POLITICAL NOTES.

The paucity of political news of general interest continues. The Government is now turning its attention to the Budget, which should be presented shortly. With this object the «Commission of Salaries», which has been steadily at work now for nearly four months, will shortly present its Report, on which the new Budget, as regards administrative expenses, will be based. It is understood that the Commission will indicate the way for reduction, both in salaries and in numbers, in practically every branch of the public service. The economy thus attained will enable the Executive to present a Budget with a surplus which may be applicable either to public works or to the much-needed reduction of some of the more exorbitant taxes. And as under the present Government the revenue is likely to recover and increase, the task of the Government will thereby become easier. In this connection it is worth while calling attention to the improvement which has already taken place in the most important branch of revenue, the Customs Receipts, since September last, the month in which peace was concluded. This is shown in the following table:—

The comparison, it will be noted, is with months preceding the actual civil war. There is good reason to hope that during the present year the Customs Receipts will recover their normal level and be well over the ten million mark.

According to the *Siglo*, the Report about to be presented by the Committee appointed to investigate the affairs of the Direction General of Direct Taxes, will be entirely favorable to that Department and to its Director Sr. Francisco Fernandez. In this respect it will be a contrast to the Reports of nearly all the other investigating Committees. It will be consoling to know that there is at least one public Department free from disorder and immorality.

The Executive has resolved to accept the resignation, from reasons of health, of Col. De Leon as Chief of the Arsenal, and will probably give the post to Col. Bassano, Director of the Military Academy, the latter being succeeded by the present sub-director Col. Gregorio Lamas (brother to the revolutionary leader.) Another change in prospect is the superannuation of Sr. Leopoldo Gard, for a great many years General Accountant of the Nation, on account of advanced age and ill-health, and the appointment in his place of Sr. E. Madalena, for many years 1st Official of the Ministry of Finance.

It now appears that the meeting against the Tribunals which it was proposed to hold on Sunday was forbidden by the authorities as «subversive to one of the high Powers of the State.» This reason is rather comic, coming from a Government which has just dissolved the Chambers.

The *Siglo* in its review of the past week can find nothing to talk about except the electoral question, which excites very little interest outside political circles, and asserts that «Everybody is fully convinced the only way to assure the patriotic political and financial evolution initiated by Sr. Cuestas consists in reestablishing as soon as possible the regimen of free institutions, giving the constitutional presidency of the Republic to the present First Magistrate de facto, and letting the representatives of the people take possession of the seats temporarily occupied by the members of the Council of State.» If the *Siglo* means by this that everyone is convinced of the necessity of hastening forward the elections, we beg to differ with it. So far as we have been able to judge, such an idea only prevails in limited political circles, whilst in others it is either regarded with indifference or more generally with positive opposition. We cannot repeat too often that the economical interests of the Republic require a respite from political agitations and changes.

The cadets of the Military Academy who were recently arrested for insubordination have all been released, and have been told they may return to their studies provided they signify compliance to the orders of the Government.

Saturday being the anniversary of the outbreak of the revolution, Col. Lamas received a visit of congratulation from the members of the «blancos» Committee and other prominent «blancos.» A congratulatory letter was also sent to Aparicio Saravia. The «blancos» in Buenos Aires celebrated the occasion by a banquet at Mercer's restaurant.

The *Razon* states that the present state of the proposed «electoral accord» is more or less as follows.—The «blanco» committee have resolved to accept the idea of an «accord» subject to its ulterior reference to a convention of the party to be held in Montevideo on April 12. Steps are already being taken for the nomination of departmental delegates to attend this convention. Meanwhile, the Direct-ive Committee of the «colorados» (independents) have asked the Committees of the other two parties to name their representatives to discuss the bases of the «accord.» This will be done in the present week. The «colorados» will be represented by Srs. Battle y Ordonez, P. E. Carve and Camps.

The Coup d'Etat.

We quote the following remarks from the *South American Journal* of Feb. 12.—

«To those who have kept themselves au courant with affairs in Uruguay the news we have this week received from Montevideo will not have been surprising. What has happened was inevitable, except in the event of either one or other of the opposing parties making submission. As our readers are aware, the Legislative Chambers of the Republic, which had been packed with the partisans of the late President Borda, most of them fully committed, in their own interests, to the evil and corrupt traditions of his sinister administration, from the first offered a strenuous resistance to the higher and more honest policy adopted by Señor Cuestas, who, after Sr. Borda's assassination, assumed the duties of the Presidency, with the emphatic consent and endorsement of public opinion. The majority of these so-called representatives adopted most equivocal means to frustrate the Presidential election of Señor Cuestas, who has only acceded to the national wish, as almost universally expressed, in finally resolving, as we now learn that he has done, to dissolve this non-descript assembly. . . . Señor Cuestas has issued a proclamation to the country, affirming the excellent condition of the finances, but announcing that, owing to the determined opposition of the Parliamentary majority, he had determined to dissolve the Chambers, and appoint a Council of State, to consist of 88 members, two-thirds being Colorados and the remainder Blancos. From a telegram, received by the Central Uruguay Railway Company, from Montevideo, under date of 10th inst., we gather that the action of Señor Cuestas has met with general approval. «Everything,» it is added, «is favourable, no commotion expected.» For ourselves, we think that Señor Cuestas has done what necessarily imposed upon him in the supreme interests of the Uruguay Republic.»

Violent Storm in «La Union».

Although the storm of Saturday afternoon presented no remarkable features in the city and the bay, it seems to have assumed a cyclonic force in La Union and the suburbs between that and the city, doing considerable damage. The cyclonic gust commenced at 4.10 p. m. but fortunately lasted less than five minutes. A small one-story house in Calle Industria, occupied by Sr. Pereira and his family, had its zinc roof lifted off and blown to a distance of two squares. At the same time the walls collapsed, burying the inmates, all of whom were more or less severely bruised by the falling bricks. The walls of a house in construction near «Arroyo Malvin» were blown down, burying a laborer named Gasparino, who was very severely injured and had to be taken to the Hospital. Two others were also slightly injured. In the Light Artillery Barracks, the zinc roof of the stables was blown completely off and part of the walls blown down. At the Cricket field of the M. V. C. C. the greater part of the roof of the grand stand was blown away and the structure considerably injured. There are numerous other cases of zinc roofs being blown off and walls injured, in fact there was scarcely a house that did not experience damage of some kind. The telephone and telegraph posts were blown down all along the road, impeding the circulation of the trams for some time. Some extraordinary examples are given of the fearful force of the wind. A tramcar that was leaving the station was lifted off the rails and turned completely round. A man who was on mule back was lifted off his steed and landed in the middle of the road. In one of the *casuarinas* a chair that was lifted up and blown against the partition door, smashing all the glass. Some of the houses shook so, that the inhabitants thought it was an earthquake and ran out into the road. The breakage of windows, doors and skylights was tremendous. So violent a storm is not remembered, and it is fortunate that it was of short duration.

We learn that the storm was also felt with great violence at Cerro de Victoria and at Maldonado. Stormy weather with heavy rains is reported from nearly all parts of the Republic, causing interruptions in the postal and telegraphic services.

SUNDRIES.

—Sunday proving fine—though not brilliant—and not too hot, the resuscitation (and burial) of Carnival in the Union was a great success. A considerable number of visitors, maskers and «comparsas» went out from the city, and there was a constant stream of vehicles in the Calle 18 de Julio, whilst the trams did a roaring trade. On the way back one of the «comparsas» showing an excess of liveliness, got into trouble with the police, and some six-teen of them were marched off to duance vile in their paint (burnt-cork) and feathers. One of the policeman was rather roughly handled by them in the encounter. In the evening, the Plaza Independencia was unusually thronged to listen to the concert provided by the united military bands, which proved very fine. It is noteworthy that the police had to deal with more disorderly cases this Sunday, than on the previous one when Carnival was in full swing in the city. Fortunately none of them were very serious.

The telegraphic sensation of the day has been afforded by the death, on Sunday morning, of Sr. Felice Cavallotti, in a duel over some political squabble, with his fellow Deputy Sr. Ferucio Macola. Sr. Cavallotti, it appears, rushed upon his opponent's sword which entered his mouth and palate, inflicting a horrible wound from which he died in a few minutes without being able to utter a word. Sr. Cavallotti, who was 46 years of age, was a prominent political character in Italy, poet, writer of force and virulence, and leader of the «extreme left» He had fought some thirty duels previously. His opponent was editor of the *Gazzetta Venetiana*, and there had been an angry political polemic between them. The affair has caused a great sensation in Italy. If it affords any check to the barbarous and utterly illogical custom of duelling it will not be without its good effects.

We are requested to announce that the golf season will be opened on Sunday next, at Punta Carretas, commencing at 2.30 p. m., with a match between the President's side and the Vice-President's side. —The Judge of Crime Dr. Ballesteros has passed the following sentences in cases heard last week.—Seven years imprisonment on Teresa Rodriguez, for the murder of her daughter aged 4, in Nov. 1896, it being shown that the

murderess was not entirely in her right mind at the time.—Sixteen years imprisonment on Federico Chambroni for the murder of his partner Antonio Bosco and the attempted murder of the latter's wife, in May, 1896.

—Mr. and Mrs. W. Harvey, of the London and Brazilian Bank, arrived in the «Oropesa» on Saturday, and received a hearty welcome from their many friends here. They left last night for Buenos Aires, to visit their friends there, and will return on Friday, leaving on Saturday for Rio Grande. During their stay here they were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. J. Oldham.

—We acknowledge receipt of the third monthly edition of the useful little «Guia de Bolsillo» published by Mr. C. W. Reiff, and of *El Estudiante*, a new and diminutive weekly devoted to the interests of the students in the preparatory classes and edited by themselves.

—Col. Picquart's first duel, that with Col. Henry, was fought in the suburbs of Paris on Saturday. Col. Picquart had the satisfaction of wounding his challenger, severely according to one telegram, slightly according to another. Of course this absurd proceeding goes a long way towards solving the Dreyfus case.

—Friday last, the *B. A. Standard* reminds its readers, was the first anniversary of one of the most brutal murders ever committed in Buenos Aires, that of unfortunate Mr. Wanklyn. A year has quickly rolled away, but not a word has yet been heard of even the trial of his murderer much less his punishment, though the criminal was taken red-handed. This is, unfortunately, only one of many cases. No wonder, in face of the recent wave of bloody crime, that our Argentine colleagues are at last calling for punishment for murder. But will the Judges of the land and the Government listen to their most just demand? Aye, there's the rub! In respect to their late partner's memory, the offices of Messrs. Tosso, Crane and Co. were closed yesterday. Dr. Garcia Merou, the lawyer representing Mr. Wanklyn's family, has addressed a strong protest on the matter to the Judge. The delay it appears, arises from the doctors, who cannot be brought together to report upon the murderer's sanity.

—Wonderful! The Clerk of the Weather has actually condescended to give us a fine Sunday, making perhaps the second in about fourteen weeks.

—The *B. A. Standard* of Sunday has two articles of unusual interest, one giving account of Mr. Grubb's missionary experiences and explorations in the Chaco, and the other giving account of Professor Hatcher's explorations among the Auracanos, Tehuelches and Yaghan Indians of Patagonia. We are sorry we cannot undertake to reproduce them, but we hope the *Standard* will give us more of this description.

—We have received a copy of the book «Impresiones Intimas» of Scenes and Episodes of the Revolution of 1897, written by Sr. Luis Ponce de Leon, Standard Bearer of Headquarters of the Revolutionary Army, just published by Dornaleche and Reyes. It is an interesting little work, containing descriptive scenes and incidents of the recent civil war, from the point of view of one who was at the side of the leaders throughout the struggle, and narrated in an unaffected and straightforward style. Sr. Ponce de Leon may be congratulated on an interesting and useful contribution to the literature of the revolution, which no doubt will find a large circle of readers.

—Here's another geographical gem from an English exchange.—At Rosario, the Chicago of the Argentine, a successful sailors' home and mission has been established at Montevideo.

—Bishop Stirling of the Falkland Islands will be leaving for England about the middle of next month.

—Here's the correct version of a London telegram published here in an unintelligible form.—Government has asked and obtained from Parliament a credit of £10,000 sterling to be applied to the payment of an indemnity to the families of French missionaries recently assassinated in Uganda. Great Britain considers herself under this obligation, as the territory in which the massacres occurred was under her protection.

—We call attention to the announcement of the Autumn Lawn Tennis Tournament, which will commence on Sunday the 20th instant, entries closing on the 15th.

—Owing to the damage done to the Pavilion and Fives Courts by the storm of Saturday afternoon, play in the Bat Fives Tournament was impossible on Sunday, and the Tournament is consequently postponed until the necessary repairs have been accomplished.

—We observe in home papers the announcement of the death of Mr. William McPherson, successively British Consul General at Barcelona, Malaga and Madrid.

His chief passport to posterity is that he translated the whole of Shakespeare's plays into Spanish, a literary task of some magnitude and not a little difficult.

—The races which should have taken place at Maroñas on Sunday were postponed on account of the bad state of the course. It is hoped to hold them next Sunday, when there will be the additional attraction of a bivouac of the National Guard Volunteers in the centre of the course.

—The bridge of the Chacarita on the Maldonado road, before reaching Manga (we hope our readers know where this may be) was inaugurated on Sunday in the presence of the Minister of Finance Dr. Mendoza and the members of the Municipal Board.

—The attractions of Klondike have drawn away two residents of Nueva Palmira, one of them bearing the name of Macdonald. Where there's an adventure, there will be a Scotchman.

—H. M. S. «Flora» has gone south for gun practice.

—According to a Chicago telegram, Dr. Edwin Klebs, Professor of Bacteriology in the Chicago University, has just discovered the bacillus of yellow fever. We wonder if Dr. Klebs ever heard of Prof. Sanarelli.

—On Saturday evening, in Calle Isla de Flores, a policeman named Sarabado was attacked and severely stabbed by a rowdy named Andrés Villar alias Truco whom he tried to arrest for disorderly conduct in an *almacen*. According to a contemporary, Villar, who is a notorious bad character, has several times been sentenced to terms of imprisonment for crimes of violence, but always manages to get out without completing his term. After some trouble, Villar and two accomplices were arrested.

—The telegrams have plenty to say, as usual, about Cuba and the «Maine» but nothing that can be regarded as reliable. There are some very contradictory assertions about the removal of Consul Lee from Cuba, which lead us to think the whole tale is a concoction of the Spanish jingo papers.

BUENOS AIRES.

—The idea of raising a subscription for the purchase of a national war-ship seems to be making headway. Throughout the provinces several meetings have been held and committees organized to initiate collections. More than a thousand people attended the meeting held in the Operai Italiano hall in this city the night before last, and a committee was appointed to collect funds. Many generous offers have been made by wealthy people towards the object, and the employees of many of the public offices, banks, &c. have intimated their willingness to subscribe from 3 to 5 per cent. of their salaries in order to contribute to the purchase of a warship for the Nation.

—Dr. and Mrs. McLaughlin were the objects of a very pleasant little surprise on Thursday night. After the official board of the Church had transacted the usual business, Dr. Drees rose and stated that he had been instructed by the Board to serve a writ of ejection on the pastor and his wife—to wit, that they were ordered to leave Buenos Aires forthwith and take a holiday. They might take their choice of Mar del Plata or the mountains of Cordoba. Following his remarks the Doctor presented on behalf of the Board and a few friends a generous purse, and stated that in addition to this the Board would present them with tickets, to and from any point they might select. We learn that they have chosen the mountains, and start this morning. Dr. Drees stated that this was a slight expression of the very deep esteem in which the pastor and his wife were held for their faithful work in the Church. He said in closing that the Board had instructed him to request Bishop Warren to re-appoint Dr. McLaughlin as pastor of the Church. According to the general law of the Church a pastor is permitted to stay at the utmost five years in the same locality. The Board of Bishops at their recent meeting in the United States, however, ruled that the first Church of Buenos Aires came under the law of ejections and the pastor of that church might be allowed to remain for an indefinite time. In common with the many friends of Dr. McLaughlin in our city, we should have great pleasure in learning that Bishop Warren had resolved to continue the pastorate of the genial Doctor in our midst.

—The Annual General Meeting of the Prince George's Hall Company was held last night, Mr. Andrew McIntosh in the chair. There were 28 shareholders present, representing over 3000 shares. The Report of the Directors was submitted to the Meeting and adopted. It was resolved to empower the Directors to declare an interim dividend in the course of the year, Messrs. A. McIntosh, J. N. Drysdale and J. C. Gibson were

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 5. The Berlin Press, in commenting upon the reported agreement between Great Britain, France, and Russia for the settlement of the Cretan question by the appointment of Prince George as Governor, expresses the opinion that England can no longer be regarded as occupying an isolated position in Europe, and that the change of policy now inaugurated at St. Petersburg defeats the efforts so long made to organise a Continental Coalition against her.

Further details of the fighting on the Mekran coast show that the enemy numbered about 1,500, and that their losses in killed included Baluch Khan and other chiefs. The British loss was small. Damodar Chapekar has been found guilty of the murder of Lieutenant Ayerst and Mr. Rand on Jubilee Day at Poona, and has been sentenced to death.

A remarkable Liberal victory was achieved in South East Durham on Thursday in the contest for the seat rendered vacant by the death of Sir H. Havelock-Allan. The votes were counted yesterday morning, the official declaration showing that 6,286 votes were cast for Alderman Richardson, the Liberal, and 6,011 for the Hon. F. W. Lambton, the Unionist. The Liberal minority of 114 at the last election was thus converted into a majority of 275. This is the gain of a seat to the Liberals.

Mr. Gerald Balfour, in the course of his annual address to his constituents in Central Leeds last night, said the Government were in no way flinching from the position they had taken up on the Chinese question, and their policy remained firm in accordance with the declarations members of the Cabinet had made on the subject. The time had not arrived for any statement to be made as to the negotiations for the proposed loan. The Irish Local Government Bill, which would be introduced early in the coming Session, would be as democratic as the system already established in England and Scotland.

Under the presidency of Mr. A. Spicer, M.P., a National Welsh Convention was held at Cardiff yesterday to consider the question of party organization in the Principality. There were about 500 delegates present, and the proceedings were characterised by much enthusiasm. The constitution of a Federation on the general principles suggested by the Welsh members was adopted, and a resolution was passed condemning the home and foreign policy of the Government, and demanding legislation on lines acceptable to the majority of the Welsh people.

Yesterday the London Chamber of Commerce held a largely-attended special meeting to consider the question of sugar bounties. Sir A. Rollit, M.P., Sir T. Sutherland, M.P., and General Laurie, M.P., took part in the discussion which resulted in the passing of a resolution denouncing foreign sugar bounties as a violation of Free Trade, and calling for their abolition in the interests of British commerce.

Cold weather prevailed generally in all parts of Great Britain yesterday, and snow storms and showers of sleet occurred in many districts. The first snow of the present winter fell in London, and the day was the coldest experienced in the metropolis since the middle of January.

During the hearing of a case which came before Mr. Justice Wright, in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, in which a widow lady sued the trustees of an estate because of the alleged insanitary condition of her house, it was shown that one of the defendants' agents was a member of the Paddington Vestry, that the builder employed to do the work was a vestryman also, and that the sanitary inspector who passed the work was a son of the builder. Mr. Justice Wright remarked that this state of things was a reproach to the whole system of local government.

Early yesterday morning a disastrous railway collision occurred at Barassie Junction, near Ayr, on the Glasgow and South-Western Railway. A local passenger train and a goods train were travelling towards one another on the

same line of metals, and when they met the impact was terrific. Both trains were wrecked. The driver and stoker of the goods train, the fireman of the passenger train, and four passengers were killed, making seven deaths in all, and a number of persons received injuries of a more or less serious character. The up and down lines were blocked by the debris for many hours, but were subsequently cleared, and the traffic has been resumed. An extradition case was disposed of at Bow-street yesterday, in which the plea was raised for the defence that the prisoner, having been born in a portion of Lorraine ceded to Germany by the Treaty of Frankfurt, and never having submitted himself to the law of France, was not a subject for extradition to France, and could not be tried by the laws of that country. Sir John Bridge, in ordering the prisoner's committal, expressed his opinion that the plea was not a very sound one.
