Dewey is actually in possession of Manila, having taken the town after much loss of life by the Spaniards. This, however, seems to be only upon his face and he is picked up and carried to the Lariboisiere Hosbased on hearsay and must be doubted until properly confirmed. The Spanish squadron from St Vin-cent is said to have been already anguish but they cannot find the two bullets. 




