June is always one of the duller months in the year for the Custom House, and this has proved no exception to the rule; on the contrary, the dullness has been accentuated by political unrest and by heavy rains which have impeded transit in the interior to an unusual extent. Exportation also, was unusually dull, being only \$72,771 against \$161,517 in 1897. In this the war and various outside causes have had their influence. Importation was \$582,185 against \$462,287, and this saved the situation. We doubt if any great improvement can be looked for in the present month.

The following table gives a comparison between the Customs Receipts for the first six months of 1896, 1897 and 1898, those for the present year being uncorrected totals and therefore somewhat below the mark.

The present year, therefore, not only shows an enormous recovery on the year of revolution 1897, but also compares fairly well with 1896, the first half of which was regarded as fairly prosperous commercially. We do not think any more eloquent testimony could be given to the changes for the better wrought by Sr. Cuesta's Government.

### POLITICAL NOTES.

In the Council of State, on Friday, the Message of the Executive referring to the reestablishment of the 2 1/2 additional Customs duty was referred to the Committee of Finance. The text of the Message has not yet been published, but, as we understand, the proposal is to assign the product of the tax entirely to the fund for conversion of the Treasury Certificates, until it is required for the development of the port scheme. Report on the Wheel Tax 1898-99 was presented. The Bill authorizing the Executive to construct wharves for the embarkation of live stock was approved in detail in first reading. After some other business not of general interest, the Council was counted out.

The sensation of the day has been afforded by the publication of the threatened manifesto of the military mutineers and their "collectivist" co-conspirators. This appeared in Buenos Aires on Friday afternoon,

and was transmitted by telegraph to the *Razon*, of which paper it occupied seven close columns yesterday morning (probably one of the longest telegrams ever transmitted.) It was approved in a meeting at which most of the exiles were present, but bears only the signatures of the military leaders, namely R. Estevan, B. Carámbula, V. Martinez, Manuel Rodriguez, D. Burgos, A. Isasmendi and J. R. Peláyo. The name of Casimiro Garcia is absent. The document was drawn up by Dr. Julio Herrera, and is a fine specimen of his metaphysical genius. Throughout it is a tissue of the most insolent falsehoods and audacious cynicisms, and it is difficult to say whether its pervasiveness arouses most indignation or contempt. It accuses the Government of Sr. Cuestas—the most respectable the Republic has had for many years—of every imaginable vice; oppression, cruelty, fraud, corruption, robbery, and even of suppressing the liberty of the press!

On the other hand it claims for the mutineers—nearly all of them men of notorious bad character, politically, militarily and personally—the purest, highest and most legitimate motives, representing them as honorable patriots and heroes struggling to free their country from a detested and abominable tyrant. It even has the audacity to say that their cause was espoused by the people and that its triumph would have been hailed throughout the Republic by an outburst of public joy! (It is a pity the mutineers did not hear the remarks made about them by the people in the streets and the plazas on the day of the revolt. The people, whose cause they pretended to espouse, would have made short work of them if they had fallen into their hands. "Assassins," "scoundrels," and "brigands" were amongst the mildest of the terms employed.) It eulogises the attitude of the fraudulent Chambers which were dissolved amid public contempt on February 10, and grossly insults the present honorable Council of State, composed of the most respectable men of all classes. It even has the hypocrisy to lament the blood deliberately spilt in an unholy cause and in an action which put the mutineers outside the law of nations and which, if persisted in, would have justified energetic foreign intervention and their own ignominious execution as brigands and savages. It furthermore threatens a renewal of the criminal attempt on the first opportunity and makes no attempt to disguise the continued mutinous attitude of all concerned and their desire to expose the country anew to bloodshed, civil war, and if possible the innumerable iniquities of a "collectivist" government. A more audacious document was never penned; in it the authors throw off every mask and, whilst juggling with words that should only be found on the lips of honorable men, show themselves imbued with the most criminal notions and intentions. Of such men it can only be said that they afford a study, not for the historian or the politician, but for the criminal pathologist, for they exhibit the most absolute perversion of every thing that constitutes truth, honor, morality and patriotism.

The manifesto also reproduces the "minute" signed by the mutineers on the eve of the mutiny and setting forth their programme. This is signed by the officers already named and also contains the following: "For Col. Martin Souberan, Chief of the 3rd Chasseurs, and with his authority, *Manuel Rodriguez*." No doubt Col. Souberan will be called upon to explain.

The publication of the manifesto has had one good effect, which probably the mutineers have overlooked; namely, it has united the bands of the Government. The amnesty so unfortunately promised on the day of the mutiny, cannot be held to extend to subsequent acts, and now that they have persisted in their attitude issued an insolent and rebellious document and threatened to renew the attempt, the Government is at full liberty to take what steps it pleases. The first of these, we imagine, will be their immediate degradation from the army they dishonor. The city is not lay hands upon them to throw them into prison, or to shoot them as they richly deserve. If they do dare to return to Uruguayan territory, they may look out.

The resignation of General Gregorio Castro as Minister of War was presented on Friday evening. The Decree accepting it, and making the other changes we have already anticipated will appear in a day or two.

As invariably happens, petitions are already being made for extension of the term for inscription in the civic register. If there were not special reasons this year for securing as large an inscription as possible, it would establish a good

precedent to refuse them and adhere to the legal period.

The members of the Council of State seem to find a difficulty in hitting on a generally acceptable candidate for the presidency, and fresh efforts are being made to induce Dr. Juan Carlos Blanco to withdraw his resignation.

Ten members of the Committee of the "collectivist" Club "Cruzada Libertadora," which was closely associated with the military mutiny, have published a "protest" against the appreciations in the recent Executive Messages. Our contemporaries reproduce it as a curiosity, but we cannot imagine that anyone pays any serious attention to it, especially as it is not signed by any name of the least political importance.

Col. Martin Etcheverry, one of the exiles in Buenos Aires, has published a letter signed by the military leaders of the revolt, declaring that he had no participation in the movement, if, indeed he was even aware of it.

### ARGENTINE NON-NEUTRALITY.

(Review of the River Plate, July 16.)

We have already noticed in these columns the inconsistency of the attitude assumed, apparently, by the majority of the Argentines in the present Spanish American war, the sole object of which is free the last piece of America in which Spanish tyranny and corruption has still a foothold, and it now seems to us that the half-hearted fashion in which the Argentine authorities have acted in tardily suppressing insulting posters, while they continue to permit the daily series of coarse insults, and weekly publication of hideously indecent cartoons, which emanate from the Spanish press in Buenos Aires, involves a manifest confession either of decided partisanship or of most culpable weakness. We might even go further, and say plainly that in thus turning upon the United States and allowing the Spanish press of Buenos Aires to lead that nation with insults, which has ever been the protector and safeguard of the national interests of Spanish-American republics when menaced by European powers, the Argentine Government, people, and press, are equally guilty of base ingratitude, and of entire forgetfulness of the fact that they owe the recognition of their own independence by the world in general to the initiative of the United States. Different indeed to the opinions which emanate day by day from the Argentine press were the terms in which Don Manuel H. de Aguirre addressed the United States Government at Washington in December, 1818, when seeking the recognition by the American nation, of the independence of the "United Provinces of South America, declared at Tucuman on the 9th July, 1816.... If these rules may sometimes be varied or admit of any alteration, the execution should always be in favor of the oppressed against the oppressor. It is, therefore, strongly contended by many of the most celebrated civilians, that in all revolutions produced by the tyranny of the prince foreign nations have a right to assist an oppressed people, a right dictated by justice and generosity."

But to day Argentina and her press have apparently forgotten all this history, have given the lie to their own national anthem in which "heros tiranos," "tigres sedientos de sangre," and other equally complimentary epithets are bestowed upon the Spaniards, and instead of rendering grateful acknowledgment to the United States for the assistance which, in accordance with the above mentioned opinions, they are even now affording to another American people struggling to be free, Argentine apparently feels no shame in appearing before the world as sympathizing strongly with the willow oppressors and as permitting the nation whose assistance she advocates, and whose recognition she sought, to be maligned, slandered, and insulted within her borders without let or hindrance. We confess that we should not be surprised if something further were heard about this extraordinary attitude just as soon as the United States have quite finished with Spain.

### THE WAR.

Though the capitulation of Santiago seems certain, notwithstanding some attempted denials by the Madrid telegrams, it would not seem that the exact conditions have yet been decided, and the messages, both Spanish and American are full of wild contradictions (when are they not?) The terms are being discussed by a mixed Commission, composed of Generals Wheeler and Lawton and Capt. Wiley, named by General Miles, the British Vice-Consul Mr. Mason, and General Toral's Chief of Staff. It is now said that General Blanco has consented to the surrender, which will comprise the entire

province of Santiago as well as the city. German vessels will probably be chartered to convey the Spanish troops to Spain. The officers will be allowed to retain their swords; the men carry their rifles out but do not keep them. The statements as to the number of men to be deported vary from 16,000 to 32,000.

General Schaffer has been named military Governor of Santiago. The reports about yellow fever in the U.S. camp seem to have been greatly exaggerated. The latest statement is 23 cases and 3 deaths.

Reports about peace are entirely conflicting as usual. One Washington telegram repeats that the U.S. Government will listen to no propositions until Puerto Rico has been taken (the expedition is said to be ready to start in a few days) and another represents President McKinley himself as acknowledging that peace is at hand.

In Spain, Premier Sagasta (the resignation of his Cabinet appears to have been withdrawn, if it was ever presented) has issued a proclamation suspending constitutional guarantees throughout the Kingdom. This is interpreted as a measure to assist in the suppression of the disorders which are feared should the Cabinet open negotiations for peace, though the pretext given is the approach of an U. S. fleet to the Spanish coasts, the announcement of which has caused a panic in Cadiz. The strictest censorship is imposed on the press and telegrams, and the papers are hardly allowed to publish any war news at all or to comment on the action of the Government. There is great subdued excitement among the people, and the situation is most uneasy. The latest tale is that the Cabinet is not unwilling to consent to the independence of Cuba, but will not hear of the evacuation of Puerto Rico (it being necessary to retain it as a base of communication with the Spanish Republics which have always shown such affection and friendship for the mother country.) From Havana it is now said that the people are most desirous for peace, and that the only opponent is the Governor, General Blanco!

Admiral Dewey has asked that the Chinese marines on board his vessels may be recognised as U. S. citizens, in homage to their valor.

In Argentine *highlife*, *lunches* and *breakfasts* are taken after sundown, whilst *picnicks* are held at every hour of the day except five, and people carry *revolvers* when riding on *trams* to *garden parties* held indoors. Such is the progress the English language and institutions are making among us.—*B. A. Herald*.

The Supreme Court of the United States has affirmed the sentence of death on John Andersen, cook of the Boston schooner *Olive Pecker*, for the murder of the captain and mate of this coast last year. Andersen's crime was a remarkable one. The three-masted schooner *Olive Pecker*, Capt. J. W. Whitman, sailed from Boston on June 20 last year for Buenos Aires with a cargo of lumber. On the morning of 6th August, when the vessel was off this coast, Anderson shot the captain in his cabin and the mate on deck and took command of the vessel. The bodies of the murdered men were thrown overboard, the vessel was set on fire and burned, and the crew reached the shore of Brazil, where they were arrested and sent to the United States. Andersen for trial and the others as witnesses. The trial began on December 18, before Judges Goff and Hughes of the United States Court, and on December 22nd, the jury found Andersen guilty of the murder of the mate. He was sentenced to be hanged on March 18th. An appeal to the Supreme Court followed with the result stated.

Judging from the number of tickets of the \$50,000 lottery left in the hands of the hawkers and agents yesterday morning, their sale was not very successful. This is not surprising, considering the meagre programme offered. The big prize was drawn by the number 10650. Next time we advise the Lottery Committee to reform the programme, and also to divide the tickets into tenths instead of fifths, so that they are less costly.

### LONDON NOTES

According to a telegram received in New York from the American fleet off Santiago, the bombardment was resumed for the third time on Thursday morning. It lasted for an hour, and was directed chiefly against the batteries at the right and left of the entrance to the harbour. Care was taken not to hit El Morro, where Lieutenant Hobson and the other Merrimack prisoners are confined. At first the Spaniards replied with a hot fire, but this gradually slackened until the guns were completely silenced. The western batteries were almost completely destroyed, but the batteries on the east of El Morro, which were not so accessible for the American ships, offered a longer resistance. In all some 5,000 shots were fired.

The Spanish reserve fleet, whose departure from Cadiz was reported yesterday, has been sighted going east from Gibraltar. Its destination is kept a profound secret at Madrid, but the naval authorities have more than the

A statement as to the situation in China was made by Lord Salisbury in the House of Lords yesterday.

In the House of Commons, in Committee of Supply, a vote of 4,920/1751 for elementary education in England was considered.

Sir W. Harcourt, who followed, declared that these admissions proved that Great Britain spent between eleven and twelve millions a year on the most inefficient and imperfect system in the world.

Mr. S. Woods, M. P., the Secretary to the Parliamentary Committee of the Trades Union Congress, yesterday issued to the officials the text of the resolutions to be proposed at the Congress in August.

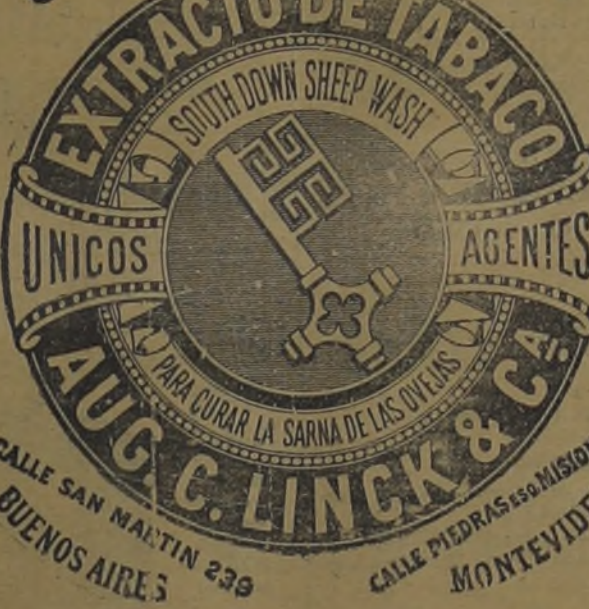

Specific requests are commonly made by a sound, which the animal intends to be taken as expressing a want, while it indicates what it wants by showing the object.

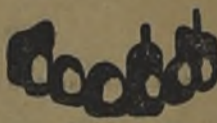

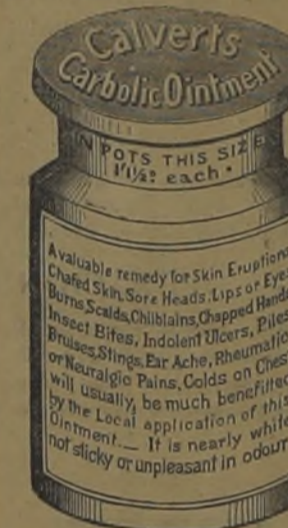
