POLITICAL NOTES.

There is still a dearth of political news, though it is said some important decrees may appear to-day or to morrow. The Council of State did not sit on Wednesday, but should do so to day to open dis-cussion of the electoral reform question. The second part of the electoral reform bills has already made considerable progress in Committee.
The Siglo is still hammering

away about hurrying forward the elections, and now wants to ab breviate the terms fixed for the party conventions for approving the electoral accord. We do not see the least reason for this extraordina ry hurry, nor do we find any reflec tion of it outside limited pol-itical circles. Two months ago the Siglo was crying out that the economical situation could not be relieved from its state of uncertainty and crisis until the dissolution of the Chambers had been effected. turning point. Well, that Rubi-con has been passed in safety, and now the Siglo is reiterating the same cry with regard to the presidential and general elections. could agree with it in the first instance but we cannot in the second. We think that ten or twelve months' respite from political agit ations and instabilities will give an opportunity for administra-tive reform, useful legislation and general economical recovery that will prove of far more value to the country at large than anything to be gained by hurrying forward the elections. The Siglo cannot, without grossly contradicting itself, pretend that the present situation wears the same upsatisfication, threads and the same treats of the same than the present situation wears the same unsatisfactory, threatening and uncertain aspect as that before the dissolution of the Chambers. On the contrary, no paper has proclaimed more heartily the satisfactory nature of the new situation and also its stability. Where, then, is the basis of its arguments for hastening to another change? The Executive has signed and

promulgated the Law prolonging for one year the term for inscrip-tion of births and deaths occurred between Nov. 1, 1896 and the pre-sent date. We do not think it ne-

cessary to give particulars. Conversion of the Treasury Certi ficates for May last commenced yesterday, as also issue of those corresponding to the local obligations for February.

The Indiscretton of Minister Dupuy de Lome.

New York, Feb. 9.

The Cuban Junta here communicated to the Press last night co-pies of a private letter alleged to have been written by Senor Dupuy de Lome, the Spanish Minister at Washington, to Senor Canalejas, the Spanish ex Minister, who re-cently visited the United States and Cuba. In the letter, which is and Cuba. In the letter, which is alleged to have been stolen by a Cuban patriot, and to have been brought here from Havans, Mr. McKinley's message to Congress is described as having undeceived the Cuban insurgents who had exthe Cuban insurgents, who had ex-pected something else, and to have paralysed the action of Congress. «But,» it continues, «I consider it bad. Besides the natural and inevitable coarseness with which he repeats all that the Press and public opinion in Spain have said of General Weyler, it shows once more that Mr McKinley is weak and is catering for the rabclass politician who desires to leave a door open to me and to stand well with the Jingoes of his party. Nevertheless, as a matter of fact, it will only depend on our-selves whether he will prove bad and adverse to us. With military and political success there is always a danger here that the insurgents will be encouraged, if not by the Government, at least by part of public opinion. I do not believe you pay enough attention to the role of England. Nearly till that news-paper canaille which swarms in your hotels are English, and at the same time that they are corres-pondents of the New York «Journal . they are also correspondents of als they are also correspondents of the best newspaper; and reviews of London. It has been thus since the beginning. To my mind the only object of England is that Americans shall occupy themselves with us and leave her in peace, and if there is war so much the better. That would further remove what was threatening her, although that will never happen.

although that will never happen. Washington, Feb. 9. The publication of Senor Dupuy de Lome's letter hand used a profound sensation here, which deepened as the day advanced, and its genuineness was virtually acknowledged, but no serious trouble is anticipated in consequence. The President is resolved, no matter what happens, that Spain shall not have a vestige of excuse for a quarrel with the United States. He recognises the fact that the obno xious letter, if written by the Spanish Minister, was, after all, a personal utterance, and does not re-flect or assume to reflect, the judgment of the Spanish Government. It is an utterance which that Government can disown absolutely without any loss of dignity or injury to it's self-pride, and just now Spain has no more interest in pick ing a quarrel with the United States than they have in seeking trou-ble with her. The President, thereore, made promptly, and after long consulta-tion with the Assistant-Secretary of State, saw no reason to change his conclusion that the prope course is to let the American Minister at Madrid present a copy of the letter to the Foreign Office there, and request its authorship to be investigated by the Minister's own

superior officials. Apart from his general desire to be prudent in his dealings with Spain at this juncture, the Presi-dent had a special purpose in view. He and the other members of the Administration were among the Republicans in public life who criticised most sharply the conduct of Mr Cleveland in giving Lord Sackville his summary conge in 1888 on the strength of the notorious Murchison letter. That pro-ceeding has been denounced by the Republican newspapers and stump speakers as an unwarrant able breach of diplomatic etiquette which Great Britain might very properly have resented to the extent of breaking off diplomatic relations instead of merely leaving her legation empty for a time. To have treated Senor de Lome as Lord Sackville was treated would have placed the McKinley administration and its supporters on the defensive. Thus the President is supplied with a good political ex-cuse when the rabid pro Cuban element in Congress assail him for letting alleged offenders off so

The Largest Cargo Steamers in the World.

To the new White Star steamer Cymric, which has just arrived in Liverpool from the builders, Messrs. Harland and Wolff, of Bel-fast, belongs the distinction of being the largest cargo carrying steamer in the world. She exceeds the Georgic, the next largest steam-er of the White Star fleet, by 2300 ions. Her length over all is 600 feet, her beam 64 feet, and depth 42 feet. In addition to her large cargo capacity the Cymric is fit-ted for the conveyance of live cattle on two decks well clear of the pas-

feature the Cymric differs from the other cargo steamers of the line. She is provided with accommoda-tion for a limited number of cabin passengers. Hitherto saloon passengers have not been carried by the cargo and cattle steamers of the White Star line, but it has seemed to the managers that in the very large vessels which are gradually superseding the earlier steamers in the trade, there is ample space for passengers without interfering with or being interfered with by, accommodation required for cargo and other purposes. The passenger accommodation is similarly arrang ed to that of the Teutonic and Majestic. The saloon is amidships on the upper deck, and is capable of seating about 100 passengers. In case of need accommodation can be arranged for a considerable number of steerage passengers, and the that she may readily be adapted for the conveyance of troops.

The Increase of Snicide.

It is by no means comforting to find that, although the deaths which take place from fevers, from tuberculosis, and such like scourges are diminishing, those from suicide and diseases of the nervous system are increasing. It is difficult indeed, to withhold the thought that there may be some connexion between that increase in the power of the healing art and that extension of charitable efforts to save and to prolong the lives of the feeble and the sick, which are such marked characteristics of modern times, and the apparent increase in that particular class of diseases which are most distinct ly hereditary, and especially of that final nervous defect which leads a man to deprive himself of life. The Harveian Orator for this year has shown how civilisation in the modern sense of the term is founded upon science, and therefore will endure. But when science devotes itself to saving life, while to the individual does good, it is by no means certain that it does good also to the race; and when the saving of life means the saving from their natural fate of those who are unfit, unaided, to attain maturity, to support themselves, or to resist the rougher influences which the race must resist if it is to continue, then we may question how far science is doing good to the com-munity. Au American writer, Dr. Lawrence Irwell, says: «Never in the history of the world was there a time when such strenuous efforts were made to prolong the lives of the absolutely unfit, that they might have an opportunity of reproducing their kind. Never was there a race which suffered as the Englishspeaking race is now suffering from the fertility of the worst speci-mens of humanity. With each generation the vitality of the community is being reduced by manner of life, and in order to enable it to continue the fight against the inevitable laws of nature all sorts of artificial aids have been invented. False teeth, spectacles, ear trumpets, wigs
—to say nothing of predigested foods—are a few of the contrivances with which we are trying to carry out the pernicious doctrine of the survival of the unfittest.» Among other signs of the degener acy which is said to follow in the steps of all our endeavours to help the sick and the afflicted-who, according to the doctrine of heredity, we ought to leave to perishis the growing number of suicides, of people who if not, as the jury generally has it, «temporarily insane, are at least of such a degenerate fibre that they cannot stand up against the worries of the world -Hospital.

-The question of a holiday on the Saturday before Easter Sunday (Sabado de gloria) has not been lost sight of, and a note in the Telé-grafo Maritimo of Wednesday contains a timely reminder The difficulty, we understand, lies with bank and commercial bills falling due on the holidays, legislative enactment being necessary to prolong their effectivity until the first working day following. This could be set-tled in a quarter of an hour by the Council of State, but it is necessary that the attention of that body should be directed officially to the matter. We think that if a deputation of five or six prominent busi-ness men waited on the Minister of Finance, there would be no further difficulty. For years past commerce and the banks have been agitating to obtain this holiday, yet, simple as the matter is, have not succeeded, mainly for the reason that the recent governments took a positive delight in snub-bing them in every way That is not the case with the present Government, so there should be no difficulty in attaining the desired

-More rain! After an interval of about three fine days, heavy rain fell at intervals yesterday afternoon and evening. This is surely one of the wettest summers on record. The recent rains are doing considerable harm in the camp, spoiling the maize crop, as the new grain is coming in all damp, and producing foot disease -All sorts of special trains have

been run over Kansas railroads, but the oddest one yet is reported from Fort Scott, It ran from Parsons to Appleton City, Mo, and consisted of one car and a locomotive. On one of the seats of the car, under the watchful eye of the brakesman, rested a small bottle, and it was to convey this bottle that the special train was run. A doctor at Appleton City had broken his leg, and lockjaw fol-lowed. A certain kind of medicine was needed which could not be procured nearer than Parsons, one hundred miles away, and the spe-cial train was called to go in quest of it. The run was made at a faster

—A last! A Rome telegram says
that the initiative of the socialist deputies in favor of a law depressing duelling is finding favor throughout the peninsula, and in several cities public manifestations are being held in its support. If this ef-fect is confirmed, the death of Cavallotti will not have been entirely

-Yesterday's telegrams keep up the excitement over the Cuban question. The vote of 50 million dollars by the U.S. Congress for defence expenses is fully confirmed, and seems to have made a good impression in the U. States but the reverse in Spain .- A New York telegram, the reliability of which we entirely doubt, asserts that the Investigating Committee into the loss of the Maine has already reported that the explosion was due to exterior causes, and that from the nature of the damages caused it could only have been produced by some explosive furnished by Spanish functionaries belong-ing to the arsenal or one of the ports of Havana. This very serious assertion has not been confirmed by any later telegram and may safely be quarantined for the present.—A Havana telegram reports an «important» victory over the rebels, in which nearly a dozen of them were kill-ed!-The U.S. Senate has authorized the Committee investigating the loss of the «Maine» to admit one journalist selected by themselves to the enquiry. (We hope they will choose one who can confine himself to the truth.) -The reports respecting the withdrawal of U.S. Consul Lee from Havana seem effectually set at rest by the Spanish Government having sent a note, which has been published in Washington, expressing approv-al of the correct manner in which he discharges his duties. (This will enrage the Spanish jingoes.)—The reports about purchases of war vessels by Spain continue to be hopelessly contradictory Panic continues on the Madrid Bolsa - There seems little doubt about the fererish activity of the war preparations in the United States. The naval Attaches in the foreign Legations have been instructed to procure for the U. States the option of various war vessels in construction. It is said the U.S. Government has a special eye on the Chilian cruiser .O' Higgins» and the Argentine «San Martin. - The French papers recommend the arbitration of the Pope or the Czar to settle any questions between the United States and Spain and thus avoid a war which would be ruinous to civilisation.» (We do not think either country would consent. The jingo element is too strong in both.)—The U. S. Government has ordered the urgent purchase of 300,000 tons of coal. If this causes the U. S. miners to make exorbitant demands, the coal will be bought elsewhere. - The U. S. squadron on the Asiatic coast is to be strengthened at once (again with a view to the Phillipines) probably by the armour-clad «Oregon.» -According to a Washington telegram, Dr. Lesser of the U.S.

Red Cross Association has reported that, according to official data of Spanish origin, out of the 800,000 concentrados in Cuba, 400,000 have already died from famine and disease, and of the remainder another 200,000 may be regarded as doomed. This is the handiwork of the property of the execrable butcher Weyler. He could not subdue the Cubans by force of arms so he made war on their women and children with famine and plague. Yet, oblivious of the fact that his proceedings are not merely a deep disgrace to Spain but a discredit to modern

iards so infatuated that they would send him back Cuba to resume his savage cruelties. If Spain ever does this, she will effectually lose what little sym-pathy may be left for her among the civilised peoples of the earth.

-We received yesterday by post

from Buenos Aires an Address to the Carlists in South America, containing a lengthy manifesto from the Pretender Don Carlos of Bourbon, also the Carlist answer to the United States. When we found that one of the first items on the latter was the immediate return of Weyler to Cuba, we threw it aside with disgust and read no further.

-The movement in America in favour of children under fifteen being required to be at home by eight o'clock in winter and nine in summer is steadily growing, more than 300 cities and towns having already adopted the Curlew Ordinance, as it is called, the last being Indianapolis, whose city council recently voted in fav-our of it by twelve to seven. The movement originated in 1894, when the Boys and Girls's National Home and Employment Associa-tion, organised to study the matter of hoodlumism and crime among boys, resolved that the revival of the curfew was the only practical way that an improvement could be attempted. So far experience has

-The telegrams announce serious disorders in Bombay. The native fanatics have revolted against the Sanitary Commissioners who were removing plague-stricken patients, and have stoned to death five or six men of the Shropshire regiment, and have also attacked one of the hospitals, burning the administrative offices and the stores. Marines had to be landed from the war vessels in the bay, and they and the armed police fired on the mutinous crowd, killing and wounding several. The situation is regarded as rather serious, and the garrison troops are not considered sufficient to restore order unaided.

-The unfortunate Zola is now being persecuted by the experts summoned in his trial, who are prosecuting him for having declared that they were either idiots or giving their evidence in bad faith! They ask for trifling damages of 100,000 francs.

-The Argentine police seem to have found a clue to the robbery of \$30,000 from the river steamer Paris > perpetrated a few days ago, the details of which have been kept mysteriously quiet.

-Our contemporaries are recalling the affair of the Military Hospital. The Hospital was estimated to cost \$185,000; it is calculated that \$350,000 has been subscribed, and the subscription in the form of a compulsory discount on military pay still goes on, yet the Hospital (which is on the site of the old cricket-field of the M.V.C.C. on the Union Road) is barely half completed and work has been entirely suspended for some two years or more, so that the buildings are falling to decay. There is evidently scope for an «investigation»

- According to a London telegram, statistics of the commerce of Great Britain with her colonies and with foreign countries during the month of February show a substantial increase in imports, which the Argentine Republic holds a prominent place. Among imports from Argentine ports those of cattle and sheep and frozen meat take the first rank. The importation of wool has declined by 19.500. 000 pounds; but the decrease has occurred solely in Australian wools There is an increase in Argentine wool.

—Don Bernardo Irigoyen has been elected Governor of the Province of Buenos Aires by 62 votes to 50, and Dr. Alfredo Demarchi

has been elected Vice-Governor.

—A Buenos Aires contemporary reports the rapid recovery of the Rev. Mr. Grubb, who was laid up in the British Hospital from a bad wound he received from the arrow of an Indian in Paraguay. Mr. Grubb is now convalescent and will soon leave the Hospital.

It seems that it sprang at once into fame, 100,000 copies being sold during the subsequent being sold during the subsequent ten years of the author's life. Till the two-and-twentieth edition in 1728, it appeared in the small octave form, when it was issued in larger octave and illustrated. It was also printed at Boston in New England in 1681, and a Dutch translation was issued in Amsterdam in 1682. This last, and a subsequent edition of a superior character, issued in 1685, were illustrated by Dutch engravers, then the leaders of the art of engraving the leaders of the art of engraving in Europe. «The Pilgrim's Pro-gress» was translated into Welsh, Walloon French, German, Polish, and Swedish between 1688 and 1743 It may be met with in Asia in Hebrew, Arabic, and other languages; in India, in Hindustani, and many dialects. It has also been translated for readers in Assam. Burma, Borneo, West and Central Burma, Borneo, West and Central Africa, the South Sea Islands, and for some tribes of American Indians. Since then it has been translated into no fewer than eighty-four languages and dialects, the versions in Japanese and the Canton vernacular being admirably illustrated by native are admirably illustrated by native ar-tists who have adapted the scenery and customs to those of their own

LONDON NOTES

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 10. On the motion to present an Address to the Queen in reply to the Royal Speech opening Parlia-ment, Mr. Davitt yesterday moved an amendment in the House of Commons dealing with the subject of distress in Ireland. It urged the necessity first of applying measures of temporary relief on a large and generous scale to the suffering districts; and secondly, of introduc-ing legislation calculated to avert the constant recurrence of famine in the affected areas. Mr. Gerald Ballour assured the House that the Government had given the most earnest consideration to the problem of relieving distress, and detailed steps already taken and steps proposed to be taken with that object. The debate was ad-




