POLITICAL NOTES.

The Conneil of State had a rather busy sitting on Monday. The Committee Reports, all favorable, on the recent Messages of the Executive relative to the Mil tary Mutiny were presented.

Short Bills were then fully sanctioned approving the extraordinary measures taken by the Executive and declaring the expulsion of General Estevan as Member of the Council. These Bills were approved unanimously and without any discussion
—we suppose the Council thought
the less said about so unpleasant a matter, the better, Dr. A. M. Rodriguez then presented a Bill for proroguing the previous Budget until the sanction of the new one until the sanction of the new one for 1898-99. This was opposed by Sr. Perez and Dr. Herrero y Espinosa. The latter said that the matter had occupied the attention of the Budget Committee. The indefinite prolongation of the anterior Budget a practice which had become habitual under previous adminis-trations-was a vicious practice and often led to the indefinite postponement of the sanction of the new Budget. It was necessary to reart against the practice, and he thought the case would be fully met by extending the previous Budget for one month longer, namely to the end of July. The Report had now been printed, and there would be more than a fortnight for its discussion and sanction by the Council. After a short discussion, Dr. A. M. Rodriguez withdrew his proposal in favor of that made by Dr. Herrero, which was then ap proved. Full sanction was given to the request of the Executive to leave without effect, for reasons of economy, the Law of July 4, 1896, economy, the Law of July 4, 1890, relative to the official representation of the Republic in the Paris Exhibition of 1900. The Bill presented by Sr. A. M. Rodriguez authorising the Executive to construct on public account two embarking wharves for live-stock was approved in general. After some approved in general. After some further business not of general in-

terest the sitting concluded.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law reducing the postal tariff on press matter. As no date is mentioned, we presume that it comes into force at once. By this the postal tariff on all news-papers and printed matter for the papers and printed matter for the interior of the Republic is reduced from 1 to 1/2 cent per 100 grammes or fraction of the same, whether bound or unbound, and without extra charge for delivery. Those who give the P. O. a guarantee may pay the fees fortnightly. The tariff on printed matter for foreign tariff on printed matter for foreign countries remains unchanged. The object of the visits was to convey his direct thanks for the support given the Government on the events of the 4th instant. proceedings were very cordial in each instance and there was no doubting the spontaneity of both officers and men in their reception

NORTH-WESTERN OF URUGUAY RAILWAY.

The seventeenth ordinary general meeting of the North-Western of Uruguay Railway Company, Limited, was held on Monday, June 13, at Winchester House, Old Broad-street, E.C., Mr. Char-les Grey Mott (chairman of the

company) presiding.

The Secretary (Mr. R. F. Fisher) read the notice convening the meeting; The Chairman said: It now be-comes my duty to move: «That the be received and adopted. I am sorry that we have to again present an unsatisfactory report for the year 1897; but I think, on the whole, that we may congratulate ourselves that the report is not a more un-favourable one. During nearly the whole of last year, Uruguay was a prey to civil war. Our line was stopped by order of the Government for nearly a month, and we had troops, first on the one side and then on the other, in possession of the country through which this line runs. Under those cir-cumstances it was impossible to carry on any satisfactory traffic, and the consequence is, as you see, that we have a considerable falling off as compared with the year previous, which itself was not a very prosperous one. We have, on the other hand, to congratulate ourselves that, under the circumstances, no serious damage was done to the line. Then, again, we have the satisfaction of knowing that the Government guarantee and the interest on our bonds were regularity paid, notwithstanding the condition of the country. Just before the close of the year the civil war came to an end, and a stronger Government—and, I hope, a Gov ernment of higher principle -came into office, and the country has since had its confidence restored, and therefore the trade of the country and the traffic of our railway is coming back to its proper condition. I hope that, if things remain as they are in respect to the Government, and all goes well, we may see a more prosperous time for this railway. The receipts for this year show an

increase, for the five months end-ed May 31, of £3650, which is a satisfactory beginning, and if that continues we shall be able to meet you in a year hence with a much pleasanter tale to tell than we can to day. The only thing that we could do under the circumstances since the company was tormed was to try to keep down expenses, and this we have done as far as it that we can say that, but, under the circumstances, we have held our hands, and we have not issued or was possible. We have made arraised any additional capital. I do rangements which will, I hope, permanently reduce the expendiinto circulation of stamps for 1/2 cent, but we do not know if the P. O. is yet provided with such.

tion before taking steps to make an outlay on that bridge. One of our directors (Mr. Holland) has just returned from South America. He has had an opportunity of going over the railway, and, on the whole, he reports favourably of our pros-As regards the comparisons of traffic for the past year, our passengers fell off to the extent of £2,-307; passengers have 907; passengers luggage decreased £69, parcels £281, and goods traffic £5,077. Telegrams decreased £54, sundry receipts were down £355, wharlage was down £128. and the interest on deposits was also decreased by £39. On the other hand, we had an increase in our live stock receipts of £115, and an increase in the item of special trains of £2,373 These special trains were run for the Government to carry troops during the war, and it has paid a large pertion of the amount due for the passage of these troops. We have, of course, other claims against the Government in respect of some slight damage done to the line, and in respect of tertain other services which we endered. These we have not in cluded here, because they have not yet been calculated by the Govern-ment. Transfer fees remain the same, and interest our investments show an increase of £142. This increase arises from the interest on the debentures of the Uruguay Land and Development Company, which has the colony. That makes a total net decrease of £5,680. As regards the expenses, the general charges are down £126, traffic expenses £146, locomotive expenses £267, maintenance of way £596, repairs on carriages and waynes £260 commission and and wagons £860, commission and discount £238, and there has been an increase in telegraphic maintenance of £82-that was really on

account of the Government—an in-crease of £43 in law charges, which is connected with a special law suit in Uruguay. That leaves us a net decrease of £3,108. We receiv-

£24,768, and this added to the traffic receipts makes a total of £52,442, and deducting the working ex penses and the interest on the first and second debentures £52,224, there remains a small balance of £217. That has been added to the amount we carried forward last year, and we have now a balance of £4,100 to the cradit of the net revenue account. That might have enabled us to pay a small dividend on the first preference, but we thought it would be better to carry it forward again to the next account, not only because of the smallness of the amount, being insufficient to pay a one per cent. dividend, and because to do that we should have to issue some fresh debenture stock, but because we have used that money instead of making any fresh issue of the capital. We have used up the profits of the company for the purposes of the line, and having regard to the present price of our debenture stock it would not have been wise in the interests of the company to issue more at the present moment. Things are now mending and I hope that when we meet again we shall be able to recommend a satis factory dividend on the first preference stock. You will find that we

place it in a very different position.

Mr. Arthur Holland, in seconding the motion, stated that he had just returned from a visit to South America, where he had had an opportunity of going over the line and inspecting the different workshops and stations. In comparing the state of the line with what it was when he last visited the country, four years and hall ago, he was much struck with the marked im-provement. They had now about a third of the line relaid with hardwood sleepers which would last their lifetime. The rest of the line was in very fair condition. He was struck with the marked improvement in the general condition of the country. When he was there on his previous visit there was a severe drought, which caused serious loss of cattle, but on this occasion he found that the cattle were in good condition, and that there was a very satisfactory pro-spect for live stock traffic on ac-count of the Saladeros owners having come to the conclusion that it would be cheaper to send cattle by rail than by road. We have contracted with one Saladero owner to convey 20,000 animals over their line and that of the Midland and of that number al-ready 9,000 had been sent. Each year the cattle trade ought to increase, and this must prove an im-portant part of their revenue. The colonists had been trying to cultiv-ate wheat, but the soil did not seem well adapted for that purpose. They next turned their attention to maize, but owing to the ravages of the locusts they were now taking to the cultivation of the castor-oil plant, which was not so attacked by locusts Should this produce prove successful it must have an important bearing upon their revenue. American Warships for Argentina?

These vessels are the 'Alabama,' 10,000 tons, and the 'Wisconsin' 11,525 tons, and of great power. The price fixed for them is £541,000 and £546,000

THE WAR.

The telegrams are at their old confusing tricks, and leave us in complete bowilderment as to what is happening at Santiago, that is to say whether the attack has really begun, or whether there has only been desultory fighting. It appears that Governor Toral offered to surrender the city, leaving the buildings intact as also the war vessels in the bay (what war vessels are left there?) and the magazines, provided his troops were allowed to carry out their arms. General Shafter refused this, and an attack seems to have been opened on Saturday alternoon-and here the doubts commence, some telegrams saying it was a bombardment by sea and have raised no new capital, and have spent no new capital during the year. I believe it is the first year yet other telegrams assign the bom-bardment to Sunday, with a renewal on Monday. Anyhow, no result of importance seems to have been obtained. The U.S. forces had 2 killed and 4 wounded. Nothing is said about Spanish losses, though American telegrams insist that the U.S. forces and batteries all made heavy fire, employing rifles, shrapnel shells, and even dynamite. If this were the case it is difficult to be-We must wait for further news to

same time, the general opinion is that the affairs of Uruguay have taken a favourable turn, and that if we can once get a settled Government, in which the people have confidence, I have no doubt trade will improve and we shall soon Regent on Monday afternoon. Toe

Government will be the surrender of Cuba, Puerto Rico and a port in the Canaries, and a war indemnity of 1200 million francs, the Philli-pines being held as guarantee for the latter (we much doubt if this is

known yet.).
The Committee appointed to enquire into the state of Admiral Cervera's lost vessels reports that the «Cristobal Colon» and the «Infanta Maria Teresa» may be re-covered and floated, if no time is lost. The «Oquendo» has 61 breaches caused by proyectiles, the «Viscaya» 24, the «Infanta Maria Teresa» 33 and the «Cristhbal Colon . eight.

A late telegram reports the arrival of General Miles, U.S. Commander in Chief, before Santiago. He found the troops in good spirits and nealth, despite the heat. There is a report that Governor Toral has abandoned the city, with his troops,

but this requires confirmation.
Cardinal Vaughan, R. C. Archbishop of Westminsterhas written on indiscreet letter to his brother at Valladolid, strongly in favor of Spain, and condemning the action of the United States.

LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, JUNE 14.

An American expedition has sailed from Key West. The marines landed near Guantanamo have been attacked by the Spaniards, who kept up their fire all night on the American camp. The Americans lost several killed and wound ed. Subsequently the camp was moved nearer the shore and the protection of the warships.

The long expected debate on the policy of the Méline Cabinet was begun in the French Chamber yes-

He finally appeal-ed for a truce of parties in order to prepare for the Exhibition of 1900. Mr. Bourgeois declared that the country needed a Republican Go-vernment, and that M. Méline ought to feel that his task was at an end

On the invitation of Earl Carrington, the Secretary of State for War yesterday, in the House of Lords, announced the decision of the Government with respect to the restor-ation of their commissions to the officers who took part in the Jame-son raid. Eight of the fourteen ac-tually concerned were not proceed-ed against. Of the others. Ministers saw no reason for mitigating the punishment of Sir John Willough-by and Colonel Frank Rhodes; but as to the remainder they were rea-dy to accept the view that they of-fended owing to a mistaken apprehension of their position. They did not, therefore, think it necessary that their punishment should in-volve perpetual exclusion from the Army, and their commissions would be restored to them. Lord Salisbury made a statement as to the Convention of Hong Kong, by which he said not only a slight ex-tension of the colony had been made, but its strategical salety had been secured.

In the House of Commons the Under-Secretary for War made a statement as to the treatment by the military authorities of Piper Findlater. Ample provision had, he said, been secured for a man in his position. In future it had been decided in cases of incapacity to earn a living to increase the pen-sion attaching to the Victoria Cross from 10l. to 50l. per annum. An inquiry was addressed to Mr. Chamberlain as to recent disturbances in Swazland. The House afterwards went into Committee on the Finance Bill, discussion first arising on the point whether the reduction in the tobacco duty would benefit consumers. After assurances from the Chancellor of the Exchequer the clause as ori-ginally drafted was adopted. Other clauses were debated, and the Bill passed through Committee by mid-


