NEWS OF THE DAY

BANK OF THE REPUBLIC.

We condense below the balance sheet of the Bank of the Republic dated March 31, adding for the sake of comparison some of the figures from the balance sheet of the previous month.

Credit.—Unissued shares of 2nd Series, \$5,000,000.—Unissued bonus shares \$1,979,696.83.—Various Debtors of head office and branches, \$6,724,156.46 (in February, \$6,553,549).—Values deposited \$3,887,798.27 (in February, \$3,586,245).—Guarantees of Judicial Deposits, \$650,000 nom. in bonds of the Extraordinary 1897 Loan at 67.80 %.—\$440,700.—Cash in hand, \$3,333,800.41 (in February \$3,195,356).—Total, \$21,363,151.97.

Debit.—Capital, nominal \$12,000,000.—Various creditors \$2,852,890.25 (in February \$2,787,815).—Depositors of Values, \$3,887,798.27.—Judicial Deposits, \$378,040.75.—Service of the Extraordinary 1897 Loan, payments by the Direction General of Direct Taxes, \$41,434.03.—Silver cheques conforming in circulation, \$9,000 (in February, \$8,000).—Notes in circulation \$2,173,695.50 (in February \$1,356,594).—Total, \$21,363,151.97.

The only item calling for remark is the Notes in Circulation which shows an increase of over \$817,000 and reaches the largest amount yet recorded by the Bank. This may be regarded both as a sign of increased business and of increased confidence. So far as we know the Bank's notes are now received without hesitation in all parts of the Republic, and by many are preferred to coin.

POLITICAL NOTES.

In the Council of State, on Monday, approval in detail was given to the Bill modifying the Rural Code so as to establish a close time for birds. On the motion of Dr Terra, sparrows and various other birds deemed mischievous to agriculture were included in the list of those which may be destroyed at any time. A clause was also added prohibiting permanent use of the trap known as *cimbra*. Sr. Rocca's Bill amending the Law relative to the cession of property was approved in general. No further business of public interest was done.

Reports were circulated on Monday evening and repeated in several of yesterday morning's papers to the effect that the electoral accord had been definitely arranged. These, however, were rather premature. At the meeting on Monday evening the «blanco» delegates declined to take upon themselves the final responsibility of accepting the formula proposed in such dictatorial form by the «colorados», and asked for time to consult the new Executive Committee of their party. As, however, the final difference was only of two seats, it was not expected that there would be further resistance. The reply of the Committee should have been given yesterday afternoon or evening, and possibly we may be able to record it before going to press. In any case, it is generally believed that it will be favorable and consequently the definite settlement of the «accord» should be announced to-day. For this reason we reserve further remark for the moment.

Decreases have been issued appointing Sr. Ernesto Richelet as Uruguayan Consul in La Plata, in place of Sr. Augusto Horne Lavalle, resigned; and Dr. L. Bonasso as member of the Municipality of Tacuarembó in place of Col. M. P. Christy, resigned.

Lieut. Col. Gregorio Lamas has presented his «irrevocable» resignation as Sub Director of the Military College, for reasons not yet made public.

It is stated that there will be an interpellation in the Council of State over the discount of 10 % on Municipal salaries recently approved by the Executive. Sr. Serrato is prepared to show that the same economy might be better attained by the suppression of some 40 employees who were given posts by favor of the late administration, but whose services are of no public necessity. The Custom House keeps busy this month, and it is estimated that the receipts will reach \$900,000 or more.

Yesterday being a national anniversary was mainly devoted to fêtes, celebrations and congratulations in official quarters.

The Army Staff has issued a general order strictly prohibiting the use of military uniform to those who acted as officers in the late campaign but who are no longer on active military service. The order was a very necessary one as not a few of these gentry were still flourishing their epaulettes and swords in the face of the public, though it is more than six months since their duties and offices ceased.

Writing later we are able to confirm the arrangement of the «accord.» The Executive Committee of the National Party taking into consideration the reasons laid before them by the combined delegates, have given their assent to the formula proposed and the «accord» should be definitely signed these before these lines are in circulation. We reserve particulars for our next.

CENTRAL URUGUAY RAILWAY COMPANY.

The report of the directors for the half-year ended December 31 last states that the gross receipts of the railway for the half-year have been \$139,838, against \$158,282 in 1896, and the working expenses \$72,314 against \$79,057, leaving net earnings \$67,524, against \$79,215. To this balance must be added interest on Government bonds, &c., \$7,502, making a total of \$75,026. Deducting debenture interest, rent, &c., \$44,887, there is a disposable balance of \$30,139.

The gross receipts of the line for the half-year show a decrease of \$18,444, or equal to 11.65 per cent; and the decrease in the net profit is \$11,691, or 14.76 per cent. The working expenses amount to 51.71 per cent, as compared with 49.95 in 1896. The receipts from coaching traffic show a decrease of 9.77 per cent. The receipts from goods traffic a decrease of 12.81 per cent, and from animals a decrease of 9.30 per cent. The receipts per train mile have been 12s. 2d. in 1897, as against 12s. 0d. in 1896; and the expense of working per train mile has been 6s. 3 1/2 d., as compared with 6s. 0d. in the corresponding half-year.

Mr. Horacio Garcia Lagos, the chairman of the local committee in Montevideo, reporting under date of February 18 last, says:—«The results of the six months' working are certainly more favourable than we had dared to hope for up to the beginning of November, and that we have been able to show the balance we now report is an excellent evidence of the extraordinary recuperative powers of the country we serve. The restoration of peace was, when we were last reporting, the great factor we were relying upon to restore prosperity to our midst, and since it was assured in October, by the generous concessions of all parties, the whole country has experienced a return of prosperity as remarkable as it is welcome. Wheat and wool crops have been first class, and we count upon the maize crop, now to be soon gathered in, giving a record yield in both quality and quantity. Our relations with the authorities have been, as always, of the most friendly character, the services of the guaranties have been made with the punctuality for which the Uruguayan Government, under the late specially adverse circumstances, is justly entitled to credit, and the arrangement agreed to for the settlement of the balance of accounts owing to us by the Government for freight to June 30 last has been duly carried out by the issue of bonds of the 1897 debt on the terms as approved, and the interest on both these and the other internal debt bonds held by the company has been promptly paid as and when due.»

The Board are glad to be able to report that notwithstanding the adverse circumstances that continued to affect the working of the Railway

during the opening months of the past half-year the restoration of peace in September last was followed by a revival of commercial activity, and this, coupled with a good wool clip and favourable harvest prospects in both wheat and maize, has materially improved present prospects, and in view of the hopeful anticipations as expressed in the foregoing reports of the Local Committee and General Manager, the Board think that they may look forward with confidence to a satisfactory result being obtained from the working of the Railway for the whole of the financial year.

The traffic of the extension companies has suffered from the same causes which have affected the parent company, the Eastern Extension showing a decrease of 2860 and the Northern Extension a decrease of \$1,454. The proportion of the gross receipts retained under the respective working agreements amounts to \$24,970 being \$666 less than the actual cost of working; against this, however, 92 per cent. of the total traffic collected by these extensions has passed over the Company's mainline.

After providing for the debenture interest and the half-year's rent of the North Eastern line, there remains an available balance of \$30,138, 16s. 5d., out of which the Board have decided to pay an interim dividend for the half year at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum, free of income tax, carrying forward a balance of \$135, 16s. 5d.

The Board desire to acknowledge the services of the Local Committee, the General Manager, and of the other officers and staff of the railway generally during the past half year, which has been one of an exceptionally trying character.

THE CUBAN QUESTION.

WAR!!

The declaration of war between the United States and Spain now seems only a question of hours.

The parliamentary conflict in our last took place. The Representatives refused to ratify the resolutions as modified by the Senate, and the difference was referred to a joint Committee of the two Houses. Up to Monday evening this had not been able to come to an accord, but yesterday morning it was telegraphed that the two Houses had agreed on a joint resolution which recognized the independence of Cuba, but did not recognize the existence of a Republican Government in the island. The other clauses were the same as previously sanctioned by both Houses, namely calling for the withdrawal of Spanish authority and forces from the island, and authorizing the President to intervene. According to the same telegram, President McKinley accepted the resolutions and would proceed to put them into effect at once. This would produce an immediate rupture of relations with Spain, and the simultaneous withdrawal of the Ministers at Washington and Brazil. In effect it only remains to be seen which power will be the first to make a declaration of war, either by formal proclamation or by some actively hostile act.

The Message of the Queen Regent to the Spanish Cortes is expected to-day, though it may be modified by the resolution of the U. S. Congress. So far nothing has transpired as to its nature, but there is not the least expectation that Spain will give way to the demands of the U. States, and even if the Government offered to do so, the people would still probably force it into war. Sr. Montero Rios has been named President of the Spanish Senate. The Council of Ministers has approved a plan for immediate arming of the steamers of the Compañia Transatlantica Española. The popular agitation throughout the peninsula is intense, and manifestations in favor of war have been held in Barcelona, Valencia and other large cities. There have been more disorders in Malaga and the black servant of the U. S. Consul has been murdered.

In the United States all sailing vessels under the U. S. flag have been recommended not to leave American ports. The departure of the Spanish Minister Sr. Polo de Bernabé is expected at any moment. He has chartered a vessel to take 400 Spaniards, residents of Pampa, to Cuba. The march of troops southwards has already commenced. It is said a third squadron will be formed for the protection of the Atlantic coast. This will consist of the auxiliary cruisers Yosemite, Prairie, Yankee and Dixie, with the San Francisco as flagship, Commodore Howell commanding. Work in the arsenal is being carried on day and night. It is said that building of the «Kearsage» and «Kentucky» has been suspended, as they cannot be concluded to be in time for service. Gen-

eral Miles has accepted the services of Col. Gody (Buffalo Bill) and will put him at the head of a regiment of Texas cowboys. A Bill will be presented to Congress for the immediate calling out of 400,000 volunteers from all parts of the Union. Half a million copies of the parliamentary and other reports on Cuban affairs and on the Maine explosion are being printed for general circulation.

The alarm in Havana is intense, and in the last few days 1468 passports have been given to persons wishing to leave the island.

According to the latest telegram from Washington instructions were to be telegraphed yesterday afternoon to General Woodford at Madrid, to present an ultimatum to the Spanish Government demanding the evacuation of Cuba. It may be safely anticipated that the Spanish Government will reply by a refusal and a declaration of war.

SUNDRIES.

Another example has just occurred of the extraordinary view taken by juries here of the responsibility in cases of murder. Two men, whom we will call A and B, had a quarrel culminating in a fight with knives. B dies on the following day from a wound in the stomach, and now the jury has acquitted A on the grounds that it «was not sufficiently proved» that he had inflicted the wound! Do they imagine that B ripped himself up in order to get A into trouble? Such a sentence shows a disregard for the value of human life and of the criminality of deeds of violence which it is difficult to recognize as belonging to a civilized country.

We do not mention the actors' names in this affair, because if we did it is quite possible that the murderer might, as Carvalho has done, bring an action against us for «offence to his private honor and tranquillity» because we protest against his absolution.

Speaking of Carvalho, reminds us that the Correctional Judge has once again sent our law case to the Fiscal of Crime Dr. V. Martinez for an opinion. As, however, Dr. Martinez has already once refused to interfere in the matter, it is probable that he will do so again, and thus more time will be lost.

The Cibils Theatre will reopen its doors this evening, after a long recess. The chief attraction will be the appearance of Sr. Colombino, a rival of Fregoli. Sr. Colombino, it may be mentioned, is not a mere vulgar and unauthorised imitator, but has learnt his methods direct from Fregoli himself and is the author and originator of many of Fregoli's impersonations. He travels with his own scenery and effects. This evening he will appear in «Camaleonte» «Mimi» (an imitation of «Eldorado») and other varieties. An Italian Comedy Company of which the capital actor Sr. Lotti is the principal will appear in two pieces, of which the first is the charming poetical comedieta «Il Cantico dei Cantici», by Sr. F. Cavallotti, whose recent death in a duel caused such a sensation.

The Ferrari Opera Company left Genoa for the River Plate on Friday last in the steamer «Perseo», of the Navigazione Generale Company.

At the General Meeting of the members of the Argentine Jockey Club the following elections were made:—President, Vicente L. Casares; Secretary, Dr. Marcelo Pellet; Treasurer, Emilio Pellet; President of the Interior, Enrique Acebal; President of the racing-committee, Manuel J. Guirralder.

A Nice correspondent communicates that the Queen gave another example of her kindly nature and admirable tact during a recent afternoon drive. The Royal party reached the narrow bridge over the river at much the same time as a funeral procession of the poorer class, and the latter immediately ranged itself on one side to allow the Queen to pass. Her Majesty, however, ordered her carriage to stop, and bowed her head reverently as the coffin was borne past. The mourners were visibly touched by the attention, and respectfully uncovered as they passed the Queen's carriage.

There are several letters in our office for the advertiser «A. B. C.» who will oblige by calling for them.

Two men named Juan Barreiro and Ricardo Andes have been arrested in connection with the extensive falsification of stamps discovered last week. Sr. Olascoaga still continues under arrest, and is being defended by Dr. A. Palomeque. The case is being conducted by the Judge of Instruction Dr. Bastos. The police are still pursuing their investigation into the affair, and it is expected that more arrests will be made.

The sensational news is telegraphed from Caracas that General Crespo, President of the Republic of Venezuela, has been killed whilst

fighting at the head of his troops against the revolutionary forces of Hernandez.

The Argentine provinces of Santiago and Catamarca are threatening to come to blows over a question of limits. The central government of the Republic really ought to keep these naughty children in better order.

Military operations in the Sudan are to be suspended until the end of July.

President Faure has paid another visit to her Majesty at Cimiez.

The police have not yet succeeded in catching the bank swindlers referred to in our last.

The resident Spaniards have lost no time in opening a subscription to aid their country in the war, and considerable sums have already been promised. Sres. Rubio and Sons have offered \$20,000; Sr. Saralegui has put his name down for \$50,000; Sr. Lopez of Trinidad \$5000; an anonymous donor in Durazno \$10,000.

We quote from the S. A. Journal—«Cycling has now become very prevalent in various parts of South America, and as the roads there are by no means so good as those in Europe, puncturing of the tyres is much more common, whilst the inconvenience caused is much greater, owing to the scarcity of repairers, and the longer distances to be travelled to find one. It will be good news, therefore, to many of our readers in South America and elsewhere that a puncture proof band is now coming into extensive use, which makes puncturing practically impossible. It consists of a band of chemically treated flax, which is placed between the inner tyre and the cover, and has been found to be a complete protection. Cycles thus prepared have been ridden over tacks, thorns, broken glass, and sharp flints without any damage resulting. Nails have been actually driven into the cover without producing a puncture. The weight of the band for a 28 in wheel is only about 4 ounces, and is inappreciable by the rider. The cost is 5s. The manufacturers are the «Empress Puncture-Proof Band Company» of Ipswich. Agents are wanted in South America.» Here's an opening for an enterprising man of business.

BUENOS AIRES.

Mr. W. R. Cassells, the managing director of the River Plate Electric Light and Traction Co. in addition to the concessions already solicited, which are awaiting the sanction of the Town Council has presented another petition in which a concession is solicited for the construction of another electric tramway, to run from the Plaza Constitucion by calles Caseros, Entre Rios, Callao and the Paseo de Julio to the Retiro station. The line would be a double one, and would connect the two principal railway stations in the city.

A London telegram of Saturday last states as follows:—Immediately on the approbation by the Directorate of the Great Southern Railway of Argentina of the contract of concession of the South Dock of the Capital, the relative documents in the case were sent to Buenos Aires, and everything is arranged so that the work may commence as soon as the transfer is effected. The subscribed capital is £1,000,000 sterling. The central committee of direction consists of Messrs. Parish, Allen, Reada and Nield; and the permanent directing commission in Buenos Aires will be composed of Messrs White and Damarchi. The latter will leave for Buenos Aires by the «Savoia» on the 22nd inst. It is said that of the subscribed capital, shares to the amount of £100,000 sterling will be allotted to the syndicate that promoted the business.

LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, MARCH 22.

In the House of Lords yesterday the Special Juries Bill was read a second time, and the Suffragan Bishops Bill passed through Committee.

Questioned in the House of Commons as to the practice which has recently become common of Colonial Governors on their return to this country allowing themselves to be interviewed by newspaper representatives, Mr. Chamberlain said he entirely disapproved of it, and was causing a circular to this effect to be addressed to all officers in the Colonial service abroad. Mr. Balfour made a statement as to the probable course of business, and the duration of the Easter holidays. The Budget would be taken on the 21st of April. A motion giving precedence to the Irish Local Government Bill having been carried, the second reading of the measure was formally moved by Mr. Gerald Balfour, the subsequent speakers

including Mr. John Morley, Mr. Dillon, Colonel Sanderson, and other Irish members. The measure was read a second time before the House adjourned.

A Correspondent in the Sudan telegraphs that the Derivishes have made a determined attack on the post at Adarama, which was defended by friendly levies. They were repeatedly repulsed, and finally retired, leaving forty-one dead on the field. A regrettable occurrence is reported from the camp at Hudi. During Sunday night a shot fired from an unknown quarter aroused the whole camp, and a private in the Seaford Highlanders while hurrying to his place was impaled on a comrade's bayonet.

Colonel Dyer, President of the Engineering Employers' Federation, died suddenly at his residence at Rusholme, Manchester, yesterday morning. He had been slightly indisposed for some days, but his indisposition was regarded as in no way serious. Yesterday he was found dead in bed, his decease being due to an affection of the heart. Colonel Dyer had seen active service in the Crimea and the Indian Mutiny.

Mrs. Jackson, whose abduction by her husband in 1891 aroused so much attention in the country, died at Clitheroe yesterday. This was the case in which a lady was forcibly seized by her husband and detained in a house at Blackburn, from which she was only released on an order by the Court of Appeal reversing the judgment of the Court below.

About nine o'clock yesterday morning a collision occurred on the South Eastern Railway, near St. John's Station. Owing to heavy fog a train from Tonbridge had been stopped 300 yards from St. John's and into the rear of this train a corridor express from Hastings dashed, smashing the hind carriage, killing three passengers, and injuring several others. The Hastings express was entirely uninjured.

The match between Mr. Stoddart's team and South Australia was continued yesterday. The first innings of the Australians closed for 287. Darling made 88 and Lyons 79. The Englishmen then went in for the second time, and at the close of play had scored 32 without the loss of a wicket.

Arguments were heard in the Court of Appeal yesterday in another phase of the Tatton Sykes litigation. The action, out of which the motion arose, was brought by the North British and Mercantile Insurance Company against Sir Tatton and Lady Sykes jointly to recover two advances handed to Lady Sykes for 16,000, and 12,000. Sir Tatton denied his liability to pay either sum on the ground that he was not a party to the execution of the security deed. In the case of the first deed, his solicitor signed the deed, purporting to do so under the power of attorney given him by Sir Tatton, but Sir Tatton denied that he had any authority to sign for him and also that the signature of the power of attorney under which the solicitor had acted was his. In the second claim Sir Tatton said the signature to the deed purporting to be his was a forgery.

Further evidence was given at Bow street yesterday regarding the charge of manslaughter brought against Mrs. Nicholls, the Kensington lady, consequent upon the death of Jane Popejoy, a domestic servant, who had been in her employment. Dr. Vaudrey, who had been the prisoner's medical attendant for some years, said the deceased was in an advanced stage of consumption when he examined her last December. Some other evidence was given of alleged assaults committed by the accused, who was again remanded. Subsequently it was reported to the magistrate that the windows of Mrs. Nicholls's house had been broken, and that mud was thrown at her carriage. Sir John Bridge expressed the hope that what he described as a disgraceful injustice would not be repeated.
