POLITICAL NOTES.

Our contemporaries all recall that it is now just one month since the successful accomplishment of the coup d'etat by which Sr. Cuestas dissolved the Chambers and established the present Provisional Government. Few political events have had a more marked and immediate effect on the fortunes of the Republic, as may easily be proved by contrasting the present feeling of security, satisfaction and hope with the feeling of uncertainty, apprehension and depression that prevailed before the event. The change has had a very beneficial effect on economical interests, capital is beginning to issue from its long enforced retirement, and business and industry in general are already showing signs of reviving activity. In no department has the change been more strongly marked than on the Bolsa. Six weeks ago the daily list of operations used rarely enough to exceed 30, on Thursday they numbered 160, for an aggregate value of over \$1,100,000 nominal and this has not been exceptional during the month. The appreciation in prices has been no less remarkable, ranging from 6 to 10% in general values and from 14 to 20% in Treasury Certificates. The quotation of the Consolidated Debt, which was 40 1/2 here and in London on February 9, has now reached from 45 to 46, with every prospect of a further rise. Certainly it may be said that Bolsa activity does not indicate general business activity, but at all events it shows a return of confidence before lacking, and that there is money to invest and people willing to invest it, and it also indicates busier times for the brokers—no unimportant class—who have suffered sorely during recent years. The best of it is that there is no reason to fear that the change for the better is a mere «flash in the pan» such as has occurred on previous occasions, for it is based on solid and genuine foundations which give every reasonable cause for belief in its continuance and steady development in the near future. This belief is shared in business circles, which certainly cannot be accused of an excess of optimism in recent years. The event referred to above was celebrated in the Government House by a number of congratulatory visits to the President and Ministers, and by the issue of a batch of Decrees for the most part intended to confirm in their posts the military officers who supported Sr. Cuestas in the coup.

The substance of the Decrees issued on Thursday is as follows—The post of Chief of the Squadron, hitherto held by Col. Jorge Bayley, is suppressed until further notice as being unnecessary, and the Squadron is placed under the orders of the Commandancy of Marine.—Lieut. Col. Lizardo Calleiros is named 1st Chief of the Mobilized Regiment of the Frontiers, in place of Col. A. Foglia y Perez.—Col. C. Morador y Otero is named 1st Chief of the Light Artillery, in place of Col. A. Perez, resigned, and Sergt. Major A. Isamendi is named 2nd Chief of the same Regiment.—Sergt. Major C. Icasuriaga is named 2nd Chief of the Heavy

Artillery.—Sergt. Major S. Bouquet is named 1st Chief of the Artillery Training Corps (Planeta de Artilleria).—Col. Cipriano Abreu is named Chief of the National Arsenal in place of Col. A. de Leon, resigned.—Col. Antonio Gonzalez is named 1st Chief of the 1st Chasseurs, in place of Col. Abreu, and Sergt. Major G. Ruprecht is named 2nd Chief of the same Regiment.—Capt. T. Scjuran is named 1st. Chief of the gunboat «General Rivera»

A list is published of some fifteen Post Office employees dismissed as unnecessary and of some forty «removed for reasons of better service» This is an indication of the thorough—and by no means unnecessary reforms being carried out in this department by Dr. Camps.

Drs. E. Acevedo Diaz (editor of the Nacional), C. A. Berro and A. Rodriguez Larreta has been designated by the «blanco» Committee as the delegates of their party to discuss the «electoral accord.»

A rumor is current that Dr. Mendilaharsa has resigned his post as Minister in Argentina, to which he was appointed not many weeks ago, for reasons at present unknown.

The Buenos Aires papers have largely circulated the rumor that Dr. Juan Carlos Blanco, President of the Council of State, will be brought forward as candidate to the future presidency of the Republic. We understand that he himself has authorized an explicit denial to the rumor, stating that his ambitions do not tend in that direction and that, in any case, he would not appear as rival candidate to Sr. Cuestas, whose prior claims to the post are of the strongest.

«Baron» Hickey of Trinidad.
The suicide of «Baron» James Harden Hickey in a Texas hotel brings to an end a strange and romantic career. An Irishman by birth, but American by nationality, he spoke French like a native, and was at one time a well known figure on the Parisian boulevards. Enjoying apparently an ample fortune, he kept open house on his estate of Andilly, near Montmorency, and entertained the wild-est spirits of literary Paris. He wrote a great deal himself over the signature of «Saint Patrice», published a book of literary portraits, «Nos Ecrivains», and projected an Encyclopaedia. Later on he started a journal, *Le Triboulet*, while his wife, a witty American, wrote operas which are still indited *The Triboulet*, was not a success, and the Baron disappeared for a time from Paris. In 1894 he returned and announced to his friends that he was no longer Baron Harden Hickey, but His Serene Highness James L. Prince of Trinidad while in the South Atlantic he had, it appears, come across the islet which had so frequently been visited by the treasure seekers, of which Mr. Knight wrote a charming volume, «The Cruise of the Alert», and which last year was the subject of a triangular dispute between Great Britain, Portugal, and Brazil. The Baron had taken possession of the island, and had duly notified his conquest to the Powers. His form of government was to be a military dictatorship, with officers wearing the moustache and imperial of the Second Empire. The flag was a yellow triangle on a red ground. He had, moreover, instituted an order—the Cross of Trinidad—for the reward of «letters, the arts, the sciences, industry, the humanitarian virtues, and devotion to his dynasty.» Several Central American Republics, for reasons known to themselves, recognised him. The State decreed for itself a monopoly in guano, turtles, and the legendary piratical treasure said to have been buried in 1825. To everything else the Colonists would be free. Other manifestoes of the same kind were issued from time to time by the Prince, and he seems to have derived some revenue from the sale of his ribands and crosses of the Order of Trinidad and his Trinidad postage stamps. He did not, however, return to the lonely islet. When Great Britain and Brazil quarrelled over the possession of Trinidad, Prince James sent a protest to the Powers. Then he disappeared, and nothing more was heard of him in Europe until February 11, when his death was announced.—*European Mail.*

It is now fourteen years since he retired from active service, but his interest in the spiritual and mundane welfare of his fellow beings has never diminished, and he retains in the highest degree the esteem and love of all who have had the privilege of knowing him.

—We quote from the *B. A. Standard*.—One of the grandest sights ever witnessed in the camps of Buenos Aires was that which occurred in the camps of Carhue last Monday. The people out there were astonished to see a huge black cloud which obscured the sun for a few moments while passing. It was considered to be about a mile in dimension, and passed so rapidly that it was at once discovered to be locusts. It was immediately followed by a large white cloud, considered to be a league in dimension, and which took four hours to pass. This white cloud was discovered to be composed of millions and millions of «gaviotas» (gulls) in chase after the locusts. It was really a glorious sight to the estancieros out there, and the white cloud was perhaps the most effective commission for the destruction of the locusts ever formed in this country. Strange to say, the locust cloud seemed to move faster than the «gaviotas» cloud, but ere our friends read this, the «gaviotas» doubtless have eaten up the locusts. The locust cloud was moving from the South-East to the North-East. We imagine that the «gaviotas» had their feast somewhere in the camps of San Luis.

—At a Christmas dinner given lately in one of the West India islands, the following incident occurred. A black servant brought in the best dish—and dropped it. It was then asked what reference had that incident to the political affairs of the day? A sharp young fellow, with more wit than coin, quickly responded: «Why—the smashing up of China—the downfall of Turkey—the upsetting of Greece—Hungry alarmed—and the Confusion of Africa.» Upon which the black band in attendance played, somewhat confusedly, «Concert of Europe», followed by «Save the pieces.»

—It seems that the alleged robbery in the Bristol Hotel at Mar del Plata was really a robbery after all, and not a Carnival joke as was pretended. What is worse, the stolen articles—jewelry and a valuable case of surgical instruments—have not yet been recovered, nor have the thieves been detected.

—Daughter.—«Yes, I've passed my examination at Girton; but now I must improve my knowledge in psychology, philology, bibli—«Practical Mother.—«You needn't continue. I have arranged for you a thorough course in roasting, biology, stitchology, darnology, patchology, and general domestic workology. Now get on your working clothes.»

—The Insurance Companies in Argentina are moving against the iniquitous forced Loan. They received orders from London to make the following proposals to the Finance Minister.—First, to pause in the issue of the Bonds till Congress meets. Second, if this be refused, the Companies, will deposit \$300,000 each against Treasury Bills. Third, they will buy the Bonds at 80 if Government undertake to buy them back again at same price in case any of the Companies close their business here. Messrs. Runciman, Corder, Edye and Jordon have been named as a Committee, and they leave for Mar del Plata, to see the Finance Minister on the matter.

—We have received from Rio Janeiro, the first number, published on the 3rd instant, of *The Brazilian Review*, a new weekly paper in the English language. The editor is Mr. J. J. Wileman, C. E., a gentleman who is well known in the River Plate, and whose capability in economic topics has already been proved by the publication of a laborious essay on «Brazilian Exchange», in which the whole question of paper currency is carefully considered. The first number of the new paper is strictly confined to business and financial topics, beyond which, indeed, its program does not profess to reach, and is evidently edited with care and ability. We wish it every success in its special line.

—Authority has been given from the Staff Office for the bivouac of the National Guard Volunteers to be held on the race course at Maroñas tomorrow, weather permitting. The Central Uruguay Railway Company has kindly offered a special train to transport them thither, but it seems that they are expected to march all the way back (about six miles)

which will be rather trying after a long day and evolutions in the open. It would be more sensible if the arrangement were reversed. The members of the Jockey Club have kindly undertaken to provide some 30 kine wherewith to offer a savory burnt sacrifice—or in the vernacular *asado con cuero*.

—Dr. Carlos Pellegrini, the prominent Argentine citizen, will pass here today on his way to Europe in the «Cordillera» arrangements between him and President Cuestas.

—The Mariani Italian Dramatic Company, said to be of the first order, is now on the way to the River Plate, and will perform first in Buenos Aires and then here.

—The Queen left Windsor for Portsmouth on Thursday afternoon, and was to have crossed to Cherbourg yesterday on her way to Nice. This shows that the telegraphic reports of her Majesty's ill-health must have been greatly exaggerated, or she would not have undertaken the journey.

—Sr. Manuel Porlan of Maldonado has presented to the Department of Live-Stock and Agriculture samples of cotton grown by him from seed imported from Paraguay by Sr. Goriello some nine years ago. The samples are said to be of excellent quality, and are on public view in the offices of the Department. It has been proved before that cotton can be cultivated in this Republic with success, but we do not think its cultivation has yet been attempted on a commercial scale.

—According to the *Siglo*, the students in the University are now turning their attention to medicine in preference to law. This means that, having already a plethora of legal doctors, we are now to be threatened with a plethora of medical doctors. We cannot help thinking it a matter of regret that the rising generation of the country do not direct their activity and intelligence more to commercial, industrial and productive studies, rather than to the learned professions. The country, or at all events the capital, is overrun with «Doctors» of all kinds. It wants agriculturists, merchants and manufacturers far more than it wants lawyers and physicians, of whom it has more than enough already, and the young men would find these occupations far more profitable than professional life, if they were not so ambitious to put «Dr.» before their names.

—A marriage has been arranged between Mr. Donald Glassford Begg, of Buenos Aires, and Miss Cecil English, eldest daughter of Mr. A. W. English, of Walsoken, Norfolk.

—A wonderful record of the reproductive powers of an English Leicester ram is given by a New Zealand exchange. Some 600 ewes were put in a fattening paddock, into which the ram found his way. Afterwards 150 ewes that had been with rams were put in, and the whole drop of lambs amounted to 700, which proved the single ram to be the sire of at least 550 lambs.

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—Says a leading London paper.—The notion that Germany has done any harm to British interests by occupying Kiao Chow is a delusion. China is still for the most part a closed market. Every door that is opened is an advantage and so long as the doors are kept open for us, the more of them the better. It would appear from the report of Reuter's Special Correspondent that this is the view taken by British traders in China. The opening of a new port by Germany is recognised by them as being not an occasion for jeremiads but a matter of congratulation.

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—Mr. Charles Gunther, President of Liebig's Extract of Meat Company, by far the most important industrial concern in the Republic, arrived here in the «Magdalena» on Thursday, and will shortly proceed to Fray Bentos on business of the Company.

—The Beethoven Society will resume rehearsals next week with a view to concerts in the approaching season.

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—The Prince of Wales was present on Thursday at the laying of the foundation stone of a new pier at Cannes.

—A Bill making duelling a common penal offence has already been presented to the Italian Chambers.

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—The House of Lords sat yesterday for twenty minutes, during which time the Earl of Dudley presented a Bill to amend the Companies Acts, and the Lord Chancellor brought in a Bill to amend the law of evidence in criminal cases. Both measures were read a first time. The House on rising adjourned till Monday.

Replying to a question by Mr. E. Spencer, Mr. Long, in the House of Commons, said he could not specify a date for the withdrawal of the muzzling order. Mr. Chamberlain had no reason to doubt the report that the Duke of Eife and Lord Farquhar had retired from the directorate of the South Africa Company. Questions were also addressed to Ministers as to the recent remarks of the Lord Chief Justice on the granting of bail, the engineering dispute and the Admiralty, the candidature of Prince George, and the progress of events in China, Madagascar, Uganda, and Crete. The debate on the Address was resumed. Mr. Davitt's amendment on Irish distress was rejected on a division by 235 to 153. Mr. J. A. Pease's amendment relating to slavery in Zanzibar, and Sir Howard Vincent's amendment dealing with foreign bounties were also disposed of.

Sir H. Campbell Bannerman speaking at Hanley last night said in foreign policy we were face to face with delicate and difficult questions, every one of them fraught with possibly vital consequences to this country, and there was great need for frankness on the part of the Government. The character given us by the rest of the world he traced to the great strokes of policy and clever enterprises of thirty years ago, introduced by Mr. Disraeli. These were methods not of the astute diplomatist, but of the stock jobber. At the present juncture we must avoid giving wanton provocation. This was a time not for extending but for contracting our responsibilities, and he regarded the words uttered by Lord Salisbury at the opening of Parliament as of solemn import. Now that British troops were to be used in Egypt the country had a right to know what the object of the expedition was. As to the North-West Frontier troubles, he

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believed the policy of the late Government would ultimately be carried into effect.

Addressing the Council of the Liberal Unionist Association at their annual meeting yesterday, the Duke of Devonshire expressed his sense of the importance of their wing as a factor in the Unionist party, and of the necessity for maintaining a separate organization.

Russia has called upon the Porte to set aside from the Greek war indemnity the sum of a million sterling in settlement of this year's instalment of the outstanding arrears of the Russo-Turkish indemnity.

The Spanish Minister at Washington has resigned, in consequence of the publication of his letter to Señor Canalejas. A Correspondent, in discussing the probable effect of this incident on the relations of the two countries, says that while there are many influences in favour of war, the President and the majority of his Cabinet are against it, and will use every means to restrain dangerous elements.

Chief interest at the trial of M. Zola yesterday centred in the evidence of Colonel Henry, of the War Office, and M. Thévenet, an ex-Minister of Justice. The former spoke as to the frequent visits of Maître Leblois to Colonel Picquart at the War Office and the action of that officer in examining secret documents to which he had no right of access.

There was a large gathering of the inhabitants of Hackney in the Town Hall last evening, when a portrait of the Lord Chief Justice was unveiled and handed into the custody of the Vestry, to commemorate the services rendered by Lord Russell as Parliamentary representative of the Division. Lord Spencer, who occupied the chair, spoke of the high esteem in which Lord Russell was held by all classes of his former constituents.

In the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, before the Lord Chief Justice and a special jury, the hearing of the libel suit brought by Mr. Sutherland, a company promoter, against Mr. Hess, of the "South African Critic," was resumed and concluded. After hearing the evidence of the defendant, who firmly adhered to the allegations he had made in the columns of his paper, the jury returned a verdict in his favour, and judgment was given accordingly, with costs.

Further progress was made in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday with the hearing of the action brought by Mr. Spokes, a shareholder of the Grosvenor Hotel Company, against certain directors of the company. Evidence was given by several witnesses as to the method by which it was alleged the price of goods supplied to the hotel at the instance of the defendants was increased. It was also stated that some of the directors visited the shop from which the butcher's meat was supplied, and remained for supper, whilst joints were sent to other officers. The hearing was again adjourned.

Two cases of threats to murder were dealt with at the Central Criminal Court yesterday by Mr. Justice Lawrence. A labourer named Alexander Morgans, who

"To be sure you do," said John, with a friendly and rather tender laugh. "I have always understood that a 'good cry' was a great luxury to young ladies."

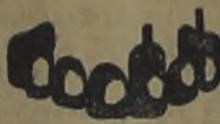
"For pity's sake, don't call me a 'young lady!'" cried Mary, with an assumption of her usually energetic manner. "I do hate that phrase."

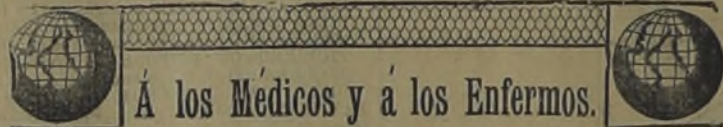
