NEWS OF THE DAY

POLITICAL NOTES.

There was a general absence of political news, and even of polemical, yesterday. In fact the only novelty was the appearance of another long letter from Dr. Angel Floro Costa, who has transferred his attentions from the *Stigla* to the *Razon*, being offended because the former paper printed one of his letters on the second page instead of the first! The *Stigla* wittily excuses itself saying that so brilliant a writer as Dr. Costa could not fail to be read even if he were placed among the advertisements. We regret that we cannot tell our readers what Dr. Costa's latest effusion is about, but we must confess that we have not read it. Life is rather too short to read all he writes.

The Government has given a negative to the application of Sr. Huysmans to work a mine of amianthus (a kind of asbestos) which he has discovered some forty metres from the Cerro fortress, nearly on the top of the Cerro Hill. The reason for the negative is an Article in the Mining Code which gives the Government faculty to deny permission to carry on mining operations within 1400 metres of fortified places.

The Government has officially approved the statutes of the North German Fire Insurance Company, represented here by Sr. Juan Estapé.

The Civic Registers were open again on Thursday, the number of registrations made being 335, making a total to date of 1357. This is slow progress, yet all the party papers keep urging their readers to inscribe.

On Thursday there took place in the Office of Public Credit the 4th amortisation of the Extraordinary 1897 Loan. Three tenders were accepted for the amortisation of \$33,300 nominal, at the rates of 64.25, 64.27 and 64.27 1/2, respectively, the effective value being \$31,399.91, leaving a balance of \$2.15 to be carried forward.

According to a contemporary—but we rather think the statement requires confirmation—the Superior Tribunal following the course it recently took with Dr. Ballosteros, has asked for the resignation of Dr. Montaña, Criminal Judge of the 2nd Turn, and of Dr. Rovira, the Correctional Judge, but both these functionaries have roundly refused to resign, preferring to be dismissed if proper grounds can be found for such a step. We cannot say what course the Tribunal will adopt in such an emergency, but we think there are good grounds for the removal of at least one of the two Judges named, and such a step would produce a good public impression.

Col. Gaudencio, Commandant General of Marine and Captain of the Port, has presented to the Government an elaborate proposal for changing the name of his office to that of «Prefectura Marítima», and of reconstructing the staff mainly with military men. Why this office, the duties of which are by no means of a military nature, should thus be militarised is more than we understand. The general opinion, if we are not mistaken, is that the military element is already too predominant in it.

Ceara Rubber.

The plant yielding what is known in commerce as Ceara rubber or Manicoba, and shipped from the Brazilian ports of Ceara, Bahia, and Pernambuco, was identified at Kew eleven years ago as *Mantou Glaziovii*, Muell. Arg. Specimens of the plant were sent from Kew to our colonies and possessions which seemed suitable for its cultivation, and the results of the attempts to introduce the Ceara rubber-trees are described in the latest issues of the *Kew Bulletin* (Nos. 153-234 1898). The following is a summary of the information thus obtained, and it furnishes another example of the valuable work done by Kew in the endeavour to increase the natural resources of British possessions:

(1) The plant is readily propagated both from seeds and cuttings. Seeds are abundantly produced in almost every part of the world where the plant has been introduced. They may be gathered from plants when only three to five years old. There is, therefore, the great advantage that a large area could be planted within a comparatively short period. Sowing the seeds in the position where they are to grow permanently is universally adopted in Brazil. It is possible, if adopted elsewhere, this plan would greatly reduce the cost of establishing plantations. (2) The Ceara rubber plant is very hardy, a fast grower, free from insect and fungoid attacks, requires little or no attention when once established, and thrives in poor, dry, and rocky soils unsuited to almost any other crop. It is evident, however, that the yield of a few trees cannot be remunerative, and only large areas can hope to make the industry a paying one.

(3) It produces a good class of rubber, second only when well prepared to the best Para rubber. For this there is a steady and continuous demand. The yield per tree is apparently small, but a return is obtained earlier than from any other rubber plant. With thick planting and judicious thinning as the trees grow up, it may be possible to increase the yield hitherto recorded; while with skilful treatment the permanent trees may be tapped twice yearly, and last in a productive state for fifteen to twenty years.—*Nature*.

The Pension as a Factor in Longevity.

A potent factor in the prolongation of human life beyond the common span which has been unaccountably overlooked in recent discussions on the subject is the possession of a pension. Sir Andrew Clark has recorded the case of the chaplain to a London Hospital who was pensioned off on account of heart disease, which it was thought would speedily slit the thinspun thread of his life, and who lived for nearly half a century afterwards, doubtless praising God, and let us hope, blessing the enlightened liberality of the committee. But probably the most striking examples in illustration of the effect of a pension in promoting longevity are to be found in the United States, where a large army of veterans who fought in the great Civil War live on in spite of most complicated ailments which would certainly kill most people whose constitution is not fortified by the elixir that dwells in a grant of public money. Many of these veterans, like Artemus Ward, escaped a wound in battle because they were not there, but a disability contracted in the service does just as well. With a little ingenuity it is possible to devise pathological conditions of the most moving kind.—*British Medical Journal*.

Hot Water Street Lamps.

There have been rumours that the latest thing in applied science was to be street lamps for London that should supply the weary pedestrian with tea, coffee, cocoa, and hot water on the penny in the slot system. The rumours were true, and the new hot water lamp is an established fact, as anyone who chooses to make a journey to Queen's Buildings, South-west Bridge Road, may verify. The lamp looks somewhat like an overgrown gas lamp standing on a square base, which is really a tank containing some fifty gallons of water. This latter is supplied from the street main by a small pipe, which, curling through the already warmed water in the main tank, runs up the lamp-post and passes in a spiral of many swirls round and round three great gas flames. The heat turns it into steam, which, confined at a pressure of thirty pounds to the square inch, becomes super-heated and, passing downwards, keeps the water in a small tank above the main one always boiling. From the upper tank the steam passes to the main one, which it keeps at a temperature just below boiling point, and from which the smaller boiling tank is kept supplied. A halfpenny put into the slot at the side releases a spring and enables a handle to be pulled over, whereupon the boiling water runs from

a spout in any quantity up to a gallon the purchaser may require. At present only the hot water is on tap; a little later compartments in the square pedestal will be filled with tablets of compressed tea, cocoa, &c. Cups will be attached to the base, and then anybody who wants a cup of tea or cocoa will put his penny in the slot, draw a compressed packet from the drawer, drop it into the cup, turn on the boiling water by means of another halfpenny, and enjoy the cup that cheers at any hour of the night or day.

THE RECRUDESCENCE OF QUARANTINE.

(HOSPITAL.)

It is not a little curious, at this somewhat advanced period of the history of civilization, to find that proposals for the more or less complete restoration of quarantine, as a protection against the introduction of disease, are not only received with favour by non-medical legislative bodies and by certain sections of the general public, but are advocated, and to some extent enforced, by direct medical authority. We have heard of so-called «quarantine camps» as part of the organisation called into existence for the purpose of checking the advance of bubonic plague in Bombay; and the *New York Medical News*, of so late a date as Christmas Day, contains not only the full text of Senator Caffery's Bill for the more strict enforcement of quarantine in the United States with reference to yellow fever, but also, what is infinitely more curious in a medical journal, a leading article commendatory of the course proposed, in which it is said that Congress has before it for enactment this winter no measure of more pressing urgency than this Quarantine Bill introduced by Senator Caffery. It does not surprise us that an ignorant population should stand on guard at railway stations with loaded fire arms, and should forbid trains to stop or passengers to alight; but it does surprise us to find a medical contemporary even appearing to admit that «the paper plausibilities of quarantine» are able to confer some kind of degree of additional security upon States in the vicinity of those which may be visited by a yellow fever epidemic.

The belief that any such security can be afforded in the manner indicated is one which could hardly fail to spring up and flourish during the darkness of the Middle Ages. The first proposals for quarantine date from the middle of the fourteenth century, and originated in the city of Milan, as a precaution against the Black Death. The example thus set was followed in Venice, where the first *lazaretto* was established in 1423, the disease then to be kept at bay being bubonic plague. Two centuries later the system was almost universal and had reached its full development, inasmuch that very elaborate regulations were formed and enforced in this country with reference to the plague which appeared so early as in 1635, and which committed such terrible ravages in London and in some country districts, as at Eyam, between 1683 and 1686. These endeavours to exclude plague were as effectual, in the words of Sir John Simon, «as if their intention had been to bar out the east wind or the new moon»; but, notwithstanding this, the epidemic of cholera which prevailed in Europe in 1831 found not only the popular, but even the sanitary authorities of this country, prepared to trust in quarantine as their supreme hope. As the Government could only control the regular channels of trade or passage, all persons of influence resident on the coast, and particularly in retired villages, were urged to impress upon their neighbours the dangers of intercourse with smugglers and other evaders of quarantine. It very injudiciously would of itself have been sufficient to prove to those who issued it the utter futility of the whole proceeding. The Government was able to interfere just so much as to cause the maximum of inconvenience and loss to healthy people, and the maximum of injury to trade; and, when this was done, they were unable to touch so much as the fringe of the innumerable points of leakage, which even the best organized system of quarantine must leave wholly unprovided for. Notwithstanding the quarantine, the disease was not only introduced, but it spread with terrible rapidity, and produced a mortality of many thousands, the precise amount of which it would now be impossible to ascertain. Taught by experience, the General Board of Health, in 1849 and in 1852, strenuously pointed out that quarantine could not give any but a false security for the purpose it pretended to accomplish; and adding illustrations of its futility and oppressiveness as commonly administered, boldly proposed, as a practical solu-

tion, that this country should entirely set aside its existing quarantine establishments, and should rely exclusively upon the protection it could derive from a system of local sanitary improvements. Our present method is to admit disease freely, but to be on the watch for it when it comes. If plague or yellow fever were brought to any English port, the actual sick would be landed and placed in a proper hospital for the reception of infectious cases; the sound would be permitted to proceed to their several destinations, the sanitary authorities of which would be instructed to keep them under observation until all danger was past, and to send them to hospital if the disease should show itself in them; and the ship and its cargo would be subjected to disinfection. When we had quarantine, plague and cholera were not only introduced, but destroyed their thousands. During the last European epidemic, cholera was introduced into many of our ports, and it fizzled out as harmlessly as a lighted match on a stone floor.

THE WAR.

The latest news is that on Thursday the U. S. fleet made another attack on Santiago, or rather on the defence works of the bay 5000 (?) shells were fired. The batteries to the West of the Morro were almost completely destroyed, four of the Spanish vessels were touched and no one hurt! It is further stated that the last defences raised by the Spanish at Caimanera have been destroyed in a bombardment by the «Texas», «Marblehead» and «Swanee» The Spanish tried to reply but their fire was useless and they were rapidly compelled to evacuate. The «Vesuvius» fired three shells from her dynamite gun, each containing a charge of 200 pounds of gun cotton, the explosion of which wrecked everything in a radius of 200 yards. (Where this was is not clear, neither do we understand how Caimanera is being bombarded when it is supposed to be in the possession of the Americans.) The Spanish continue to harass the American encampments. There is no news about the arrival of further forces, notwithstanding the frequent assertions of the embarkation of expeditions last week and the beginning of this. It is now said, however, that President McKinley has given orders for the preparation of a large force for the invasion of Puerto Rico.

It is once more stated, this time from Spanish sources, that Admiral Cámara's reserve squadron has at last sailed from Cadiz. How far it will get remains to be seen. The Spanish Minister of Marine, Admiral Auñón, is on board the flagship «Pelayo» but is expected to return (how?) after he has given his final instructions to Admiral Cámara.

According to a Madrid telegram, General Linares, Commander of Santiago, has telegraphed to his Government that he is unable to say if any American forces have landed at Caimanera, for it is twenty leagues away and the roads are impassable. It is now stated that the Spanish Government has refused to exchange the prisoners of the «Merrimack» for those of the «Argonauta». Matters seem quieter politically in Madrid, and we hear nothing more for the moment of a change of Government. Several of the leading Madrid papers are beginning a campaign in favour of peace, saying that the large majority of the people really desire it but are afraid to say so on account of the violence of the *exaltados*, who qualify any hint of peace as anti-patriotic. There are, however, contradictory messages, which affirm that Spain desires to continue the war, being convinced that the U. S. States are impotent to take either Cuba or Puerto Rico and will soon get tired of the struggle, especially if complications arise with other powers.

There is again a lack of news from Manila. The attitude of the German squadron is still much discussed, though the idea seems now to predominate that Germany has no further intentions beyond the protection of her own interests in the Philippines. The cruiser «Wilhelm» has left Nagasaki for Manila, and the entire German squadron in the Extreme East will soon be concentrated in Philippine waters.

SUNDRIES.

—The captain of a steamer which has just arrived from Las Palmas gives us the following note.—There were four Spanish torpedo type boats, one British and one French men of war at Las Palmas when we passed through Potatoes, not for export merchandise, but as ship's provisions, were to be had at £2 per ton, there being no market at Havana now. Coal was 27 shillings the ton; a good stock, but not of first quality. Plenty of movement of military folk, placing of cannon on the commanding heights near the port, and no lights or movement in the port after sunset. Nobody seemed to have any news of what was taking place, and the European papers gave them their latest.

—Of the seventeen Prime Ministers of England who have died during the present century, five only have received the recognition of a public monument—Mr. Pitt in 1806, Mr. Perceval in 1812, Sir Robert Peel in 1850, Lord Palmerston in 1865, and Lord Beaconsfield in 1881. Pitt, Perceval, and Palmerston died in office; Peel and Lord Beaconsfield were at the time of their deaths in Opposition.

—«Wife as active as ever!»—Yes. She can jump at a conclusion as quick as she could forty years ago.

—The marriage took place on Thursday evening of Mr. José Clulow, of the Montevideo Gas Company, to Miss Selva Comparada. The ceremony was performed in the house of the bride's father, after which dancing was kept up until the early hours of the morning. The presents were both numerous and in good taste. We wish the newly-married couple lasting happiness.

—The following are the draws and handicaps for the Foursome Golf Tournament which will commence tomorrow.—Lane and Marshall 32 versus Adams and Nuttall 27;—Dunbar and Jones 24 versus Bowles and Crocker 18;—Frederick and Thomas II versus Benedict and Oldham 25;—Towers and Scott 35 versus Fraser and Reid 9.

—The subscription to purchase a house for the mother of the late Col. Diego Lamas has now reached the sum of \$12,346. The lists will soon be closed.

—A Rugby football match, Montevideo versus Rovers, will be played at the Blanqueada field tomorrow afternoon. We have not yet received the names of the teams.

—The marriage was celebrated on Thursday evening of Sr. José Serrato and the beautiful Miss Josefina Perez. There was a very large and fashionable attendance at the house of the bride's parents, and an overwhelming list of presents.

—A Spanish Zarzuela Company is announced to make its appearance at the San Felipe Theatre in the course of next week.

—According to a statement furnished by the Ministry of Foment, during the year 1897, 6,400,791 kilos of auriferous quartz were crushed in the Republic. It is not said how much gold was obtained.

—It is easy to see how the confusion of tongues came about as we notice how quickly popular language—in effect, the argot of the street, the shop, the club, the bar room—diverges even in countries which share the same literary language. The London coster and the New York dealer in the same line, would be found to express themselves in a quite different manner; and the frequenter of a Chicago bar-room would be hardly understood in an English tavern. To «flash the long green» has nothing to do with signalling, for example; it is simply American argot for spending money freely, and changing notes, or «greenbacks», of considerable amount. And, «green goods» are not what we understand by green groceries, but forged «greenbacks», in which, by the way, a considerable trade is done, carried on almost as openly as any legitimate business.

—The great Italian actress Eleonora Duse is seriously ill at Bologna, and has had to suspend her tour.

—The Paraguayan Government has decided to allow the «Temerario» to remain in Asuncion one month for repairs. This will give the U. S. fleet one month's breathing time before annihilation.

—At the Solis this evening, Sr. Mariani will appear in Sardou's «Andréina», one of his great pieces which has not been played here much.

—At the Cibils Theatre this evening will be given the antique and tremendous melodrama, from the French, «Lazarro el Mudo». The two theatres are giving as great a contrast as possible in style of art and of programme—the two extremes in fact.

LONDON NOTES

Mr. Gladstone passed peacefully to his rest yesterday morning. Mrs. Gladstone and all the other members of the family being with him when he breathed his last.

Telegraphic messages were dispatched to the Queen and the Prince of Wales. Her Majesty, in acknowledgment, sent a touching message of condolence to Mrs. Gladstone.

There was only a brief sitting of the House of Commons in the afternoon but there was an exceptionally large attendance of members, most of whom were dressed in black.

The Leader of the House, who spoke with evident emotion, said that was not the occasion on which to give utterance to any of the thoughts which naturally suggested themselves.

Telegrams of condolence from abroad have reached Mrs. Gladstone and Mr. Herbert Gladstone has received a sympathetic message from the American Ambassador attached to the Court at St. James.

In the course of an address to the Indian Section of the Society of Arts, Sir Alfred Lyall yesterday spoke of Chartered Companies as, in the present state of the world, no longer convenient agencies for the acquisition and administration of territory.

Addressing the shareholders in the African Transcontinental Telegraph Company day, Mr. Cecil Rhodes explained his scheme of telegraphs across Africa, and said that cable communication from Capetown to Cairo would soon be no longer an imaginative dream, but a practical commercial reality.

A report from the British Embassy at Berlin with reference to the supply of flowers from the public parks to the schools for the study of botany came before the School Board for London yesterday. It was decided that letters should be sent to the London County Council and her Majesty's Office of Works inquiring whether a similar arrangement might be made in this country.
