THE ELECTORAL ACCORD.

According to the latest account, the mediators who are occupied in trying to reopen negotiations to bring about the electoral accord, have resolved not to hurry the matter, and it is therefore probable that nothing definite will be learnt until after Easter.

We think this is wise. The interests at stake are so numerous and so complex that a satisfactory solution is not likely to be reached in a hurry. The failure of the first attempt may be attributed in great measure to the precipitate manner in which it was undertaken, causing the two principal parties concerned to assume, without due consideration, an extreme attitude from which they now find it difficult to recede without loss of dignity. Above all, it is necessary to leave time for public opinion to bring its influence to bear on the parties in general and their leaders in particular, in order to convince them that the question is one in which the interests of the party must cede to the more general interests of the Republic.

There can be no doubt, we believe, that public opinion is very strongly in favor of an accord, and the reasons for this are not far to seek, though they are being somewhat lost sight of in the clash of party interests. To comprehend this thoroughly it is necessary to realize the fact—which we fear is not always realized by the parties here—that either of the two parties, however great their real or even their assumed strength, is, after all, in a minority compared with the rest of the Republic; and that, even if this were not the case, no party can legitimately have interests which are opposed to the general welfare. The country, as an entity, does not consist of one party alone, but of a congeries of all parties, and in the case of this Republic of a great many, representing important interests, who are outside any party in so far as the direct exercise of the suffrage is concerned. For this reason we say that any party must be in a minority compared with the entire Republic, and therefore, if a party can only maintain its position by assuming an attitude inimical to the general welfare, that party at once becomes a public danger and its attitude should be opposed. Such a danger is threatening just now.

Public opinion, we venture to say, in earnestly desiring the political accord, has something in view beyond the interests of either of the parties concerned. So long as there is a fairly representative Chamber, composed of sufficiently honorable and capable men who can be trusted to decide honestly and disinterestedly on the questions put before them, the occupation of a few seats more or less by "colorados" or by "blancos" is really a matter of indifference to the majority of the Republic, however important it may be considered in the circles—limited after all—whose existence is concentrated in "politics." What public opinion desires above all—and this is the real secret of the desire for the accord—is a rest from political agitations. We cannot dwell upon this too strongly. For many years the economical interests of the Republic have been cruelly sacrificed to "politics." For quite ten years it has made little or no economical progress, its development has been retarded, on account of political agitations and uncertain-

ties and of the dishonest struggles of a faction to superimpose its own interests over the general welfare. Fortunately this is now past, and the Government has been purified in a manner which has received the approbation of all. Confidence has been fully restored. After long waiting, the economical and progressive interests of the Republic at last see an opportunity for the prosperity and developments long denied them. But if the political agitations and uncertainties are to be resumed, these hopes will again be frustrated. Therefore it is that they ask, they even implore, a truce. "Let us work," they all say. Economical interests have been sacrificed to political interests—the political interests of a few—for many years; for once let political interests be put aside in favor of economical interests. And we think the request is justified. This, there, is the real secret of the desire for the accord, far more than any benefit it brings to the parties concerned. It is the appeal of the country to its politicians to sacrifice their own interests to the general welfare. And such an appeal should not be made in vain, at least of all at the present moment of hope and reaction.

But the accord—the rest from political agitation—will be impossible whilst the parties maintain their present attitude, and only consider the question from their own point of view, instead of that of general interests. Above all, the accord, to be real, must be just. Whatever the pretended danger to either party from a concession to the other, it can never be so great as the danger to the country from a renewal of political strife. The only real danger would be the resuscitation of the "collectivity," and of this there need not be the least fear with proper electoral reform, such as the Council of State is in duty and honor bound to give. But to pretend that ten seats more or less to "blancos" or to "colorados" constitutes such a danger that it demands the sacrifice of the accord and of the material interests therein involved is a quite untenable proposition. It can only be admitted on the supposition that the partisans of both parties are still so blinded by party and traditional hatred that they are prepared to sacrifice the welfare of their country sooner than give their political opponents a fair participation in the control of the country—which is equivalent to saying that the country is still politically uncivilized. For the honor of the Republic we will not admit this. Provided the Government is honest well intentioned and amenable to public opinion, there can be no danger to the Republic from the predominance of either party—it will prosper and progress the same, provided political agitators keep quiet. The President may call himself "colorado" or "blanco" or blue or green, his political color is of quite secondary importance to the fact that he is honest and capable, and governs in public interests. When this is fully realized, and the political parties learn to alternate with each other in power, and to sacrifice their own interests to those of the country, as is the case in European countries, the political education of the Republic will be complete. It has not reached this point yet, but it is on the way to it, and the recent evolution is a great step towards it. The electoral accord will be another step, when taken, and this is another reason why it is desirable.

For these reasons it is necessary that the accord should be brought about by mutual concessions, but especially by concessions on the part of the "colorados." With this, however, we must deal in detail in another article, to which this may be regarded as introductory.

POLITICAL NOTES.
The latest about the electoral accord is that the mediators have determined not to hurry matters and that no decisive announcement need be expected until after Easter. Meanwhile they think it better to maintain a prudent reserve as to the progress they are making. It seems to be understood that discussion of electoral reform in the Council of State will similarly be deferred, despite the wishes of Sr. Cuestas to see it hurried forward. The general impression just now seems favorable and there has been a recovery in Bolsa values.

The unpleasant rumors about the creation of new battalions have been set at rest by yesterday's *Nacion*, which gives them a complete denial. All that the Government proposes it says, is to restore the Urban Guards in Paysandu, Salto and other frontier towns, and which are a recognis-

ed local necessity. This will not imply any increased expense, as it will be covered by the estimates of the dissolved 2nd Chasseurs, which regiment, the *Nacion* adds, there is no intention of restoring at present. These explanations have made a good impression, for it would certainly have been incompatible with the economical professions of the Government to have launched out into increased military expenditure.

The "Colorado" Directive Committee held an important meeting on Tuesday evening, at which it was resolved that until the General Committee of the party was definitely constituted, the existing Departmental Committee should be fully authorized to treat all political questions arising. This refers mainly to the accord.

The Legislative Committee of the Council of State has resolved to propose an amendment to the Rural Code, establishing a close time for birds, excepting birds of prey and plovers (*chorlos*) which are deemed birds of passage, from Sept. 1 to March 31. The Rural Association has been agitating to obtain this for over ten years, but has hitherto been defeated by legislative indifference.

After many rumors, it is at last confirmed that Dr. Mendilaharsu will shortly resign his post as Minister to Buenos Aires. The resignation, which is not due to political causes, will be accepted by friendly arrangement.

There is an awkward split in the "blanco" party. A member of prominent "blancos," headed by Col. Lamas and Dr. C. A. Berro, have published the candidature of Dr. Juan José de Herrera as President of the Directorate of the party, the *Nacional*, which represents the "extreme" section of the party, refuses to acknowledge or even to publish the declaration, and states its intention of opposing the candidature tooth and nail. These party "splits" are not edifying, and should above all be avoided just now.

The Custom House has been remarkably busy in recent days, the daily receipts varying from \$50,000 to \$60,000. This promises a good total for the end of the month.

Golf without a Ball.
When General Grant was in Scotland some years ago he heard a good deal about golf, and one fine afternoon he asked one of his many admiring friends to explain the use of a bulger in a practical way.

Out to the spacious park they went, and the obliging host teed the ball, and waggled the club with all due solemnity. The General's expectation were running high as he carefully observed the impressive preliminaries.

Presently there was a heavy thud, a light of turf, and the little ball still sat on the tee. Again, and yet again a thud, heavier than before, with turf still flying, with ball unmoved, with the man perspiring and perplexed.

Whereupon the distinguished guest gently remarked:
"There seems to be a fair amount of exercise in the game but I fail to see the use of the ball."

Education and Crime.
The *Schoolmaster* publishes some statistics which are worthy the attention of candidates for the honor of membership of a school board. In 1860 the population of England was a little over 20,000,000, and of that number 23,000, or 115 in every 100,000, were in prison. In 1870 the population had risen to nearly 23,000,000, but the proportion of it that inhabited our goals had risen more rapidly. It was 29,000, or 128 in every 100,000. In 1872 the Education Act was passed, and in 1880, with a population of 25,000,000, the prisons contained not quite 29,000, and the proportion was 111 in the 100,000. But in these eight years the Education Act had only begun its work. Those whom it had benefited were for the most part only leaving the schoolroom; but by 1890 the whole of the younger generation were educated, and in that year the prison population had fallen to 19,624, or only 68 per 100,000 of the general population. We do not venture to say that this decrease is wholly due to the spread of education, but education opens up chances of advancement to a young man which the illiterate can never hope for, and thus it relieves the pressure in that class which is always overcrowded, because it lacks the mobility, the initiative, that education gives to the mind; not to speak of the mere knowledge of lands beyond the sea where there is room for the men who are crowded out of this little island. Education does not of itself give morality, but in spite of our occasional examples of accomplished forgers and thieves, we may claim for it that it makes morality possible for many who would otherwise have had no honest sphere

open to them for the exercise of their faculties; and thus it makes indirectly for honorable living. This is what Sir George Kekewich meant when he said, "Every time I hear of another school being opened I say to myself, 'There goes another prison.'"—*Hospital.*

SUNDRIES.

The *Razon* of yesterday afternoon published telegrams repeating in full the finding of the Maine Enquiry and President McKinley's Message to Congress. They are too long for us to repeat, but the whole gist may be found condensed in the following paragraph of the Message:—"The conclusions of the Court are, that the loss of the Maine is not due in any concept to fault or negligence on the part of her officers or crew; that the vessel has been destroyed by the explosion of a submarine mine, which caused the partial explosion of two or more powder deposits in the prow, and that there is no proof whatever that permits the responsibility of the destruction of the Maine to be fixed against any person or persons." The Message concludes by placing the affair before Congress, without expressing opinion on part of the Executive.

In addition to the above, Mr. McKinley has now received the Report of the Spanish Court of Enquiry. This has also been forwarded to Congress, but without any further Message. The telegrams give no hint of its contents which we therefore imagine are not yet public.

The other telegrams on the question are utterly bewildering in their confusion and contradictions, and leave it impossible to form any opinion as to the situation. The New York papers are now said to be attacking Mr. McKinley for his "evacillation." This probably means the Jingo organs. In force of the inconclusive nature of the Report, it would have been morally impossible for Mr. McKinley to do otherwise than he has done, and it would be certainly difficult to find a just "casus belli" in it. General Woodford seems to have presented some sort of a proposition to the Spanish Government, which is now under consideration, but the telegrams leave us in the dark as to its nature. We give the matter up in despair until new light appears.

Rear Admiral John Walker, according to a Washington telegram, has been appointed Commander in Chief of the U. S. Navy, and will take charge on Saturday. Capt. W. S. Schley has been named Commander of the flying squadron (three days ago the telegrams said it was Capt. Rob. Evans) and will hoist his flag on the "Brooklyn." There is no doubt about the activity of the preparations for war, whatever the upshot may be.

According to European telegrams another attempt is being made to induce the Pope to intervene between the United States and Spain, but not much hope is given of success.

The following is the copy of a Washington despatch published by a leading London paper of March 2, and exposes once more the utter unreliability and falsity of nearly all the telegrams that have appeared and are still appearing here—*"Desperate efforts are made by the sensational journals to keep the war scare alive, but it is apparently dead for the present. It was declared this morning that the time limit put by the American Government for Spain to bring about peace in Cuba was March 1st. This is denied semi-officially as follows:—The report is absolutely false in every particular. No time-limit expires to-day or on any other specified date, and for that reason there are no negotiations in progress or contemplated for a two months' extension or any other extension. The report is an invention throughout." This denial is a good sample of most of the news sent from here now, which consists mainly in the contradiction of false information which the correspondents of lying newspapers publish every morning. The simple fact is that the danger of serious trouble with Spain, either about the Maine disaster or Cuba, is less today than for many weeks. Mr. Secretary Long said after the Cabinet meeting this afternoon that the element of Spanish responsibility had been eliminated from the Maine disaster, meaning thereby official participation therein, adding: "This is a personal view, and not based upon evidence or information in the possession of the Navy Department." This is regarded as ending the Maine incident as the source of a possible war."*

Here are two social paragraphs from the *B. A. Standard*.—"This morning Madame (why Madame?) Thursby gives a grand breakfast party to the Prince and Princess Cariati at her residence in the Avenida Republica, at which the British Minister, the Honble. W. A. C. Barrington will attend. The Prince speaks English fluently and is at present Italian Chargé d'Al-

fares until the new Italian Minister, the Marquis Malespina arrives in July. The Princess also speaks English fluently. She likes Buenos Aires immensely, and is on horseback every morning in Palermo; she is fond of riding and has hunted a great deal in Ireland. The Prince and Princess are staying at the Royal."
—"Mrs. Malvina Cilley de Hughes, we regret to say, met with an accident at the Tigre the other day which might have entailed serious consequences. She slipped, sprained her ankle and fell on the ground; her husband in trying to save her, stumbled over her and fell in the mud and soiled his clothes. They got back to the city in the train, and Mrs. Capt. Cilley is nursing her youngest daughter. Mr. F. G. Hughes has gone to La Viga, near Rojas Mrs. Deborah Cilley de Hemenes with her mother and her two youngest children are at San Isidoro. Capt. Cilley, U. S. Navy, has nearly recovered from the effects of the collision at Claypole Station, and says he is waiting orders for active service should war occur with Spain or any other nation. Civil Engineer J. B. Cilley, is at present in Brigado and will be in town next week. Louis B. P. Cilley, B. C. E. in first commission de limites, is now in the Andes about the latitude of Copiapo, Chile, working industriously for Argentina, José S. Cilley, Ingeniero Agronomo of La Plata, was in Tandil recently gathering cereal data for the annual Blue Book of the Province."
—"I didn't know," said an old lady, as she put down her newspaper, "that thieves were so scarce that they had to advertise for 'em and offer a reward for their discovery."
—"What is this?" exclaimed a compositor who was expecting to be promoted to a proof-readership shortly. "Sermons in stones, books in the running brooks! Impossible! He means, of course, 'Sermons in books, and stones in the running brooks.' And the new reading of Shakespeare appeared next morning."
—"The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Scott, will condole with them on the loss of their infant son John Harvey, who died yesterday after a long and painful illness."
—"According to a general request the Management of the Central Railway has resolved to run a special holiday train to Tacuarembó on Wednesday next. Particulars will be found in the advertisement."
—"The Management of the Central Railway has issued a circular to all the employees reminding them that the Railway is foreign to all party politics, and therefore they should not take part in political Clubs and meetings."
—"We are requested to announce that a sealed Golf Handicap will be played on Sunday next, entries closing on the ground at 2 p. m. On Saturday and Sunday, April 9 and 10, there will be a handicap of 36 holes against "bogeys," to be played off on either or both of those days. Entries for this should be made not later than Monday next. There will be two prizes for both events, and the entrance will be 50 cents."
—"In view of the alarming increase of late of night robberies and burglaries in the city, the police force has been reinforced and the Squadron of Security ordered to patrol the streets during the night hours."
—"The occupation of Port Arthur by Russia has been formally notified to all the Powers. According to the telegrams, Gt. Britain is expected to make a protest."
—"The great composer Verdi is in delicate health, and has had to abandon his proposed visit to Paris."
—"A benefit performance was held in the Gaiety Theatre in London on Tuesday night, in favor of Nelly Farren, the idol of over a generation of playgoers, who for some time past has been in bad health and distress. It realised the handsome sum of £10,000, probably a record."
—"Two of the passengers by 'Les Andes' have died from yellow powder in the Immigrants Hotel in Buenos Aires. Fortunately the cold season is now at hand, and there is therefore no cause for alarm."

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ese territory. Mr. G. Bowles seconded the motion. Sir W. Harcourt, whilst deprecating the language employed by the mover and seconder of the motion, invited the Government to make some clear statement which would set the public mind at rest. Mr. Curzon who followed, gave an explanation of the views and actions of the Government. While not opposing the advent of German and Russian influence in China, Great Britain should guard her loins to retain in an age of competition what she had won in an age of monopoly. The integrity and independence of China were matters of intense solicitude to the Government and might be considered the cardinal basis of their policy in regard to that country. Proceeding, Mr. Curzon detailed what had occurred during the progress of the loan negotiations, and claimed that valuable commercial concessions had been obtained from China. Eventually the House was counted out.

Lord Rosebery addressed a magnificent meeting, held last night in St. James's Hall, under the auspices of the London County Council Progressive Committee. There were, he pointed out, two great dangers with which they were now confronted—the introduction of party politics into the municipal arena and the partition of London itself. There had hitherto been no party politics in the Council. Those who sympathized with the Liberal party actually chose the name Progressive because they would not adopt a word having a political significance. Charges of Socialism had been brought against the Council, but the municipal enterprise of Birmingham, which was the model city, had placed that city in a position London would not envy.

On the proposal to divide the Metropolis into municipalities, Lord Rosebery read passages from the letter of a County Councillor, which showed that if the proposed boroughs were to have such powers as were exercised by West Ham they must have their own fire brigades, technical education boards, and lunatic asylums; they must each clear away their own slums, administer their own parks, and even, if the parallel were complete, educate their own children. London was the capital, not only of this country but of the British Empire. What interest would a Canadian or Australian feel in Fulham or Hammersmith? In an eloquent peroration Lord Rosebery contrasted London with Rome. A Roman was proud of Rome, he would, he said, have been proud of London.

Mr. Chamberlain, addressing a meeting held at the Surrey Theatre in support of the Moderate policy, defended his appearance there, and that of other Cabinet Ministers at similar gatherings. His opponents, he remarked, were very inconsistent in complaining of their action, since Liberal leaders were attending meetings on the other side. It was, he maintained, a good thing that political parties should participate in municipal elections, but politics should not be carried into the work of the Council. Admitting that the motives of the Progressives were good, he argued that their methods were bad. Whilst he denied that Ministers had any desire to smash the Council, he contended that those London districts which wanted municipalities of their own ought to have them.

A Berlin Correspondent learns that the statement that the linen dues on foreign goods in China were to be abolished is inaccurate. Imported goods are henceforth to pay only the Customs duty at the port of entry, and the linen at their final destination inland, and not as heretofore transport dues in every province they pass through. It is stated that Germany is making extensive demands for concessions in the Shantung province. Besides the railway claim, she is demanding preferential rights to all contracts for the carrying out of public works in the province.

Notwithstanding the efforts made by the papers at New York to keep alive the excitement over the Maine incident, the war scare is now, a Washington Correspondent informs us, practically dead. A cabinet meeting was held yesterday afternoon, and subsequently Mr. Long, Secretary, expressed the opinion that the element of Spanish responsibility had been eliminated from the case.

Mr. Hanotaux, the French Minister of Foreign Affairs yesterday made a statement in the Chamber

on the subject of Anglo-French relations in West Africa. Replying to a question by M. d'Arenberg, he stated that in view of the negotiations now proceeding in Paris he was bound to maintain considerable reserve in speaking of the matter. He could nevertheless say that the International Commission had already done much to clear the way to an understanding, and that notwithstanding difficulties inherent in the matters in dispute, an equitable solution was sought by both Powers.

Accompanied by the Duchess of York, the Prince of Wales yesterday left London for the Continent. In the Hackney Show which opened at Islington yesterday all the best breeding studs of the kingdom were strongly represented. The entries numbered more than in any previous year, except 1897, when classes for riding and driving were introduced. These have now been abolished in favour of classes more directly associated with the Society's main objects. Several champions of previous years are amongst the competitors. The cups will not be awarded until to day.

The final test match between England and Australia was continued yesterday at Sydney. The first innings of the Australians closed for 239, and with 96 runs to the good the Englishmen entered upon their second innings. At the close of play 9 wickets, were down for 172. Hayward, who made 43, was the top scorer.

Before Mr. Justice Darling and a common jury, in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, Mr. Pullen, a solicitor, living at Caterham, sued the South Eastern Railway Company for damages sustained by him on Cannon street platform, when a porter knocked him down with a trolley full of luggage. After hearing evidence, the jury brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for 600l.; as the company had paid 750l. 1s. into court, judgment was entered for them with costs.

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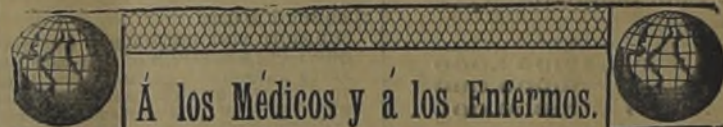
