Other manifestoes of the same kind were issued from time to time by the Prince, and he seems to have derived some revenue from the sale of his ribands and crosses of the Order of Trinidad and his Tri-nidad postage stamps. He did not, however, return to the lonely islet. When Great Britain and Brazil quarrelled over the possession of Trinidad, Prince James sent a protest to the Powers.
