POLITICAL NOTES.

The Decrees have been issued naming Dr. Gonzalo Ramirez as Minister to Argentina, and the ex-minister of Foreign Affairs Dr. J. Salterain as Councillor of State in place of General Estevan, expelled.

The Military Committee of the Council of State has resolved to present a Report unanimously in favor of the application of the Executive for the expulsion from the army of the Officers who signed the recent revolutionary manifesto. The Report will be presented at the next sitting and probably approved at once.

It will be remembered that on the 11th instant the Council of State passed a temporary measure prolonging the previous Budget until the end of July, it being thought that there would be time before the end of the month for the discussion and sanction of the new Budget. More than a fortnight has elapsed, the month is within a day or two of its close, and the Budget has not yet appeared on the «order of the day» so that yet another prolongation of the previous Budget is now inevitable. Who is responsible for this delay and what is the reason of it, are more than we can say, but it certainly can not be looked upon with approval, nor does it conform with the professed intention of the Government to reestablish financial order and regularity. One of the financial vices of the previous administrations was their neglect of the Budget, though, indeed, for all the respect they paid to it and for all the use it was as a regulating power in the expenditure, it was immaterial whether a Budget was sanctioned or not. We would be sorry to think and we do not think that the present Government intends to perpetuate this vice, but nevertheless it would do well to show a little more despatch in the matter. A proposal in the Council of State to prolong the existing Budget indefinitely, as had been done on so many previous occasions, was opposed and negatived with the express object of checking the vicious custom, yet it would seem that the proposers were nearer the mark than those who thought the Budget would be sanctioned within the month.

It is suggested that the sittings of the National «Colorado» Convention, which at last seems in a fair way of being constituted, shall be inaugurated on the approaching patriotic anniversary of August 25. It is also proposed to hold a popular celebration on the day, which is also the first anniversary of the accession of Sr. Cuestas to power and of the political revolution which has taken place under his administration. We think the latter idea is decidedly a good one, if carried out thoroughly. As we said a few days ago, the moment is very opportune for another public expression of confidence in the policy pursued by Sr. Cuestas and of condemnation of the aims and methods of the «collectivity.» We think that such a demonstration would strengthen the hands of the Government and tend to dispel sundry clouds and doubts in the political atmosphere.

It seems that the nationalist party has taken considerable offence at the recent Decree changing the names of the 1st and 3rd

Chasseurs Regiments, the idea being that the new titles revive associations of civil war which were better left in oblivion. The nationalist members of the Council of State intend to bring the matter before the body.

Sr. Juan Nicrossi has been named interim Prefect of Florida in place of Dr. J. L. Cuestas, whose resignation we mentioned yesterday. It is stated that Col. B. Caballero has already resigned the Prefecture of Salto to which he was appointed only last week.

Further telegrams have been received from the frontier Departments reporting everything perfectly tranquil. Nevertheless the Government continues to take precautions against any further surprise, one of the most important being the sending of a supply of arms and munitions to the frontier police stations. The cavalry regiment will also be supplied with their full quota of horses.

The Chief of the Arsenal has furnished his report of the material abstracted during the mutiny of the 4th instant. The chief items are 125 carbines, 227 bayonets, 34 loaded shells for Canet cannons, 35,000 Mauser cartridges, 200 revolver cartridges, 65 ponchos, etc. The mutineers left a number of things behind them, including 2 cavalry sabres, 2 police cutlasses, 32 reformed Mauser carbines and 4 horses. As the greater part of the stolen material is still unreturned, the police will probably be given extraordinary powers to search for them in suspected houses.

Trepanning by the Ancients.

The custom of trepanning, or taking small pieces of bone from the living head, was much practised in prehistoric times, as the skulls prove to us, and is still in vogue among some peoples. Among these are the people of the Berber stock in the Djebel Aurés and the Djebel Chechar at the edges of the Algerian plateau. The method of performing the operation is carefully described by Drs. H. Malbot and R. Verneau, of whom Dr. Malbot was shown by a native doctor a skull with more than a dozen circular holes, two small, and a large irregular one, all of which had been pierced when the man was alive. The skull was kept hidden, and was evidently used as an example by the local doctors. The natives have recourse to trepanning for blows or wounds on the head, and it does not matter how long before the blow may have been given, if only the sick person can remember that he has had one. The operation is not severe. A woman, tired of her husband, is said to have called in the service of a trepanner in order to get a divorce from him by producing a piece of her skull and affirming that he had broken it in some of his cruel acts.—*Appleton's Popular Science Monthly* (U.S.)

The Marvels of the X Rays.

One of the latest applications is described in a most interesting communication to the Académie des Sciences de Paris by H. Courot, in which he states that the X rays afford an instantaneous and certain means for determining the purity of mineral fuel. The fact that the diamond and wood are both permeable to these rays, whilst silica and the silicates remain opaque thereto, permitted the presumption that the combustible material of fuel would be transparent to the cathode rays, the siliceous ash-forming constituents, on the other hand, obstructing the passage of the rays and forming an obstacle the more impenetrable in proportion as their abundance increases. This hypothesis can be justified by a practical test, with a radioscopic screen and an X-ray apparatus. In every instance of the tests made by the author with anthracite, coal, lignite, peat, coke, and briquettes, the full details of the internal structure of the mineral matter of the fuel was plainly revealed, the slightest fragment of schist, invisible to the unaided eye, being shown upon the screen either as a black spot or as a dark band in the field illuminated by the rays. Coal being very transparent to the cathode rays, it is unnecessary to trim the sample into a regular shape, the large fragments furnished by natural cleavage sufficing for the test. The radiographs were obtained with a 10 inch exposure being for about five minutes, with samples measuring 1 1/4 to 2 inches in thickness.

THE WAR.

Yesterday's telegrams leave no doubt that preliminary steps have been taken towards peace, though so far the news comes entirely from the European side, and nothing transpires from Washington. As we make out, Mr. Cambon the French Minister in Washington handed to Mr. McKinley, on Tuesday, a letter from the Spanish Government, couched in general terms and asking on what terms peace could be

made. Nothing is said, however, about an armistice. It is expected that the negotiations, when opened, will be carried on between the Spanish and U. S. representatives in Paris. A Madrid telegram also confirms that the Spanish Cabinet has resolved to ask for peace. A statement is current in London, but is not easily credible, that the European Powers have agreed to guarantee the maintenance of Spanish dominion in the Philippines. The late of the Philippines seems to be exciting far more interest in Europe than that of Cuba (probably on account of its relation to the Far Eastern question) and the European Ambassadors in Washington are said to have approached the U. S. Government on the subject but without obtaining any definite reply beyond that the interests of the Powers would be respected.

General Nelson A. Miles has reported the safe landing of his expedition at Guanica in Puer Rico, 15 miles west of Ponce, on the morning of Monday. The Spanish seemed quite taken by surprise! Some 2000 Spanish tried to oppose the landing, but were speedily driven back and dispersed, with some losses, by fire from the Massachusetts, Colombia and Gloucester. The operation and landing was then effected, under the protection of the war vessels, without any loss or hitch at all. The bay affords excellent anchorage. The Spanish flag (it is not explained where) was hauled down and the Stars and Stripes run up in its place. The troops are in good health and spirits. The landing of other expeditions is expected to follow at once.

For about the twentieth time we are told that Guanlanomo has surrendered. As the fortress is now said to be occupied by U. S. forces, it is to be hoped we will hear no more of it.

Matters are quieting down in Santiago and the Province generally, and the difficulties between General Shafter and Calixto Garcia seem to be smoothing over, the latter understanding that it is a case of patience, and the U. S. States must be responsible for the administration of the province until the war is over. The port and bay of Santiago are being cleared of obstacles to commerce. The garrison duty is entrusted to troops from the Southern States, little liable to yellow fever. General Shafter has had a tiff with the Civil Governor, and uncivilly called him a «presuming rascal.» The alleged defeat of Calixto Garcia by a Spanish force is now denied. Garcia is at Jiguani. A strange statement appears to the effect that some of the surrendered Spanish officers hesitate to return to Spain, fearful of the reception they may get there, and one or two of them have actually offered their services to Calixto Garcia.

There is an absence of news from Spain, except that the attitude of the Carlists continues to cause grave anxiety. They are said to be congregating on the French side of the lower Pyrenees.

Vague reports again appear of the surrender of Manila, but may not be trusted until confirmed. There is no direct news thence.

SUNDRIES.

—On Saturday next H. M. S. «Flora» flagship on this station, will leave for the annual visit to Rio Janeiro, and, as we understand, she will be accompanied by all the other three vessels of the South Atlantic squadron. For some three months, therefore, the British residents in Uruguay will be deprived of such protection as is implied in the presence of a war vessel of their nation. Whether this is advisable in the present uncertain situation and after the experience of the recent outbreak, is very questionable. For our part, though we do not pretend to take an alarmist view of matters, we think that it would be wiser and also more reassuring if at least one of the vessels were left on station here for some time to come. The chief object of the South Atlantic squadron is, we believe, the protection of British lives and property in this part of the

world, yet we have noticed more than once that the vessels of the squadron have peculiar knack of being out of the way at the most critical moments. Last year, for instance, when the country was convulsed with revolution and no one knew from one day to another what might happen, the vessels were rarely seen here, and spent most of their time in costly and useless voyages between this port and the Falklands, quite out of call in case they were wanted. We do not know what the plans of the Admiralty or of the Commanding Officer may be in sending the entire squadron to Rio Janeiro, but we certainly think that at least one vessel should be left in or near this port and we take the liberty of calling the attention of our Minister to the point, for we believe the idea is shared by several British residents here.

—We remind subscribers to the Victoria Hall Fund, that it is to say the majority of our readers, of the First Annual General Meeting, which will be held at the British Consulate this afternoon for the presentation of accounts (a statement of which appears in our columns) and the election of new Trustees. It is also possible that some remarks may be made in reference to plans for erecting a Hall with the aid of the loan which has been conditionally promised from the Cemetery Fund, but we believe the Trustees are not yet prepared to advance a definite proposal. Any how, the meeting is an important one, and given the great interest felt in the object of the Fund, there should be a large and representative attendance.

—The R. M. S. «Nile» is expected early tomorrow morning bringing London dates to about the 9th instant.

—At the Cibils Theatre this evening Holden's inimitable Marionettes will appear in a programme with many novel items, the most important being an imitation of a bull fight. Our radical objections to bull fighting disappear when it is undertaken by marionettes, and no doubt the spectacle will be as harmless as amusing.

—A strange affair is reported from Manchester. A person condemned to a fine in a Civil Court (presumably at the Assizes) took out a pistol and shot the Judge in the face, wounding him dangerously. Fortunately this kind of offence is very rare.

—The marriage is announced, for October, of Mr. Carlos O. Krause to Miss Adela Eastmann.

—Mr. Des Portes, recently Secretary of the French Legation in Montevideo, has been decorated by his Government.—The name of Mr. Zola has been erased from the list of the Legion of Honour.—Mr. Zola is now reported to be in Hamburg where a monster Gymnastic Tourney, attended by some 50,000 gymnasts and students, is taking place.—The health of Prince Bismark is giving serious cause for alarm and he is said to be rapidly losing all strength.

—Handel's great but rarely heard oratorio «Judas Maccabees» has been performed with success in Buenos Aires by the Lomas Choral Society. The soloists were Mrs. G. De Franc, Miss Maude Morton, Rev. E. G. Coeks and Mr. J. Colquhoun. Mr. H. B. Owen was organist. Mr. Wall conducted and there was an orchestra of 40 musicians and a full choir. The performance took place in St. Andrew's Scotch Church.

—The B. A. Standard regrets to announce the death of our old friend Don Gmo. Davison, of Belgrano and Venado Tuerto, who died on Monday at his residence in Belgrano. He was well known both in native and English circles, and did important work for the National Government as one of the contractors of the waterworks in 1872. Of late years he had given up his business in contracts and bought an estancia in Venado Tuerto. He was a firm believer in the country and its fortunes, and though he made occasional trips home, he could not break the ties that bound him to the land of his adoption. Generous, hospitable and of a genial disposition, he was very straightforward in all his dealings, and all who had come in contact with him in public and private will regret his loss and mourn his absence. We tender his family our sincere condolences.

—The mere pedestrian, says a London paper, is threatened with a new terror. This is a development of «road skating.» Hitherto this pastime has been confined to small boys who appear never to have more than one skate apiece. Henceforth, however, road skating is to be a serious business. A «London Road Skating Club» has been formed, with a captain, a committee, «runs», «races», and «meets.» In a circular letter the hon. secretary assures us that «a number of the aristocracy are road skaters.» «Though I am not at liberty,» he adds, «to mention

names at present, I may say that some in the highest positions are taking up the pastime.» Thus do extremes meet, and dukes learn their pastimes from gutter snipes.

—The Anglo-American Committee recently formed in London for the promotion of closer ties has been joined by four dukes—Westminster, Newcastle, Sutherland, and Marlborough—by Sir H. H. Fowler, Lord Ripon, and Sir George Trevelyan, Lord Loch, Lord Davey, Sir Robert Reid, Lord Rayleigh, Sir John Lubbock, Sir John Kennaway, Mr. J. W. Mellor, Q. C., Mr. Horace Plunkett, Lord Tennyson, Mr. Herbert Spencer, and Mr. Algernon Swinburne. Thirteen more Bishops, including the Archbishops of Armagh and Dublin, have also joined the Committee; fifty lord mayors or mayors, the heads of the two great Universities, and of all the great public schools, and the Agents-General of the great Colonies. The President of the Wesleyan Conference, and the Chairman of the Baptist Union and Congregational Union are among the members. Literature has shown a keen interest in the movement; the new adherents including Mr. Leslie Stephen, Professor Dicey, Sir Edwin Arnold, Sir Edward Russell, and Mr. Rider Haggard. From the first our greater artists have been eager to identify themselves with the committee, and the latest recruits include Sir W. B. Richmond, Mr. G. F. Watts, and Mr. Britton Riviere. Finance is also represented in the person of the Governor of the Bank of England.

—The Queen, says an interesting article in «The Quiver» is very fond of the hymn «Nearer, my God, to Thee,» and so are the Prince and Princess of Wales. Another great favourite with the Prince is the Soldier's Hymn, written by the Rev. Arthur Robins, of Holy Trinity Church Windsor, and set to Rossini's music. Never does the Prince attend that church without this hymn being sung, in which he joins heartily. Charles Wesley's «Jesus, Lover of my Soul,» and old John Newton's «How sweet the Name of Jesus sounds!» have always been much enjoyed and appreciated by the Queen, but for the last thirty years her choice has fallen most frequently on hymns relating to the future state, and breathing the spirit of resignation.

LONDON NOTES.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 29.

Official dispatches received in Madrid from the Governor General of Manila state that there is much sickness among the Spanish troops. A number of volunteers have refused to man the trenches. Aguinado, the insurgent leader, has summoned the Governor to surrender. The German Admiral has summoned Aguinado to release the family of the Governor-General, but without success. A semi-official statement is made at Berlin to the effect that German marines will be landed as soon as it becomes necessary to protect German subjects.

Martial law has been declared in the disturbed districts in Galicia. The area of the riots is spreading.

The new French Cabinet has now been definitely formed. The most dangerous task ahead is the question of the suspension of the corn duties. The proposal to prolong it is already meeting with opposition, but on the other hand the Cabinet must seek to avoid earning notoriety as a dear bread Government.

On the motion for the third reading of the Benefices (No. 2) Bill, Sir William Harcourt made clear the objection he had taken in the earlier stages of the measure to ritualistic practices which were so prevalent in the Church of England. He objected to a Bill which while professing to reform abuses in the Church, did not deal with its greatest abuse. His cry had been, as was said, not one of «no Popery,» but of «no treachery.» Having explained why he was not able to move the amendment of which he had given notice on the report stage, Sir William traced the recrudescence of obnoxious practices in the Church to laxity in administration. After a debate, in which Mr. Balfour joined, the Bill was read a third time without a division. The Prisons Bill, as amended, was then considered.

A large and fashionable assembly thronged the Hotel Cecil yesterday when the Princess of Wales opened a bazaar in aid of the funds of the London Hospital.

A considerable saving on operations of the Works Department in the half-year ended in March last was reported at yesterday's meeting of the London County Council. The proposed by-laws coming on for consideration the first one, directed against street noises, was opposed by those anxious that costermongers and street hawkers should not be interfered with. This by-law was referred back by 01

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votes against 31, and the consideration of the others was postponed. After Monday's rain the bright sunshine of yesterday made the ground anything but favourable to batsmen, and as a consequence, wickets fell freely, and for comparatively small totals. At Lord's, for instance, thirty batsmen were disposed of in the course of the day, Oxford University beating the M. C. C. by nine wickets. Richardson was in better form at the Oval than he has been in any preceding match this season, and Somerset had to follow on, still requiring 146 at the drawing of stumps to escape a single innings' defeat. At Bradford, Yorkshire completely outplayed Essex. Bowling for Middlesex against Lancashire at Manchester, J. T. Hearne accomplished a remarkable performance, and as a consequence, the visitors left off on pretty even terms with their formidable opponents. At Derby the home eleven beat Leicestershire by an innings and 31 runs.

Hermann Verweck Steward at the Myddleton Dramatic Club in Pentonville-road, was, at the Clerkenwell Police Court, yesterday, fined 10s. for selling intoxicating drink and tobacco at that place without a licence.

THURSDAY, JUNE 30.
The position of the Americans in front of Santiago remain unchanged. The troops are busy getting up guns and stores to the front, where 13,000 men are now assembled. It is stated that 8,000 Spanish troops are marching to Santiago, and are within 54 miles of that city. General Shafter is expected to deliver his assault before they can arrive.

Yesterday the House of Commons spent the afternoon in Committee on the Evidence in Criminal Cases Bill. Several amendments were moved with the object of limiting the scope of the measure, but they were defeated. The first Clause was still under discussion when the House adjourned.

Presiding last evening at the annual dinner of the United Club at St James's Hall, Lord Salisbury answered critics of the Government who complained that little had been achieved by the Foreign Office. Whilst the country was to be congratulated on the treaty that was signed, he pointed out that the policy of this country in that locality had completely changed in the past thirty years, and their present efforts had been neutralised by the errors of the past. As to the Far East, the British aim was to maintain the Chinese Empire, to prevent it falling into ruins, to invite it in the paths of reform, and to give it every assistance to perfect its defence or to increase its commercial prosperity.

Last evening, at the Mansion House, the Lord Mayor received a company of nearly three hundred officers of the British Navy, invited to meet Mr. Goschen. In the course of an animated speech the First Lord of the Admiralty pointed out that all the demands made upon the minds of the present generation of naval officers in the direction of education had not in any way diminished their courage or physique. Of the responsibility which rested on the Admiralty to supply the most perfect instruments for the use of the navy he was fully conscious, and he utterly scouted the idea that the Government could be in any way influenced by social prejudices to limit the supply. The navy never stood higher in the affection and confidence of the nation than it did at the present moment. It is reported that Mr. Ritchie has informed Mr. W. Abraham M. P., that he will appoint a conciliator in the Welsh colliery dispute, but has not yet decided whom he will nominate.

Speech Day at Harrow was celebrated yesterday, the weather being beautifully fine, and the attendance very large. One of the speeches was a selection from Mr. Bright's oration on America, delivered in 1861 which was afterwards referred to by Lord Peel at the luncheon, and evoked hearty expressions of sympathy.

There was a pleasant gathering at the Queen's Hall, Langham-place, yesterday, on the occasion of the annual vocal musical display by children attending the London Board schools. Lord Reay (chairman of the Board) presided, and the performances of the various choirs gave great satisfaction. A new feature, which was much approved, was a «Costume Recital», in which selections from the operetta «Columbus in a Merry Key» were given.

An alarming accident occurred yesterday afternoon at Keyham Dockyard Devonport. Three vessels were being moved from one part of the floating basin to another when a bawser suddenly snapped. This caused the bowsprit of the battleship Temeraire to strike a pair of steel legs eighty-seven feet in height, which had a lifting power of 75 tons. The force of the blow made the legs collapse, and they fell with a tremendous crash.

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SOLE AGENT FOR THE URUGUAY REPUBLIC.

The steel legs broke in several pieces, two of the supports blocking the main road, whilst the third fell into the basin. Representatives of Oxford and Cambridge Universities met yesterday at Queen's Club for the 35th annual series of athletic competitions. It was generally anticipated that the Dark Blues would win, but they surpassed the most sanguine expectations, proving successful by seven events to two.

During a cycle race at the Crystal Palace yesterday one of the handle bars of a quirette ridden by pacers broke. The man was thrown violently to the ground, and the well-known cyclist, Platt-Betts, received very severe injuries.

Somerset made a splendid rally at the Oval yesterday, and in the end set Surrey the task of getting 153 to win with little less than two hours to do it in. The home side just accomplished the task in the time for the loss of a single wicket. At Bradford Yorkshire added to their long list of successes by defeating Essex by an innings and 88 runs. Kent, at Nottingham, were beaten by seven wickets. A keenly-fought game between Lancashire and Middlesex resulted in a victory for the northern county by 44 runs.

Shortly after the trial of Dr. Collins was resumed at the Old Bailey yesterday a scene was occasioned by the prisoner suddenly falling forward in an epileptic fit. He remained unconscious for three-quarters of an hour. Upon his seizure the Court adjourned until the afternoon, when the prisoner appeared somewhat stronger, but still looked very weak. The evidence of Dr. Collins taken at the instance was read over and Mr. Uzielli was afterwards recalled to deny the accuracy of several of the statements made by Dr. Collins before the Coroner.

Yesterday the Select Committee on Money Lending met and adopted the report of their Chairman, Mr. T. W. Russell. A number of recommendations are made, amongst them that full and unfettered discretion should be given to the Judges of the High Court, the County Courts, and the Bankruptcy Court, to deal with individual cases upon their merits. It is also suggested that money-lenders should be registered, that they should be compelled to keep books, that their accounts should be open to inspection, as in the case of pawn-brokers, and that they should trade under their own name, and not under multiple names, or as corporations or companies under fanciful designations.


