NEWS OF THE DAY

MONTEVIDEO WEDNESDAY, MAY 25, 1898.

Saint Gregory VII.—National Holiday. —Princess Christian born, 1846—145 days past, 220 to the end of the year.

Holiday. To day being kept as a national and general holiday, THE MONTVIDEO TIMES will not appear again until Friday morning next.

POLITICAL NOTES. The Council of State diligently no-quorumed on Monday, and as today is a holiday there is not likely to be much business done this week. Yet there are plenty of important questions awaiting legislative resolution.

The Budget Message, translated in our issue of Saturday last, occupies both the *Siglo* and the *Razon* of yesterday, and both papers criticize it rather unfavorably, mainly on account of its failure to afford any information as to the real financial situation of the Republic. The estimated expenditure in the new Budget is \$15,547,861. This compares with \$13,000,000 in the Budget of 1897-98 still in force, \$14,400,000 in the Budget presented but never sanctioned in 1895, and \$16,000,000 in the similar unsanctioned Budget of 1896. The increase of almost two millions may be attributed in great measure to the legacy left by the Borda Government, which, apart from its local extravagances, increased the public debt by some eighteen million dollars, meaning an addition to the annual service of quite a million dollars. The *Siglo* is of the opinion that an effort should be made to reduce the expenditure still further, striking out every item not absolutely indispensable. The Government should remember that it not only has to balance its Budget, but also to wipe off a heavy floating debt, including ten months' arrears in the Treasury Certificates. The Budget leaves little or no margin for this, nor for the reduction in taxation for which the country is yearning.

The *Razon* mainly deals with the other, that is to say the credit, side of the Budget. It was an absurdity, it says, to base the estimate of revenue on that of the year of 1896-97, which was a period of abnormal depression that cannot serve as a guide. It would have been wiser to take an average of the three years 1893-96, and this would have given an estimate of \$16,000,000. (The estimate in the Budget now presented, based on the revenue of 1896-97, is \$14,258,000.) There would then have been no reason to present the Budget with an alarming apparent deficit of \$1,290,000. The *Razon* is thus of the opinion that the Budget might and should have been presented with a surplus of nearly half a million, applicable to the reduction of taxation. It remains to be seen what the Council of State will make of it.

Of other political matters there is nothing worth mentioning for the moment.

Raid on the Gambling Dens.

No little sensation has been caused by the raid effected by the police, on Sunday night, on some of the gambling dens that infect the shady streets behind the Solis Theatre. Out of the many existing, three were chosen, namely at Yerbal 59, Camaras 213, and Reconquista 185. Every precaution was taken to ensure a surprise, a force of about 50 police was chosen and the Prefect Sr. Dominguez conducted the proceedings in person. The raid took place just after midnight. The houses named were quietly surrounded, one after the other, and then the police entered arresting all the persons present, and confiscating all the cards, counters, gambling material and stakes. Those present were also searched for arms, and quite a collection of revolvers and daggers was secured, showing the dangerous class of men that haunt these houses. Unfortunately at the last house raided, an alarm had been given which enabled a number of the persons to escape, still, on the whole over eighty persons were arrested, including the keepers, croupiers and decoys of the gambling houses, gamblers and lookers on. These included not a few persons of respectable social position, though mostly young, and one military officer of high rank in full uniform. The whole lot were taken to the Cabildo, where they were kept all Sunday night, and yesterday morning they were transferred to the Correctional prison. It required eight large breaks to convey them. There was quite a crowd awaiting outside the Cabildo to see them come out, and it received them with decidedly disrespectful jeers. Most of them did what they could to hide their identity, putting up their coat collars and pulling their hats over their faces. They will now await the decision of the Correctional Judge, though we imagine most of them will be released on bail in a day or two, if they have not been already.

The penalties imposed by the Penal Code of the Republic, but which have practically been allowed to fall into abeyance, are as follows:—Keepers of a gambling house, whether open to the general public or only to subscribers or members, also their agents and managers, fine of \$100 to \$300 or imprisonment to three months; gamblers found in such houses, fine of \$25 to \$100 or corresponding imprisonment; police officers who neglect to proceed against gambling houses, fine of \$100 to \$300 or imprisonment.

Prefect Dominguez deserves to be warmly congratulated on his vigorous action, in which he has shown himself no respecter of persons. Even if the Judges do not support him by imposing the penalties authorized by the law, the arrest and temporary detention will be a wholesome lesson to many of the gamblers. We hope that now he has made a start he will follow it up until all these pernicious places are swept out of existence.

Spanish Moderation. The sentences below are translated from the *Voz de Espana* of this city, and, we presume, may be taken as an example of the Spanish chivalry and dignity of which that and other Spanish papers are never tired of boasting.

«The neutrality of the Government of this Spanish-American Republic, although no more than an unworthy indignity and cowardice, compels us to respect the Yankees resident here, as if they were men worthy of some consideration, gifted with honor and shame, and therefore we cannot spit in their faces nor tread them under foot like worms when we meet them in the streets; nor must we, in spite of our wishes, oblige the public authorities of the Republic to double the police guards which at present defend from the popular indignation the filibustering spies and agents who treacherously conspire against the sacred interests of our country and even against those of the country that protects them. On the contrary, we may invoke the loyalty of our feelings, which are the same as those of our brothers the Uruguayans, in order that there may return to their duties those police guards who are occupied day and night in guarding the houses and persons of the Yankee conspirators. We are not of that race given to perjury and crime: we have tried to ascertain if amongst the Yankees resident in Montevideo there was a single exception to the general rule, capable of assuming even for a moment the qualities proper to decent persons, and we have lost all hope of meeting such. If we have enemies here, they are despicable.»

It requires the mad fanaticism of an unreasoning Spaniard grossly to insult the government of a foreign country that gives him shelter because it prefers to remain neutral in his quarrels, as also to

imagine that he is at liberty to commit outrages on the inoffensive residents in a neutral territory.

In another paragraph the same paper expresses its lament that the resident Spaniards cannot make a raid on the U. S. merchant vessels which put into this neutral port!

Propaganda of this mad description is not likely to increase sympathy with the Spanish cause.

Mrs. W. J. Sloane.

With sincere regret we are obliged to announce the death of Mrs. W. J. Sloane, which took place shortly after midnight on Monday, at the family residence in Calle Asambleas 131A. Mrs. Sloane was daughter of the late Rev. T. R. Hoskin, British Chaplain in Montevideo some 25 years ago. Her many social qualities and her high domestic virtues had made her both popular and respected, and her untimely decease will be lamented by the entire English community. She leaves a husband and a large family to deplore her loss, with whom we express our sincerest condolences, which we are sure will be shared by all our readers.

The funeral will leave Calle Asambleas 131A at 9.30 a. m. today. British Cemetery.

Football.

Albion F.C. versus «I Zingari». This match, witnessed by 2500 spectators, was played on Sunday last at Punta Carretas, and resulted in a draw, 2 goals each, after a most interesting and exciting game, the match being very closely contested throughout. In the first half the Zingari's scored the two goals, one by Fallace, and the other by Right Wing Inside. In the latter portion of the game, Ramsay scored the first point for the Albions, and later on Poole made the game even. For the Zingari's, Donaldson played exceptionally well as back and Fallace was the most conspicuous among the forwards. For the Albions, C. B. Poole played his usual sure game as back.

This afternoon the Albion F. C. will play a match against a team from H. M. S. «Swallow» commencing at 3 p. m. The Albions will be represented by Messrs. H. Sardeson, Williams, C. B. Poole, Darcunex, Stewart, J. Sardason, A. Lichtenberger, Ramsay, Poole (captain), C. Buchanan and Craven.

The Treatment of Inebriates.

The Government has done well to bring in a Bill for the treatment of Habitual Inebriates. The measure introduced yesterday by the Home Secretary, is designed so as to catch the Jane Cakebreads, but to leave the men-crimal drunkards untouched. When the inebriate has «done something» through drink, he may be shut up in a special reformatory for three years, or less, with the prospect of earning a ticket of leave. It is a step in the right direction; and, in these days, when laws derive their entire sanction from public opinion, no measure can be much more. It would be impossible to imprison for mere tendencies, unaccompanied by acts. But it might be possible to extend the facilities for such imprisonment, as a favour, on the application of the sufferer. There is a conceivable opening for abuse in the temptation offered to accused persons to plead drink, by way of securing the milder treatment for offences otherwise punishable by ordinary imprisonment. But this no doubt, will be the subject of special precautions in the measure. The Bill, by taking a whole category of offenders out of the gaols; is another step in that process of differentiation which is at the root of all prison reform.—*Daily News.*

Lanoline.

Lanoline is a product which illustrates the tendencies of the present age; first as being extracted from what was a waste product only a few years ago, and secondly, as a substance which is applied to purposes suggested by nature's own use of it. Moreover, lanoline stands completely alone, it being a material quite sui generis, and its introduction has completely solved a problem which has puzzled pharmacologists for centuries. Lanoline has many of the properties of a fat or grease without being fat or grease; the most remarkable difference being that lanoline can take up or mix with water or an aqueous solution, even to the extent of something like its own weight, while true fats repel water and refuse to absorb it. True it is that a fat can be in a certain sense mingled with an aqueous fluid, a so-called emulsion resulting; but in the emulsion each particle of fat is really distinct and separate, a good illustration of this being afforded when a drop of milk compressed between two glasses, is examined by the microscope. Each fat globule is then seen as distinct and as floating on the aqueous fluid. In the cleaning of sheep's wool for use the first step is the removal of the various sudorific exudations of the animal skin, and among these is that lanoline which when purified and cleaned is now an article of commerce.—*Thomas Bolas, F. C. S., F. I. C., in the «Amateur Photographer.»*

THE WAR.

Yesterday's war telegrams contained even more than their usual measure of balderdash. When we find messages «confirming» with equal assurance that first the Spanish and then the U. S. fleet are in Santiago de Cuba, we may well abandon as hopeless the attempt to place them.

The two fleets seem to be playing hide and seek among the West Indian islands, and, if their Governments know of their whereabouts, it is certain that the telegraphic correspondents do not. We suppose they will be bound to meet some day, if only by accident. The latest idea seems to be that Admiral Cervera is purposely avoiding a combat, awaiting the arrival of the Cadiz squadron, but if that is the case, why did he go to the scene of action so soon? It is also said that nineteen, if not more of the U. S. vessels have appeared before Havana and 24 hours' notice has been given of the bombardment of the city. This may be accepted with the usual doubts.

The safe arrival of the «Oregon» and consorts at Key West seems fully confirmed, and they will soon be ordered to join one of the squadrons.

There are wonderful tales that Spain is getting ready another squadron of six or eight powerful vessels, which will be sent to take part in the war. Where the vessels come from is not explained.

The latest story is that the Spanish Government is seriously considering the advisability of issuing letters of marque to corsairs. As it cannot attack the U. S. fleet we suppose it intends to attack the U. S. merchant vessels. Such procedure will not encourage European sympathies.

It is asserted and (of course) equally contradicted that the Italian Government has lodged a protest against the blockade of Cuba. Why it should do so is not made clear. It has no interests of importance there.

The telegrams have started two sensational stories, one that a Franco-Spanish alliance will soon be proclaimed, the other that France will buy the Canary Islands from Spain for six millions sterling. We expect both which the telegrams try to drag the other European powers into the quarrel is extraordinary were it not explicable by remembering that the telegrams are concocted to please Spanish tastes and are invariably unreliable.

SUNDRIES.

—It is to the deep and lasting discredit of the recent «Colorado» governments that a man of the worth of the late Colonel Lamas, a figure so striking in his generation, should have been obliged to seek in a foreign land field for his talents and his energies, and should only be able to appear in his native country at the head of a revolutionary force. A country that thus hostilizes, instead of utilizing, the services of its best and worthiest men, is on the verge of an abyss. Fortunately things have now changed for the better, and it is to Lamas himself that the country in great measure owes the change.

—All the vessels in the bay were gay with bunting yesterday, in honor of the Queen's birthday, but we did not see many British flags in or about the city, in spite of the permission granted by the authorities.

—Says a Yankee wit, «Spain is probably sorry she ever discovered America.»

—In the forthcoming naval manoeuvres the Duke of York will be posted as Captain to the command of a ship for the first time in his career in her Majesty's Navy—a stepping stone to flag rank. Up to the present his Royal Highness has only had two commands, those of Lieutenant-Commander of her Majesty's gunboat *Thrush*, on the North American and West Indian station, and Commander in lieu of a Captain of the cruiser *Nelampus* some few years ago during the manoeuvres.

—Ought babies to be kissed? A great many people will be thankful to learn that a paragraph in the *Medical Press* of last week suggests that osculation is dangerous—for the baby. For in early life, we are told, children are very susceptible to the infection of zymotic diseases, and kisses may convey them. Of course the fond mother will scorn the warning as far as she herself is concerned, but the mere suggestion of zymotic terrors hovering over the cradle will impel her to keep everyone else at a safe distance, even if she has to build a zaraba round it. This will be hard on the female friends who worship babies, but the male relatives will be rather glad than otherwise. Not that it will make much difference either to them or the infants; for the ordinary man, if he feels called upon to kiss baby at all, carefully selects a spot on the top of the head. If that be not available he contents himself with a caressing movement of the forefinger towards that part of the lace shrouded anatomy which he judges to be the neck, uttering at the same time some gibberish compounded of affectionate diminutives. But he won't be sorry if he is kept altogether outside a zymotic zone.

—German military critics naturally look down with contempt upon all amateur soldiers who have not attained the standard of German mechanical precision of movement and rigidity of discipline. One of them has been describing in the *Deutsche Zeitung* a review of Volunteers he has recently seen in the United States. It was to begin at eight o'clock, but it was not until a quarter-past nine that the manoeuvres began. This was a severe shock to the critic, which was intensified by the fact that the review was held in a concert hall with galleries reserved for ladies. The last straw to the critic was that the officers addressed the men as «Gentlemen!» This was the crowning horror, and no doubt the Kaiser, who is the special patron of all battles, will look upon these proceedings as almost blasphemous. No doubt American volunteers want training, but they have enthusiasm, and the great Civil War showed that the raw material is undoubtedly good.

—The deaths have taken place of Sr. Brin, Italian Minister of Marine, and of General Bermudez Reina, ex Minister of War in Spain.

—There has been a local revolution in the remote and unimportant Argentine province of Rioja, and the Governor has been turned out.

—The 25th of May has arrived and so has the bad weather which invariably accompanies it.

—The death is announced from Savannah of General Henry R. K.

LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, APRIL 26. President McKinley yesterday sent a message to Congress recommending the immediate and formal declaration of war.

It was stated at Washington yesterday that as a consequence of the action of Spain in granting to United States vessels in her ports 30 days' grace in which to leave, the American Government had decided to release Spanish vessels captured by the squadron in Cuban waters.

No movement of American volunteers into Cuba, may, a Washington Correspondent thinks, be expected before the autumn, it being thought that the marines and regulars, in conjunction with the insurgents in the island, who will be armed and equipped by the United States, will be all the force needed for the present.

A short sitting of the House of Lords was held yesterday, during which several private Bills were read a second time.

In the House of Commons further questions were addressed to Ministers as to conduct of the pending war. Mr. Balfour said he was personally disposed to interpret the declaration of the Spanish Government as meaning that, while reserving to itself the right to grant letters of marque if circumstances should arise to make it expedient, it did not in the meantime intend to grant them.

In the presence of a very considerable company the Prince of Wales yesterday opened the Royal Photographic Exhibition at the Crystal Palace. His Royal Highness made a tour of the Show, and afterwards witnessed part of the daily entertainment from the Royal box in the Central transept.

Jeffery and Mr. E. J. Horniman. The petition was dismissed, but as the Falmouth House entertainment, in the opinion of the Commissioner, was open to grave mis-construction, he decided that each party should bear its own costs.

A respectable-looking old man, who gave the name of William Moore, was sentenced to three years' penal servitude at the Central Criminal Court yesterday for defrauding various City stock brokers. Prisoner asserted that some years ago he lost a sum of 80,000l. through stockbrokers.

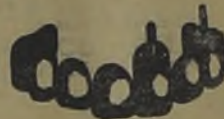
By this the constable knew that though he had acted a brave man's part, done his duty and earned a hundred pounds in an evening, he had lost the chief hope of his life.
