POLITICAL NOTES.

Entirely contradictory reports continue to circulate about the state of the «electoral accord» and it is difficult to say how the matter stands. The dominant «colorados» from whom the concessions should come, show no signs of budging from their original pretensions. The conciliators or mediators are still working hard to bring the parties once more together. The *Nacion*, in an evidently inspired article, seems to take it for granted that the «accord» has fallen through, and accordingly urges the prompt sanction of electoral reform that the question may be settled by an appeal to the electorate, giving assurance that the elections will be conducted with entire impartiality. It points out that an «accord» does not mean the free exercise of the suffrage nor the direct intervention of the electors and consequently Chambers born of an «accord» would have less moral authority and prestige and would be less genuinely representative than Chambers arising from contested elections. This is undeniably true, but the *Nacion* in putting forward these arguments overlooks the fact that the object of the «accord» is to avoid the political agitations which would arise from contested elections, and which many think would be prejudicial and even dangerous to the country just now. In any case it is the «colorados», not the «blancos» who have most to fear from contested elections, and if the former, by their excessive pretensions, make the «accord» impossible, the responsibility for any danger to their own party must rest entirely with themselves.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law declaring Saturday in Holy Week to be a holiday. For the present year only bills falling due on that day are transferred to the Monday following; on succeeding years they will be due on the Wednesday previous, Thursday and Friday being also holidays.

The Ministry of War has issued a Decree dismissing from the Military Academy ten cadets who have refused to accept the resolution of the Government concerning permanence of their grade of ensigns. The vacancies are to be filled by competitive examination.

Some attention has been attracted by a lengthy conference between President Cuestas and General Justino Muniz, the «blanco» officer who distinguished himself by fighting against his partisans in the recent revolution. The interview is said to have been very cordial, and the President is said to be fully convinced of the adhesion of General Muniz to the new situation, about which our contemporaries seem to have felt some doubt.

Some surprise has been occasioned by the circulation of rumors that the Government contemplates the creation of two or three new regiments. The announcement, which certainly requires corroboration, is certainly

ly contrary to the plan of strict economy followed by the Government, nor is it understood what necessity it has for increasing its military strength. We doubt if there is any truth in the report.

The Government has again sent a circular to the Departmental Prefects urging on them the necessity of strictly limiting the number of official passages issued by them.

The Swindler Armadale.
Armadale's examination was finished on Tuesday, and the public is now in possession of a few more particulars of his career. He still says his name is Charles Edward Prescott, and that he is the son of Charles and C. Prescott, of Dublin, where he was born. When quite a child he was sent away to a boarding school, and subsequently went to Melbourne to an uncle there. While there he entered into business, and according to his own statement, information respecting him can be obtained from several firms there. In Australia he married Miss Florence Loveband in 1877, who died the following year, 1878. It is a coincidence that his capture by the police in England took place on the very day which completed the 20th anniversary of his wife's death. It was after this, while still in Australia, that he says he became acquainted with Danby, whom he represents as having acquired an extraordinary influence over him, to such an extent indeed as to induce him to adopt the name of Danby, and to take his passage by the *Tongararo* in that name, and as the uncle of the younger man. It was on board the *Tongararo* that Danby planned his scheme for robbing the bank judging from information he obtained from a young lady passenger, that the Argentine Republic was a suitable field for the employment of his peculiar talents. Armadale further states that he only remained four weeks in Buenos Aires and that he was not here when the robbery was effected, having in fact fled from the evil influence and bad company of Danby, when the latter began to unfold to him the grand «coup» he was meditating on the bank. Being poor, he accepted some clothes from Danby which accounts for his being in possession of shirts marked with his name, but he never received any of the proceeds of the bank robbery. But how did Danby gain possession of Armadale's cheque book, which he made use of for the forgery? Armadale's explanation is that he dropped the book, which doubtless Danby secured and made use of. This it will be seen, according to Armadale, Danby was always the moving spirit if not the only actor in the business. He explains the fact of taking his passage in the name of Charles Edward, by stating that he wanted to get away unknown to Danby, who he was afraid would make enquiries after him. As for his first denials of having been introduced at the English Club at Montevideo, he admitted, on being pressed to having been taken to some house where he was well received, it might have been a club, but he did not know.

As the case is still «sub judice» we of course refrain from commenting on it, and our readers will doubtless draw their own conclusions from Mr. Armadale's statements.—*B. A. Standard.*

SUNDRIES.

—There is no advance over the Cuban question; this week will probably be the critical one. Various telegrams from Washington and New York contain obviously premature statements concerning the conclusions of the Maine investigation Committee, all assigning the explosion to an exterior cause and on the other hand a message from Madrid assigns it to an interior cause. Another Madrid message, equally unreliable, says the Committee comes to no definite conclusion. Feverish preparations for war continue in the United States. President McKinley has named a Commission of National Defence. Capt. Rob D. Evans has been given command of a flying squadron composed of the cruisers «Cincinnati», «Castine», «Wilmington» (these composing the S. Atlantic squadron) «Albatross», «New Orleans» and others. Orders have been given to paint the U. S. vessels black, which is war color. The Spanish torpedo flotilla has left the Canaries, it is believed for Cuba or for Puerto Rico. The news of this has caused great excitement in the United States and is regarded as another provocation. The telegrams keep silent as to what is doing in Spain.

—The Capt. Evans mentioned above is a veteran officer who ranks Capt. Chester by length of service only. Both are veterans of the last war, and the flying squadron will be «put into it» on any occasion offering.—Capt. William Simpson, Commander of the N. Atlantic squadron, has been promoted to the rank of Commodore. The naval militia has been called out on all the coast States on both sides of the Atlantic.

—There was a tremendous crush at the Lourdes Chapel on Thursday evening to witness the marriage of Professor Sanarelli to Miss Maria Pons. The ceremony was conducted by the Rev. Father Pons uncle of the bride. After the ceremony there was a reception in the house of the bride's parents. The newly married couple even the recipients of numerous and valuable presents.

On Friday night a gang of burglars broke into the house of Dr. Horacio Garcia Lagos, Calle Florida 112. It is believed they effected an entrance from the back. They had evidently ransacked the house, turning over all the furniture, but it does not seem that they actually stole anything, though a large bag full of small articles was found in the passage ready for removal. The family had been living outside for some months and Don Horacio had taken the precaution of leaving the safe open to show that there was nothing in it. From various indications it is believed that the thieves are the same who have been concerned in several similar attempts of late, and whom the police are particularly anxious to catch.

—They must be hard-up for invention of malicious rumors in Buenos Aires, when they say that Dr. Julio Herrera's house in Montevideo is being watched by the police. The police have something better to do than to watch an unoccupied house.

—The following note appears in a recent London paper:—«Mr. Barnard moved that the death of Henry Lavery, of Liverpool, should be presumed on or since February 27, 1897. Mr. Lavery sailed as a passenger on board the steamship Hydarnes from Liverpool for the River Plate, but on May 26, 1896, the vessel was posted at Lloyd's as missing, and the underwriters paid as on a total loss. Notice had been given to the New York Life Insurance Company, wherein Mr. Lavery was insured in a policy for \$1,500. The deceased left a widow and three infant children. Mr. Justice Gorell Barnes gave leave to presume the death on or since February 27, 1897.

—Mr. William David, who had managed for some years the splendid *Wendelstadi* estancia Nueva Meblem at Fray Bentos, B. O., has been appointed manager of the Liebig Company's establishment El Ombu in the same department.

—The marriage has taken place in Buenos Aires of Mr. Cecil A. Thornhill, estanciero, and Miss Emily Langham.

—We quote from the B. A. Standard.

—It is generally said in town that Messrs Walker and Co., the great contractors who constructed the Madero port-works had obtained the contract from the Government for the great naval port in Bahia Blanca. Everyone will be glad to hear this news: as it is a guarantee that the works will be well and solidly done, and quickly; and if the news be true, we congratulate the Government on the business of course, Messrs. Walker and Co. have immense advantages over all other contractors; a complete staff, with materials, machinery and steamers all ready at a moment's notice to begin the work. Some of the greatest firms in Europe have bid for these works, and as far as we understand, the present contract, which amounts to a million sterling, is only for one third of the job. These great works will lift Bahia Blanca to the first position in the River Plate.

—The *Tribuna* devotes some three columns to publishing the petition of Sr. Rodero for the re-establishment of bull-fighting in the Republic. The document is quite a literary curiosity in its way. The petitioner argues, with great verbosity, that of all sports and spectacles invented, bull fighting is the most refined, ennobling and picturesque and that its absence is a positive blamish to the civilisation of the city! In fact, it is not a sport (it is an art, which can only be properly understood by the cultured and the initiated. (Prize fighters call knocking each other to pieces a science, so why should not bull-fighting be called an art.) Bull fights are positively necessary from a commercial point of view. They stimulate trade in the place where they are held, and above all they give impetus to the breeding of fine bulls. (Fighting bulls, like race horses, are the most useless of creatures of their kind.) Breeders of fighting bulls, and the inhabitants of La Union generally have suffered serious injury by the suppression of bull fighting. As to the bloody spectacle of gored horses rushing round the ring with their entrails dragging on the ground, screaming with pain and terror, until they drop and die of exhaustion the petitioner sees nothing cruel or repulsive in it; on the contrary the horses are mere wretched beasts who should be proud to die in so noble a manner. The personal danger to bull fighters is really much less than in many other forms of sport. (This is not to the point. It would be no loss to the world if all the bull-fighters were gored to death tomorrow. The point is the brutalising effect of the sport on the spectators. The personal danger and cruelty to the bulls he wisely omits to mention.) In fine, bull fighting is an admirable institution which produces innumerable benefits and harms no one. In consideration of all which he coolly asks for an exclusive monopoly for his own benefit for ten years, offering to give two shows yearly for the benefit of public charities.—We trust the Council of State will lose no time in putting the petition in the waste paper basket.

—Dr. Teofilo Diaz, who a month ago understood the defence of Ensign Fernandez Fistera, in the Butler murder case, has now thrown it up, giving as his principal reason the charges to be brought against the judicial and police authorities on account of their irregular proceedings in the case, which, he says, prevents a proper defence being made. He expresses his belief in the innocence of Fernandez, and leaves the defence to the hands of the Official Defender. This will throw back the case some months.

—The passengers left by the P.S.N. Co's «Orellana» on Friday were Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Graham, Mrs. Wilson and Mr. E. H. Johnston, 9 third class.

—The *Review of the River Plate* has the following amusing bit in the manner in which the «social paragraph» is overdone by some of its contemporaries.—«Among the passengers who sailed by the last mail steamer for Europe were Mr. and Mrs. Goen Ome. Most of our readers will remember that Mrs. Goen Ome was a Miss Lately Arrived, who is a very distant connection of the first Archbishop of Runtloo. Mr. Goen Ome, it is popularly supposed, is a descendant of the well known Adam who figures largely in books of early history.—An engagement will shortly be announced—at least we have it no good authority that such will be the case—between a well known young gentleman and a charming young lady. The gentleman is a very distant relative of Lord Pflars, indeed there are only twenty five lives between him and the title, while he also enjoys the honour of being a cousin of another almost equally great personage. The young lady is a great, great, great grand daughter of the first Mayor of Slapton-on-the-Mold, and we need hardly re-

—The Oxford and Cambridge Boat race was rowed yesterday and according to the telegram resulted in a victory for Oxford by twelve lengths, which if true is the worst beating for Cambridge on record. Time 21 minutes. This makes 32 victories for Oxford against 22 to Cambridge and a dead head in 1877. Oxford has now won for nine years in succession.

—The Golf handicap against «bogey» drew forth 13 competitors, Mr. J. S. Reid being absent, and after a pleasant afternoon's game it was found that the first prize had been won by Mr. Cameron and the second by Mr. Jas. Fraser. The next competition will be held next Sunday.

—The death has occurred in Buenos Aires of Sr. A. D. Parodi, of the important firm of Demarchi, Parodi and Co., of that and this market. The *B. A. Standard* refers to him in the following terms:—«Mr. Alfred D. Parodi, who was buried on Thursday, was son of our old and lamented friend Mr. Parodi who died in Paris some six years ago, and for many years figured in this city as head of the firm Demarchi, Parodi & Co., also as president of the Banco de Italia and also as municipal under Torcuato Alvear. Mr. Alfred Parodi, whose death we now record, was born in Paraguay and took charge of the great firm which his father so long and ably managed on the death of our old friend William Cranwell some four years ago. «Pallida mors» seems to follow in the track of all the members of this well known firm; all the senior Demarchis are dead and gone. Mr. William Cranwell, who managed the firm for years in London, then in Montevideo and last in Buenos Aires, died some four years ago, comparatively a young man. Old Mr. Parodi, the father of the gentleman who was buried yesterday, took over the management of the firm in Paris, but the climate did not agree with him and he sighed to get back to Buenos Aires; he died, however, in harness at his desk and not an old man. Mr. Demarchi, the founder of this great firm, was an old friend and neighbour of the *Standard* when its offices were in Calle Belgrano, and he often told the editor of the hard times he had when he first came to the Plate. He retired from this country some thirty five years ago to Milan a millionaire, and for the purpose of educating his sons.

—We are requested to state that the Rev. Mr. Howard will preach at the Methodist Church to day.


—We read in the *S. A. Journal* of March 5:—«We have had numerous communications with regard to the result of the election of the Electoral College for the Presidency of Uruguay, which, in the ordinary course of events, should have taken place on the 1st inst. We have received no direct telegrams, and find, by inquiries made in the offices of the principal companies connected with Uruguay, that they are also without information. The impression in well informed circles is that, owing to Señor Cuestas having declared a dictatorship, the election did not take place, and that Señor Cuestas will probably hold executive power until November next.» The enquirers must have paid very little attention to the announcements in the *S. A. Journal* and numerous other London papers of the formation of a Provisional Government, to ask such a question. In any case, the Election of a President here is conducted by the Chambers, not by an Electoral College.

Staff, and the Minister of War received yesterday a telegram from General Fotheringham, in command of the Cuyo division at Mendoza, resigning his post on the ground of inability to retain it after reading in the Prensa the charges brought against the division under his command.

The Society for the Protection of Animals in Paris has sent a very complimentary letter congratulating the President and people of this country on the recent successful issue of the attempt to prevent the revival of the bull-ring.

We are pleased to learn that Messrs. Rudolph and George Newbery, who have been lately laid aside by illness, are now progressing favourably.

LONDON NOTES

The first Drawing Room of the season was held yesterday at Buckingham Palace. Her Majesty the Queen attended in person, and all the members of the Royal Family now in England were present.

A sitting of an hour's duration was held by the House of Lords yesterday. Ministerial statements as to the use of Dum-Dum bullets and the progress of the plague in Bombay City were made, and the Bill and the Public Record Office Bill passed through Committee.

In the House of Commons Mr. Curzon explained the conditions under which the internal waterways of China would be opened to British and other steamers in the course of June, and announced that France had disclaimed any intention to occupy a naval base in Hainan.

Another Liberal success has been achieved in the Cricklade Division of North Wilts, where polling took place on Thursday to fill the Parliamentary vacancy caused by the retirement of Mr. A. Hopkinson, Liberal Unionist.

Mr. Balfour addressed a meeting last night in Steyney in connection with the County Council Election. He argued that the difference between Progressives and Moderates was that the former, unlike the latter, in seeking great objects which both equally desired (such as that associated with street improvements, working class dwellings, and a proper water supply) were influenced by ulterior ends.

Lieut. Colonel Picquart, who commenced the investigation into Major Esterhazy's doings in connection with the Dreyfus affair, has been cashiered, and a lieutenant who wrote to M. Zola congratulating him has at the same time been placed on the unattached list.

Mr. Justice Romer, in the Chancery Division, dealt with an application relating to the Peel heirlooms. The plaintiff was Mr. Von Der Heydt and the defendant Sir Robert Peel. The Judge ordered the latter to restore pictures he had taken away from Drayton Manor and granted an injunction restraining him from removing any others.

In the Queen's Bench Division, yesterday, before the Lord Chief Justice and a special jury, the British Empire Type-Setting Machine Company obtained a verdict for 500l. damages and costs against the Linotype Company (Limited) for a libel, alleged to have been furnished to two newspapers, implying that the machines of the plaintiffs were of an inferior character.

The mastiff left the children and followed him. It was Moore's dog.

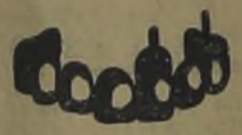
SCRAPS
