### POLITICAL NOTES.

Nothing new about the electoral accord. What is now awaited is the reply of the "blancos" Committee to the request to name new delegates; about which contradictory reports are circulating. This was expected to have been given yesterday, but we are not yet able to state the result.

The banquet in the San Felipe Theatre on Saturday night to the Chiefs of the National Guard Volunteers was a brilliant affair. The theatre was very prettily arranged and decorated for the occasion, and the boxes were filled with ladies and families. The chair was taken by Dr. Juan Carlos Blanco, the Chief of the Staff, the Ministers of State, the guests of the evening, and various other civil and military officials being seated around him. Captain Aurelio Hernandez proposed the toast of the evening, and speeches of a fervid patriotic description were also made by Dr. Salterain, Gen. Garcia, Sr. Battle, Dr. J. C. Blanco, Sres. Guani and Burmaster, and others. A letter was read from President Cuestas expressing his regret at not being able to attend, and intimating the desire that the Chief and officers of the guard should retain their swords, as a souvenir of the crisis through which they had served. This provoked great enthusiasm. The gathering broke up at a late hour in what a contemporary describes as "an atmosphere heated by patriotic enthusiasm and by fraternity." Fortunately the building was insured and members of the fire brigade in attendance.

In response to a petition from the Association of Retail Dealers, the Government has prolonged until the 30th instant the period for paying business licences (*Patentes*.)

On Sunday morning a large meeting of "colorados" was held at Villa Colon. Although it was for the formation of a sectional club, several hundreds, some of them obviously "marcianos" went out from the city. These returned in the course of the afternoon, some by railway, others on horseback, all wearing red handkerchiefs. Several of them formed themselves into groups and penetrated to various parts of the city, uttering aggressive party cries and occasioning no little disorder. In the district known as "Galicia Chica" there was a regular tumult in which over 100 persons took part, sticks and stones being freely used, and several heads being broken. The mounted police had to be called out to restore order, and some of the principal offenders were arrested—we hope they will be severely dealt with. Such disorderly scenes as these bespeak a very low grade of civilization and of political education on the part of those who provoke them by their aggressive and offensive attitude, and cannot be condemned too sternly. It is certainly intolerable to think that a political meeting cannot be held at so remote a suburb as Colon, without its being made the motive of disorder, riot and even bloodshed in the streets of Montevideo. It is noteworthy that it is only the "colorados" who promote these disorders; we never hear of them when the "blancos" meet. We

think the respectable elements of the "colorado" party would do well to discourage the wearing of the crimson handkerchief. It is a bloody and sinister emblem, with a long record of unhappy associations of civil wars, fratricidal quarrels, and scenes of strife and bloodshed, and its appearance in the streets is almost always the precursor of disorder and trouble. To those who know its history, it is difficult to look upon it without a shudder.

Sunday's *Siglo* has a sensible article referring to the political events—or want of events—of last week. It points out that one of the greatest dangers in the failure to produce the "accord," will be the preservation of the old impure civic registers. This, by giving electoral power to the "collected" who have filled the registers with fraudulent inscriptions, will be dangerous equally to the "colorados" and the "blancos." The arguments advanced by the two parties respectively in favor of their present demands for representation, and which stand in the way of the "accord," are equally respectable on both sides, but still their demands are extreme and should be mutually abated in view of the general benefit to be derived from the "accord." The *Siglo* concludes saying, "A question of seats, however, important, is nothing in comparison to the cardinal problem of institutional reconstruction, which is one of life or death for the Republic. . . . The motto for the 'accord' should not be 'each party the corresponding number of seats,' which renders negotiation impossible, but rather 'down with collectivism.' With which we entirely agree."

A Decree has been issued ordering the issue of a call for tenders for the service of public inspection of weights and measures, the contract held by Olive & Co. for this service having already expired.

The Balance Sheet and Revenue and Expenditure Account, show a deficit of \$1061.54 gold. Of this amount \$422.55 corresponds to 1896, and to the year 1897 \$638.99. Receipts show an increase of \$238.55, over 1896, but on the other hand there has been an increased expenditure of \$879.54.

During the year 1897, there were no entries from the Brazilian Navy, and the increase in Receipts is mainly due to *Patentes Account* and the British Navy.

The increase in Expenditure is due to House Expenses which increased from \$3991.41 in 1896, to \$5613.61 in 1897.

It is with regret that the Committee has to record the death of Dr. Luis A. Fleury who for over 25 years was connected with the British Hospital first as Medical Officer, and subsequently as visiting surgeon, where he rendered many and valuable services to the Institution.

In concluding the Committee desire to express their thanks to Dr. J. T. Edey, for his constant attention, and to the Resident Medical Officer, Dr. Thomson, and the Staff of Nurses, for the zealous discharge of their duties; to the German and American Consuls for collecting fees; to the Editors of THE MONTVIDEO TIMES, THE URUGUAY NEWS and THE BUENOS AIRES HERALD for copies of their respective papers, and to those friends who from time to time have sent donations of illustrated papers, fruit, flowers, etc.

Food and outfit of Japanese Soldiers.

An interesting paper on the health of the Japanese soldier was read before a recent meeting of the Sanitary Society of Japan by Surgeon-Colonel Koike. A considerable portion of the paper was occupied with a discussion of the most suitable diet, and especially of the much vexed question in Japan of rice or bread as the best food for the soldier. In the last war wherever the Japanese army moved rice was grown, and could be purchased in such

quantities as to meet every deficiency in the supply from home. A fraction less than a quart of rice, with vegetables, meat and fish, as condiments, is the daily ration of the Japanese soldier. The outfit in time of war of the Japanese is the lightest in the world, being 25 1/2 kilos., and, according to Dr. Koike, the military authorities regard it as necessary to reduce it to about 19 1/2 kilos, which they think is the proper limit for infantry. So far, however, they have got it down to 21 kilos, but cannot find means of reducing it lower at present. As to the construction of barracks, Dr. Koike stated that the old French method, in which the chief feature is the grouping of buildings in the form of a square, with a courtyard in the centre, has been abandoned in Japan, and a more healthy form of construction has been adopted on the advice of a committee appointed to consider the subject.—*Army and Navy Gazette.*

### SUNDRIES.

A Paris telegram received yesterday afternoon states as follows:—"It is officially confirmed that by common accord the Spanish and United States Government have accepted the mediation of Pope Leo XIII to arrange the questions pending between the two nations. President McKinley is rather unwilling just now and consequently the Message which he should send to Congress has been postponed."

The importance of the above, it true, cannot be over-rated. However, we have learnt to look on all the telegrams published here, with such suspicion, that we await to see it confirmed before making any comments, except that such a solution is unexpected and surprising.

There were about three columns of telegrams on the Cuban question yesterday and on Sunday, but their contradictions are so numerous and bewildering that we do not find one statement to which we can give unreserved credence, and for all their voluminousity, they leave us quite in the dark as to the real situation. In fact, the more critical the situation, the more unreliable and contradictory seem the telegrams, and the service is practically worthless. For this reason, and in view of the news stated above, we refrain from repeating any of them to-day. It is to be hoped this morning will bring us something definite and reliable.

A contemporary calls attention to the fact that in Sunday's races, all five winners were mounted by the same jockey, M. Suarez, and four of them came from the hands of the same trainer, Martin Gonzalez. This is peculiar.

Our contemporaries overflow with details—some of which it would have been more judicious to reserve—of the capture by the police of the recent burglars, or rather burglar, for it now appears there is only one of them, a young man named Amarante, whose family, respectable working people, live at Maroñas. Amarante has made a full confession, including some robberies of which the police knew nothing. He had also committed robberies in B. Aires, having been at his little game for nearly three years. He is the same individual who some eight months ago attempted to rob Frégoli (we always thought that exploit was an invention.) Although it is rather incredible that the burglaries should have been committed single handed, he stoutly denies having had any accomplice, nor have the police been able to find traces of one. The man who was arrested with him has been released, it being proved that he had no connection with Amarante. Nearly all the recent plunder has been recovered a large portion of it being found hidden away at Maroñas, but there is nothing to prove that his family had any knowledge of the robberies. It is comforting to know that the police have got possession of a thief so cunning and audacious that his exploits threw the whole city into alarm. They deserve great credit for the capture.

The P. S. N. Co's "Orcana" arrived yesterday, but did not bring any first class passengers for this port. The vessel arrived at Flores Island about 7 a. m., but it was an advanced hour of the afternoon before any mails were delivered. The unreasonable delay is all the more irritating in a short week like the present, and when the vessel is already late in arriving.

During the holidays this week, all the slaughter houses are to be closed. We hope this will not mean that the city is to be kept short of fresh meat for four days.

The National of Sunday and the *Tribuna* of yesterday again devote leading articles to consideration of the question of participation of the Central Railway employees in active politics.

It is worth noting that the said Mulligan Guards are regarded as one of the finest regiments in the United States army."

Here's an interesting paragraph from the *B. A. Standard*.—"In reply to a letter asking the names of the principal English residents in this city at the beginning of this century, we state that in 1810 there were very few English in the country, and their names were—Orr, Gowland, O'Gorman, Barton, Lynch, French, Atkins, Robertson, Wright. In the year 1817 the two brothers Robertson arrived back from Paraguay, and in that year the number of English residents had increased. Their names were—Dickson, Brittain, Fair, Cartwright, Mackinlay, Staples, Macdougall, Orr, MacCrahen, MacFarlane, Newton, Higginbotham, Dixon, the brothers Gowland, James, Wilde, Wilson, Miller, Sutward, McNeil, Roberts, Billinghurst, Brown, Zimmerman, Jenkinson, Dr. Hogan, Dr. Dick, Dr. Bond, Dr. Brown, Wilfred Latham, and a few years later came Stewart, MacCoil, Ford, Thomas Armstrong, Edward Lumb, Revd. John Armstrong, M. Love, Eastman, and a whole crowd of others. In the year 1823 the British residents in the River Plate numbered 3,500. Don Patricio Brown, Don Patricio Bookay, and Don Pedro Sheridan were amongst the earliest Irish settlers."

We give elsewhere account of another utterly disgraceful shooting affray in Buenos Aires, the would be assassin in this case being a Bolsa broker. When will public opinion in the River Plate be sufficiently strong to demand the stern repression of this cowardly and blood-thirsty habit of carrying revolvers and using them on every trivial occasion. Men who do these things have no claim to be called civilized. Not even the crudest African savages seek to murder each other, as men do here, for every trivial quarrel. It is horrible.

It is gratifying to learn from Paris telegrams that one of the most monumental cases of prostituted justice on record, we mean the trial and condemnation of Mr. Zola, has been undone. The Court of Cassation, to which he appealed, has set aside the sentence passed on Zola and the editor of *L'Aurore* by the Court of Assizes, on the ground that as Mr. Zola's alleged libel was directed against the Council of War that tried Com. Esterhazy, and not against the Minister of War, the prosecution should have been undertaken by the former and not, as it was, by the latter. The entire proceedings are therefore annulled. If the French Government has any common sense and self-respect left, it will now let Mr. Zola alone. The Court of Cassation may be congratulated on its firmness. It has proved—and by no means unnecessarily,—that not all the French judges are to be moved by military bulges in epaulettes and gold lace.

A certain minister, who is not always so careful as he ought to be in making his teaching, and his practice correspond, was lately telling some friends a story of adventure. It was a pretty "tall" story, and the ministers' ten-year old little girl was observed to be listening to it very intently. When he finished, she fastened her wide open eyes upon her father's face, and said, very gravely, "Is that true, or are you preaching now, papa?"

A contemporary makes the disconcerting announcement that the petition in favor of bull-fights has been favorably received by many members of the Council of State and is likely to have a favorable resolution. Is there no one in the city with sufficient energy and influence to initiate a counter petition? Where is the Society for the Protection of Animals?

Notwithstanding all the outcry about the suppression of the gambling dens, one of the worst and most notorious of them, that known as "the Colonel's," is open nightly and without disguise, in a prominent position within a square of the Government House and two of the Cabildo, and is thronged by

men of all classes and nationalities, the majority of whom leave it poorer, it not wiser, than they entered. Not one, but half a dozen illegal gambling games are played in this den, the open existence of which is a public scandal. Are the Minister of Government and the Chief of Police ignorant of it!

The Municipality, taking into account the advice of the Sanitary authorities, has ordained that in future the carts used for the distribution of bread must be completely closed, and whether of wood or metal, without paint on the inside. Open carts may, however, be used, provided the bread is carried in closed metal or wooden boxes or receptacles, also without paint inside. This is to come into force from July 1.

## BUENOS AIRES.

Government has resolved to grant an extension of four months' time to the Southern Railway to finish the construction of the branch line from Bahia Blanca to Neuquen. The extra time will run from the 24th of March, 1899, and not from 24th March last, as has been stated.

A disgraceful affair took place on Friday afternoon near the entrance to the Bolsa, when two well known persons produced what is generally termed an "incidente desagradable" when the actors are respectably connected, but, when they are members of the common herd, the affair is dubbed a shameful attempt to assassinate. It appears that two Bolsa-brokers named Carlos Nicolas Carman and Luis Rodriguez quarrelled some days ago on account of a joke which the former cracked with reference to the Spanish-American question. As Sr. Rodriguez is a Spaniard and Sr. Carman an Argentine of Anglo-Saxon descent it would appear that the former felt very much annoyed; in fact, an incident occurred which was fortunately confined to strong language only. Some days later a further wordy quarrel arose through some remarks which Sr. Rodriguez made with regard to the supply of horses to the army, and the result was that the two men, who before the unfortunate joke on the Cuban muddle had been great friends, now became implacable enemies. On meeting yesterday afternoon, the quarrel was renewed, and Carman, with true Argentine courage, whipped out a revolver and fired three shots at Rodriguez, who fortunately escaped with a slight wound in the chest. Carman was immediately arrested, but, for reasons which we need not explain, he was speedily released by Dr. Bustamante, the Criminal Judge, who accepted the bail offered by Dr. Domingo Gonzalez.—*B. A. Herald.*

## LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, MARCH 5.

In the House of Lords yesterday, Lord Herschell presented a Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to copyright, and it was read a first time. The London University Commission Bill was read a second, and the Bail Bill a third time.

Some amusement was caused in the House of Commons by questions addressed to and answers given by Mr. Balfour as to the intention of Ministers with respect to the Government of London Bill, in the light of Thursday's poll. The House went into Committee of Supply, and various subjects were discussed upon a vote of 13,000,000, on account of the Civil Service.

Sir William Harcourt, writing to a Manchester correspondent, says the statement that he used the word "veto" in the title of the Bill introduced by the late Government in 1895 relating to the liquor traffic conveys an idea to many that it contains no alternative to complete extinction of trade, is evidence of the success obtained by deliberate misrepresentation of its real character by the opponents of that Bill. The word "veto" did not appear in the title, or any part of the Bill. The Bill was strictly a measure of popular control, requiring in case of prohibition a two-thirds majority.

Yesterday celebration was made in Rome and throughout Italy of the fiftieth anniversary of the granting of the Constitution by King

Charles Albert, The King, accompanied by the Queen, and surrounded by the Ministers, the members of the legislative bodies, the Diplomatic Corps, the mayors of Rome and the provincial towns, and the highest officials of the realm, delivered in the Capital a speech in which he extolled the benefits to the nation which had followed the granting of the Constitution, and thanked God who had ordained the unity and the greatness of Italy.

A lady named Laurie, who had been the occupier of Beach Home, Eastbourne, was yesterday committed for trial on a charge of administering chloral to her three children with intent to murder them, and with attempting to suffocate them and herself by means of gas.

It is announced from Madrid that Spain has asked for the recall of General Lee, the United States Consul-General at Havana, and that any relief for the Cubans should be sent in merchant vessels. It is stated that the American Government has declined to remove General Lee or to countermand the employment of warships for carrying the relief supplies.

Speaking at the banquet given in his honour at Graaff Reinet, Sir A. Milner, the Governor of the Cape, and High Commissioner, deprecated the suspicious entertained by the Transvaal towards the Dutch colonists to influence the Transvaal Government to assimilate its institution to those of the other South African States.

Signor Cavallotti, leader of the Radicals in the Italian Chamber, was killed in a duel with Signor Macola, also a deputy yesterday. The meeting was the result of statements reflecting on Signor Cavallotti made by Signor Macola in a Venice newspaper. The seconds had twice declared that there was no cause for a duel, and it was only when the two politicians, who were close friends, felt that their position before the public was becoming ridiculous, that they decided to fight.

Canon and Mrs. Barnett were at home yesterday afternoon at Toybee Hall, in celebration both of their own silver wedding and of the completion of their 25th year at Whitechapel.

Mr. Edmund Tattersal, head of the well known firm of racing auctioneers, died on Saturday at his residence, Coleherne Court, South Kensington. Mr. Tattersal was in his eighty-third year.

The Custom House paid into the London Bank yesterday \$25564 on account of the Consolidated Debt and Railway guarantee service and \$3124 on account of the 5% Loan service.
