. versus Albion F. C.*  
This match was played at Peñarol on Sunday last, in almost perfect cricket weather. The newly laid pitch was inaugurated and gave general satisfaction. The game resulted in a crushing defeat for the Albion team, whose captain, however, must be commended for having to bat three men short, they having failed to turn up. Their places in the field were filled from the home team, but no doubt three more batters would have made a considerable difference in the total. The visitors started the batting somewhat disastrously, losing two wickets for 1 run before the third over. Poole, who was playing well and confidently, was then unfortunately run out. Adam (18) and Thomas (11) made a good effort to mend matters, but none of the others made any stand, and the innings closed for the small total of 49.

Owing to the firm stand made by Frederick and Sedgfield, the home team passed this total before the fall of the third wicket, and then the Albion bowling was fairly collared by Adams (28), Chater (37), M. Moor (19), R. Moor (40), and T. Davies (18), the innings closing for the fine total of 224. ### SUNDRIES

—Once more we have to apologise for the suppression of much matter. We could have filled our paper four times over to-day.

—Telegrams bring terrible accounts of the storm in the South of England, the Channel, and the German Ocean. All the ports are full of vessels in distress. Many cities are flooded. Bishop Warren is one of the most distinguished preachers and writers of his country, and his visit here will be a treat to those who like the highest order of preaching and lecturing.

A London telegram states that about 100 barrels of gunpowder, which were being shipped for Aden under false pretences, and which, it is suspected, were destined for the insurgent tribes on the Indian frontier, were seized at the docks. The senders have been cited to make a declaration before the maritime police-court. The barrels are said to have been on board a Russian vessel.

The R. M. S. «Clyde» is expected tomorrow morning bringing London dates to about November 13.

BUENOS AIRES.

In the presence of a number of friends and relatives, the wedding took place in the pretty little Church of St. Peter at Flores, on Monday, of Mr. Bernard G. Henderson of the Buenos Aires Western Railway, and Miss Winifred Lucy Rix, the youngest daughter of Mr. S. Rix of this city. The ceremony was performed by the Vicar of the Church, the Rev. F. F. Hancock, assisted by the Rev. Thomas Wilkes of St. Johns. At the conclusion of the ceremony a reception was held at the residence of the parents of the bride at Calle Yerbal 2665, Flores, after which the newly married couple left on their honeymoon amidst a shower of congratulations and well wishes for a happy future.

The marriage has taken place of Mr. Charles Temple, of the Buenos Aires Great Southern Railway, and Miss Isabel Sarah Ansted, the well known miniature painter in this city.

Herbert Shaw, brother of Frederick Shaw said to be concerned in the fraud perpetrated on the London and River Plate Bank in Rosario, has been liberated on bail.

On Sunday afternoon an accident took place in the river off Olivios which might have been attended with serious consequences. Messrs Wilding and Kimball, commodore and vice commodore of the Tigre Sailing Club and members of the Argentine Yacht Club, were out on the river sailing a new centre board boat recently received from London and which we believe has not yet been named. The yachtsmen were cruising between Olivios and Martinez when a squall struck the craft and she capsized and both gentlemen found themselves in the water. The incident, it seems, was witnessed by a boy who was riding on horseback near the river bank and he immediately galloped to a fisherman's hut a few squares off. The fisherman, Nicolini, immediately put out his boat and bore down on the craft and found the Messrs. Kimball and Wilding clinging to her in a very exhausted condition. After considerable difficulty they were picked up and landed and walked to Martinez in their wet clothes to the residence of Mr. Ronald Bridgett, the British Consul, where changes of clothes were generously afforded them and in the evening they returned to their respective residences. Previously to the arrival of the fisherman, one of the wrecked yachtsmen, after having been in the water for three hours, divested himself of most of his clothing, with the intention of swimming a shore, which, however, for the reason stated, became unnecessary. He lost his watch, money and other belongings and had to make his way to Mr. Bridgett's hospitable mansion in the scantiest of clothing. This open boat sailing in the open river is not to be encouraged, as only really expert open boat sailormen are equal to it. Only a few years ago, in about the same spot, two young Germans, expert swimmers, capsized their canoe and were drowned. For the Tigre this class of sailing is well enough but anything beyond is extremely dangerous.—Times of Argentina.

LONDON NOTES

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 3. Last night the body of the late Duchess of Teck was privately conveyed from White Lodge to St. George's, Windsor, where it was placed in a temporary side chapel to await interment to-day. The coffin was met at the Chapel by the Dean of Windsor and other dignitaries, and a short service was afterwards held. Amongst the many wreaths from Royal and other personages was one from the Empress Eugénie and another from the King and Queen of Italy. These were placed on the coffin. Sympathetic crowds lined the streets both at Richmond and in Windsor.

The tribesmen of the Tirah country have been harassing Sir Wm. Lockhart's convoys. Several men have been killed and wounded. Among the latter are two British officers.

Lord Rosebery fulfilled several engagements in Manchester yesterday. Early in the afternoon he visited the Royal Exchange in the City and was warmly greeted by the members. In the course of a brief speech Lord Rosebery expressed his appreciation of the

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sight that met his view, and of the cordiality of his reception. In the evening he attended a reception in the Town Hall by the Lord Mayor. Mr. and Mrs. Chamberlain arrived at Glasgow last night and were received by Lord Kelvin, whose guests they are. A band of students welcomed the right hon. gentleman outside the station, and accompanied him with torches to Lord Kelvin's house, from the steps of which he delivered a brief address.

At their meeting yesterday the London County Council passed a vote of sympathy with the Queen and the Royal Family on the death of the Duchess of Teck. It was decided to contribute 19,360l. towards the cost of widening Ludgate hill between St. Martin's-court and Pigram-street—an improvement carried out at the time the Council succeeded the Metropolitan Board of Works. The circumstances under which, apparently, Russell court playground will be taken for the poor children of Drury-lane, were reported to the Council.

It is generally felt that the prospects of a conference as to the engineering dispute are now far from encouraging. Mr. Barnes, on behalf of the Amalgamated Society, yesterday had an interview with Mr. Ritchie at the Board of Trade. It is understood that a suggestion was made that the men should not make the appointment of an impartial chairman an absolute condition of conference.

Sir Rutherford Alcock, K.C.B., who had been ill for some time, died at his residence in London yesterday morning. The death is also announced from Hatch Beauchamp of Colonel Chard, V.C., the hero of Rorke's Drift. Colonel Chard had been suffering from a painful illness for a year, and had undergone three operations without permanent benefit. Yesterday the twelfth annual show of the London and Provincial Ornithological Society was opened at the Royal Aquarium. The number of birds entered for competition is greater by five hundred than in any previous year.

Justices Darling and Channell were yesterday sworn as members of the Judicial Bench, the ceremony being observed in the Lord Chief Justice's Court, which was crowded chiefly by members of the Junior Bar. Lord Justice Vaughan Williams, having been sworn in before the Lord Chancellor, took his seat in Appeal court II.

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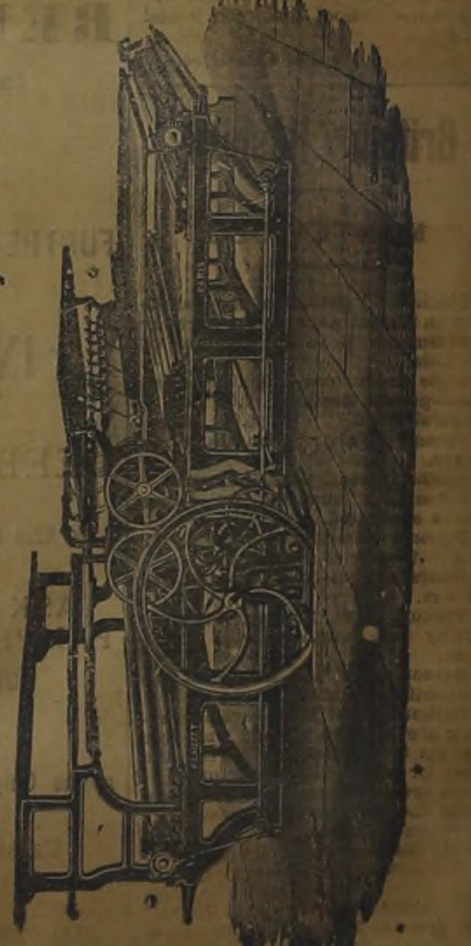
