POLITICAL NOTES.

The alleged conspiracy was the principal topic yesterday, though nothing could be a vanced in the way of definite explanation. Some further arrests are being spoken of but are not yet certain. Col. Pampilon, who is said to be implicated has received orders not to leave the capital Sr Francisco Moré has been arrested. He is bro-ther of the Sr. Pedro Moré who was arrested on Monday. Both are kept strictly «incomunicado.» The idea neems to be that they were engaged in an attempt to subvert the local authorities of San José where they re side. Dr. Julio Herrera's name has also cropped up in connection with the matter, and it is alleged that he has visited various parts of the north and interior of the Republic with the object of stirring up disaffection.

Our contemporaries of yesterday all occupy themselves more or less with this affair of the alleged con-spiracy. For the most part they fail to see anything serious in it, and blame the Government for spreading alarms, which always do mischief to the econ-omical interests of the country, by making arrests which it finds difficulty in substantiating and by pretending to see a conspiracy in every marmur of disaffection. The Government, they all say, is showing an excess of nervousness and susceptibility. It is very firmly es-tablished, it has the support of the enormous majority of the country. and it can well afford to laugh at the outcries of the disafected few whose interests, generally unholy ones, have been injured by its reformatory policy. In fact, it would do better to let them conspire freely, for any attempt at the alteration of public order could very promptly be suppressed, and to be continually persecuting them only gives them more im-portance than they deserve, and enables them to represent them selves as martyrs of political per-secution and of a dictatorial re-

For our part, we think that although there is some truth in this. there is also much to be said on the other side of the question. Sr. Cuestas' Government of which tact is not one of the principal qualities - has been both too lenient and too severe with the adherents of the past regime, now converted into the conspirators of the present. If from the first it had put Dr. Julio Herrera, Dr. Brian, and half a dozen other leading spirits into prison and kept them there
—for which step there would have
been no difficulty in finding good ressons—it could have afforded to laugh at the intrigues of their underlings, and the country would have been much more tranquil. It was a great error when Drs Herrera, Brian and Automa ware allowed to and Aguirre were allowed to go to Buenos Aires instead of

against the people who ought then and there to have been put in prison and kept there until a constitutional situation was restored. The political revolution t rat has tak en place has naturally left a number of the adherents of the old regime, corrupt men without con science or patriotism, intensely dis-satisfied because they can no longer live by plundering the treas sury and the people, and have no honest means of earning a liveli hood. These have nothing to lose, not even reputation, and everything to gain by subversion, and it is certain that they will form an uneasy and dangerous element some time to come, or at all events until they are thoroughly convinc ed of their impotence. If the Government really has proofs that any of these men-of whom Dr Julio Herrera may be regarded as the archetype and leader - are engaged in a serious conspiracy against the present situation, it cannot, in our opinion, be too severe with them, and would do well to make a signal example of them. But, on the other hand, we quite agree with our contemporaries in thinking that it does more harm than good in taking notice of every little murmur of disaffection that may reach its ears. It is right to be on its guard, but it is a sign of weak-ness rather than of strength to

public The Dia. referring to certain reports recently current, says that it is quite true that the Government has been able to put aside a million dollars, more or less, during its term of administration, but the money is not kept unproductively in the Treasury safes; on the contrary, it has been employed in repaying to the Bank of the Republic the million dollars of credit allowed to the Government, a d which had been ex-hausted by the Borda administration. The money is therefore in the Bank, at the se vice of the Government for any emergency.-The explanation, presuming it to be correct, is rather surprising, for, unless we are greatly mistaken it had been stated very positively that the Borda government had only used a small part of its credit with the Bank of the Republic-though, of course, this may have been a false statement like many others issued by that highly moral government. Anyhow, the incident once more shows the advisability of making the Government account a separate item in the published bal-ance sheets of the Bank of the Republic in order that the public

may know what is happening. With regard to the Port question, it is stated that the Government has ordered scale copies to be made of the port plans prepared Isome time ago by the engineer Sr Rigoni. These will be presented to the Council of State side by side with the Guerrard plans, so that a comparison may be made between the two. It is now said that the whole affair will be presented to the Council of State next week.

Of Interest to Cricketers.

A mass meeting of Buenos Aires Cricketers was held on Monday evening last, about 50 being pre-

Mr B W Gardom, the chairman, explained that the first busi-ness before the meeting was the presentation of two bals, generously donated by Mr. D. Kingsland, and which he might say were purposely made for Dr. W. G. Grace, and it was only by a great favour that Mr. Kingsland had been able to become possessed of them. The first was for Mr. A. Anderson, who in championship matches obtained the splendid average of 101 runs and the second was for Mr. F. Bennett who, bowling in the same competition, got the analysis of 8.79 runs per wicket.

The next husiness was the consideration of the possibility of bringing out a first class profes-sional cricketer from England. It was attempted last year by the B. A.O.C., but the time was too short and the expense too great for one club, but this year there was a much better prospect. There was plenty of time, and with regard to the matter of expense, Mr. Kingsland had most generously offered to pay the man's passage both ways, and his keep whilst here, on condition that the various clubs

Bringing out such a man would impart great stimulus to cricket, and was a thing badly wanted. He estimated the cost to the various clubs at about £200 Mr. H. M. Mills thought the amount somewhat high, and proposed that a sub-committee of the captains of the various clubs should be appointed to consider ways and means. This motion was carried by 22 votes

to 13. Mr. Gardom next brought forward the important point of the possibility of entertaining a team of English Amateur Cricketers. The idea was started last year but fell through owing to some misunder-standing as to expenses. Those invited to come would pay their own passages and the only expense to be considered was that of entertaining them. They would be here from 4 to 6 weeks, and it was cal culated that the cost would be about \$1,000 per week. To meet this it would be possible to charge gate money in some instances, and influential and wealthy Englishmen here would be approached on the

Subject.
With regard to the matches, it was proposed to play Montevideo, Rosario, B. A. C. C. Flores, Lomas, Hurlingham, North, Northern Camps, South, Southern Camps, and three matches against the Republic. They could not decide tonight but could only appoint a committee.

THE WAR.

Yesterday's war news was rather more contradictory than usual, if that be possible l'he morn ing telegrams began by denying entirely the alleged landing of U.S. forces near Santiago, saying that the landing was confined to a small party to estab-lish communication with toe rebels, and that there will be no attempt to land troops until the entire force can land together. The alternoon telegrams, however, return to the original tale of the landing of a force of 5000 or more. Betwoen the two versions it is impossible to know what to believe, and it is useless repeating details every one of which is met with a contradiction. It seems quite certain that the

It seems quite certain that the blockading squadron madeanother determined attack in Havana on Monday morning, lasting from about 7 to 11 a. m but versions differ greatly as to the results, though even the Spenish despatches admit that some damage was done. According to the American version, the forts at the en-trance to the bay were silenced and seriously damaged, if not quite destroyed the cruiser «Reina Merto be abandoned, the cruis-er «Infanta Maria Teresa» was sunk (this is very doubtful) and there were a great number of killed and wounded, among the former being the milit-ary commander Col. Ordonez, Capt. Sanchez 2nd Commander of the «Reina Mercedes,» and some other officers. Nothing is said of any losses or injury on the American side. The Spanish version is that the forts received comparatively little damage which has already been prepared, and that after three hours bombarding the U S. vessels retired greatly dam aged by the Spanish shells. They acknowledge 8 killed and about 20 wounded, including the officers already named, though one despatch says they are only wounded. Some of the U.S. shells are said to have tallen in the rebel camp causing several deaths! The U.S. vessels taking part in the combat are variously represented as from 9 to 24 (!) and the number of shells fired from 600 to 1500, a wide di-

LONDON NOTES

WEDNESDAY, MAY 11.

A Correspondent in Milan tele-graphs briefly saying that in con-sequence of a yet more rigid censorship of telegrams he is unable to send further accounts of the re-volutionary events there. He adds that the enforced silence is most ominous. Telegrams from stations beyond the frontier describe con-tinued scenes of bloodshed and disorder. The students from Pa-via entrenched themselves in a convent, and opened fire upon the troops. Cannon were used to make a breach in the walls, but the students, when the soldiers entered, had managed to make good their escape. During a de-monstration of Italian workmen at Lausanne, in Switzerland, yester day, a telegram received by one of the leaders was read declaring that Turin had been set on fire, and that the revolution there had triumphed. Subsequently a large number of the manifestants left Lausanne, declaring their intention to cross the frontier to join in the revoit. A Rome Correspondent telegraphs that the Cabinet Council yesterday decided to prorogue the Chamber which was to meet to-morrow. Precautionary measures have been taken in the capital, military patrolling the streets, and all gunsmith's and cutlers' shops being closed. There has been serious rioting at Naples, and here, as at Florence and Leghorn, martial law has been proclaimed.

Lord Brassey (Governor of Vic toria) took the oath and subscrib-ed the roll on taking his seat in the House of Lords yesterday for the first time during the present Parliament. A question of which notice had been given by Lord Carring-ton relating to the commissions of the officers who took part in the Jameson Raid, was postponed.

In the House of Commons, the Chancellor of the Exchequer ad mitted, in reply to a question by Mr. Gibson Bowles, that he had assented to terms of issue by which British subscribers to the Greek Loan were at a disadvantage com pared with those of France and Russia. Mr. Balfour announced that the Old Age Pensions report had been drafted, and was under discussion. The House went into Committee on the financial resolution of the Irish Local Government Bill. This having been adopted the Committee stage of the Bill itself was resumed.

There was an exceptionally large attendance at Buckingham Palace yesterday, when the Queen in per-son held the third Drawing Room of the season. Her Majesty was ac companied by the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York, and other members of the Royal Family. The function, as usual, was a brilliant one, the presentations numbering 200. The weather was fine though dull.

A solemn scene was witnessed vesterday morning at the Congrega tional Union Assembly at the City Temple. Dr. Guinness Rogers mov ed a resolution of sympathy with Mr. Gladstone in his great suffering, and declared he had given the world the spectacle of what a Christian statesman could do, and ought to do. After Mr. Albert Spicer and Dr. Parker had spoken, the Chairman offered an affecting and touching prayer the crowded audience standing with bowed heads. Many were moved to tears. Another impressive incident was the enthusiastic reception of the American de-legate, Dr. Philip Moxom, and the sympathy displayed with Americans, in the present war. Dr. Moxom strenuously urged unity be-tween Great Britain and America. If they were joined they could dominnate the world in the interests of peace and righteousness A resolu-tion of sympathy with the U. States was passed. In his address the Chairman urged Congregationalists to concentrate their resources for the part they had to play in the coming century.

We regret to announce the death of the Duke of St. Albans, which occurred yesterday morning at Brooke House, Isle of Wight, the residence of Sir Charles Seely.

Yeslerday, the London County Council resolved to revert to twenty miles as the radius with-in which its labour conditions shall operate. Debate on the subject led to an animated scene, arising out of Mr. Frank Smith's suggestion that the acquaintance of Moderates with wheel-barrows was probably limited to being car-

ried home in them. Mr. Kensit attended Convocation yesterday but was unable to get his petition against alleged illegal practices in metropolitan churches presented. Later in the day, however, he received a letter from the Bishop of London, who himself to the Upper House of Convocation at its sitting to day. Meanwhile the Bishop asks Mr. Kensit to discontinue his protests at divine service, and to submit to him a memorial stating the practices he objects to.




