POLITICAL NOTES

The Permanent Commission held a short sitting on Monday and transacted some business of the highest public importance.

The revolutionary protest of the "collectivist colorados"—we know not how else to describe them—is the topic of the moment. Our independent contemporaries pretend to make light of it, but cannot disguise the fact that the signatures attached show the "collectivist" opposition to Sr. Cuestas to be more formidable than they have hitherto cared to admit. Amongst the general public the impression caused by the document was unmistakably disagreeable, and hardly anyone failed to regard it as a direct provocation to both the people and the Government. So much was it viewed in the latter light, that rumors were current on Monday evening of the Government at last taking decisive steps for which the document certainly gave good excuse. Nothing was done however, and—another chance has been lost. However, we think more may be heard of the matter yet. According to the *Pueblo*, the author of the wonderful protest is Senator E. Garzon, not Dr. Julio Herrera as was generally supposed. It comes to much the same thing, for the one is the mouthpiece of the ideas of the other.

The grand "Colorado" Congress was opened on Monday afternoon with due formality. Delegates were present from all the Department of the Republic, to the number of about sixty. The proceedings were presided over by the parliamentary supporters of Sr. Cuestas, Senator Bauza taking the chair. After some not very brilliant speechifying, a proclamation was signed by all present solemnly declaring Sr. Cuestas to be the candidate of the party for the presidency of the Republic next March. That, we believe, is the end of the whole business.

It must be frankly confessed that the above does not amount to much. The delegates signing the proclamation may be very worthy men in their way, and may or may not be genuine local representatives of their party, there is no knowing, but the large majority of them are quite unknown in Montevideo and their names carry no weight. Knowing the profound schism that exists among the "Colorados," neither these delegates nor the "collectivists" signing the protest can be allowed the right to speak in the name of the entire party, the most they can do is to speak in representation of a faction of it. In reality there is no longer a "Colorado" party, since men are to be found claiming the name yet professing diametrically opposite and mutually destructive political tendencies. The "collectivists" may be the genuine "colorados," or the independents may be, but they cannot both be, and one or the other must sooner or later abandon the claim to the title. Returning to the point, we think that if this Congress is all that the "cuestistas" have been able to do in favor of their candidate after two or three months hard work, they might

have saved their trouble, for it seems to us ineffectual. All it has proved is that Sr. Cuestas is the candidate of an important faction of the "colorado" party, but not of the entire party; and that was known long ago. And, even if the Congress had been far more representative, of what avail would it be with legislators who openly profess that they owe no duty to their electors and boast of their inaccessibility to public opinion. The milk-and-water proclamation of the Congress is useless against such an attitude as this. What ought to be done is for the electors of the Republic to rise in a body and demand the instant resignation of legislators who occupy their seats under false pretences and who rebel against the expressed wishes of the people. This, however, requires more energy and determination than any one seems to possess at the present juncture.

The Decree has been issued appointing Sergt. Major Ramon Gimenez y Fernandez 2nd Chief of the 4th Chasseurs in place of Lieut. Col. Victor Canton. This is one of the results of the affair of last Friday.

The manager of the Western Railways and Sauce Port having communicated that the Port is in a condition to be used for the embarkation of produce from the neighbouring districts, the Government has sanctioned a provisional tariff for the use of the same.

It is officially announced that Sr. Bernabe Mendoza has resigned the Prefecture of Salto. His successor is not yet certain.

The latest invention launched by the "collectivists" is that Dr. Julio Herrera has resources to the tune of two million and a half dollars wherewith to start a revolution in case they are not restored to power next March. How he came by them is not explained. It could hardly have come from his parliamentary friends, remembering how many of them have their salaries embargoed. We need hardly say that no one believes the tale.

The *Nacion*, referring to the statement in the *Protest* that some of the parliamentary supporters of Sr. Gonsensoro did not sign because they were not "colorados," repudiates the non-signatories as "blancos" and says that that party is only waiting the opportunity to expel them from its number.

The *Nacion* perseveres in its assertions that Sr. Cuestas will be elected by the Chambers next March. In its issue of yesterday it says: "In spite of our tranquil and insistent affirmation, some are still given to doubt, asking, how can Sr. Gonsensoro boast of having 51 votes, sure and several times ratified, and yet our assertion be true. There lies the secret which we cannot yet reveal, but, as we have already said, many days will not have passed before it will be seen if our predictions are true or not."

CONSULAR REPORT

We have been favored by Mr. Consul Grenell with a copy of his Report on the Commerce and Trade of Uruguay for the year 1897, recently officially published in England. As the close and laborious analysis he makes of the commercial conditions of the Republic will be of great interest to many of our readers, we have resolved to reproduce the principal passages of the Report, as follows.

The year 1896 has certainly not been one of prosperity for the Republic. Various reasons might be assigned for this, but two of the principal factors have certainly been oppressive taxation and heavy customs dues.

The provision of the large sum required annually to meet the interest of the Foreign Debt is also a serious burden and one attended with no little sacrifice to the country. It is true, no doubt, that her resources are as yet not fully developed, and that they are great is hardly to be questioned, so that there is every reason to hope that with peace and order a rapid return to prosperity will take place.

The customs revenue for the year 1896 gives a total of 2,181,554. Comparing this with that given for the year 1895, 2,260,417, there is a decrease of 78,863 for the former year, which is not a very notable falling off, but it must not be lost sight of that from January 11, 1896, new duties were imposed on agricultural and industrial machinery, as well as on certain raw materials, varying from 5 to 15 per cent, which helped to swell the amount of the receipts. Previously these articles were free of duty.

It is true that the duty on tobacco was reduced somewhat, but on the other hand an extra 2 1/2 per cent. (internal tax) was put on that commodity. In addition to this a further 2 1/2 per cent. has been imposed on the commerce of the country in the form of a licence which merchants are bound to take out before clearing their goods. This, however, is not collected by the custom house, and does not appear, therefore, as custom dues.

According to the official figures now published, it appears that the total imports for the year 1896 were 5,431,931. Comparing these with those given for the year 1895, 5,391,295, there is a small increase of 40,636, in favour of 1896.

The total exports for 1896 are given as amounting to 6,468,710, against 6,924,173 for the year 1895, or a decrease of 455,463.

I may here observe that it is the practice now of the custom house in Uruguay to put an official valuation generally a very high one, on all articles imported into the country for the purpose of applying the tariffs. For example:—Iron wire for fencing purposes, the market value of which is 12.8d. per 100 kilos (220 lbs.), but the official valuation for tariff dues is 17.0s. 10d. galvanized wire has a market value of 18s. 9d. per 100 kilos, but is valued at 17. 13s. 4d.; ploughs, market value 12s. 6d. each, official value 17. 10s.; steel ploughs are sold in the market at 14. 9s. 8d. each, and are valued officially at 41. 3s. 4d.; twine for binders is sold for 21. 17s. 4d. per 100 kilos, but the official valuation is 61. 16s. 1d.

The system of over-valuation for the purpose above-mentioned exists throughout the imports, and in no small degree tends to check the commerce and trade of the country, for it enhances the local market value or sale price of the imported article very considerably and not infrequently puts it beyond the reach of the ordinary buyer's means. This is especially the case as far as British goods are concerned, which are usually higher priced than those of a similar nature from other countries, hence the introduction of cheap wares, which are generally brought into the country from Germany. As regards the exports no such official valuation is made, the market value being taken as a basis for applying the custom dues, which seems a more reasonable system.

The Worship of Athletics

The thing of most general interest in the proceedings of the Headmasters' Conference this week was the debate on athletics. The Headmaster of Monmouth School moved, "that the worship of athletics has increased, is increasing, and ought to be diminished." Various alternative forms of words were discussed, and in the end the following motion was carried by a decided majority:

"While fully recognising the value of athletic sports in school training, this conference earnestly deprecates the increasing importance and excessive publicity that are now accorded to them."

Among those who spoke very strongly on the subject was Mr. Lyttelton, of Haileybury, whom nobody will accuse of any natural bias against athletics. The evil is indeed generally admitted by all who have studied the matter. The question is whether anything will be done to mitigate it. Headmasters if they are really in earnest, can certainly do something of a good deal more efficacious than passing abstract resolutions.

If the worship of athletics at the public schools be increasing it must now be at a great height. A generation ago, the present Dean of Canterbury found "the mania of muscularity" dangerously strong. His words are worth recalling: "I must not hesitate to say that in some instances we have pushed

our admiration for these things to extravagant and disastrous lengths. When we commonly see boys ready to sacrifice everything to cricket; when we see them devoting to it a number of hours, and an amount of enthusiasm out of all proportion to that expended on their work; when we find their thoughts so thoroughly coloured and moulded by it that they talk cricket, think cricket, and dream cricket, morning, noon, and night, it is hardly surprising to find many who complain that this mania of muscularity has its share in the hunger-bitten poverty of our intellectual results, and tends to account for the fact that the value of the work we get out of the mass of boys is, as Mr. Gladstone puts it, scandalously small."

At some schools and among many boys, the serious work of school-life is played and at work they do little more than play. Physical degeneracy would be a national danger, but intellectual atrophy is a danger also. In these days, as Lowell said, in the scale of the destinies brain weighs more than brawn.—*Daily News.*

SUNDRIES

—H.M.S. "Flora" is now on her way out to take the place of the "Retribution" as flagship of the South Atlantic squadron, and should be here in the course of next month. The "Flora" is a more important class of vessel than has hitherto been sent on station here. She is a 2nd Class Twin Screw Cruiser, recently built of 4360 tons (about 10 1/2 tons larger than the "Retribution.") J. H. P. 70 0 N.D., 9000 F.D., 10 guns Captain Norcock of the "Retribution," recently promoted to the rank of Commodore, will still remain commanding officer of the Squadron, and will hoist his Commodore's pennant for the first time, when the "Flora" arrives, the change probably taking place at Rio Janeiro. The "Flora" will bring a Chaplain and a band.

—Wonderful! Summer is half way through and we have heard nothing of our annual visitor Mr. Caso Sospechoso, neither has there been any talk of quarantines.

—We remind our readers of the debut of the Hanlon Lees troupe in the Solis Theatre this evening, being the first time they have been seen in this city. Their performance is as original as it is surprising and amusing, and as the greater part of it is in pantomime no one need stop away for fear of not understanding the language. As they are only here for a few nights, the opportunity of seeing them should not be lost. "Robert Macaire" is the piece for this evening.

—The salvage of the ss. "Jupiter" is not definitely abandoned, as our contemporaries, state, but in suspense awaiting the report of divers and surveyors, to know if it is worth while proceeding further with the task. This may be known this morning.

—Notwithstanding the recent efforts of the police, gambling dens are again flourishing openly in some of the most central parts of the city, and some have even had the impudence to reopen in their old quarters. We call Mr. MacEachen's attention to this.

—The score of Sunday's cricket match seems to have miscarried; at least it has not reached us yet. Yesterday's telegrams give the scanty information that Mr. Gladstone continues in a dangerously weak state.

—A small boy gives his views on a very pertinent subject in these graphic words: "Some boys is honeste than others, and there's no way to tell them apart except you pretend to forget your knife, and watch 'em jump for it. The one that jumps last is the honestest one."

—An Englishman was once persuaded to see a game of base ball, and during the play, when he happened to look away for a moment, a foul tip caught him on the ear and knocked him senseless. On coming to himself, he asked, faintly, "What was it?" "A foul," "Good heavens!" he exclaimed, "I thought it was a mule."

—Truth is sometimes told by a misprint. Yesterday's *Pueblo* says that the "collectivist" protest "es sin duda la nota cinica más elevada que en estos últimos tiempos ha dado el Partido Colorado, etc." No doubt it meant to say "cinica," but "cinica" comes nearer the truth, for a more cynical document could not be conceived.

—Permission has been given to the resident Germans to fly their national flag to-morrow, being the birthday of their Emperor.

—Yesterday morning, at day break, near the Pantanos police station the body of a man was found lying across the rails of the Northern Railway. A cord was tied tightly around his throat, and medical evidence showed that he had died from strangulation, and had been dead some six hours. After some trouble he was identified as one Luis Negri, an Italian in humble circumstances who earned a precarious

living by odd jobs in the neighbourhood. He is not known to have any family or relatives here. There is little doubt that his death is the result of crime, but at present both authors and motive remain a mystery. The police are busy making enquiries.

—Some interesting glimpses of the late Professor Huxley's home life are given by his son, Mr. Leonard Huxley, in the January number of the *Century*. One of his traits was his love of children. His grandson, Julian, was a source of great amusement and interest to him. The boy was about four years old when the Professor one day came in from the garden and said, "I like that chap; I like the way he looks you straight in the face and disobeys you. I told him not to go on the wet grass again. He just looked up boldly straight at me as much as to say, 'What do you mean by ordering me about?' and deliberately walked on to the grass." This disobedient youth, who so charmed his grandfather's heart, was the prototype of Sandy in Mrs. Humphry Ward's "David Grieve."

—Telegrams from Rio Janeiro announce that Bispo Mello, the half-caste soldier who tried to assassinate President Moraes and who killed the Minister of War, has committed suicide, hanging himself in his cell with a shaver. He had been condemned to imprisonment for life.

—A Birmingham telegram announces the death of Mr. George Dillon, the notable educationist.

—According to a Paris telegram, a Hamburg astronomer (name modestly reserved) has made the remarkable discovery of a new moon, which will make its appearance on July 30. Where it has been all these centuries remains to be explained.

—London telegrams report that the British and Russian squadrons off China are watching each other very jealously, each following the least movement of the other. The Japanese squadron, recently reinforced is about to make a demonstration of force off Wei Hai Wei. An effort will also be made to land cargo at Tan Lien Wan, a port north of Port Arthur, to see if Russia will venture to interfere.

—The U. S. steel clad cruiser "Maine" has been ordered from Key West to Cuba, but it is carefully explained that this is only a friendly visit, motivated by the appearance of two German war vessels in Cuban waters.

—The 1st Class Cruiser "Argonaut," 11,000 tons, has been successfully launched from the Fairfield docks at Glasgow.

—Mr. John Pendleton, in the January number of *Travel*, gives several instances of the whimsicalities of locomotion. The late Bishop of Sodor and Man (Dr. Rowley Hill) found an entertaining side in railway travel. On arriving at a station in the North he was asked by a porter, "How many articles, my lord?" "Thirty-nine, my man," gravely replied the Bishop, his dark eyes twinkling. A humbler passenger was not far behind the prelate in sense of the ludicrous, remarking, when a tin box fell off the light luggage rack upon a gentleman's silk hat: "Aye, mester, it's made a nice mess on it. What a sight the looks!" There was a spice of unconscious humour in the exclamation of the lady passenger who had the misfortune to get upset on her first journey by rail. Scrambling out of the wreckage at the foot of the embankment she inquired: "Is this Stamford?" "No, marm; it's a catastrophe!" replied a fellow passenger, excitedly. "Oh, then," cried the lady, "I hadn't ought to have got out here." Mr. Pendleton also quotes the example of the late Duke of Sutherland "Bill," exclaiming a navy to his mate in the cutting, "that's what I call a real dook. Why, there he is, a driving his own engine, on his own railroad, and a burning of his own blessed coals!"

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 25.
Telegrams from Cairo state that the native levies of the Kassala garrison have surprised and defeated the Dervishes at El Fasher. The hostile position was taken, and the enemy suffered heavy losses. Among the killed were two Emirs.

The Drayfus case is becoming every day more involved. A Paris Correspondent states that a new character has appeared on the scene in the person of a man named Picard, who handed to the "Figaro" a document tending further to incriminate Major Esterhazy. This was quickly shown to be a forgery, and is believed to be part of a plot intended in the end to tell in favour of that officer.

As an instance of the brutal methods of the Berlin police, a Correspondent there gives particulars of a case in which a lady who had requested a policeman to help her was first bawled off late at night to a police station, and subsequently prosecuted for insulting the man.

Reports of the prevalence of dense fogs completely disorganizing traffic and business, come from various provincial centres. In the metropolis they have in conjunction with the cold weather led to several fatalities. A young soldier was found early yesterday morning lying dead in an area in Paddington. It is surmised that he perished from cold and exposure.

The frost, which has accompanied the fog in most places, has given an impetus to skating arrangements. In the Fen district, races are being fixed, and in some parts of the country skating is already in full swing. Various ice accidents are reported, two, which had fatal results, occurring on some dangerously thin ice, near Greenock.

A sad accident occurred near Scarborough, last evening. A lady and gentleman were crossing the line, when they were knocked down by a passing express, the lady being killed and her companion seriously injured. Near the same town, also, a joiner named Temple was found on the railway, suffering from severe injuries to the head, but how he obtained them is up to the present unknown.

An illustration of the dangers run by employers in engaging servants without strict inquiry as to character was given at the Marlborough-street Police court yesterday, when James Stewart, a valet, was charged with stealing property valued at 50l., belonging to his mistress, Mrs. Louisa Campbell, living at Queen's gate. After only six days' service, in May, 1896, the prisoner was alleged to have decamped with the goods in question, and was only arrested on Thursday morning as he was leaving Winchester Gaol, where he had been detained a long term for another offence. He had also, it was said, suffered two other periods of imprisonment. The accused was remanded.

Cross, the man arrested on suspicion of having been the perpetrator of the murderous outrage on two women at Westwick, Norfolk, was yesterday brought up before the local magistrate, who remanded him till Tuesday. The two women are reported to be going on favourably. It is said that the coroner of one of them was instrumental in saving her life by turning aside the point of the instrument with which she was stabbed.

At the South-Western Police-court yesterday a woman was sent to prison for three months with hard labour for a cruel robbery. A workman testified to seeing the woman go up to a little boy who was looking in a sweetstuff shop. She gave him a halfpenny to go in and buy some sweets, promising to mind his coat while he went. When the child was in the shop she hurried off with the coat, but was followed and given into custody by the workman.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 27. Through the Home Secretary, the Queen has addressed a letter to the Lord Mayors and Mayors who held office in England and Wales in the Jubilee year, thanking them for the interesting and beautifully prepared address received from them.

A shocking calamity occurred yesterday in Bethnal Green. About half-past six in the morning a fire broke out in Dixie street, a house tenanted by two large families. Those living on the ground floor managed to make their escape in good time, but the occupants of the first floor were cut off and a woman and her nine children were either burned to death or suffocated. To add to the horror of the situation, the husband, who was lying ill in a local hospital, died soon after.

Mr. R. C. Halse, Alderman of Cheap Ward, in the City of London, died at his residence, Inverness terrace, Bayswater, on Saturday. On Tuesday last he presided over the Wardmote held in one of the Courts at the Guildhall. The death of Mr. C. Harrison, M.P. for Plymouth, is also announced. Mr. Harrison was in full health and activity up to Friday, but died that day from heart failure, after four hours' acute illness.

Almost ideal weather for Christmas was experienced in London on Saturday. Owing to the sharp frost and the anti-cyclonic condition of the atmosphere a heavy fog hung over the central districts in the early morning, but as the day wore

on the strength of the sun's rays dissipated the mist, and a bright clear afternoon succeeded. At night the fog reasserted itself in some parts of the metropolis and was particularly dense in portions of North London. Christmas Day was celebrated in the churches of the Metropolis with the usual observances. The services were as a rule well attended, and the decorations were, speaking generally, on a more extensive scale than last year. Dean Gregory preached at St. Paul's, and the Dean of Westminster at the Abbey. Other occupants of the pulpit included the Bishop of Rochester, Canon Wilberforce, Dr. Guinness Rogers, the Rev. F. B. Meyer, the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, Dr. Brooke Herford, and the Rev. J. Ossian Davies.

Treats to the poor were organized by the Robin Society, the Field-lane Institution, and other missions and charitable bodies, the Social Wing of the Salvation Army providing for the 5,000 inmates of the various workshops, shelters and the like, special fare similar to that given by Boards of Guardians to persons under their charge. Seasonable festivities were also arranged at the Central Fire Station and most of the hospitals and barracks, whilst the lightships stationed around the estuary of the Thames were visited by members of the Missions to Seamen. At Queen's College, Oxford, the Board's Head was borne into the dining-hall with time-honoured ceremony.

Early on Christmas morning a bad railway accident occurred on the line from Marseilles to Paris. An express train had come to a standstill between Valence and Vienna when a second train dashed into it telescoping the rear carriage. Three persons were killed, and fifteen injured. All are French. Kassala has been formally taken over from the Italians by the Anglo-Egyptian force under Colonel Parsons.

Sir Wm. Lockhart is advancing from the Khyber-Pass into the Bazan Valley. General Yeatman Biggs is lying seriously ill at Peshawar. A statement has been made by Richard Archer Prince, the murderer of Mr. William Terriss. Allegations of blackmailing are made against the deceased actor. Prince asserts that he should not have lifted his hand against Mr. Terriss, only that they were driving him mad by starving him, by blackmailing and trying to drive him to commit suicide.
