POLITICAL NOTES.

The lack of political news is more than atoned for by the superfluity of political polemic, not always of a gratifying kind. As the Bien aptly puts*it, Sr. Cuestas' Government is receiving its «baptism of opposition» from certain organs of the press. This appropriation however is not on opposition, however, is not on administrative grounds—no one has yet ventured to make a serious attack on the administrative acts of Sr. Cuestas' government-but is purely political, and, for the matter of that, partisan in the narrowest sense of the term. In fact, the whole polemic may, without difficulty, be traced to a purely «collectivist» origin. The «collectivists,» never at a loss for means to disturb public opinion and injure the Republic, are now making a vigor] ous ouslaught on Sr. Cuestas, and because they very rightly find themselves excluded from his political programme, as they must be from the programme of every honest President, are accusing him wildly of narrowness, personalism, persecution, and so th. The whole outery is, thinking, sheer nonsense. If Sr. Cuestas has erred, it is not on the side of the severity, but of lenity. These men-the «collectivists»have committed every imaginable offence against the country, yet pretend that they are hardly treated because for awhile they are kept out of the political power of which they made such a miserable use when they had it. We repeat, nothing could be more absurd. Sr. Cuestas would be weak and unworthy indeed if he listened to such an outery. For the matter of that, the «collectivisis» expose the fallacy of their own arguments, for whilst on the one hand they complain of Sr. Cuestas' «exclusiveness,» on the other they simul taneously complain of his favors to their opponents—that is to say of the breadth of his policy, which finds room equally for «colorados» nationalists and constitutionalists. Sr. Cuestas is the first respectable President the «colorado» party has given the country for many years, and the first to govern on national lines and in national interests ins-tead of by and for a narrow circle, and for these very things, which most people would consider merits worthy of all praise, he is being attacked, abused and obstructed by a noisy and discredited faction of his own, the «colorado» party, and by no one else, and is accused by them of teachery Reduc-ing the matter to its lowest terms, we might say that it amounts to this—because Sr. Cuestas is an honest, popular and national President, such as his pre-decessors failed to be, therefore he is no true «colorado» and has no right to govern. The Fate of the Spanish Armada. The June Century contains an ar-

ticle on «The Spanish Armada.» by William Frederic Tilton with an introduction by Captain Alfred T. Mahan Captain Mahan says:

The fate of the Spanish Armada stands conspicuous among the great catastrophes of war narrated by history. According to the estimate of the Spanish captain Duro, who has made a close study of the records in his own country, out of one hundred and thirty sall lost. Of those only nine fell in battle or in immediate con-sequence thereof, although the injuries received in the various ac tions in the Channel doubtless contributed to the ultimate ship-wreck of many. Nineteen were cast away on the Scottish and Irish coasts; thirty five disappeared altogether. Of these last, it it pos-sible that some of the smaller classes of vessels may have reached port, and that the fact passed unnoted; but of the forty-odd larger vessels which never returned, the probability is that those whose fate is unknown perished at sea.

The war news is indecisive and contradictory asusual Theattempt-ed assassination of General Blanco in Havana is denied from Spain but apparently confirmed from other sources. The assailant is said to be one of his own troops, a Cuban (or Spanish) volunteer, named Mariano Salva, who desired to revenge the death of his brother, who had been shot under an accusation of treason. General Blanco was not wounded, but or effect accompanying him but an officer accompanying him was shot in the leg. Another officer then ran Silva through with his sword, and the entire company to which he belonged was arrested! General Monet and 500 Spanish marine infantry were taken prisoners. (Some ac-counts say the General was killed.) The Tagalos are said to have now some 5000 Spanish prisoners!


